McCarthy Dressman Education Foundation Academic Enrichment Grants

The McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation offers Academic Enrichment Grants designed to develop in-class and extra-curricular programs that improve student learning.

The Academic Enrichment Grants provide funding for programs that nurture the intellectual, artistic and creative



abilities of children from low-income households. The McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation awards grants to individuals in amounts up to \$10,000 per year for a maximum of \$20,000 over two years, provided the eligibility requirements continue to be met.


Doodle for Google Contest for K-12 Students

The <u>Creative Heights initiative</u> aims to increase Oregon's cultural visibility and vitality while supporting unique opportunities for Oregonians to experience innovative arts and culture. Up to \$1 million in projects will be funded annually with grants from \$10,000 to \$100,000 per project.

The SHIFT – Transformative Change and Indigenous Arts program supports artist and community-driven projects responding to social change issues through a Native Iens. The program focuses on efforts that are built upon community cultural assets, resilience, and strengths and draws increased attention to Native communities, perspectives and challenges, shifting a national narrative of invisibility, misunderstanding and misappropriation.
