

Are you eligible to ask for relief from registering as a sex offender?

There are three classification levels for people sentenced as adults in Oregon for a sex offense. Your level is decided by the Oregon Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision. The type of relief for which you are eligible depends on your classification level.

To ask for relief from registration as a sex offender, you must file a petition through the court in which you were convicted. You may hire an attorney to help with the process. You will be responsible for any court fees and legal costs.

Level One: If you are a Level One sex offender, you may ask for relief from registration 10 years after supervision for your sex crime ends.

Level Two: If you are a Level Two sex offender, you may ask to be moved from Level Two to Level One 10 years after supervision for your sex crime ends. If you move to Level One, you may ask for relief from registration 5 years after you become a Level One sex offender.

Level Three: If you are a Level Three sex offender, you may ask to be moved from Level Three to Level Two 10 years after supervision for your sex crime ends. You are not eligible for reclassification below Level Two. You must continue to register as a sex offender for the rest of your life.

Registration and reporting requirements for youth convicted as adults for a sex offense

Follow these rules if you are required to register and report for a sex offense

What crimes require you to register as a sex offender?

The following list shows examples of crimes that require you to register as a sex offender. Talk with your attorney or review the Oregon Revised Statutes for the complete list.

- Rape
- Sodomy
- Unlawful sexual penetration
- Sexual abuse
- Compelling or promoting prostitution
- Using a child in a display of sexually explicit conduct
- Encouraging child sexual abuse in the 1st or 2nd degree
- Transporting child pornography into the state
- Incest with a child victim
- Kidnapping in the 1st degree if the victim is under age 18

When do you have to register and update your registration?

You must register within 10 days of:

- Release from an OYA close-custody facility if you are paroled directly to adult community supervision
- Release from a DOC facility if your sentence requires you to transfer to a DOC facility after leaving OYA
- Release from a jail or other secure facility
- Any change of residence, including moving out of Oregon

- Your birthday each year, even if your address has not changed
- The first day you attend a college or other institution of higher education as a student
- A change in your student enrollment status at an institution of higher education
- The first day you volunteer at or become an intern at an institution of higher education
- A change in your volunteer or intern status at an institution of higher education
- Your first day on a new job at an institution of higher education or at a job that takes you to a campus
- A change in your job status at an institution of higher education or at a job that takes you to a campus

Where do you register and update your registration?

You must report in person to the Oregon State Police, local county sheriff's office, or local city police department.

Is there a fee to register as a sex offender?

Yes. You must pay \$70 per year to the Oregon State Police as long as you are required to register as a sex offender. Your first payment is due the first time you register. Each year after that, a bill will be sent to your last known address. You are responsible for keeping your address information up to date with the Oregon State Police.

What happens if you do not follow the registration requirements?

If you fail to meet the registration requirements, you could be arrested and face more charges. It is very important to meet all registration requirements. How long must you register as a sex offender?

You must register as a sex offender for the rest of your life, unless you are granted relief from registration.
