**Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's
DNA Project**

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

Oregon State Library Transformation

The latest news on the Transformation from Senator Steiner Hayward is that no new legislation will be introduced at the Legislative session in February 2014. The October report stated **"February 2014: Pass legislation for statute revisions with phased implementations between Feb 2014 and June 30, 2015 (end of biennium)."** It's hard to say if this is good news or bad, but perhaps it's not so easy to move everything to the Historical Society!

I did address the State Library Board of Trustees on December 20, 2014 and submit a letter on behalf of WVGS. I addressed the concerns over public access to the collections and the mission statement, which does not mention Oregonians accessing historical materials.

I also have been asked to write a letter that members can use to present to interested parties. My attempt at that is on page 5—feel free to print copies of it.

To Oregonians concerning the Oregon State Library Transformation:

For several years the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) has been working with the Oregon Legislature and the Governor to reduce duplication of services, update and modernize, and reduce costs at the Oregon State Library. This process is called the Oregon State Library Transformation. It involves the Oregon State Library, the State Archives, the State of Oregon Law Library, and the Oregon Historical Society.

On October 25, 2013 Senator Steiner Hayward and Representative Nathanson of the Joint Ways and Means Committee, Subcommittee on General Government, provided an outline for the transformation. Concerning historical, cultural, and genealogical materials that would not typically be used for research for state agencies the report says:

Oregon Genealogy: This function will fully shift to the Oregon Historical Society. OHS should then determine the best method of collaborating with outside genealogical groups, such as the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society.

State Documents: All required state documents will be consolidated with the Archives and any materials that are not government records and should be kept for historical purposes will then be moved to the Oregon Historical Society

State History: Similar to the State Documents, all required state documents will be consolidated with the Archives and any materials that are not government records and should be kept for historical purposes will then be moved to the Oregon Historical Society.

Our concerns with this are:

The Oregon State Library has many books purchased with taxpayer money which will be moved to a private organization. Books were donated to the Oregon State Library with the understanding that they would be available to anyone who came to the Library.

Oregonians have had access to historical and genealogical materials at the Oregon State Library. Oregon Historical Society charges a fee.

These changes eliminate public access when **"It is a basic right of citizens to know about the activities of their government, to benefit from the information developed at public expense and to have permanent access to the information published by state agencies." Oregon Revised Statutes, 357.001**

Please contact your legislator to let them know that the proposed changes will eliminate the public services of the Oregon State Library and relocate public documents and historic items at locations with limited public access.

Onondaga County Public Library Local History and Genealogy Databases by Valerie Beaudrault

Onondaga County is located in the west central part of the state of New York. Its county seat is Syracuse. The Onondaga County Public Library Local History and Genealogy Department has produced and uploaded a number of “one-of-a-kind” searchable databases to its website.

- **1855 and 1865 New York State Census for Onondaga County** The 1855 index includes the city of Syracuse and some or all of the towns of Clay, Cicero, Dewitt, Geddes, Manlius, and Salina. The index contains 5,432 records. The 1865 index, which contains 8,143 records, includes the city of Syracuse and some or all of the towns of Geddes, Lysander, Manlius, Onondaga, Salina, and Van Buren.
- **Necrology** This database serves as an index to deaths of residents of Onondaga County. The list was derived from a number of sources, which include WPA records, “Minnie Kellogg’s deaths from Syracuse newspapers and directories between 1850-1880,” and obituaries found in Syracuse newspapers. Most of the deaths occurred prior to 1900.
- **Obituary Clippings** This index to obituary clippings from Syracuse newspapers covers 1862 through 1992. The clippings are from the library’s Local History/Genealogy Department. The collection also includes clippings related to other types of records, such as marriages and probate. You may order a copy of the clipping from the Local History/Genealogy Department.
- **Timeline** Using various sources, the timeline covers major local events from 1654 through 1994. You can search the timeline by record number, event, date, year, notes, and citation.
- **Woodlawn Cemetery**, on the east side of Syracuse, is one of the largest in the county. There are more than 46,000 records in the index. The search fields are last name, first name, year, month, day of death, section, lot, grave number, mausoleum code, row, tier number, block number, and record number.
- **Onondaga County WPA Files** Individuals working for the Works Progress Administration during the Depression compiled a card index for items of general and historic value to the region from the newspaper files of the Syracuse Public Library and the Historical Scrap Books of the Onondaga Historical Association. The original index has been digitized and uploaded to the library’s website. It covers 1814 through 1900 and contains nearly 53,000 records.

Dutch ancestry in New Netherlands

- **New Netherlands Institute** For a quarter of a century, the New Netherland Institute (NNI) has helped cast light on America’s long-neglected Dutch roots. Created in 1986 as the Friends of the New Netherland Project, it has supported the transcription, translation, and publication of the 17th-century Dutch colonial records held by the New York State Library and State Archives. These records constitute the world’s largest collection of original documentation of the Dutch West India Company and its New World Colonies. The New Netherland Research Center is making available digitized versions of translations and transcriptions of documents relating to New Netherland. Written in an archaic hand, these seventeenth-century documents were damaged by fire and water, but they are our best source of knowledge about the former Dutch colony. Available on this website are government records held by the New York State Archives, private and corporate papers from the collections of the New York State Library, and selected documents from other repositories. Scanned originals of many of these documents are available on the websites of the New York State Archives and New York State Library.

- **Olive Tree Genealogy** Olive Tree Genealogy has records, links and information on New Netherland records. The first churches established in New York during the 17th. century were Dutch Reformed, French Protestant, and Lutheran churches. As New Englanders migrated to New York, the Congregational Church (Puritans) and Society of Friends (Quakers) grew. Many New Yorkers joined both the Baptists and Presbyterians. By 1775 the Presbyterian Church was the largest denomination in New York. The site includes **Church Records of New Netherland/ New York on the Olive Tree Genealogy, Church Records on other Sites, County Church Records of New Netherland New York on other Sites** (arranged by county), **List of New York Reformed Dutch Churches with dates of records**, a link to **Names of Persons for whom marriage licences were registered in NY State previous to 1784** (The complete book put online by *Making of America Journals* at Cornell University).

- **Oregon Societies** Listing of Oregon Societies with Web Sites, Listing of snail mail addresses for Oregon Historical and Genealogical Societies.
