**Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's
DNA Project**

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

Oregon State Library

The Reference Room at the Oregon State Library will be closed on January 27th, 28th, and 29th (Monday thru Wednesday of the last week in January) for installation of new blinds in the Reference Room.

Financial Report 2013

Our Society maintains funds for the Book Fund, Operations, Publications, Equipment/Ancestry.com and Life Memberships.

Book Fund—funded by donations to purchase books for the Oregon State Library. \$3,560

Operations— money received from membership, research fees, sales of tote bags and charts, some donations, used for newsletter, Beaver Briefs, postage, fees and permits, subscriptions, office supplies, special events. \$1,200

Publications—used to pay for printing our publications and sales from publications goes into the fund. \$1,900

Equipment/Ancestry.com—set up to purchase equipment and pay for ancestry.com if necessary, receives money from donations. \$7,110

Life Membership—Funds from Life Membership, cannot be spent. \$4,480

Oregon State Library Transformation

On October 25, 2013 Senator Steiner Hayward and Representative Nathanson of the Joint Ways and Means Committee, Subcommittee on General Government, provided an outline for the transformation. Concerning historical, cultural, and genealogical materials that would not typically be used for research for state agencies the report says:

Oregon Genealogy: This function will fully shift to the Oregon Historical Society. OHS should then determine the best method of collaborating with outside genealogical groups, such as the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society.

State Documents and State History: All required state documents will be consolidated with the Archives and any materials that are not government records and should be kept for historical purposes will then be moved to the Oregon Historical Society

Oregon taxpayers are entitled to answers. Questions that you can ask Senator Steiner Hayward and your legislators:

- 1) What does it cost to maintain these collections at the Oregon State Library?
- 2) What will it cost to move the collections?
- 3) Where will the collections be housed and is there currently room at the Archives and Oregon Historical Society?
- 4) What plans do you have for an empty Library?
- 5) How will you guarantee free public access?
- 6) Why spend taxpayer money on moving collections when they have space now?
- 7) If you are insistent that the Oregon Historical Society be in charge of the collections, why can't they be left where they are under the supervision of OHS?
- 8) Why can't maintenance of these collections be funded by the General Fund instead of assessing other agencies? It's all taxpayer money.
- 9) If the object of the transformation is not to save the state money, shouldn't it be?
- 10) Why are DAS, the Oregon Historical Society and the Subcommittee working behind closed doors and not talking to the public?

You Can't Believe the Census Records!

Census records are amongst the primary tools of genealogists. Even so, those of us who have been reading them for a while can tell you that the records are not as reliable as we would wish. I am still trying to find great-great-granddad in the 1850 census although he appears hale and hearty in the enumerations of 1840, 1860, 1870 and 1880. His absence in 1850 is still unexplained. Still, my quandary is minor compared to some others. For instance, the 1990 census is thought to have missed one native American in eight. Thousands of others – perhaps millions – have been missed in census records taken over the past two centuries.

FamilySearch Adds More Than 1.9 Million Indexed Records and Images to Collections from Austria, Denmark, Hungary, and the United States December 26, 2013

FamilySearch has added more than 1.9 million indexed records and images to collections from Austria, Denmark, Hungary, and the United States. Notable collection updates include the 834,729 indexed records and images from the U.S., Maryland, Baltimore Passenger Lists, 1820–1948, collection, the 590,658 indexed records from the new U.S., New York, State Health Department, Genealogical Research Death Index, 1957–1963, collection, and the 12,338 indexed records and images from the new Hungary, Jewish Vital Records Index, 1800–1945, collection. Now Online: Albany County, New York, Marriages, Deaths & Miscellany 1837 - 1860

The following was received from Bill McGrath, TIGS Project Coordinator for the Troy Irish Genealogy Society:

Announcing a New Database: West Troy Advocate Marriages, Deaths & Miscellany 1837 - 1860

- A. The West Troy Advocate, a weekly newspaper, was published every Wednesday in the Village of West Troy, Albany County, from October, 1837 to 1865. The Village of West Troy, by the way, became part of what is now the city of Watervliet, New York in 1896. A data base of 380 pages of marriages, deaths and miscellany news stories transcripts from the newspaper has now been added to the Troy Irish Genealogy web site. You can view these records by going to the Troy Irish Genealogy website at: www.troyirish.com and click on TIGS PROJECTS and then click on WEST TROY ADVOCATE NEWSPAPER.
- B. The newspaper was founded by William Hollands, Sr. of Waterford and was the first newspaper published in the Village of West Troy. Upon the death of Mr. Hollands, Sr., on June 8, 1853, the paper was continued by the family under the editorship and management of his son, William Hollands, Jr.
- C. In reviewing the 380 pages of transcripts, an index of "6,248 Surnames" was developed along with an index of "1,473 Subject" entries. In the "Subject" index, for instance, you will find numerous Canal Boats by names, Civil War Battles including deaths and battle field injuries, numerous drowning deaths, industrial accidents, murders and suicides, train accidents along with many references to local factories, stores and companies.
- D. After checking out the surnames you are researching and scanning the Subject index to see what item interest you, it is suggested that you read all 380 pages of these excerpts. These news stories provide a glimpse into life and customs in the mid 1800's. One custom, for example, mentioned in many of the marriage notices, was that the newspaper reporter was provided with a slice of the wedding cake by the bride!



Research

Records Preservation and Access Committee December 16, 2013

Bad news: The Records Preservation and Access Committee of the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the National Genealogical Society, and the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies reports that another step has been taken to restrict access to the Social Security Death Index. This afternoon senators voted 64 to 36 to approve the bipartisan budget agreement. Section 203 restricts access to the Death Master File (DMF) to certified individuals under a new program established under the Department of Commerce.

This section also establishes a new user fee to cover the cost of certification that is projected to raise \$517 million over 10 years.

RPAC will be outlining the approach we will be recommending that the genealogical community take in participating in the process Commerce is expected to take in developing this new program. Much more to come. Stay tuned.

Oregon Death Indexes

The Oregon Center for Health Statistics has previously compiled a death index for Oregon deaths every five years. The last one was 2004-2008. However due to rising costs the Center will no longer compile indexes (the 2009-2013 should have been released this year). This makes the Social Security Death Index even more important.

Death certificates are still transferred to State Archives after 50 years. In 2014 death certificates for all counties in Oregon for 1963 will be transferred. This takes some time. You can go to the Archives in Salem yourself and make a 25 cent copy of a death certificate.



Research

Larimer County Genealogical Society, Colorado <http://www.lcgsc.org/county-indexes/>

Larimer County is located in northern Colorado, along the Wyoming border. Its county seat is Fort Collins. Online databases:

1885 State Census, Larimer County, Colorado

When the 1885 state census was taken, Larimer County, which was created in 1861, included what is now Jackson County. Jackson County was created in 1909, from a section of Larimer County known as North Park. The information recorded in the census includes line number, dwelling number, surname, given name, color, sex, age, relationship, marital status, occupation, birthplace, father's birthplace, and mother's birthplace.

General Index - 1862-1872

This database contains records of land transfers in Larimer County between 1862 and 1872, transcribed from the original Larimer County Court-house General Index books.

Marriage Index Volume 1, 1858-1910

The records in this database were extracted from Larimer County marriage indexes from 1858 to 1910. The database includes marriages for both Larimer County and Jackson County.

Fort Collins *Coloradoan* Obituaries

The genealogical society has begun a project to digitize obituaries published in Larimer County publications. This database indexes digital images of obituaries from the Fort Collins *Coloradoan* from March 1988 to August 2002. The database is organized alphabetically by last name. The index includes last name, first name, and date on which the obituary appeared in the newspaper.
