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New Board members

Governor John A. Kitzhaber appointed four new members to the Oregon State Board of Examiners for Engineering and Land Surveying (OSBEELS), as of July and August 2013.

William J. Boyd

William Boyd completed his undergraduate work at the University of Iowa, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering. He also completed graduate work in Environmental and Ocean Engineering at Oregon State University. He worked in the Office of the City Engineer in Iowa City, Iowa; Corvallis and Portland before earning his law degree from Lewis and Clark Northwestern School of Law in Portland. Before his recent retirement, Boyd worked as the manager of the Dispute Resolution Program for the Oregon State Construction Contractors Board. He's also worked for the Office of the City Attorney for the City of Portland, in a number of private

firms practicing construction law, and as the Session Staff Attorney with the Legislative Counsel for the Oregon Legislature. Boyd believes his background in law, engineering, construction and mediation give him unique qualifications for Board service as a public member.

Boyd has previously served his community as the chair of the Metro Committee to Reapportion Election Districts in Portland, as a board member and chair for the Richmond Neighborhood Association, and as a co-chair of the Land Use and Transportation Committee of the Southeast Uplift Neighborhood Program in Portland. He currently serves as the co-manager of Backstage Beverage Service for the Portland Opera Association. He also served as the regional coordinator for the local chapter of the Jane Austen Society of North America in 2010 and 2011.

Shelly Duquette, PE, completed her undergraduate work at the University of Washington, where she graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering. She obtained her registration to practice civil engineering with OSBEELS in 1997. She became especially qualified in structural engineering in 2004.

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Right of entry notification in apartment complexes

Recently, the Professional Practices Committee was asked how right of entry notification should be applied in the case of an apartment complex. According to Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 672.047(4):

A registered professional land surveyor, or any employee or agent of the land surveyor, may not enter upon land for the purpose of surveying, performing other survey work or establishing a permanent survey monument without first providing notice to the landowner by first class mail or by personal notice. If the land is occupied by a person other than the landowner, notice must also be given to the occupant by first class mail or by personal notice. Notice that is given by first class mail must be mailed at least seven days prior to the entry onto the land. Notice that is given by personal notice must be hand-delivered to the landowner or occupant or be posted in a conspicuous place where the landowner or occupant may reasonably be expected to see the notice. The notice

shall give the professional land surveyors name, address, telephone number, purpose, availability of the survey and the presence of any temporary or permanent monuments or other markers to be left on the land.

Legal counsel confirmed that tenants of an apartment complex would be regarded as occupants “other than the land owner” and, as such, EACH tenant must receive notice by first class mail or by personal notice. Additionally, it was determined that the landlord of an apartment complex cannot act as an agent of the professional land surveyor in delivering notice to the tenants. Preparing for retirement?

Staff would like to remind registrants that a signed form is required to officially retire your State of Oregon license. The *Request for Retirement Status* form is available at www.oregon.gov/osbeels under the “Registration” option. Until this form is received by OSBEELS staff, a registrant is not considered to be retired and, therefore, must continue to abide by all Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) and Oregon Administrative Rules (OAR); including those pertaining to completion of Professional Development Hours (PDH).

OSBEELS 2013 Symposium focuses on environment and infrastructure

The Oregon State Board of Examiners for Engineering and Land Surveying (OSBEELS) recently hosted its third annual symposium at the Salem Conference Center in Salem. Nearly 100 registrants attended the day-long conference which highlighted environmental and infrastructure-related areas of interest. Full-day attendance earned registrants 8 professional development hours (PDH), which is nearly one-third of the hours needed for each biennial renewal cycle.

“We are faced with constant changes in both technology and the regulatory environments. Continuing professional development enables us to keep current with the latest advances in technology to provide better service to our clients and the public and it helps us stay in compliance with current codes and regulations,” explained Board President Carl Tappert, PE, CWRE. “By attending the symposium, professionals are exposed to new concepts and ideas that they can incorporate into their own practices.”

Experts from across the state covered topics such as hydrographic surveying, engineered wetlands, roundabouts, flood plains and

natural resource valuation.

Speakers were from a variety of public and private organizations including the cities of Portland and Albany, U.S. Fish and Wildlife, the Environmental Protection Agency, Oregon State University, CH2MHill, David Evans and Associates and the National Flood Insurance Program.

Kristin Preston, PE, wastewater superintendent for the City of Albany, and Mark Madison, PE, CH2MHill, discussed the engineered wetlands in use at the Talking Water Gardens and the Fernhill Healing Gardens Wetlands. Talking Water Gardens works to reduce pollutant levels in the wastewater coming from the cities of Albany and Millersburg and ATI Wah Chang to

prevent ecosystem disruption.

Wetland cells, with shallow, slow-moving water, encourage the growth of plants which help filter out pollutants and remove excess heat from the water. Talking Water Gardens also provides public recreation trails, a habitat for local wildlife and a means for wetland restoration.

At Fernhill, the goal is to transform current sewage ponds into a zen-like garden area, open to the public. While it is still in the developmental stages, Madison and other members of the design team are predicting Fernhill will provide 16 separate environmental benefits, including nitrate removal and retention and thermoregulation. Talking Water Gardens serves as the final stage

in wastewater treatment, with the focus on reducing heat levels, while Fernhill aims to play a more active role in the removal of contaminants such as ammonia and metals.

Jon Dasler, PE, PLS, Certified Hydrographer (CH), director of Marine Services for David Evans and Associates, shared information regarding the multitude of ways hydrographic surveying can be used, such as in documentation of submerged structures, removing potentially active ordnance or conducting pre-construction surveys in marine environments. Hydrographic surveys are often

used for coastal mapping to identify dangers to navigation that are undetectable without the use of marine imaging equipment. He also discussed the different results provided by vessel-based mobile LiDAR, single-beam echosounder, multi-beam sonar and other measurement and imaging devices.

The day's keynote speaker was Bill Owen, PE, a senior engineer with the City of Portland Bureau of Environmental Services. Owen discussed the evolution of "green streets" in Portland, which focuses on redesigned storm water management infrastructure to improve

sustainability and livability in Portland neighborhoods. New components of the "green streets" initiative include swales, rain gardens, curb extensions and street planters that each work to manage storm water in innovative new ways.

The OSBEELS Symposium is an annual event. Registration fees cover registration materials, lunch and 8 PDHs. 2014 OSBEELS Symposium

OSBEELS is working to determine a date and location for the 2014 Symposium. This annual event is hosted by OSBEELS and provides registrants with an affordable way to obtain eight professional development hours (PDH). What types of courses meet PDH requirements?

All registrants are required to complete 30 professional development hours (PDH) each biennial renewal cycle. Often, it's difficult to discern if non-technical courses count or how much teaching, authoring, performing self-study, or mentoring can be used per biennial period.

According to Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 820-010-0635, PDHs must be obtained in qualifying activities related to the individual's registration. However, these qualifying activities don't necessarily need to be specific to the technical aspects of engineering, land surveying, photogrammetry or water right examination. The activities must have a clear purpose or objective which improves, or expands the skills and knowledge relevant to the registrant's field of practice or practices. If a land surveyor spends a majority of their time in the field, knowledge of first aid and CPR would be a valuable skill and that course would count towards fulfilling their PDH requirements. Similarly, if an engineer had a foreign client with whom they needed to communicate directly, classes in that language would be beneficial to their practice of engineering and would also count as PDHs. Bookkeeping and management courses have been

approved as appropriate PDH courses in past years. For non-technical courses, further explanation of the courses' relevance may be requested by Board staff.

While some individual courses may be up for discussion, the amount of PDHs earned for activities such as teaching, authoring, performing self-study, or mentoring is clearly stated in OAR 820-010-0635. The PDH limits for specific activities are as follows:

- Teaching or instructing a course or seminar can only be claimed the first time the course or seminar is taught and not if the registrant is a full-time faculty member
- Authoring or co-authoring published papers, articles or books – Maximum of 10 PDHs
- Active participation in a professional or technical society, committee or board – Maximum of 8 PDHs
- Self-study – Maximum of 6 PDHs
- Mentoring of engineering, land surveying, or photogrammetry topics to a nonregistered individual not under your supervision. Each 10 hours spent mentoring equals 1 PDH – Maximum of 4 PDHs
- Developing, writing, or scoring an engineering, land surveying,

or photogrammetric mapping examination for licensure or certification – Maximum 15 PDHs

The following activities DO NOT count toward fulfilling the biennial PDH requirements:

- Regular employment
- Real estate licensing courses
- Personal, estate, or financial planning
- Personal self-improvement
- Service club meetings or activities
- Equipment demonstrations or trade show displays
- Topics not relevant to engineering, land surveying, or photogrammetry professions
- Enrollment without attendance at courses, seminars, etc.
- Repetitive attendance at an identical course
- Repetitive teaching of an identical course
- Attending committee meetings or general business meetings of any organization. This can be confused with active participation with profession or technical societies. Attending a meeting is not the same as actively participating with an organization.

Construction contractors offering engineering services

Under specific circumstances, construction contractors are able to offer services constituting the practice of engineering. However, Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 820-010-0715 requires ALL of the following criteria be met when offering these services:

- The construction contractor must hold an active license under Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 701
- The services offered must be related to the construction trade, to include: constructing, altering, repairing, or improving real estate
- The services must be performed by a registered engineer
- The offer to provide these services must specify that the contractor is not an engineer and must identify the registered engineer who will be providing these services

As contained in subsection 1(a) of OAR 820-010-0715, “offering services” is defined as “manifesting a willingness to provide services, either orally or in writing, such that another person may reasonably believe that their assent to the services is invited and will establish an agreement.”

Construction contractors who violate any provision of this rule may be considered to be practicing engineering or using an engineering title, which are violations of ORS 672.020 and ORS 672.045. These violations can carry sanctions and civil penalties up to \$1,000 per violation. VA benefits now available for select licensure exams

OSBEELS is pleased to announce that a majority of licensure examinations offered are eligible for reimbursement through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

Starting with the Spring 2013 examination administration, the Acoustical Engineering, Forest Engineering, Oregon Specific Land Surveying, and Certified Water Right Examiner examinations are eligible for reimbursement. The National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying

(NCEES) fundamentals and professional examinations for engineering and land surveying have been eligible since 2003.

Veterans and family members must first apply for education benefits through the VA by completing the electronic application form at www.gibill.va.gov. To apply for reimbursement, individuals must submit a copy of the examination results, which must include your name, address, Social Security or VA claim number. The name and address of the organization issuing the license or certificate, the cost

of the examination, the statement “I authorize release of my test information to the VA,” a signature and date must also be included. The reimbursement only covers examination costs, not the cost of registrations fees, preparation guides, or processing fees. Individuals may be eligible for retesting reimbursements if a previous attempt did not result in a passing grade. Individuals must be eligible for VA benefits to receive reimbursement and total months of benefits will be reduced each time reimbursement is received. ■

Investigation and Enforcement

Law enforcement cases with sanctions from July 11, 2013 to October 31, 2013

2813 – DL Design Group, Inc.

The Board issued a Default Final Order against DL Design Group, Inc. for advertising and offering land surveying services without a licensed registrant. The company used a number of different federal codes that purported their ability to provide surveying services when they did not employ a licensed land surveyor as a “full-time partner, manager, officer, or employee.” The company was assessed a \$1,000 civil penalty for two violations of ORS 672.045(2) and OAR 820-010-0720(1) and (3).

2736 – Mark E. Fordham

The Board issued a Final Order against Mark E. Fordham, PE, finding that he failed to comply with CPD requirements. With consideration to mitigating circumstances, Mr. Fordham entered into a settlement agreement to permanently retire his registration without the option of reinstatement for violations of the former OAR 820-010-0635(1) and (5) and OAR 820-020-0015(7).

2777 – Joe P. Hill

The Board issued a Final Order against Joe P. Hill, PE, finding

that he failed to mark initial plans as preliminary. The plans were stamped, signed, and submitted to the City of Eugene for permitting installation of temporary spectator towers for a football game at the University of Oregon. The initial plans lacked a lateral load resisting system, but once Hill was made aware of the deficiency the plans were corrected. Mr. Hill entered into a settlement agreement to pay \$500 for a violation of OAR 820-010-0621(2).

2738 – Frederick J. Proffitt

The Board issued a Final Order against Frederick J. Proffitt, PE, finding that he failed to comply with CPD requirements. Mr. Proffitt said he was not aware of a change in documenting his PDHs. Mr. Proffitt did not contest and paid \$500 for a violation of OAR 820-020-0635(1).

2739 – George W. Voss

The Board issued a Final Order against George W. Voss, PE, finding that he failed to comply with CPD requirements. Mr. Voss claimed his previous employer had kept all of his CPD documentation and the only record he had was a Word document listing the classes. Mr. Voss entered

into a settlement agreement to pay \$250 and permanently retire his registration without the option of reinstatement for violations of OAR 820-20-0015(7) and the former OAR 820-010-0635(1) and (5).

2741 – Ross A. Winters

The Board issued a Final Order against Ross A. Winters, PE, finding he failed to comply with CPD requirements. Mr. Winters admitted to not properly maintaining records of his PDHs. Mr. Winters entered into a settlement agreement to pay \$250 and permanently retire his registration without the option of reinstatement for violations of the former OAR 820-010-0635 (1) and (5) and OAR 820-020-0015(7). ■

Social Security Guidelines

As part of your application for an initial or renewed occupational, professional or recreational license, certification, or registration issued by OSBEELS, you are required to provide your Social Security Number to OSBEELS. This is mandatory. The authority for this requirement is ORS 25.785, ORS 305.385, 42 USC § 405 (c) (2) (C) (I), and 42 ISB § 666 (a) (13). **Failure to provide your Social Security Number will be a basis to refuse to issue or renew the license, certification, or registration you seek.** This record of your Social Security Number will be used for child support enforcement and tax administration purposes (including identification) only, unless you authorize other uses of the number. Although a number other than your Social Security Number appears on the face of the licenses, certificates, or registrations issued by OSBEELS, your Social Security Number will remain on file with OSBEELS.

If, the United States Social Security Administration has not issued you a social security number, you must follow these guidelines:

- a. form must be signed by you;
- b. You are attesting to the fact that no social security number has been issued to you by the United States Social Security Administration; and
- c. are acknowledging that knowingly supplying false information under this section is a Class A misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment of up to one year and a fine of up to \$6,250.

By providing the following signature, you are agreeing to comply with the guidelines listed above.

When determining how many PDH credits are earned through college and continuing education courses, remember that 1 college semester hour equals 45 PDH, 1 college quarter hour equals 30 PDH, and one continuing education unit equals 10 PDH.

The primary responsibility of every Board member is to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the general public.

Board meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each odd-numbered month and Committee meetings are held the second Thursday and Friday of each even-numbered month. Board members are eligible for per diem and reimbursements for actual expenses involved in carrying out Board business.

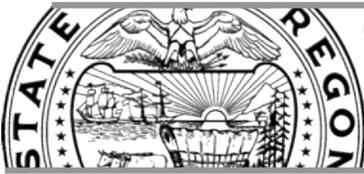
Social Security Number

To comply with child support enforcement and tax administration law, OSBEELS requires that all applicants and licensees provide their Social Security numbers. The Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 25.785, specifically requires that the
