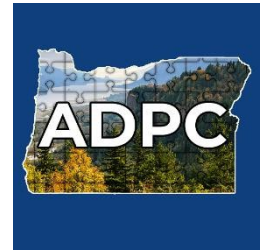

Organizational Business

Members Present: Stacie Andoniadis (Chair), Blue Valentine, Mariah Wright, Genine Tuifua, Haven Wheelock, Naomi Hunsaker, Jenna Nevills Adam Caba, Scott Jones, Seraphina Pinsky, Stephanie Damon-Moore

The meeting was called to order at 9:33 AM. Roll call was conducted and quorum was established.

Director's Updates

Presented by Director Dolph

Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission

New Commissioner: Stephanie Damon-Moore has been appointed to fill the attorney seat.

Commission Leadership:

- Chair: Debby Jones, who also leads the Primary Prevention Committee
- Vice Chair: Sharon Dursi Martin, noted for her extensive work with OYAA

The full Commission met in July to receive a 6-month update on the comprehensive plan.

August Meeting: CANCELLED

Recovery Committee Update

- The Recovery Committee recently developed a standard definition for recovery community centers.
- Currently collaborating with OYAA on the youth-related components before sending materials to state agencies.

Next meeting: August 20, 2026

Treatment Committee Update

- Current focus: improving discharge and transition practices across the treatment continuum
- Mitch Doig has launched two workgroups:
 - Medications for SUD
 - Evidence-based practices

Next meeting: August 12, 2026

Prevention Committee Update

- The Prevention Committee continues work on the development of a Center of Excellence, having already defined its scope and beginning governance planning this month.
- The committee is also finalizing House Bill 3321 deliverables, which include a statewide primary prevention financing, workforce, and program assessment.

Next meeting: August 26, 2026

Oregon Youth Addiction Alliance

- Youth leaders shared early recommendations for how recovery centers can better serve young people. Their feedback includes the need for transportation, clear age-range guidelines, trauma-informed staff training, and smooth transitions between youth and adult services.

Next meeting: August 12, 2026

Local Opioid Settlement Board

- Meeting next week with OHA to provide input on the next round of funding.
- OHA will be posting an RFGA this fall.

Naloxone Toolkit Worktime

Presented by Mara Sargent and Chair Andoniadis

Overview of Purpose

- The committee revisited its previously agreed-upon strategy: to create a statewide Naloxone access toolkit focused on amplifying existing distribution channels.
- Intended outcome: a statewide brief directing individuals, organizations, and agencies to all Naloxone access points.

Toolkit Audience Discussion

- Members asked for clarity on audience. Current assumption: widest possible reach for all Oregonians seeking Naloxone information.
- Recognition that different audiences may need different formats.
 - Client-facing materials should be simplified and possibly take the form of a one-page flyer.
 - Toolkit itself could remain multi-section but link out to simpler materials when appropriate.
- Committee emphasized ensuring plain language throughout to make it accessible to non-professionals.

Avoiding Duplication / Coordination with Existing Resources

- Members expressed concern about duplicating work already led by OHA and Save Lives Oregon.
- Discussion centered on determining whether the committee should:
 - Build a full toolkit,
 - Create a simplified link-hub, or
 - Produce a policy/white paper that consolidates resources rather than recreating them.

OHA & Save Lives Oregon

- OHA is launching the Friends for Life campaign and refreshing its Overdose Prevention Website for accessibility
- Save Lives Oregon to remain the main hub for organizational Naloxone distribution guidance.
- Rural Health Transformation work will include a new program for adult Naloxone access.

Additional Toolkit-Related Resources Identified

- Existing joint OHA–ADPC–ODE Naloxone/Fentanyl overdose toolkit for schools should be linked within the broader toolkit.
- Existing professional-level materials (Save Lives Oregon pharmacist toolkit, school toolkit, etc.) can be referenced instead of recreated.

General Direction Emerging

- Committee leaning toward creating a central hub that links to all statewide Naloxone.

Agency Partner Updates

Presented by Agency Partners

Oregon State Police:

Consultation with the State EMS Director, the agency's licensing authority, is planned to identify any regulatory hurdles or requirements associated with potential process modifications. OSP's naloxone supply practices were reviewed, noting that approximately 50 boxes are purchased each month.

An internal workflow assessment indicated that introducing naloxone into inventory approximately 45 days prior to expiration would be the most feasible approach. This method avoids issues associated with expired naloxone, which would require statutory changes in Oregon for any disposition or redistribution.

It was noted that current on-demand purchasing of roughly 50 boxes monthly presents operational challenges and potential inefficiencies. Additional evaluation is needed to determine how ordering processes may be streamlined while maintaining reliable access.
