Proposed EQC Action – ORW Designation

DEQ proposes that the EQC amend Oregon's water quality standards rules to:

1. Designate Waldo Lake an Outstanding Resource Water
 - Protect the existing high water quality of Waldo Lake.
2. Designate Crater Lake an Outstanding Resource Water
 - Protect the existing high water quality of Crater Lake.



Outstanding Resource Water Policy

Where high quality waters constitute an outstanding state resource, existing water quality must be maintained & protected.

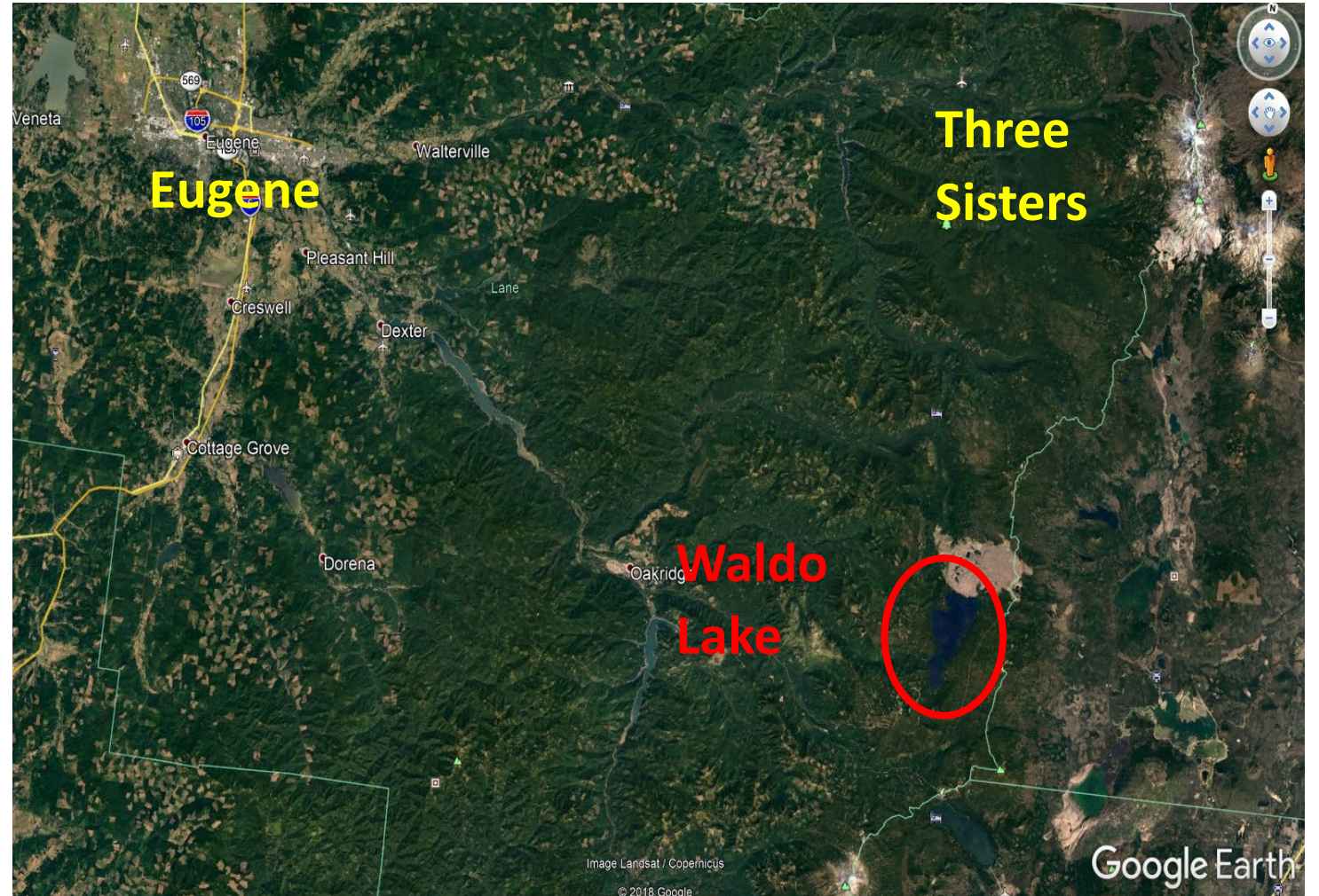

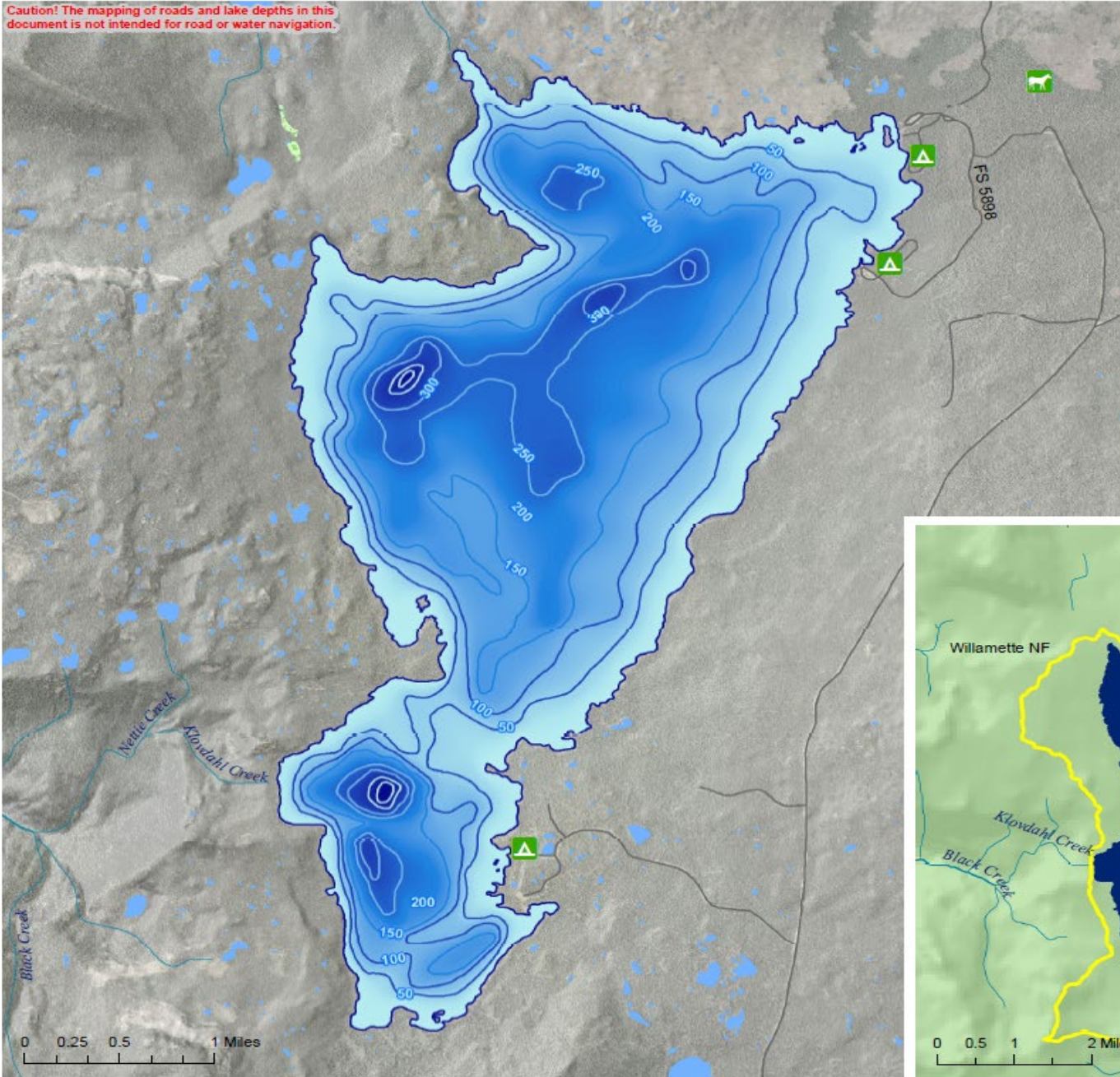

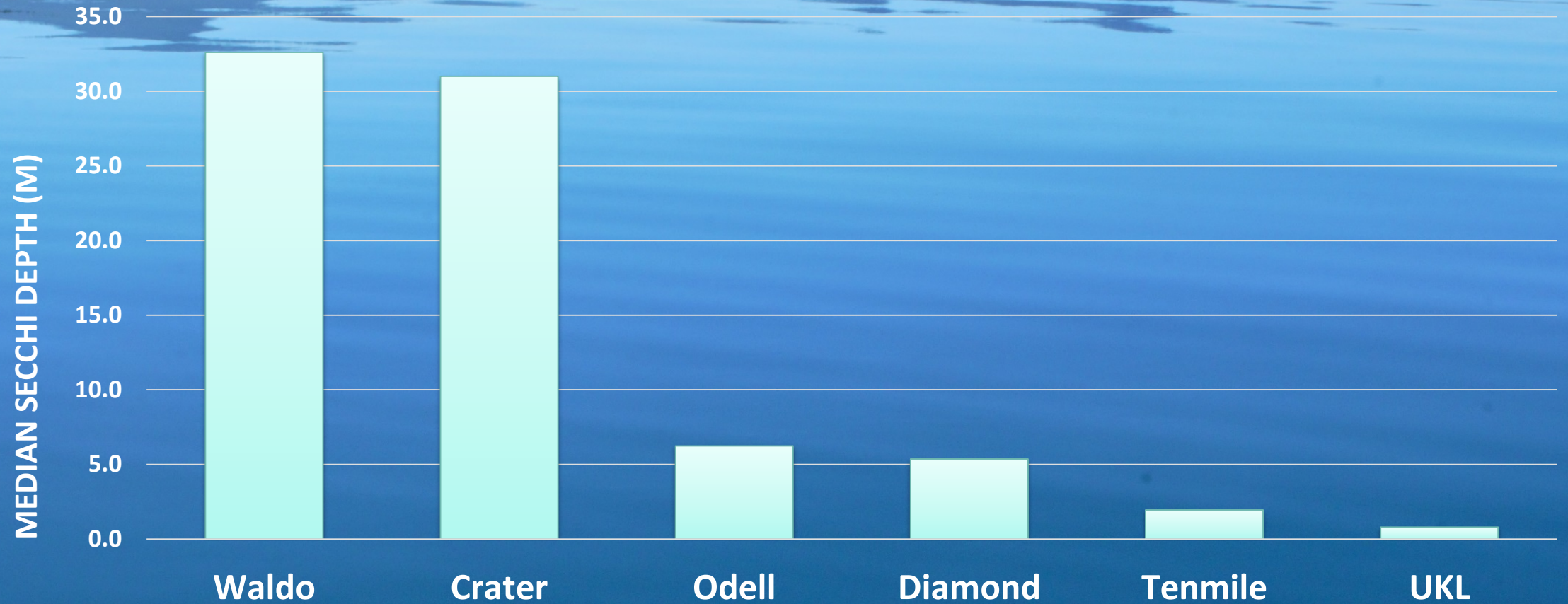

Water Quality

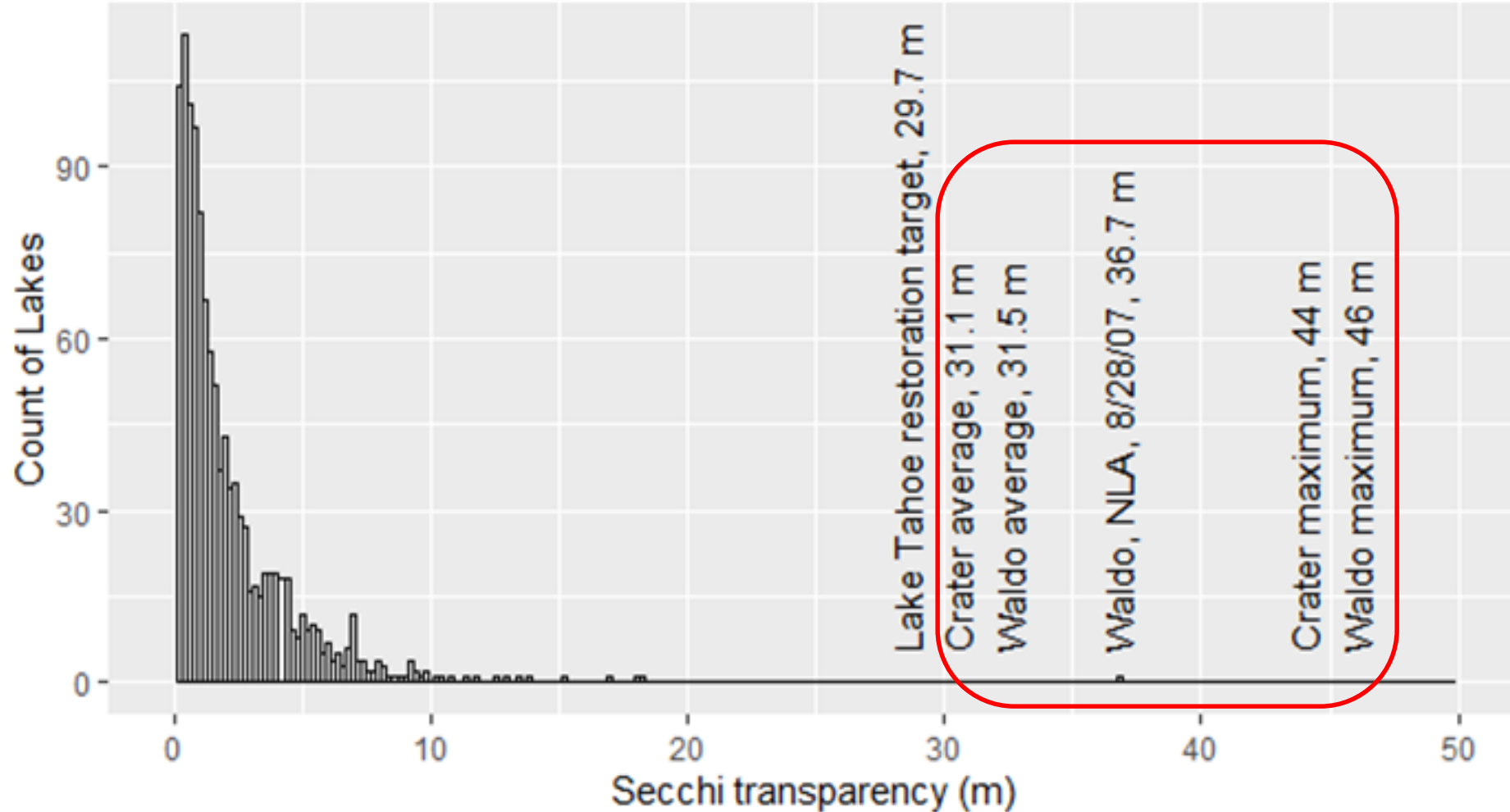


- Extraordinarily clear

Secchi Depths from the 2007 National Lakes Assessment

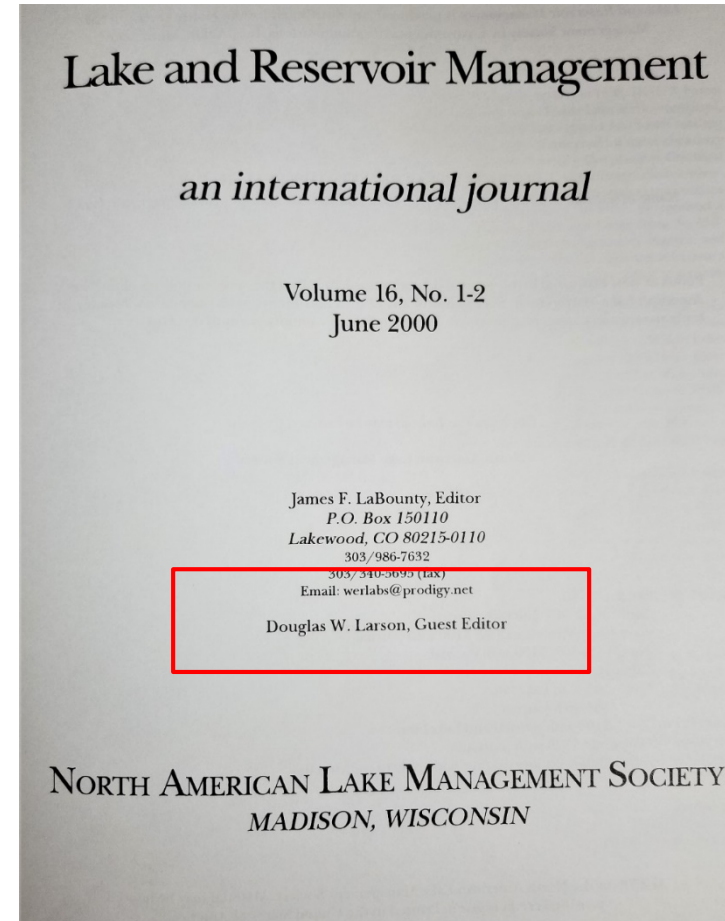

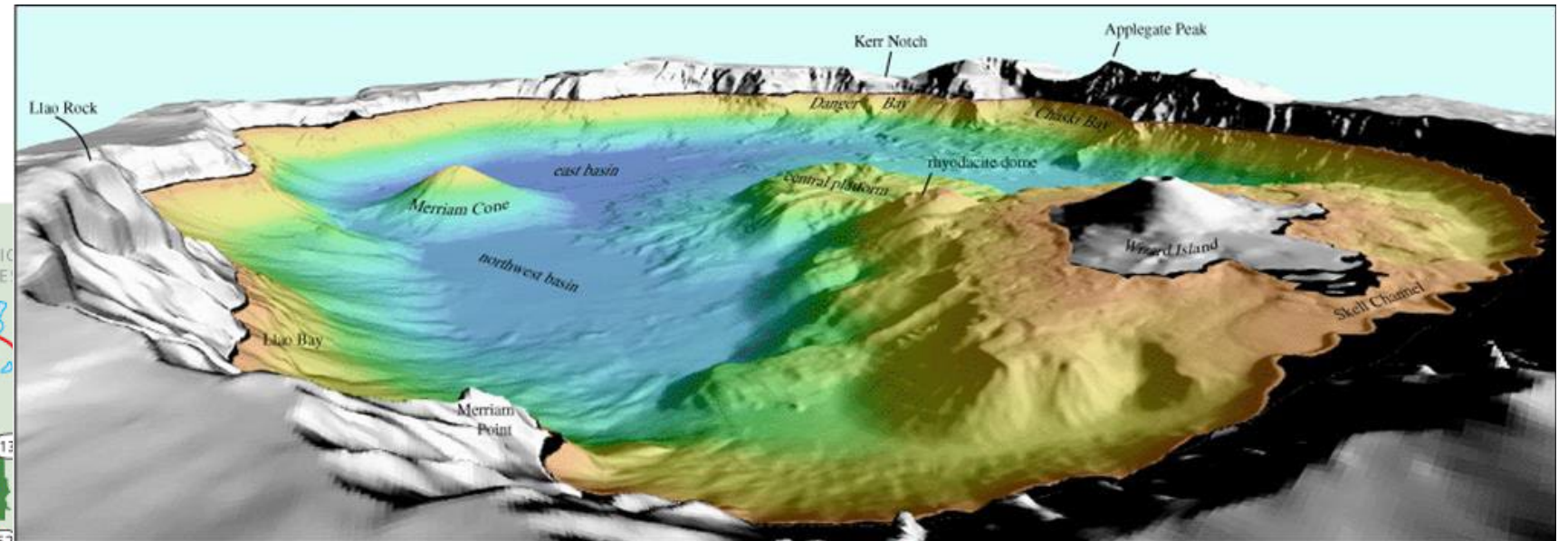

- The lakes qualify as ORWs based on their water quality and ecological and recreation values.



DEQ recommends ORW designation:

- Proposed rule implements the ORW policy.
- State protection will support the agencies' management goals

Summary of Public Comments

- 730 comments were received, 729 in support
- Common comments:
 - Pristine nature and high quality of the waters
 - **Importance of protecting water quality for future generations**
 - Need for wise stewardship of water quality
 - Protection for critical habitat areas
 - **Importance of lakes for recreational use**

Summary of Public Comment

- Comments on Rule Language
 - National Park Service
 - EPA
 - Rogue Riverkeeper
 - Forest Service (Waldo Lake)
- Recreational user impacts
 - Human waste; invasive species
- Oregon Farm Bureau, Oregon Forest Industries Council and Oregonians for Food and Shelter

Final Proposed Rules

- Protect and maintain existing high water quality, ecological and recreation values
 - Except as altered by natural processes
- Prohibit permitted discharges
 - Except construction stormwater permits – short term
- Prohibit other new discharges, with exceptions:
 - Respond to public health or safety emergency
 - Allow restoration or improvement projects

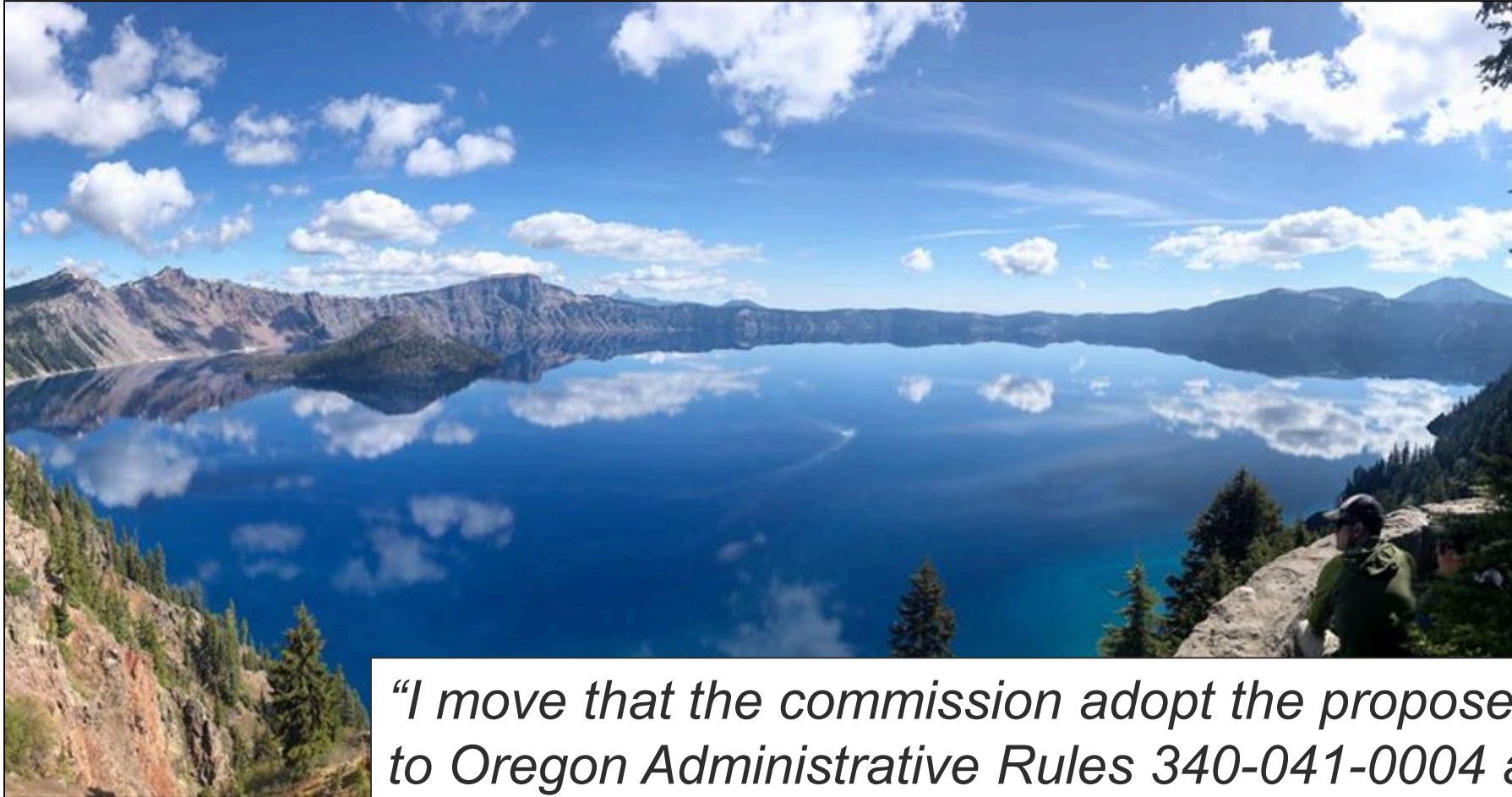
