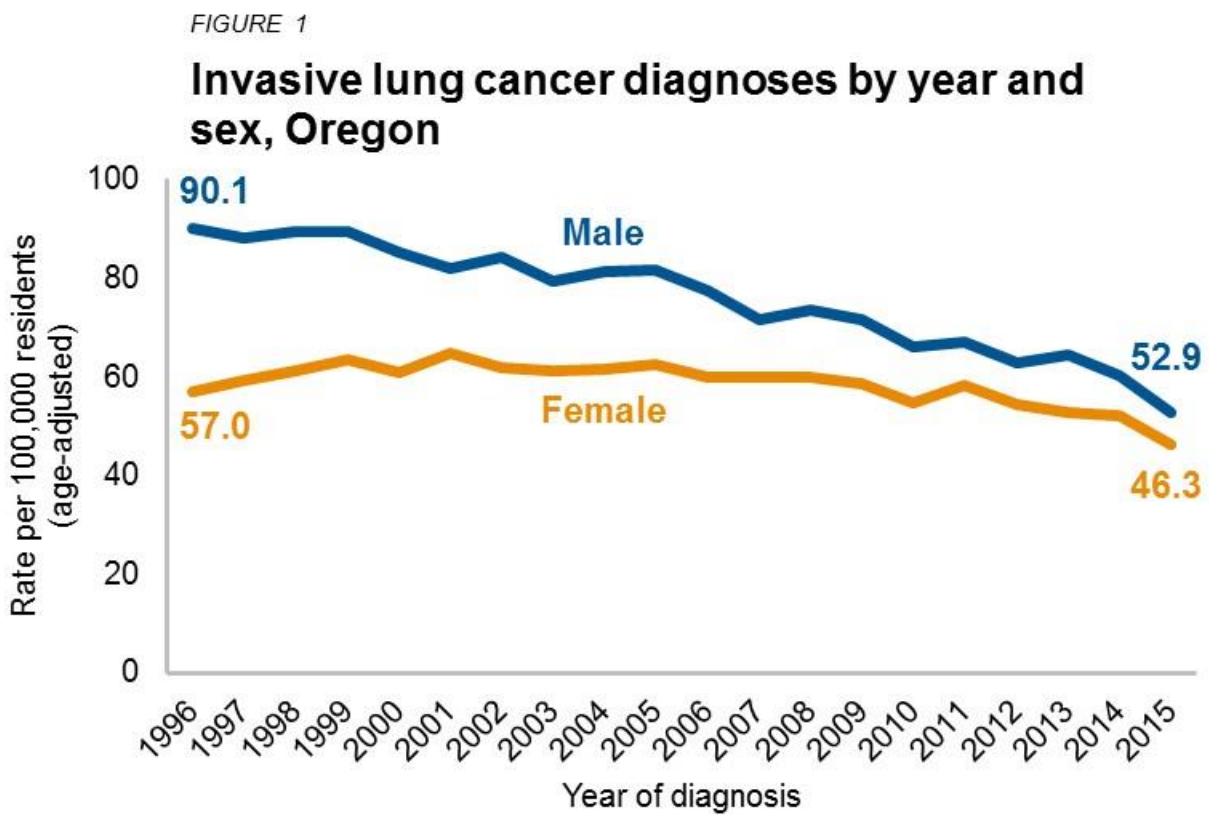

Lung cancer

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in Oregon, and the second most commonly reported cancer in 2015. Oregon death certificates indicate that nearly four out of five lung cancer deaths are related to tobacco smoking.

Oregon men have a higher incidence of lung cancer than women; however, the rate in men has steadily declined over the years (Figure 1). Among Oregon women, lung cancer incidence has declined more modestly. Lung cancer rates are expected to decrease further among both sexes if smoking continues to wane.



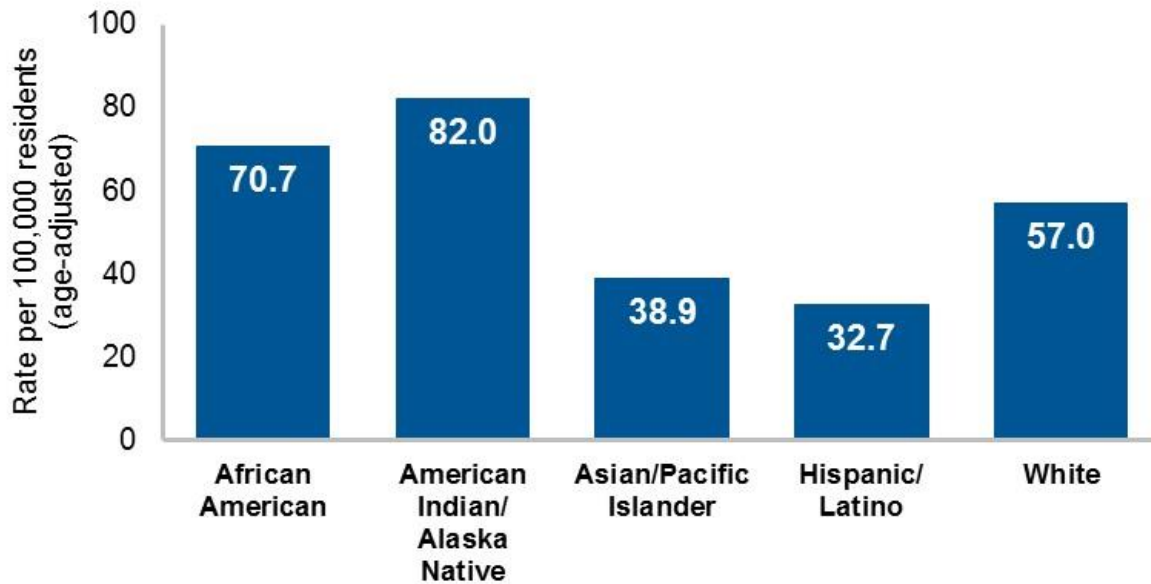

Disparities in age-adjusted lung cancer incidence rates by race are notable: American Indian/Alaska Natives have the highest incidence (82.0 per 100,000) and

Hispanic the lowest (32.7 per 100,000; Figure 2). Rates are similarly low in the Asian Pacific Islanders population (38.9 per 100,000).

About the Data: Data source is the Oregon State Cancer Registry (OSCaR). Data include diagnosed cases of invasive malignant lung and bronchial cancers among Oregon residents. Rates are age-adjusted to the 2000 U.S. standard population (19 age groups - Census P25-1130) standard. Population estimates used in calculating rates are from the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS).
