

ANNUAL RULE REVIEW MEETING REPORT 2015

Introduction

This report describes the annual meetings the State Forester conducted during 2015, to ensure proper coordination among state agencies with an interest in the forest environment and forest practice rule sufficiency. OAR 629-605-0110 states, “The State Forester shall, at least once each year, meet with other state agencies concerned with the forest environment to review the Forest Practice Rules relative to sufficiency. The State Forester shall then report to the Board of Forestry a summary of such meeting or meetings together with recommendations for amendments to rules, new rules, or repeal of rules.”

All state natural resource agencies were invited to meetings, as were several additional agencies that often collaborate or coordinate with the Department on forest resource issues. The invited agencies that chose to meet included the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB), Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD), Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD), Oregon Water Resources Department (WRD), Oregon State University Extension Service (OSU), Oregon Health Authority (OHA), Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW), Oregon Department of State Lands (DSL), Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), Oregon Forest Resources Institute (OFRI), and the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI).

The following invited agencies decided that a meeting was not necessary this year: Governor’s Natural Resource Office (GNRO), Oregon Emergency Management (OEM), Department of Agriculture (ODA), Columbia River Gorge Commission (CRGC), and Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). The Department of State Lands has postponed until the new director is in place.

Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), the Governor’s Natural Resources Office (GNRO), and Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) met with ODF staff at several other meetings during the year to discuss issues of interagency coordination.

Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) field staff was informed at least two months prior to scheduling the meetings and asked to provide input regarding issues of interagency coordination. Oregon Department of Forestry staff also asked the other agencies for items they would like to discuss at the annual meeting. A decision to hold a formal meeting is based upon the relative importance of the issues that have been identified during pre-meeting discussions, the adequacy of ongoing coordination, and the preference of the invited agency.

Summary of Meeting Results

There were no specific recommendations for rule changes. Topics discussed, potential action items identified, and follow-up actions occurring as a result at the meetings are described on the following pages.

Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB)

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Clean Water Partnership

- The Clean Water Partnership (CWP) program was not funded. OWEB believes it will move forward with a “philosophy shift” approach. Agreement for a “voluntary approach” was voiced, understanding barriers exist around resistance and the state setting riparian benchmarks.
- Richard Whitman plans to convene the Working Farms and Forest task force. OWEB is moving forward with the Agricultural Partnership.
- Voluntary certification was discussed and ODF wants to work with OWEB on the plan for the shift in philosophy to incentivize riparian management.
- ODF and OWEB will schedule planning meetings.

Voluntary Measure Evaluation Project

- Kyle Abraham gave an overview of the program and indicated there will be a survey going out with 10-12 questions, designed to identify barriers of reporting and implementation. The survey was reviewed by Davis, Hibbitts, & Midghall, Inc. (DHM) and OWEB, has databases in place, as well as email contact lists.
- Ken Fetcho introduced the plan for four workshops delivered across the state, beginning in mid-October.
- Kyle Abraham and Lena Tucker will produce a list of key components that would allow data to be shared in a more seamless and efficient way.

Urban and Community Forest Program

- Peter is hopeful for the potential of this program to expand into the wildland urban interface and desires to continue the work in partnership.

CREP Effectiveness Monitoring

- Ken Fetcho provided an overview of the program, indicating there are three tiers involved. Tier 1 has been completed, involving collection of information from FSA and partners. Tier 2 is in process and involves assessing existing contracts, field data, fence conditions, etc. Tier 3 will be implemented in the future.
- OWEB contracted for riparian assessments.
- ODF will be filling two positions and might be of help with compliance and introductions for a more positive response from their outreach efforts. Peter Daugherty stressed the success of an education and assistance approach over a simple an enforcement approach.
- Ken Fetcho indicated that the CREP advisory group needed to refine protocols and control sites.
- Peter Daugherty indicated the subject of data collection and use is being explored by ODF.

Model Eastside Collaborative

- Lena Tucker presented the concept of replicating the federal collaborative model on private land.
- The original goal for this project was 10,000 acres; the current commitment is at 55,000 acres.
- The focus for the past 6-8 months has been on the organizational structure, with OSU serving as project coordinator. The steering committee has been able to step into an advisory role at this point.
- The Focused Investment Partnerships (FIP) Strategic Action Plan Template is being used for the next-step of applying for an implementation grant. Peter and Meta will meet to discuss how to leverage capacity.

Oregon Plan Biennial Reporting

- Meta Loftsgaarden indicated deadline of June 30, 2015 for data submission. The plan is to do the official collection of data earlier for 13-15 biennium.
- Ken Fetcho said they would like to set up systems with other agencies that would allow data to be shared more efficiently. OWEB will work on identifying specific projects for data sharing.
- Peter Daugherty discussed the idea of data templates that could be tied to the Forest Action Plan, and the value of writing project reports that could be used in various applications.
- Meta reported that Courtney Shaff will be the point person, this and next year, for the Federal Forest Collaborative Program, as well as resource for both ODF and OWEB.
- Peter and Meta agreed that ODF is valuable with technical expertise, while OWEB knows how to report.

Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD)

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Ongoing coordination on Forest Practice Act (FPA) / Land Use

- Peter Daugherty discussed the overview and relationship between Forest Practices Act (FPA) and land use. He outlined the components that had been submitted concerning Coastal Nonpoint Service as strong land use regulations, strong and flexible Forest Practices Act, and voluntary measures.
- Peter Daugherty acknowledged the shared views of ODF and DLCD and the benefit of working together to achieve a better outcome.
- Peter Daugherty explained that one concern surrounding the Board of Forestry (Board) riparian rules was increased pressure on land use conversion, as more acres of land are encumbered by regulations.

Coastal Nonpoint Source Program

- In reference to the Board's riparian rule analysis, Carrie MacLaren asked if we had a legal analysis of the Ballot Measure 49. Peter Daugherty explained that the Department of Justice did an analysis and indicated that rules to implement Water Quality Standards would be covered under Federal requirement exemption.
- Doug Decker discussed the reason for creating a sub-committee and the need for time and room to discuss trade-offs. The Board plans to make a decision in November. Doug Decker feels the Board is operating in the best interest for the diverse mix of individuals who share commitment for a good decision.
- Carrie MacLaren provided an overview of the agency impact from loss of Federal funds. She explained that they support coastal communities who are concerned about losing their planner who is funded through DLCD. Patty Snow offered the DLCD to assist with input and support.
- Doug Decker thanked DLCD for the offer of support and indicated it would be most helpful surrounding Ballot Measure 49. He explained that the Board has challenging and complex issues to consider.
- Patty Snow indicated she speaks with NOAA regularly. Doug Decker indicated that ODF wanted

to strengthen the working relationship between ODF and NOAA.

- Carrie MacLaren said they would work to assist the flow of communication with NOAA.

Conservation Easements, Statewide Coordination and Standards

- Carrie MacLaren explained that landowners want “flexible certainty”. They want to know what the expectations are, but be able to go around them when they want to.
- Peter Daugherty shared that the conversations with OWEB around incentives for family forestlands have been initiated.
- Carrie MacLaren discuss the need to understand the impediments or barriers or lack of interest. She explained that in Measure 49 they implemented incentives to direct the desired outcomes.
- Katherine Daniels indicated that one of the issues with easement acquisition is lack of contrast between development value and farm value, therefore the landowner does not receive significant compensation. Katherine Daniels expressed the need for a person on the ground to identify potential for easement lands.
- There was discussion relating to the difficulty of holding easements, monitoring levels and funding. Carrie MacLaren said the DLCD cannot hold property interests.
- Katherine Daniels said that the larger properties should probably be on conservation easements and the smaller properties could go under restrictive covenants. Carrie MacLaren said that both could be stand-alone documents or part of the deed, most often stand-alone documents.
- Interest was expressed for multi-agency coordination on easement holding.

Transferable Development Rights - Status of Pilot and Next Steps

- Carrie MacLaren outlined DLCD’s 8-year strategic plan that includes incentives to keep large tracts of commercial timberland intact. She discussed the Working Lands Initiative, which would synthesize and promote incentive programs.
- Carrie MacLaren feels that if the economy keeps improving there will be more development pressure on rural lands making this topic relevant if we want to be part of that.
- ODF and DLCD agreed to continue coordination on working farm and forestlands. Carrie MacLaren and Peter Daugherty will continue the conversation and work with Richard Whitman to coordinate with other interested agencies.
- Kevin Birch discussed land use change study and pointed out that the data do not contain ownership or parcels, but is based on visual physical changes. Katherine Daniels pointed out that designations are on density. Kevin agreed and indicated that ODF does not have data on investment trust ownership.
- Jim Cathcart discussed the tax lot data for family forestland owner outreach. The Family Forests for Oregon manages the database, which contains tax lot data for parcels larger than two acres. The data was developed for education and outreach; and not intended for commercial purposes.
- ODF is willing to work to devise a mechanism for sharing data with DLCD.

Non-Resource Lands vs. Forest Lands

- Katherine Daniels outlined the purpose for striving to define non-resource and forest lands.
- Katherine Daniels said they are unable to define non-resource lands until they have a final definition of farmland and forestlands. They have a clear definition of agricultural land, not of forestland.
- The issues to address in the pursuit of definition include water quality, fire protection costs, production vs. density and forest practices.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Joint Training Opportunities

- Peter Daugherty discussed the subject of wilderness training (first responder, first aid, etc.) for staff that work alone. ODF last offered class 4-5 years ago. The report back on this training was positive. ODF is looking at offering one or two programs (1/2 day and 2 day).
- MG Devereux indicated they would be interested in course. OPRD has staff who could assist and other staff who should participate. Dan Jones would be the OPRD contact person for ODF to continue exploration into this training.
- OPRD is also interested in learning more about the SPOT locator technology that allows tracking and check-in to identify potential problems. MG said on their Eastside they have single staffed locations alone for several days at a time and would be interested in this technology.
- OPRD is interested in more information on the SPOT locator.
- Marganne Allen will let Dan Norlander know to contact Dan Jones on these subjects.
- Nancy Hirsch suggested that it would be valuable to promote a base-level Incident Command System (ICS) training to allow effective interaction for OPRD staff in those environments.
- OPRD has done some training in the ICS area, but recognizes the value of increasing this training within their organization as it could be utilized on a number of levels. Nancy Hirsch offered assistance for tapping into training based upon whatever level of interest OPRD has.
- Chrissy Curran expressed interest in exploring "Resource Advisors" and indicated the contact has been positive with Dave Lorenz and Keith Baldwin.
- MG Devereux suggested collaborating for better coordination of staging areas to increase efficiency of logistics.

Hazard Tree Identification

- OPRD has had some feedback from organizations about hazard tree procedures inside recreation areas, stemming from a couple big trees being removed.
- Paul Clement will be ODF contact and when the new pathologist is in place ODF will continue training.

Archeological Resource Training

- ODF sent most Stewardship Foresters to the training and is interested in sending foresters, supervisors and other staff to the training.
- OPRD will continue the training on a regular basis.
- Paul Clements is ODF training coordinator for this topic.
- OPRD will be hiring a new Archeologist that will be taking over the training.
- OPRD will ensure the message is shared with the correct people and will let ODF know who the new contact person is, once they are hired.

Interagency Agreement on Cultural Resources

- Peter Daugherty distributed copies of the most current draft of the “Programmatic Agreement between Oregon Department of Forestry and Oregon State Historic Preservation Office”.
- This version has been reviewed several times and Doug Decker is ready to sign this document and feels this is a way to show progress.
- Nancy Hirsch asked where the draft and summary should be submitted for next-steps.
- Dennis Griffin indicated he would be the appropriate person. Dennis acknowledged the content had already been reviewed and approved in previous meetings
- Peter Daugherty will send both copies, track changes and final with summary of changes in it, to Dennis Griffin.
- Once the document is reviewed, it will be moved forward for signing.

E-Notification System

- Peter shared that operators notify on the ODF web-based system to map operations (rock pits, roads, drilling, etc.) The system shows the planned footprint of harvest operations.
- ODF was given funds for enhancements to increase efficiency and to create an automated subscription system. Majority of users of the ODF subscriber system are counties, other agencies, companies, log buyers and a mix of users. ODF will be looking at the information provided, what information is needed, the time frames, etc.
- The desire is to reach out to the Tribes who have concerns about operations and provide information that would be relevant to them, without requiring them to be a subscriber. This approach could provide information that would allow them to intersect with their archeological information, and then reach out to landowners themselves.
- ODF indicated there is about a year to work with stakeholders to gather input and will keep OPRD in the loop.
- Dennis Griffin, Marganne Allen, and Keith Baldwin will follow up on percentage of harvest by ownership.
- OSU Extension is to hold a cultural resource training and awareness for industrial landowners.
- Association of Oregon Loggers, Rex Storm, is working with Paul Clemmons on focus training for loggers and operators on resource protection.

- ODF supports ongoing training and there may be an opportunity for OPRD to join ODF in this training partnership.
- Peter will talk to OSU Extension about opportunities for cultural resources training, e.g., Tree School, Western Forestry and Conservation Association (WFAC), and Association of Consulting Foresters (ACF).

Fund transfer for OHV Program

- OPRD wanted to know if the fund transfer conversation is on the table.
- Nancy Hirsch indicated it is on the list with the State Forests Divisions and will have Liz Dent follow up with MG Devereux to give OPRD a timeline on what is expected.
- MG Devereux will talk with Liz Dent about joint jurisdictions where OPRD has the program, but not the land and ODF has the land, but not the program. OPRD has been working with Justin Butteris successfully and desires to continue the good work.
- ODF will add OHV and recreational topics (equestrian, mountain bikers, hikers with dogs, etc.) to the annual meetings, understanding that management of areas differs but common expectations for visitors exist.
- OPRD requested that State Forest funds transfer remain on agenda for next year.

Salmonberry Trail Project

- Lisa Sumption indicated that the transfer agreement with ODF has \$25,000.00.
- OPRD will hold the position and ODF will transfer the money to OPRD.
- Lisa will follow up with Doug Decker on this and requests that this subject remain on the agenda for future meetings.

Wireless Radio Communications

- Eric Timmins explained that two Biennium ago there was an increase in funding for radios and ODF worked with OPRD on the issue. Reduction in number of radios (135 state fair radios used for 2 weeks removed from yearly stats.) did not increase savings due to statewide calculations for fixed costs (operational and service costs).
- OPRD served on the workgroup for radio review. Eric Timmins reported overall positive service and relationships with park managers and ODF communication.
- OPRD is looking at radio reduction through this year as more cell towers are going up and expanding the cell reception.
- OPRD is interested in learning more about cell tower and communication systems.
- Nancy Hirsch will follow up with Travis Medema on radio funding implementation and will close the loop on wireless with Eulus Newton.

Invasive Species Council

- ODF serves as chair of the Invasive Species Council this year.
- OPRD is not a member of the council, but has been tracking the conversations surrounding invasive species and is interested in notification, restricted lists, training requirements, and tracking changes.
- OPRD is also interested in early identification training.
- Peter will contact Wyatt Williams to have him work with OPRD as a resource for information and partnership.

Oregon Water Resources Department (WRD)

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Fire Pond Coordination

- Travis Medema explained that Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) funds allow opportunity for creation of fire ponds and increased coordination at the field level.
- ODF appreciates the partnership between ODF and WRD and would like to continue to align and communicate surrounding fire ponds and water resources.
- ODF plans to allocate time at the next Leadership Team (LT) meeting for Thomas Paul, WRD Deputy Director, to attend and discuss fire pond development: what qualifies as a pond, options around clean out of ponds and contacts for water masters, permit policy, rules and regulations.
- Tom Byler indicated he supports developing good alignment between the agencies.

Coordination on Drought Actions

- WRD is the lead agency on the drought actions and ODF has a plan for the Salem campus. The target is 15% water reduction and ODF is getting guidance from WRD for reporting water use
- ODF priority is on fires with no cutbacks from fire suppression.
- WRD appreciates the legwork ODF is doing and requests continuing input from ODF.
- The Executive Order baseline is 2014 water year, beginning October 1.
- The initial report for February will not be expecting statistical reports from agencies at that point.
- Another part of the Executive Order, involving all agencies, revolves around outreach and messaging. WRD is working on approaches to make it easy-lift for all agencies.
- The Executive Order also folds in drought, drought response, policy, and discussions into the Integrated Water Resources Strategy (IWRS). WRD is due to have an update to their strategy by 2017. They are just beginning and welcome ODF's participation.
- The existing emergency plan/drought annex, through the Executive Order, will be updated with OEM and will have it done before the end of the year.
- Peter brought up the public messaging from ODF to "deep water" trees and the potential need for coordination to prevent mixed messaging. ODF's goal is to make watering more effective and

not waste water, by promoting “deep watering” rather than “shower watering” of trees.

- WRD acknowledged that the outcomes were not in conflict, but the messaging may seem to be contradictory concerning watering.
- Peter Daugherty will follow up with Cynthia Orlando and Tony Andersen on the need for coordination. WRD indicated that Dianna Enright is the appropriate contact at WRD.
- WRD would like ODF to assist with consultation on maintaining landscaping/trees for other agencies.
- ODF’s primary contact would be Paul Ries, Urban Community Forestry, for technical outreach.

Integrated Water Resources Strategy (IWRS)

- Peter Daugherty is on the list for Integrated Water Resource Strategy. Kyle Abraham may become ODF’s primary contact.
- IWRS update will focus on climate change adaptation.
- WRD reported the hydrograph for this year is radically different from the typical pattern for when water comes and how long it stays around before it shoots out toward the ocean. Potential changes in irrigation seasons may require changes in water rights.
- Habitats shifting from long-term fundamental shifts in weather patterns from climate change may require adaptation.
- WRD will be taking on conversations and invites ODF to be involved in conversations surrounding these issues.

Opportunities for Future Collaboration/Water Rights and Pesticide Mixing

- Peter Daugherty indicated that ODF is looking into hosting a wilderness survival training course, to include GPS devices, and will keep WRD updated on the progress.
- WRD expressed an interest in collaborating in this venture and indicated that Doug Woodcock (Field Division Administrator) would be the contact for this training and information on the use of the SPOTS monitoring system. He is in charge of all the Water Masters and Hydrographic Techs.
- Lena Tucker will let Dan Norlander know to contact Doug Woodcock.
- Racquel Rancier raised the topic of the relation of water rights and using stream water for pesticide mixing. If no water right exists, an exemption allows operator to draw water from streams provided ODFW and WRD are notified.
- Kyle Abraham mentioned that ODF is updating monitoring strategy and the opportunity for WRD to collaborate.
- WRD said that Brenda Bateman would be the contact for the monitoring strategy project.
- Peter Daugherty asked for clarification of WRD’s interest in water quality and drinking water.
- WRD indicated they are involved in the “quantity” use of water and Oregon Health Authority is involved in “quality” of water. WRD is also involved in the use of ground water, as far as the ability to use it in the first place.
- Sometimes DEQ’s water quality monitoring areas overlap with WRD’s water quantity monitoring areas. WRD and DEQ cooperate to implement administrative processes.
- WRD is exploring recharging options, feasibility studies, and projects for conservation, water efficiency and storage.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

After the Fire Program

- ODF is tasked by Doug Decker to identify programs available to land owners as a tool kit for pre and post large fire incidents. ODF developed an After-the-Fire information after the 2013 fire season.
- Lena Tucker will send Jim Johnson the After the Fire Program information electronically for him to send to his staff.
- Following this fire season, NRCS is open to pulling together funding for restoration and rehabilitation. ODF needs to identify affected landowners, and show demand, to move into the sign-up phase.
- Reforestation is a priority, ODF has seed to start seedlings to deliver to land owners, and the lack of seedlings may be the greatest area of challenge.
- Irene Jerome, Consultant Forester, is lead for the After the Fire Program in the John Day area. She will bring together operators, the mill, and the county surveyor to identify where to start with restoration and rehabilitation. Northeast Oregon may have a similar community forum.
- ODF appreciated OSU Extension's involvement in programs and will keep OSU informed of forum dates. Lena Tucker will ensure that Paul Oester is informed of meetings.
- Baker County received 11 notifications for fire salvage, indicating forward motion.

Model Collaborative Project

- Jim Cathcart and Jim Johnson reviewed the progress on the project. The project is on track and proceeding well.
- ODF feels the landowners are being reached in a meaningful way. The partnership with OSU has been critical to project success.

Continuing and Professional Education (CPE)

- ODF would like to engage in an update on the CPE program OSU has implemented.
- Brianna Beene is the Continuing Education Coordinator and provides needs assessments and bridge to the appropriate training resources. Brianna Beene is working on specialized harvesting

and logging training for the US Forest Service personnel. Brianna and David Shaw are working on the Forest Health Conference.

- OSU will provide a Climate Change Training Program for the USDA Climate Hub in December.
- ODF did a survey of what training the field offices felt they needed in forest health. ODF field staff would like forest health training done in their own area to maintain relevance.
- Jim Cathcart will have Dan Norlander of ODF collaborate with David Shaw surrounding forest health training.
- Jim Johnson supports ODF using Brianna Beene a resource.

Partnerships for Forestry Education Competitive Grants

- Jim Cathcart and Jim Johnson reviewed progress on Phase II funding, including the Leadership Academy work completed in cooperation of OSU and OFRI.
- Fran Cafferata Coe, private wildlife biologist doing consulting work with OFRI, is the primary contractor for the Wildlife and Managed Forests. ODF will chair the Woodland Fish and Wildlife Committee.
- The Pathways to Stewardship project will be extended 18 months. ODF will have the Pathways modification initiated by October 1st. American Forest Foundation provided funding for the East Face Project.
- Jim Cathcart will work with OSU on use of funds for other projects.
- ODF has an initiative to rebuild technical incentives assistance to family forestland owners in the area of focused investments and partnerships.
- Jon Souder starts with OSU on October 1, 2015. He previously served as the Executive Director of the Coos Watershed Association.

Master Naturalist Program

- Jim Johnson reported the Master Naturalist Program has been around about 7 years. The program is just holding its own, no expansion. Approximately 400 people have completed the program requirements and are volunteering in the field.
- Jim Johnson said that the program has eco-regional courses on the Coast, Willamette Valley, and East Cascades out of Bend. The first one in the Basin Range eco-region will be at the Malheur Field Station over Labor Day with about 20 people (residential 3-4 day session).
- The courses fills up without advertisement, it is self-supporting, and the coordinator is Jason O'Brien.

Cultural Awareness Training

- Lena Tucker reported that there has been some interest about the benefit to foresters from all agencies to explore what cultural resources are, the laws that govern them, and what are the different agency roles, responsibilities, and requirements, etc.
- State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) has provided a broad database to ODF that indicates if there may be cultural resources in a given area. Landowners are encouraged to contact SHPO for additional information.
- There may be a benefit for landowners and practicing professionals to understand issues surrounding this subject. ODF would like to check for interest from agencies to have conversations surrounding cultural resources.
- Jim Johnson agreed that this would be a good topic for further discussion. He will have Brianna Beene check for interest.

- OSU and ODF will continue to discuss this subject.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Water Quality Protection

- ODF and OHA discussed the DEQ Drinking Water Source Assessment Guide and agreed that the report will need an extensive review.
- OHA indicated that the report was not a joint report.
- Source Water Assessments need to be updated (DEQ does Surface Water Source and OHA does Ground Source Water)
- DEQ has started to update the Surface Water Assessments and OHA will begin the Ground Water Assessments the beginning of 2016.
- ODF and OHA agree that interagency coordination and communication is very important.

PARC and Pesticides

- OHA's role is getting health information to communities in response to chemical application reports.
- PARC is making recommendations to OHA for reporting Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). OHA was pleased with the process of information flowing through PARC to them.
- ODF and OHA agree the SOPs should be updated annually.

E-Notification Update

- ODF will be updating the workflow enhancements for reporting, in the automated notification system. ODF will be updating the subscription submission process in the system, and would like to include public drinking water systems as subscribers in the system.
- OHA agreed that would be a good idea and David Leland offered to connect ODF with members of community water supplies.

HB2453 (Rave Bill)

- OHA regulates commercial events. Jason Butteris has met with OHA to review the impact of the Bill to OHA. Peter Daugherty explained the process of the Bill and that it allows law

enforcement to have authority.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Clean Water Partnership

- Peter gave an update that most option packages were funded except DEQ's for quantifying conservation uplift and ODF's for water quality concerns surrounding landslides and roads.

Specified Resource Sites

- The subject of Specified Resource Sites will be moved to future interagency meetings, and addressed as is appropriate.
- ODF had an OSU intern survey other states' management of wildlife resource sites.
- ODF would like to focus on conservation strategy incentives, rather than species by species.

Bald Eagle Rule Change

- Peter explained that with Federal and State delisting, the Board will need to make a rule change.
- Jennifer Weikel reported that there is an active review of the rule changes and development of a technical report. ODF will present the technical report to the Board and several rule options will be considered.
- One option would be to follow Washington Department of Natural Resources, which rescinded their rules and rely solely on the Bald Eagle Protection Act under US Fish and Wildlife (USFW).
- If rules are rescinded in Oregon, we would also have to rely USFW online form for self-certification to identify work being done near a Bald Eagle. Relying on the USFW process raises

enforcement authority and resource limitation concerns.

- ODF asked ODFW to collaborate on this issue.
- Curt Melcher asked ODF to contact him first, as a process to connect with representatives from ODFW for collaboration.

BOF Riparian Subcommittee Meeting

- Peter Daugherty discussed the status of the riparian rule analysis and the decision to create a subcommittee (Chair Tom Imeson, Gary Springer, Nils Christoffersen and Sybil Ackerman-Munson) that will meet once on September 25, 2015 to discuss and develop prescription packages.
- The subcommittee will develop some proposals to submit to the full Board in November for a decision, allowing the start of rule language development.
- Peter outlined some of the possible scenarios that may be considered and some of the legal requirements and complexities.
- ODFW would like ODF to contact Bruce McIntosh and/or Dave Jepson for continued collaboration.
- Peter will contact Bruce McIntosh.

OWEB Focused Investment Priority (FIP)

- Peter Daugherty introduced the concept of leasing riparian areas, with expectations and standards supporting Coho recovery. Peter shared that 80 percent of the high intrinsic potential Coho habitat is owned by non-industrial ownership (mix of forest and non-forest ownerships).
- Peter Daugherty reported that OWEB seems interested in piloting this concept, but perhaps the time has not arrived.
- Kyle Abraham indicated that ODF is looking at capacity building grants to develop an action plan, working with districts and small woodland owners to garner support, with good response.
- ODF feels that the plan is a positive way to move forward for Coho habitat.
- Tom Stahl reflected that this initiative is reminiscent of the content in the ODFW Coastal Multi-Species Plan.

Fish Passage Standards

- ODFW and ODF have a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in place, signed in 2000 by the Board and ODFW Commission.
- The MOU gives ODF management authority at all Forest Practices lands for fish passage.
- In 2001, ODFW updated their fish passage rules and over the past year. ODFW and ODF have met several times to eliminate inconsistencies and align the rules with jointly collected data.
- Next steps will be redrafting MOU's by the joint team comprised of Kyle Abraham, Brad Knotts, Ken Loffink and Rod Kraemer. Ken Loffink said that one desired outcome is to simplify the document and have more standardized language.
- ODFW explained that the defined requirements used in determination of culvert size differs between the agencies.
- Peter Daugherty suggested that any change in culvert size, especially larger, is an increase in money and asks that there is outreach to industrial and family forestland owners.
- ODF will help assist with outreach to avoid the appearance of a top-down approach and to avoid surprise on landowner part.

Stream Classification Standards

- In May and June, ODF focused on training Stewardship Foresters and supervisors on stream classification techniques, including criteria and GIS training, with a follow-up meeting on ODF requirements and the role ODFW plays with information.
- ODF and ODFW are currently working on how districts can change classifications.
- Much of the upper extent of streams remain classified as unknown. ODFW offered ODF to integrate some of ODFW GIS data. ODF noted the challenges posed by two different stream layers and areas where the data does not line up.
- ODFW feels our districts are working well together and in response to areas where there are data unknowns, perhaps the agencies could work together to create some kind of acceptable identifications.
- ODF agreed that continued partnership with ODFW on stream classification is the best approach and will minimize potential liabilities.

Conservation Strategy

- ODFW has completed updating the conservation strategy and having them adopted.
- ODFW is in the process of making their submission to the US Fish and Wildlife Service.
- One of the significant changes was the addition of discussion on climate change; what is new and what are some ideas to challenge themselves and partners moving forward.
- The Conservation Strategy document is now web enabled.
- ODF will continue to use the ODFW Conservation Strategy work and incorporate it into the next Forest Action Plan.
- ODFW expects the new version to be available end-of-year, or early 2016.

Wildlife Food Plot Rules

- Peter Daugherty explained that the house bill requires the Board to adopt rules to implement wildlife food plots as a forest practice.
- The Oregon Department of Agriculture is concerned that some food plot seed mixes contain invasive species.
- The Food Plot Bill will go into effect in January 1, 2016, however the Board of Forestry will not have rules in place by then.
- Rod Kraemer will be the contact for ODFW.
- Peter will identify a Wildlife Food Plots contact for the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA).
- ODF wants the rules to prevent manipulation around reforestation and issues of invasive species.
- Jennifer Weikel supports the concept and feels it rules could have positive effects for many species.
- ODFW applauded ODF for looking across species for exceptions of reforestation.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Coordination on E-Notification System

- Legislation was passed (SB 1546) which gave ODF authority to waive reforestation along those highways where ODOT deemed forest cover to be incompatible with motorist or infrastructure safety. It also mandated coordination between ODOT and ODF.
- ODF has developed a tool so that ODOT can electronically access information regarding notifications of operations.
- Marganne Allen, ODF and Patti Caswell, ODOT have been working on interagency agreement with at ODOT and it is in final review. The agreement should be signed at the program director level by February 2016.
- Marganne would like to work with ODOT concerning ambiguity about when to notify. There is also a need for greater understanding, through either an agreement or training, about when ODOT needs permits for power-driven machinery (PDM).
- ODOT will begin with refreshed awareness and identify holes in the communication chain. Lucinda indicated there has been turnover and ODOT will be more vigilant and adhere to higher uniformity.

Pollinator Health and Habitat

- Matthew Garrett indicated that he had been invited to a Whitehouse Summit on the transportation responsibilities on pollinator health and asked about ODF's role. He explained that much of the focus in on the monarch butterfly, and even greater emphasis on the honeybee.
- Peter Daugherty indicated that there has not been coordination with ODF on the topic, probably because the forestry sector rarely uses insecticides.
- Peter discussed the Food Plot Bill, which affords small landowners greater flexibility in

managing for wildlife habitat, including pollinator habitat.

Salmonberry Trail project update

- Doug Decker provided an overview of the Salmonberry project, which involves an 84-mile rail corridor that links Banks and Tillamook. The Port of Tillamook Bay owns the line. A new organization formed under ORS 190 creates a new authority called the Salmonberry Trail Agency with Doug Decker and Lisa Sumption (State Parks) as co-chairs. Members of the agency include The Washington County Commission, the Port of Tillamook Bay, Oregon Parks (OPRD) and ODF. They have linked up with the Tillamook Forest Heritage Trust, with Jim Brown, to do fundraising for the project. The project leader for Salmonberry will be Dennis Wiley, State Parks. Capacity fundraising is going on now. They have received an EPA grant for Level 1 hazardous materials survey throughout the corridor. EPA will fund the recovery of the mitigation of the two worst HAZMAT offending sites. They have received a TGM grant, as well, to integrate all the municipalities, communities and planning commissions with one document to reference. The seven communities in Tillamook County are very interested in the project.
- Hwy 101 Wheeler to Tillamook is a very tight spot with high expense and will have intersection with ODOT. The group would be interested in potential funding sources in cooperation with ODOT. ODOT definitely wants to stay informed of and appropriately involved in the project, particularly around the 101 section.
- Matt Garrett indicated that ODOT wants to lend their experience, explore funding opportunities, issues with ownership for long-term maintenance (clear intent) and ODOT's responsibility of serving all the users of already busy Hwy 101.
- The group will do catalyst projects that make sense to communities' priorities and that tie into existing investments, then over time will connect the pieces together.

IPM (Integrated Pest Management) coordination

- Peter reviewed the new interagency structure regarding pesticides that was created in the last session where agencies that deal with pesticides are mandated to meet yearly. With the Bill passed for spray buffers, the committee will come into focus.
- Lucinda reported that ODOT had contacted OSU and one meeting was held.
- OSU is designated as the lead, but there needs to be more direction about setting meetings.
- Peter will contact Gabriella Goldfarb and Will Lackey about the committee and its direction.
- ODOT will prompt OSU.

Fire and Ice implementation – Reader Boards, prioritization of highway slopes for fire protection of critical infrastructure

- Lucinda wanted to share the need to clarify and document when ODOT should or should not be reimbursed for their efforts. ODOT desires to align the state agreement with what is done with the Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and the private sector.
- Matt clarified that the concern involves their trust funds that are constitutionally restricted to the highways and byways. ODOT is eager to help, but they need to ensure the integrity of the management of the trust fund.
- Doug Grafe indicated that ODF is in alignment with ODOT and the agreement will be refreshed.
- ODOT discussed the use of reader boards to inform public about fire danger and road closures. The use for fire danger was appropriate and ODOT got positive feedback immediately.

- Doug Grafe expressed ODF's appreciation of the collaboration with ODOT on the use of reader boards.
- There is agreement that the collaboration on reader board usage should continue.

FEMA

- Doug Grafe explained that the Fire Management Assistance Grant is focused for suppression activities on a FEMA eligible fire.
- Sub-grantees are those that play a role in the suppression efforts and perhaps ODOT is eligible for those reimbursements.
- ODOT will explore the possibility of funding from the Fire Management Assistance Grant.
- ODOT and ODF will update the Intergovernmental Agreement.

After the Fire

- Peter indicated that a post-fire restoration legislative concept did not moved forward in the last legislative session.
- Doug Grafe estimated that this year, a large majority of the 76,000 acres burned was private land.
- ODF will discuss this topic with the Governor's Natural Resource office. ODF asked ODOT if they want to be included in the discussion.
- Doug Decker noted that the intersection with ODOT involved transportation, road maintenance and safety issues, as well as ODOT supporting with finance business and information technology during fire season.
- ODOT contact to explore this subject is Katie Thiel.

OFRI Forest Health Special Report

- Paul Barnum reported that the new Public Outreach Manager for OFRI is Inka Bajandas.
- Christine Buhl was on the working group for the new Special Report “Forest Threats”.
- Mid-January OFRI will send out a mailing and will produce five videos on the same topics that will be housed on the OFRI website. OFRI’s ad campaign begins Jan. 18 and includes the URL Oregonforestlaws.org where the public can find the report and videos.
- Mike Cloughesy indicated that there would be a handout at the Forest Health State of the State Conference to promote the report and videos. Paul Barnum may sign up for public comment at the January 6 Board of Forestry meeting to introduce the report.
- After some discussion, the group agreed it would be valuable to add the availability of an ODF pathologist, Sudden Oak Death (SOD), and Swiss Needle Cast to the report prior to printing.
- Paul Barnum introduced the next special report as being “Harvest Methods,” with information surrounding visual management (options to clear cutting, operational safety, silviculture) and herbicide application (best practices manual, safety, rules, water and wind samples, etc.) and OFRI will be offering workshops surrounding this content.
- Mike Cloughesy indicated an interest in having representatives from Private and State Forests on the committee for the next report.

Partnership for Forestry Education Grant (status and next steps)

- Jim Cathcart reported that OFRI had completed all their projects. OFRI conducted three Leadership Academy sessions, generated four publications, produced several fact sheets, and offered two workshops in partnership with Oregon Society of American Foresters.
- Paul Barnum expressed the desire to have “Pathways to Stewardship” completed and offered their assistance on the project. The OFRI Board is supportive of this partnership and has continued the financial support.
- Jim Cathcart plans to move the “Woodland Fish and Wildlife” from the Western Forestry

Conservation Association website into the “Know Your Forests” website, as approved by the workgroup. The workgroup wants to use “Know Your Forests” as a gateway to reach family forestland owners in both Oregon and Washington.

- Paul Barnum indicated the timing is perfect for adding “Woodland Fish and Wildlife” as OFRI will be working on the website due to changes in use.
- OFRI will be asking ODF to be a partner on a fire risk project to reach out to landowners.
- Nancy Hirsch indicated that Teresa Alcock would be a contact for Paul on the fire risk project.
- Nick Hennemann is working on getting video information put together and offered to share footage with OFRI, as well as use of equipment. He will contact OFRI to explore opportunities for sharing resources and will complete agreements with OFRI so work can begin early in 2016.
- ODF and OFRI will meet to update the partnership.

Voluntary Measure Evaluation Project / Public opinion survey

- Kyle Abraham is heading up this project and it is moving forward.
- Paul Barnum reported there were 70 people at the combined workshops in Seaside. The multi-agency cooperation was excellent and the information well received by attendees.
- OFRI has reservations with a formal survey at this time and perhaps the workshops or FERNS would be a better way to get information. He requested that Peter, Kyle and Lena discuss the public opinion survey and, if ODF still wants to do one, OFRI would be willing to help facilitate the discussion with Davis, Hibbitts, & Midghall, Inc. (DHM).
- OFRI suggested that they could add a question to their formal survey that will happen after their ad campaign.

Compliance audit publications interest and strategy

- OFRI felt there would need to be more discussion surrounding this idea to identify what role OFRI would play.
- OFRI supports ODF desire to promote the audit’s positive results and Paul Barnum suggested that ODF could have the publications reviewed by an outside panel, e.g. Nature Conservancy, Ecotrust, landowners, etc.)

Focused Investment Partnership Grant (capacity building)

- Lena introduced the concept behind the grant and identified the partners involved. The funding will go through OSWA to ODF. ODF will use these funds to create a strategic plan and will apply for implementation funds after the plan is developed.
- Lena will keep OFRI informed on the progress of the Focused Investment Partnership.

Riparian Timeline for Rule Making

- OFRI is attempting to coordinate the remake and printing of “The Illustrated Manual for Oregon’s Forest Protection Laws”.
- Lena Tucker shared the riparian rule process may not be complete until 2017. ODF discussed other rule changes to consider, including food plots, aerial spray buffers, and the Bald Eagle.
- OFRI requests ODF to keep them informed on the developments surrounding food plots, aerial spray buffers, riparian buffers, and the Bald Eagle.

Miscellaneous

- OFRI would like to supply “Planted (year)” signs to State Forests, at no cost to ODF. The signs would be ordered on-line and Paul Barnum will send ordering information to Lena Tucker.

Summary of Discussion and Potential Action Items Identified:

Landslide Mapping with LIDAR and Funding Outreach – LIDAR Mapping

- DOGAMI expressed an ongoing search for funding to continue mapping. The complex and time-consuming detailed process prevents automation. Three percent of the coast is completed.
- When DOGAMI does a new study based on LIDAR, they erase everything in that area out of SLIDO and put in the LIDAR data. DOGAMI indicated that, without LIDAR analysis, SLIDO misses 80-90 percent of the landslides, particularly in the coast range.
- DOGAMI has developed a new Landslide Susceptibility Map for deep-seated and shallow landslides (debris flows are not mapped; and majority of shallow landslides are not debris flows).
- Uses for the map include Community Goal 7 (Natural Hazards) planning, surface water impacts, earthquake hazard modeling, landslide risk assessments, etc.
- Ian Madin will have Bill Burns send Peter Daugherty documentation on debris flow mapping. DOGAMI will contact Sheree Stewart to share the new map with DEQ.
- DOGAMI would welcome assistance from ODF for future LIDAR data collection. Most of the coast range has data, except the Siskiyou. They have reached out Emmer Nile, ODF, to see if partners are available, but have not had any leads from that process. The checkerboard ownership makes it difficult to interest landowners in making the investment.
- Peter Daugherty will have Chad Davis reach out to Ian Madin to discuss possible Good Neighbor Authority. (A) Ability to receive USFS funds for LIDAR analysis. (B) Administration of mining operations on federal lands.

First Aid / Wilderness Training

- DOGAMI is interested in participating in the First Aid/Wilderness Training.
- Kyle Abraham will follow up with Richard Riggs on the wilderness training information.

Integrated Enterprise Monitoring (Clean Water Partnership (CWP))

- There was discussion about data and needs and desire to improve partnership with DOGAMI around landslide data and mapping.
- OWEB may have funding from legislature to support the CWP.
- DOGAMI has not been invited to recent meetings.
- Peter Daugherty indicated that ODF supports DOGAMI being included in the CWP.
