Organizational Business

The meeting was called to order at 3:00 PM. Roll was conducted, and quorum was **not** reached. No action items were taken.

Director's Updates

Presented by Director Dolph

Director Dolph provided updates across ADPC committees and partner efforts:

ADPC: The full commission will meet Monday, April 13, for an update on school-based early intervention pilots funded in partnership with OHA. The meeting will also include the first quarterly update on the 2026–2030 Comprehensive Plan.

Next Meeting: April 13, 2026

Recovery Committee:

Starting work on defining Recovery Community Centers (RCCs) and reviewing current RCC funding sources.

Next Meeting: April 16, 2026

Prevention Committee: Beginning discussions on a Prevention Center of Excellence (training/TA hub) and will receive an update on the HB 3321 primary prevention assessment.

Next Meeting: April 22, 2026

Health & Safety Interventions Committee: Formerly the Harm Reduction Committee updated its charter and is now focused on a statewide naloxone strategies.

Next Meeting: April 28, 2026

OYAA: Meeting later today to begin discussing youth recovery spaces/ "third spaces."

Next Meeting: May 13, 2026

Opioid Settlement Board: Preparing a Request for Proposals to distribute the remaining \$13 million in settlement funds this biennium. A broad call for proposals is expected within the next six months.

Community Partner Presentation: High Acuity Behavioral Health Analysis & Strategy

Presented by Cat Livingston, MD, MPH, Medical Director, Healthshare

Dr. Livingston presented Health Share's multi-year analysis of high-acuity behavioral health needs among Medicaid members. Key points included:

- High Acuity Behavioral Health Cohort (HABH)
- Housing Data Integration
- Treatment Initiation (IET) Data
- Health Share's Response Strategies

Health Share leaders saw growing needs related to:

- Substance use disorders
- Untreated psychosis
- Housing instability

Health Share's Response Strategies

Health Share has invested in several initiatives based on these findings:

- MOUD in Emergency Department

- Addiction Consult Services: Implementation of inpatient addiction consult team
- Better Outcomes Through Bridges (BOB: Peer-led support for high ED utilizers across Providence hospitals
- Wound Care Expansion: Kits, training, and public health partnerships to address sepsis and skin infections.
- CHAT Teams: Low-acuity response teams (Portland Fire & Rescue) to divert unnecessary ambulance and ED use.

The program will continue to track housing stability, including retention and the success of housing placements, across both the HABH cohort and the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) cohort, which includes individuals receiving housing-related services tracked through the statewide HMIS system.

EPIS Overview

Presented by Mitch Doig, ADPC

Background: The EPIS model helps explain how programs and larger systems work together during implementation. Using EPIS also helps maintain a Recovery-Oriented System of Care perspective throughout the implementation process. The model functions like a checklist, outlining the key factors that need attention at each level of the system.

Key Focus Areas and Short-Term Goals:

- Evidence-Based and Trauma-Informed Practices (EBP/TBP)
- Timely Access to Care
- Improved Transition Between Services
- Quality and Accountability
- Additional System Level Efforts (wrap around services, technical assistance, funding opportunities, standardization, etc.)
