Vision

We envision a more just and equitable society in which children, youth, and families live in sustained, supportive communities, which reinforce the cultural wealth and lived experience of the family.



Mission

We advocate for and act to increase equity and social justice through programs, services, community organizing and collaborative leadership that create equitable opportunities for African refugees and immigrant children, youth and families to thrive.

Values

Community Driven

We encourage community inputs and participation. Our Services are informed by and with the voice of the community in mind. We will be flexible with our delivery and responsive to our changing community demands and issues.

Social Sustainability

We strive to ensure that our systems, structures; and those of partnerships actively support the capacity of communities to be their own advocates. Our approach is best captured by a quote from César Chávez: "Once social change begins, it cannot be reversed. You cannot un-educate the person who has learned to read. You cannot humiliate the person who feels pride. And you cannot oppress the people who are not afraid anymore."

Cultural Wealth, Diversity & Inclusion

We have a grounded confidence in our ability to inform through our cultural wealth and lived experiences. We promote the preservation of our own cultural identity cognizant of the diversity in the society within which we operate and live in. We treat each other fairly. We listen to and act on the opinions of others.

Unbreakable Resilience

We believe in our community's ability to withstand and recover from past adverse experiences. We draw upon our individual, and collective competencies to cope with, adapt to, and develop from the demands, challenges and changes encountered in our past and current lives.

 2021-2022. Almost 80 students registered into our program
- Continued parent engagement and home visits.

BSS Collaborative Partnership

- CAIRO, United Way of the Columbia-Willamette & Washington County partnered from the inception of the BSS grant fund.
- United Way and Washington County (Early Learning Washington County) were initial grant respondents and sought out CAIRO and Beaverton School District as lead implementing partners
- Early Learning Washington County (ELWC) continues to aid in financial management, project planning and program expansion
- Collaborative actively seeks ways to integrate other streams of work and build out services and supports to the Black Student & Family Population in Washington County
 - Future expansion of CAIRO preschool sites
 - STEAM/STEM Early Learning
 - Seek geographic expansion of SPACE model
 - Home visiting & Perinatal support to Black/African population

What is UPLIFT?

UPLIFT is a program that provides support and mentorship to youth while promoting their cultural identity and leadership skills.

Academic support

- AYCO UPLIFT youth participate in academic support, athletics, and culturally specific mentorship programs
- Leadership development and cultural identity strengthening are incorporated in all activities
- Cultural Navigators serve as a bridge between youth, schools, and parents
- Cultural Navigators ensure that youth and families receive the best possible support in navigating complex educational systems

Academic support

Scholarship program:

- AYCO Scholarship Program started in summer 2021
- Goal: Change the lives and futures of immigrant youth served by AYCO
- 9 students were awarded scholarships to pursue college degrees
- Scholarships were made possible through generous donations from 2 community members

Environment Education Program

AYCO's goal is to connect youth development and programs that connect students to the natural world.

Field trips are offered to keep youth engaged and learning outside of the classroom, and aim to increase knowledge and provide outdoor experiences like hiking, camping, and studying environmental science and ecosystems.











Refugee Support

- Program description: Helps refugee students aged
 15-24 who have lived in the US for less than 5
 years
- Focuses on social integration and academic support
- Challenges: Language barrier and culture shock
- Successes: Students like Yusuf Mussa and Salma Yusuf have overcome academic roadblocks and improved their grades
- Goals: Enroll more refugee students in the program
- Helping students overcome challenges of adjusting to a new culture and thriving academically

Athletics Program

AYCO facilitates basketball and soccer programs
Program promotes team building, sportsmanship, and transferable life skills

Coaches and program coordinators encourage these values in youth participants



Girl's Program

- Girls Group is a year-round program that supports middle and high school students through college
- Focuses on empowering young women to achieve emotional and economic self-sufficiency and high school graduation
- Addresses long-term systemic, racial, economic, and academic inequities
- Offers youth-led activities, a safe space for exploring identities, and positive relationships with peers and mentors
- Led by a strong and passionate leadership team and staff



Special Needs Children Support

AYCO Health care and Disability services is funded by the Portland Children Levy to support new immigrant families access health care and disability services.

However, there is a **stigma in the Somali community** about disabilities, making it hard to
work with them. Parents often think having a
disabled child reflects poorly on them and hide
their child from the community. Our community
workers aim to change this perception by providing
resources and safe spaces for disabled children to
feel included and accepted in the community.

Youth Environmental & Workforce Development Program

The YEWD Program aims to support youth through various career exploration opportunities and professional development.

Youth will learn leadership and self-advocacy skills.

They will be exposed to growing industries such as environmental and tech sectors, healthcare, and more.
