Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

NEW! Discover close relatives and your ethnic percentages with Family Finder! Available to both males and females.

Family Finder uses autosomal DNA (inherited from both the mother and father, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc.) to provide you a breakdown of your ethnic percentages and connect you with relatives descended from any of your ancestral lines within approximately the last 5 generations.

Family Surname File

Over the years, WVGS corresponding secretaries have done research for people with requests to the Society. They copied their results and filed them in the wooden filing cabinets in the Microfilm Room, labeled as Family Surname Files. Also members donated some of their research or small individual genealogies were also donated. These eleven drawers are now indexed! Thanks to volunteers Jerry Rodgers, Dee Iltis, Fran Eriksen, Renee Melton-Hart, Dianne Harsh, and Sue Masse for helping with this project.

The index is sorted by surname and gives the name of the primary individual, as well as a brief description of what is in the file. Most individuals had a connection to Oregon, although not all. Files contain family group sheets completed by WVGS as they researched a request, donated pedigrees, booklets, and some original documents. Some small genealogies in the filing cabinets are still in the Oregon State Library online catalog, with the location "GS Vertical File".

Oregon State Library Transformation Update

The Project Manager released a draft statement on August 30, 2013 (page 15 below). There seems to be no recommendation concerning the genealogy collection. The Legislative Joint Ways and Means Subcommittee on State Library meets for a work session on September 17th. I'll keep you informed!

Transformational Change 4: Non-Government Materials Collections

Description of Current Services

OSL manages genealogy materials, poetry collection, and Oregon Book Awards collection. There are on-going MOUs with Willamette Valley Genealogical Society and Oregon State Poetry Association. These collections are complementary to the heritage collections. Management of these collections requires a small amount of OSL staff time for processing and maintaining.

Need for Change

Current funding (assessment) is designated for services to state agencies. There is unclear alignment between services provided and funding sources.

Service Delivery Alternatives

- Seek alternative funding. To maintain the current availability and access to non-government materials, OSL could work with current partners to explore funding service delivery alternatives such as cost sharing.
- Discontinue OSL support for non-government materials. To enhance the alignment of OSL services and funding, OSL could work with current partners to explore alternative locations for these materials.

Anticipated Outcomes

- Better alignment of funding and utilization
- Preserve culturally significant collections

Considerations

Financial

- Stronger partnerships could save staff time and funding
- Grant funding should be explored for maintaining these collections
- While the genealogy collection may not be seen as useful to state agencies it has been used to some extent by the reference librarians to respond to agency questions
- Is cost recovery or general fund more appropriate for functions that will serve the public
- It will be necessary to assess how these changes may impact existing agreement with Ancestry.com

Organizational

- There is substantial public support and advocacy for genealogy and poetry
- The impact on staffing the reference room and technical services will need to be assessed
- The Oregon Poet Laureate's reading room which houses the poetry collection could be decommissioned and the space repurposed
- There are potential changes to the administrative rules

Technological

- Other than the Ancestry.com data files, there are no real technology concerns. Our association with Ancestry.com is through the WVGS so the disposition of those files will need to be discussed

New site for photos

MyHeritage.com Launches Treasure Family Photos

MyHeritage released a new service, called **Treasure Family Photos**. The purpose is to encourage people to learn more about their family's history from their old photos and to preserve these precious artifacts online for future generations. In fact, MyHeritage.com now has the largest family photographs sharing web site.

This initiative is endorsed by the New England Historic Genealogical Society and features **Maureen Taylor, the world renowned "Photo Detective"**, who will be sharing tips for understanding photos through a video, a webinar, and appearances on US national television.

Daniel Horowitz, Chief Genealogical Officer at MyHeritage, stated, "We've launched a special website detailing ways to get involved. It's full of tips and tricks for helping people understand the clues in their old family photos and explains the importance of family photos for family history research. We give suggestions for preserving photos and creative ideas for getting the younger generations involved.

"We've also announced today that we have the world's largest international collection of old family photos online. MyHeritage users from around the world have contributed and shared family photos on the site and those that were shared publicly are searchable by name, date, location and keywords via SuperSearch.

"Lastly, we've doubled our free photo storage allocation to enable users to upload and share more photos on their private family sites at no cost."

World War I Research

On July 12, 1973, a disastrous fire at the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) destroyed approximately 16-18 million Official Military Personnel Files (OMPF).

The records affected:

- **Army Personnel discharged November 1, 1912 to January 1, 1960 80%**
- **Air Force Personnel discharged September 25, 1947 to January 1, 1964 (with names alphabetically after Hubbard, James E.) 75%**

No duplicate copies of these records were ever maintained, nor were microfilm copies produced. Neither were any indexes created prior to the fire. In addition, millions of documents had been lent to the Department of Veterans Affairs before the fire occurred. Therefore, a complete listing of the records that were lost is not available. However, in the years following the fire, the NPRC collected numerous series of records (referred to as Auxiliary Records) that are used to reconstruct basic service information.

Online World War I Indexes & Records - USA

Note: before 1939 the First World War was known as "The Great War"

- **World War One Draft Registration Cards Index** (with digital images) Ancestry subscription. Now available for all states, plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico - has nearly 24 million records; includes digitized images of the draft cards (from National Archives Microfilm Publication M1509, imaged from FHL microfilm)
- **World War I Civilian Draft Registrations Index** Ancestry (free to search, but not complete) about 5% of the men who registered are included here -- nearly 1.2 million names of the 24 million total
- **American Soldiers of World War I - Death Index** Ancestry, arranged alphabetically by state
- **U.S. Naval Deaths, World War I** Ancestry
- **U.S. Marine Corps Muster Rolls, 1893-1940** Ancestry, not specific to World War I, but includes the WWI years
- **United States Registers of Enlistments in the U.S. Army, 1798-1914** FamilySearch
- **United States World War I Draft Registration Cards, 1917-1918** FamilySearch
- **United States Veterans Administration Pension Payment Cards, 1907-1933**

September Program

Our September program was a member participation program about the Civil War. Susan Niggli, WVGS member and retired Oregon State Library employee, brought out seldom used books from the Library on the Civil War. There is at least one book on Civil War participation for most states. Some books are regimental histories, some are letters and dispatches by officers. Also the Adjutant General of the US made a report on the illnesses and injuries that occurred during the war, as did many states.

In addition the Library has books on what took place day by day, as well as Who's Who. The online catalog can be searched from home. If the location is OSL Main, record the Call No. as the book is in the stacks and will have to be retrieved. Books located in OSL Genealogy are on a shelf in the Reference Room and those in the Genealogy Annex are easily retrieved by a volunteer.

After the book presentation, members shared their stories and heirlooms of ancestors who served in the Civil War. The hand-outs "Some books on the Civil War at the Oregon State Library" and "Strategies for Tracing Union Civil War Veterans" by David Allen Lambert are available at the Reference Desk.

Research

New Online Guides for Boston and Suffolk County, Massachusetts

Free guides to finding ancestors in Boston and Suffolk County, Massachusetts, are now available online. They are the latest in a series of guides to genealogical research in Massachusetts prepared by Family Search. (Also see Plymouth County.) These guides were compiled with the help of fellow genealogists and archivists and librarians at area repositories.

The largest section of the guide covers Boston churches. 108 churches were established in the city by 1846. Entries include name changes, location, notes, records, online resources, publications (with links), and a list of ministers. The minister list allows researchers who have a civil marriage record with a minister's name to identify the church where the marriage took place.

The guide also presents an inventory of records for the town (1630-1822) and city (1822-present) in all the major Boston repositories. A List of Residents (1909-1960), which can be used in conjunction with the census and city directories, is useful for tracking ancestors in the city, especially those who frequently moved. This guide also lists in chronological order every newspaper published in the city to 1855. If a digital copy is available -- most pre-1830 newspapers are digitized -- the guide provides information about where to locate it.

The Suffolk County guide offers a brief history of the county; a table of county border changes; a list of towns and cities in the county (and those annexed by Boston) with links to their separate pages; a clickable town outline map of the county and surrounding area; notable histories with cataloging and digital online version links; discussion of land, probate, and court records; maps; and links to research libraries in the county.

Given the size of Boston, the annexed towns have their own detailed guides:

Brighton (1807-1874), Charlestown (1630-1874)
Dorchester (1630-1870), Hyde Park (1868-1912)
Roxbury (1630-1868), West Roxbury (1851-1874)

Guides were also prepared for the other towns in Suffolk County:

Chelsea, Revere, Winthrop

Each of these town guides includes a brief history; information about border changes; histories; vital records; city directories; cemetery, church, and town records; newspapers; and local libraries and historical societies. Many links are provided to digital books, online databases, and free transcriptions, when available. These links are especially helpful for the cemetery and church records.


