JJIS Mission

To promote public safety and youth accountability, and to offer opportunities for rehabilitation to youth, through the development and sustainability of a statewide juvenile justice information system.

JJIS Steering Committee

The JJIS Steering Committee is the governance body providing guidance to oversight of JJIS activities. The committee represents Oregon's 36 counties, the Oregon Youth Authority, and other statewide partners.

Oversight responsibilities include monitoring appropriate use of JJIS and its data, prioritizing development of software features, making policy decisions, and authorizing access to statewide data for research and program evaluation.

The committee meets monthly to ensure that JJIS is on task to accomplish the vision and goals of the JJIS partnership.



JJIS Data and Evaluation Subcommittee

The JJIS Data and Evaluation Subcommittee is a standing committee of the JJIS Steering Committee, contributing to local and statewide research initiatives, program and system evaluations, and policy recommendations regarding the use of data. The subcommittee supports the juvenile justice system by ensuring consistency, accuracy and appropriateness of the data, guiding the development of routine and annual reports and statistics, and interpreting relevant data analyses.



Introduction

Oregon's juvenile justice community is committed to providing effective and efficient services to promote public safety, ensure justice for victims, and prevent youth from repeating criminal behavior.

The use of detention is one key aspect of the juvenile justice system. This document contains statewide and county specific reports describing youth admissions to and releases from juvenile detention facilities*.

Contents of this report

There are three statewide reports and three for each county. The three reports are:

Detention Admissions Reason by Demographics

A unique count of admissions to a detention facility during the year, by the reason the youth was admitted to the facility and demographic characteristic (age, sex, and race/ethnicity) of the youth being admitted.

Detention Length of Stay by Demographics

For each detention release during the year, the length of time spent in the facility (length of stay) by demographic characteristic (age, sex, and race/ethnicity) of the youth. (Note: The associated "admission" may have occurred in a prior reporting year.)

Detention Length of Stay by Admission Reason

For each detention release during the year, the number of days the youth spent in the facility (length of stay) by the reason the youth was admitted to the facility. (Note: The associated "admission" may have occurred in a prior reporting year.)

Each report divides Admission Reasons and Length of Stay into Pre-Adjudicatory, Post Adjudicatory, and Warrant or Other. Pre-adjudication admission reasons are further grouped by juvenile admissions and automatic transfers to adult court.

Percentages, sub-totals, and grand totals are provided for each category.

*Many county juvenile detention facilities operate Detention Based Youth Care Centers within their detention facilities. Admission statistics for Detention Based Youth Care Centers are not included with these reports.

Notes about the information

Admissions: An Admission is an entry into a detention facility during the reporting year. It is possible for a youth to have more than one admission in the reporting year.

Length of Stay: Length of Stay is computed by subtracting the admission date from the release date. If a youth is admitted and released on the same day, the Length of Stay is one day. Length of Stay is only computed for youth who have been released from a detention facility. The Admission may have occurred in a prior reporting year.

Reporting Year: The calendar year is used for the reporting period.

County: This is a youth-based report, not a facility report. Youth are counted in the county that had jurisdiction over the youth at the time the detention reports were produced.

Demographics: The JJIS Steering Committee recognizes that reporting race, ethnicity, sex, and gender in JJIS may not accurately represent everyone, due in part to a need to comply with federal reporting requirements. We respect all individuals, but also acknowledge and regret we cannot capture how individuals may self-identify in these areas.

- Race and Ethnicity: The JJIS Steering Committee defines Race/Ethnicity reporting categories based on available data. Race is recorded by the juvenile department based on police reports and youths' self-reporting. These reports categorize youth by the race that is recorded in JJIS unless the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic. When the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic, the youth is categorized as Hispanic, regardless of race.
- **Sex**: The options for reporting sex currently include Male, Female, or Unknown. There are current state and national discussions about new ways to document sex that are respectful and inclusive of all. The JJIS Steering Committee will continue to engage in those discussions and make updates in this area as available.

Cautions regarding detention data

Comparing the three reports: It is not possible to compare the Admission Reason report to the Length of Stay by Admission Reason report. The Admission Reason report is based on Admissions during the reporting year. The Length of Stay report is based on Releases during the year. Youth on the Length of Stay report may have been admitted in a prior reporting year.

Caution Regarding 2022 Data: The data in this report and other JJIS Annual Reports for 2022 differs significantly from reports from years prior to 2020 because of the pandemic. As a result, one should use caution when using 2022 data to make comparisons across years.
