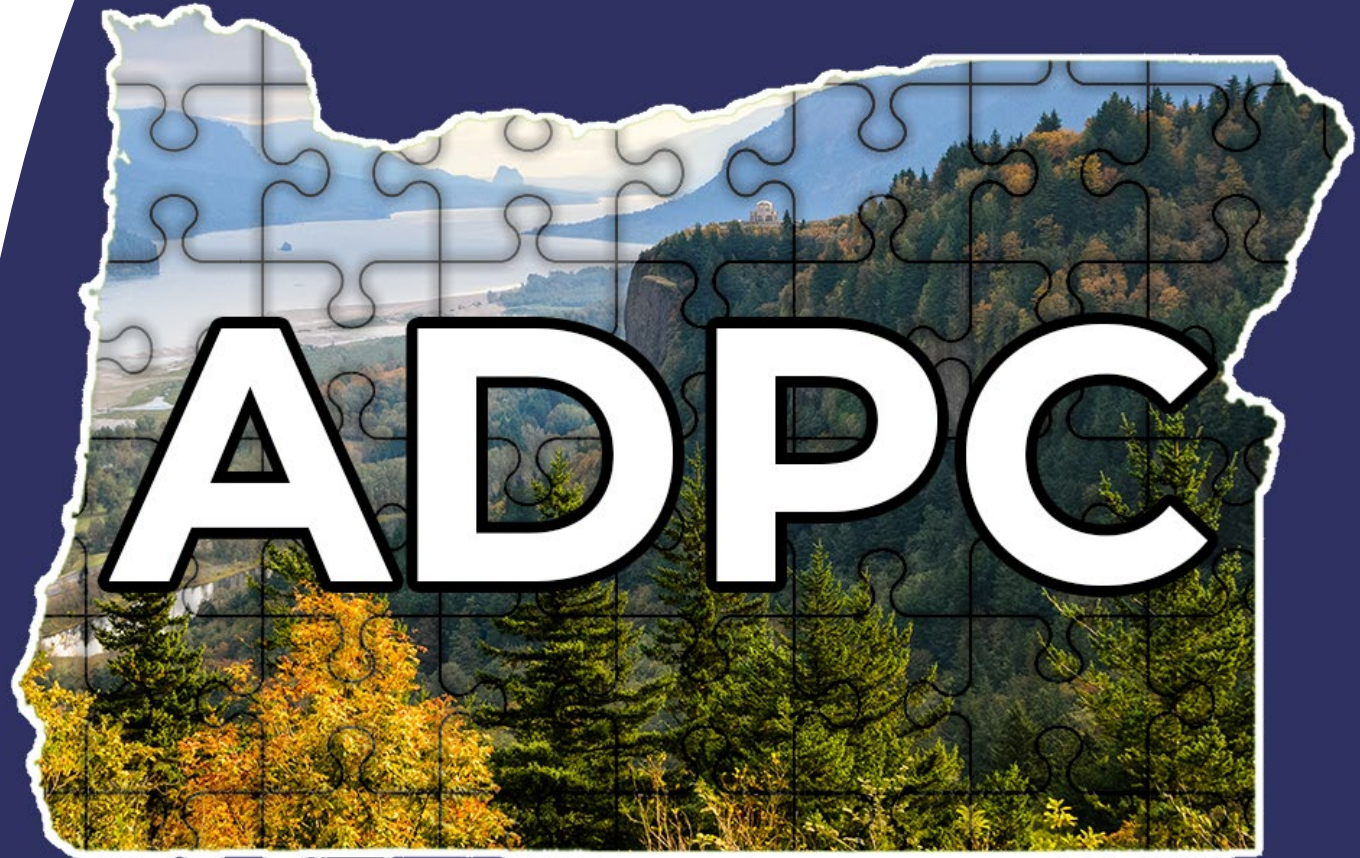

# SAMHSA Dear Colleague Letter 7/29/2025

- The following are supplies and services that CANNOT be supported with SAMHSA funding:
- No federal funding can be used directly or through subsequent reimbursement of grantees to purchase pipes or other supplies for safer smoking kits nor syringes or needles used to inject illicit drugs. Grant funds cannot be used to purchase any other drug paraphernalia.
- Sterile water, saline, or ascorbic acid (vitamin c) used to facilitate drug use.
- Any other supplies to promote or facilitate drug use not listed as acceptable above.

# Dear Colleague 7/29/2025

The following are supplies and services that CAN be supported with SAMHSA funding:  
Life-Saving Overdose Prevention and Response Services

- Opioid overdose reversal supplies, including the purchase of naloxone and nalmefene (OORMs)
- Substance test kits, including fentanyl test strips and xylazine test strips
- Medication lock boxes and medication disposal kits
- Overdose reversal education and training services
- Distribution mechanisms (e.g., bags or metal boxes/containers) for OORMs Infectious Disease Prevention Services
- Wound care supplies
- FDA-approved home testing kits for viral hepatitis (i.e., HBV and HCV) and HIV
- Sharps disposal kits
- Educational materials on HIV and viral hepatitis and prevention, testing, treatment, and care services
- Navigation services to ensure linkage to HIV and viral hepatitis prevention, testing, treatment, and care services — including antiretroviral therapy for HCV and HIV, pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP), prevention of mother to child transmission, and partner services
- Referral to hepatitis A and hepatitis B vaccinations (to reduce risk of viral hepatitis infection)
- Provision of education on HIV and viral hepatitis prevention, testing, and referral to treatment services
- Education and activities to reduce risk of STIs, including distributing condoms
- Provision of information on local resources and/or referrals for PrEP Other Supplies and Services
- Nicotine cessation therapies
- Food (e.g., snacks, protein drinks, water). Food is limited to \$10 per person and must be used in the course of service engagement.

# New Guidance 4/24/2026

Supplies and Services NOT supported with SAMHSA funding:

- No HHS funding can be used directly or through subsequent reimbursement of grantees or others to purchase or distribute:

- o Syringes or needles used to inject illicit drugs

- o Pipes or other supplies for safer smoking kits

- o Fentanyl test strips or any other substance test kits, including xylazine and medetomidine test strips, intended for use by people using drugs

- No HHS funding can be used to support “overdose hotlines” that have a primary function of facilitating illicit drugs use by providing people using drugs a virtual or telephonic companion while they are using drugs.

- No HHS funding can be used to purchase or distribute sterile water, saline, or ascorbic acid (vitamin c) used to facilitate drug use

- No HHS funding can be used to purchase or distribute any other drug paraphernalia or supplies that promote or facilitate drug use not listed as acceptable above.

# Bylaws Proposed Changes

The ADPC Health and Safety Interventions Committee aligns with the National Harm Reduction Coalition and defines harm reduction as a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences of substance use. Also, that harm reduction is a movement for social justice built on a belief in and respect for the rights of people who use drugs. The policies, strategies, interventions and practices supported by the ADPC Health and Safety Interventions Committee will center people with lived and living experience of substance use, especially those from marginalized communities. Lastly, the strategies, practices, and interventions supported will meet and engage people who are using substances where they are without judgement, stigma, racism, or discrimination.



The ADPC Health and Safety Interventions Committee aligns with the National Harm Reduction Coalition and defines harm reduction as a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences of substance use. **The Health and Safety Committee operates on a shared belief that respecting the rights of people who use drugs is critical to providing the best services to those that access them.**

The policies, strategies, interventions and practices supported by the ADPC Health and Safety Interventions Committee will center people with lived and living experience of substance use, especially those from marginalized communities. Lastly, the strategies, practices, and interventions supported will meet and engage people who are using substances where they are without judgement, stigma, coercion, racism, or discrimination.
