

McCarthy Dressman Education Foundation Academic Enrichment Grants

The McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation offers Academic Enrichment Grants designed to develop in-class and extra-curricular programs that improve student learning.

The Academic Enrichment Grants provide funding for programs that nurture the intellectual, artistic and creative abilities of children from low-income households. The McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation awards grants to individuals in amounts up to \$10,000 per year for a maximum of \$20,000 over two years, provided the eligibility requirements continue to be met.

Games for Change Student Challenge: 2022-2023 Competition

The G4C Student Challenge culminates in a national game design competition, through which middle and high school students (grades 5-12) can enter their original social impact games for the chance to win prizes, including a \$10,000 scholarship, generously provided by Take-Two Interactive. Games are evaluated April – May. All students will be notified of their standing in the competition in May and winners are announced at an Awards Ceremony at the end of the school year.

Jakob and Sala Kryszek Art & Writing Competition

The annual Jakob and Sala Kryszek Art & Writing Competition for middle and high school students encourages youth to evaluate history, foster an awareness of the Holocaust, and broaden their minds in the areas of art, history, civics, sociology, and literature. For the competition, students are presented with a prompt that becomes their cue to create a piece of writing or a work of art.

Grand prize winners receive a trip to Washington D.C. to visit the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum for themselves, a caretaker, and their teacher.

This competition is open to students attending school in Oregon and SW Washington.

Western Governors' Association: Celebrate the West Art Competition 2023

The Western Governors' Foundation is excited to launch the <u>2023 Celebrate the West regional art competition</u>, sponsored by Americans for the Arts. Celebrate the West is a regional art competition that challenges high school students to create works inspired by their state.

To enter the competition, students must live in one of the 17 Western states and two U.S. territories whose Governors participate in the bipartisan WGA and be enrolled in grades 9-12. Once completed, their work must be submitted using a digital entry form.

The LIFT – Early Career Support for Native Artists program will provide critical support to early career Native artists with one-year awards to develop and realize new projects. The program encourages artists to uplift communities, advance positive social change, point courageously toward environmental sustainability, and foster communal meaning making.

The SHIFT – Transformative Change and Indigenous Arts program supports artist and community-driven projects responding to social change issues through a Native Iens. The program focuses on efforts that are built upon community cultural assets, resilience, and strengths and draws increased attention to Native communities, perspectives and challenges, shifting a national narrative of invisibility, misunderstanding and misappropriation.

The Roundhouse Foundation Grants

The Roundhouse Foundation focuses their work in and across four areas that are fundamental to thriving rural communities – Arts & Culture, Environmental Stewardship,

They support rural Oregon communities, including Tribal communities. All proposals, regardless of an applicant's location, must have a clear and compelling benefit to rural Oregon. Organizations that fit within the focus areas and eligibility guidelines may submit a proposal to one of the Open Call grant cycles.

The <u>Oregon Media Arts Fellowship</u> is a biannual award provided by the <u>Oregon Arts Commission</u> and overseen by the <u>Portland Art Museum's Center for an Untold Tomorrow</u> (PAM CUT) for outstanding achievement and creativity in the field of media arts in the state of Oregon.

PGE Foundation Creative Expression Grants

The PGE Foundation's Creative Expression Grants Program is open for funding applications.

If you're interested in submitting a proposal for a creative expression program, consider:

- · Curriculum that offers access to sequential arts learning
- Programs that promote youth development using creative expression to foster social emotional skills crucial to becoming active contributors to our community
- Arts and cultural programs integrated into classroom curriculum that promotes innovation and creativity, while also enhancing literacy and math aptitude

PGE prioritizes programs that are culturally specific and BIPOC led as well as organizations who use input from the community they're serving and intentionally focus on communities that have faced historic or systemic barriers in reaching equal outcomes.

ODE's assessment of <u>Integrated Applications for Six ODE Initiatives</u>. Community engagement, accountability and transparency are central to the Student Success Act (SSA), and serving on a QALP is a new and valuable opportunity to be a part of the process.

QALP panelists will review the work of ODE while increasing their knowledge about Integrated Guidance efforts in districts, charter schools, programs, and communities across the state of Oregon.
