Organizational Business

The meeting was called to order at 1:05 PM. Roll call was conducted, and quorum was established.

Director's Updates

Presented by Director Dolph

Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission Update

ADPC will resume meetings on September 14, focused on the 2023–2025 State Agency Financial Analysis. The report will be published following the meeting. Committees will be asked to conduct deeper dives into their respective sections.

Treatment Committee Update

Recently met and received updates from OHA regarding planned rule amendments to implement ASAM 4.

Prevention Committee Update

Reviewing House Bill 3321 Primary Prevention Assessment, which includes statewide and local funding analysis and a scan of all primary prevention programs.

Next meeting: August 26, 2026

Health & Safety Interventions Committee Update

Preparing feedback for Senator Reynolds on proposed legislation regulating syringe service programs; continuing development of a naloxone toolkit with resources, best practices, and model policies.

Next meeting: August 25, 2026

Oregon Youth Addiction Alliance Update

Final recommendations for youth-specific recovery centers have been completed and will be presented today.

OYAA members will participate and present at an upcoming statewide youth summit.

Local Opioid Settlement Board Update

OHA will soon release a grant application process for one-time opioid settlement funding. Allowable uses have been mapped to the ADPC comprehensive plan, including recovery community centers and recovery housing. Long-term funding strategy planning will begin once settlement amounts through 2039 are finalized.

Youth Recovery Center Definition and Vote

Presented by Oregon Youth Addiction Alliance (OYAA)

Overview:

Will Burchard (ADPC) presented the final youth and young adult recovery center definitions created collaboratively with the Oregon Youth Addiction Alliance. These definitions complement the previously adopted adult Recovery Community Center (RCC) definition.

Youth (Under 18) Definition Summary:

- Youth-serving RCCs are built upon Section 1 (adult definition) and include additional requirements for protective boundaries, youth-specific spaces, youth/adult partnership support, and access to youth-serving systems and services.
- Must provide supports such as transportation, youth-specific recovery tools, family support, and transition planning.
- Governance must include youth-informed roles; ADPC will develop standards for youth-serving RCCs.

Young Adult (18–25) Definition Summary:

- RCCs serving young adults may incorporate youth definition components.
- At minimum must provide system navigation, young-adult-informed policies, and supports for transition to adulthood (employment, life skills, financial literacy, housing, independent living).

- Roll call vote; all present committee members voted yes.
- Outcome: Motion passed unanimously; definitions formally approved.

Next Steps (Implementation Discussion):

Tony Vezina outlined possible implementation routes:

1. Inclusion in a Governor's Office bill (decision pending).
2. Adoption and administration through state agencies (primarily OHA).
3. Independent legislative advocacy outside ADPC purview.
Conversations with legislators about carrying a bill containing the approved language are already underway.

Recovery Center report framework

Presented by Will Burchard, Chair Vezina

Will Burchard presented the draft framework for the Recovery Community Center (RCC) report, which is intended to support policy discussions, legislative advocacy, and broader public understanding.

Members reviewed the draft framework and discussed how it will help establish shared statewide measures while showcasing the variety of RCC models across Oregon. A work group will convene to identify which measures are most meaningful for RCC reporting, and the committee will also lead a survey of recovery organizations to inform the final report.

Current Peer Work

Presented by Will Burchard, Chair Vezina

The committee is shifting attention toward peer services more broadly, now that RCC definition work is complete. Members agreed that peers are sometimes asked to do work outside their role, so clearer guidance is needed. Stronger data is also needed to show how peer support helps people in recovery. Overall, the goal is to make peer services more consistent, easier to access, and better supported statewide.

Next steps:

- Begin mapping process elements for peer-services standardization work.
- Include voices outside the committee (peers, orgs, agencies, etc.).
- Coordinate with treatment committee for peer-in-treatment setting.
