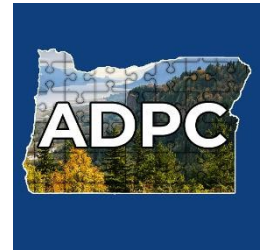

Director's Updates

Presented by Director Dolph

The full Commission met last month at Miracles Club in person. At the next meeting we will be providing a Q2 Comprehensive Plan update.

Rule and ASAM Review: Discharge and Transitions

Presented by Mitch Doig

Mitch Doig provided a presentation on the current discharge and transition standards found in Oregon Administrative Rules (OAR 309-018) and in the ASAM text. He noted the committee will need several months to align standards across the continuum of care, especially where physical and behavioral health systems intersect. He summarized current rule requirements for residential, outpatient, and adolescent programs, including documentation, transfer procedures, family involvement, and continuity-of-care expectations such as written summaries and wellness or relapse-prevention planning.

Mitch also highlighted challenges in applying uniform standards within physical health settings due to varied environments and limited regulatory guidance. He reviewed ASAM's support concepts—adequate, available, integrated, and sufficient—and emphasized the need for sustainable, flexible policies that minimize provider burden while meeting the needs of individuals with complex conditions.

Key Action Items:

- **Continue multi-month review** of discharge and transition standards to allow comprehensive evaluation of system impacts and sustainability.
- **Assess alignment** between existing OAR requirements and ASAM guidance to determine where standardization is feasible.
- **Identify gaps** in physical-health settings where discharge standards are not defined in rule and determine how the committee should address these variations.

- **Determine appropriate level of detail** for new standards, ensuring they accommodate complex needs and do not create undue burden for providers across the continuum of care.

Comprehensive Plan: Discharge and Transitions Discussion

Presented by Chair

During discussion, members stressed defining “discharge” versus “transition,” ensuring the process is client-centered, and beginning transition planning at admission. They raised concerns about payer-driven discharges, administrative burden, inconsistent definitions, and the need for flexible standards that avoid micromanagement. Members mentioned the essentiality of crisis-planning, after-hours discharges, documentation timelines, cross-system coordination, and ensuring transitions apply across outpatient, residential, criminal-justice-aligned programs, and medical settings.

Public Comment

Presented by Chair

A representative from the justice system commented on the importance of ensuring that individuals entering jail settings receive necessary medications and related supports. They expressed strong interest in continued partnership with the committee, noting that the justice system - particularly within treatment courts - is committed to working collaboratively to improve continuity of care. Their goal is to help individuals succeed when they return to their communities, and they affirmed willingness to supplement existing efforts to support successful reentry.
