
OGEC INTRODUCTION





BOARDS, COMMISSIONS & ELECTED OFFICIALS



Must publicly announce potential conflicts of interest

On each occasion before acting



Must publicly announce actual conflicts of interest

- On each occasion
- No participating in discussion, debate, or voting



BOARDS, COMMISSIONS & ELECTED OFFICIALS

Public official's vote is necessary to meet a quorum

- Make public announcement
- May NOT discuss or debate
- MAY vote

Do you have a conflict of interest?

You are reviewing bids for roofing contractors. Your son works for one of the companies that submitted a bid, but he works in their residential division and would not be working on the agency's project.

EMPLOYEES

Must provide written notice

- ► To supervisor
- Describing conflict
- On each occasion the conflict of interest is met





THE PUBLIC BODY'S RESPONSE

Notice must be recorded in the official records of the public body

ORS 244.130

Supervisor will either:

- Assign task to someone else
- Instruct the employee on how to proceed

Your agency contracts with a consulting firm.

Your spouse was recently employed by this firm but does not work on agency related projects.

Would you have a conflict of interest if a contracting matter involving the firm came before you?

YES





INSTEAD

The consulting firm employs your cousin.

Would you have a conflict of interest?



You are serving on a board and are discussing licensing requirements for agency vendors.

Your father-in-law owns a catering business that sometimes puts in bids for agency contracts.

Do you have a conflict of interest when discussing this at meetings?

YES





Prohibited Use of Office

Using your official capacity for economic benefit



ASK YOURSELF

Do I only have this opportunity because I'm a public official?

YES = probably prohibited!




Prohibited Use of Office Exceptions

Official Compensation Package



Reimbursement of Expenses



Honorarium (\$50 limit)



Professional achievement awards



- ▶ Gifts
 - Economic Interest = \$50 and under
 - ▶ No Interest = No limit
 - ▶ 16 Gift Exceptions
- ▶ Gifts Monthly Webinar

Spot the Ethics Law Violation(s)

01

Using your agency's open WIFI network on a personal device during breaks

02

Picking up your spouse from the airport in an agency vehicle

03

Posting fundraising flyers in break room (not open to public) for nonprofit you volunteer at 04

Accepting a \$25 gift card for being a speaker at an event

Remember

Prohibited gains include:


- obtaining a financial gain
- avoiding an expense

Does not have to result in any cost for the public body!



Guidelines to Private Employment

- No governmental body time
- No governmental body resources
- No official action that could financially impact
- No confidential information obtained

Disclose all conflicts of interest

Selecting Contractor

INSTEAD

It is one of your family friends that you're recommending for the job.

Only if open to general public

INSTEAD

You only deliver orders, advertise on social media, and hand out your business cards/flyers outside of the office while not acting in the capacity as a public official.

Would doing so violate Oregon Government Ethics law?

NO




Your public body has an account and gets a 15% discount at the local hardware store.
