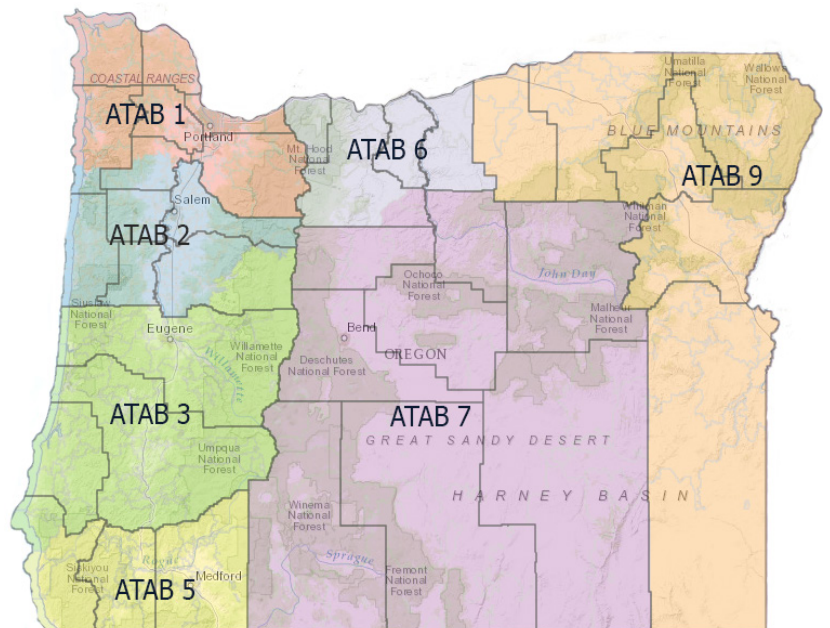

Area Trauma Advisory Board

In the State of Oregon, the OHA Emergency Medical Systems & Trauma Systems is responsible for the development, implementation and ongoing monitoring of the state's trauma system, including establishment of prehospital system standards, designation of trauma hospitals to care for injured patients and the collection of trauma registry data. The Trauma Program ensures that high quality community resources are available to respond to individuals who are traumatically injured in Oregon by assuring an integrated statewide system of resources, including establishment of trauma regions and designation of trauma care hospitals.

The integrated system of resources involves seven Area Trauma Advisory Boards (ATABs) appointed by the Oregon Health Authority Public Health Division. Each established ATAB consists of at least 15 volunteer members and represents trauma care providers and members of the public. The ATABs are established in accordance to Oregon Administrative Rules 333-200-0050 through 300-200-0080 which define the ATAB's functions, rules and policy and guidelines for the Area Trauma Plan.



Area Trauma Advisory Boards meet quarterly, exercise plans and procedures regularly and work collaboratively to fulfill the following items:

- ✓ Design and monitor a Quality Assessment and Performance Improvement program to assist in community outreach and education using Trauma data collected.
- ✓ Acts as liaison between the trauma care providers and general public in their area and the State Trauma Advisory Board (STAB) and the Public Health Division for exchanging information about trauma system issues and developing an area-wide consensus.
- ✓ Participates in the promotion and function of the implemented area trauma system plan by making recommendations to the Public Health Division and the area trauma care providers.

Area Trauma Advisory Board

Area Trauma Advisory Boards are expected to have written plans, policies, procedures, and protocols addressing 12 trauma system components are met or exceeded. Interpretation and implementation of the components are in general accordance with the guidelines of the [Resources for Optimal Care of the Injured Patient: Committee on Trauma, American College of Surgeons, 2014](#). The following list is the trauma system components:

- ✓ communication and dispatch
- ✓ responders and prehospital response times
- ✓ medical direction and treatment
- ✓ triage and transportation
- ✓ hospital resources
- ✓ inter-hospital transfers
- ✓ rehabilitation
- ✓ quality improvement
- ✓ education and research
- ✓ prevention
- ✓ disaster management

ATABs are supported by the EMS & Trauma Systems Committee Coordinator. The ATABs collaborate with four other committees that overlap in trauma care. These are:

- ✓ Oregon Emergency Medical Services Committee
- ✓ Oregon Emergency Medical Services for Children Committee
- ✓ Oregon State Trauma Advisory Board
- ✓ Oregon Stroke Care Committee
