House Bill 2880 (2015)

Need for the Rule(s):

The Oregon Society of Physician Assistants (OSPA) requested that OBMI provide a way for physician assistants to perform fluoroscopy, so that a PA could assist during a fluoroscopy procedure. In response, the OBMI cooperated with OSPA in enacting House Bill 2880 in 2015. These rules implement the provisions of HB 2880.

Fiscal and Economic Impact:

In general, medical offices that employ physician assistants who have the fluoroscopy permit may experience some increased convenience by having a PA who can help during fluoroscopy procedures. However, the Board of Medical Imaging is not able to estimate the fiscal or economic impact.

Statement of Cost of Compliance:

1. Impact on state agencies, units of local government and the public (ORS 183.335(2)(b)(E)):

For the OBMI, total 15-17 revenue estimated to be \$7,950. Of the total revenue, \$4,200 is retained by the OBMI, comprised of the OBMI's exam fee (\$20 per exam) plus the \$120 fee for a two-year permit that a PA will need to pay after they pass the exam and apply for a permit. Of the total revenue, \$3,750 is the examination fee (\$125 per exam) that is collected by OBMI and passed through to the national registry that administers the examination. No impact expected for units of local government. Physician assistants who seek this permit will spend a total of \$265 to take the initial exam and get their initial fluoroscopy permit, and then \$120 every two years thereafter to renew the permit.

2. Cost of compliance effect on small business (ORS 183.336):

a. Estimate the number of small business and types of businesses and industries with small businesses subject to the rule:

These rules are anticipated to have no impact on small businesses. Small businesses are not subject to these rules.
