### Apply Now to Become an NHSC-approved Site!

From March 31 through June 2 the [National Health Service Corps](#) (NHSC) will be accepting applications from new sites.

NHSC-approved sites are outpatient facilities providing primary care medical, dental, and/or mental and behavioral health services. All are located in a Federally-designated Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) and serve the population of that HPSA.

Becoming a NHSC-approved site enhances your primary care transformation efforts by improving access to care for people in communities with limited access to health care. The [loan repayment programs](#) offered through NHSC help practices in primary care shortage areas recruit qualified providers who want to work where their skills are needed most.

### Promoting Your PCPCH Recognition to Patients and the Community

Congratulations, your clinic is a recognized PCPCH! So how do you spread the news? Below are a few ideas and resources for educating your patients about what it means to be PCPCH and promoting your practice to the community.

**Stock your waiting rooms with PCPCH brochures.** Patient brochures can be customized with a clinic's name, contact information, hours and more. They are available in six languages. Downloaded and print them for free at [www.PrimaryCareHome.oregon.gov](http://www.PrimaryCareHome.oregon.gov)

**Add the PCPCH logo to your website.** Email [PCPCH@state.or.us](mailto:PCPCH@state.or.us) for an electronic copy of the PCPCH logo.

**Create a PCPCH webpage.** Describe the PCPCH model (use the language from the PCPCH brochure), add testimonials from your patients, and explain why being a PCPCH is important to your practice.

**Distribute PCPCH Patient Fact Sheets.** Include these in new patient packets or with intake paperwork. They can even be emailed! Download and print them for free [here](#).

**Decorate with posters and window clings.** Email [PCPCH@state.or.us](mailto:PCPCH@state.or.us) to request PCPCH posters and window clings for your clinic.

**Create your own PCPCH brochure.** Use the language in the PCPCH brochure, and add your clinic programs, culturally specific content and more.

**Use social media.** Connect with the PCPCH Program on [Facebook](#) and encourage your patients to do the same.

**Send out a press release.** Let local media know when your clinic becomes a recognized PCPCH (or reapplies for recognition), hires a behavioral health therapist, implements a new process to improve patient care, or other newsworthy events.

**Put it in a newsletter.** Include information about the PCPCH program in your patient newsletter.
