SLPA Practicum Requirements

The Board office has recently been seeing an increasing number of people seeking to be licensed as SLPAs. As these numbers have grown we have had a growing number of cases involving unlicensed practice and inadequate supervision.

Licensees are bound by Oregon Administrative Rules to prevent all instances of practice of speech-language pathology or audiology by any unlicensed persons. The Board can take action against licensees who do not adequately ensure that the persons they are supervising are properly licensed.

The requirements for SLPAs can be found in OAR 335-095. A person must have 100 hours of documented and supervised clinical interaction. Observation does not count as clinical interaction and will not be credited towards the 100 hour requirement. SLPA students and provisional SLPAs must be supervised 100% of the time. They must also report any change in supervisors within 30 days of any change.

Any person doing an SLPA practicum in Oregon must be enrolled in an academic program or hold a provisional SLPA certificate issued by our Board.

Welcome Ellie McPeak, New Public Board Member

Elynor (Ellie) McPeak was appointed to a three year term by the Governor and confirmed by the Oregon Senate to serve as one of two public members of the Board beginning July 1, 2015.

Ms. McPeak received her Master of Arts in Economics from Cal State University, San Diego, and went on to teach economic theory, consumer education, introduction to business and the history of economics at community colleges. Prior to moving to Lake Oswego, Ellie's civic life was with the Air Force community. As the wife of General Tony McPeak, Ellie was very active as a volunteer, working at the base Red Cross and thrift shop, and raising money for Air Force related causes around the world. Since moving to Oregon, McPeak has been a volunteer for the OPB Golden Hours program, the Lakewood Center Reruns shop, the Lake Oswego Arts Commission and the Citizens Budget Committee. She ran for and served on the Lake Oswego City Council from 2000 to 2008. Ellie looks forward to serving on the Board, and feels non-professional input is a necessary addition to decisions in order to best serve the public. The Board looks forward to utilizing Ellie's experience and judgment.



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SB 287 – Universal Licensure – Passed by the Legislature

After six years of collaborative work with the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission (TSPC), the Oregon Speech-Language & Hearing Association (OSHA), and stakeholder groups, the Board finally succeeded in having the Oregon Legislature create a single structure for SLP licensure. SB 287 has been passed by both house of the legislature and was signed into law by Governor Kate Brown on June 4th. The law takes effect on January 1, 2016.

The passing of SB 287 means the exemption in ORS 681.230(4) is now changed so that it only applies to SLPs licensed by TSPC before July 1, 2016. Thus, as of July 2016, BSPA will issue all new Oregon SLP licenses. SLPs previously licensed by TSPC would be “grandfathered” by continually renewing their TSPC license after July, 2016.

SB 287 was supported by the Governor’s office, TSPC, the Oregon Education Association, and the three University programs that train SLPs in Oregon (Portland State, University of Oregon and Pacific University).

Text of SB287:

(additions in **Bold**, deletions in *italics*)

SECTION 1. ORS 681.230 is amended to read:

681.230. (1) Without obtaining a license under this chapter, a person may use *[any]* **a** procedure included in the practice of speech-language pathology or audiology if the procedure is within the **person’s** scope of practice *[of the person]* and the person is:

- (a) Licensed by a health professional regulatory board as defined in ORS 676.160;
- (b) Performing basic audiometric testing under the supervision of a physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 and representing that the person is a medical assistant or audiology assistant;
- (c) A teacher **who is** licensed by the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission and *[holding]* **who holds** a hearing impaired endorsement **issued by the commission**; *[or]*
- (d) A student participating in supervised field work or supervised course work in speech-language pathology or audiology as part of a college or university program approved by the State Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology; or
- (e) **A student taking** an undergraduate course in speech-language pathology approved by the board.

(2) A person practicing speech-language pathology or audiology without a license under subsection (1) of this section may not represent or imply that the person is a speech-language pathologist, speech-language pathology assistant or audiologist.

(3) A person practicing speech-language pathology or audiology without a license under subsection (1)(d) **or (e)** of this section:

- (a) Must use a title that indicates that the person is a student trainee.
- (b) May not be paid for speech-language pathology or audiology services provided by the person, except that the person may be provided a reasonable educational stipend.

[(4) Without obtaining a license under this chapter, a teacher licensed by the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission and holding a communications disorders or speech impaired endorsement issued by the commission may practice speech-language pathology if the person:]

[(a) Practices speech-language pathology solely in the course and scope of the person’s duties as an employee of an education service district, a school district or a charter school; and]

[(b) Complies with ORS 681.360 to 681.375 and rules adopted under ORS 681.360 to 681.375 when supervising speech-language pathology assistants.]

[(5)] **(4)** Without obtaining a license under this chapter, a person may:

- (a) Consult with or disseminate the person’s research findings and scientific information to **an** accredited academic *[institutions]* **institution** or a governmental *[agencies]* **agency**; and
- (b) Offer lectures to the public for a fee, monetary or otherwise.

SECTION 2. The amendments to ORS 681.230 by section 1 of this 2015 Act become operative on July 1, 2016.

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding the amendments to ORS 681.230 by section 1 of this 2015 Act, a teacher who is licensed by the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission and who holds a communications disorders or speech impaired endorsement issued by the commission may continue to practice speech-language pathology on and after July 1, 2016, without obtaining a license under ORS chapter 681 if the person:

- (1) Was licensed and endorsed by the commission before July 1, 2016;
- (2) Practices speech-language pathology solely in the course and scope of the person’s duties as an employee of an education service district, a school district or a charter school; and
- (3) Complies with ORS 681.360 to 681.375 and rules adopted under ORS 681.360 to 681.375 when supervising speech-language pathology assistants.

Licenses must be renewed prior to December 31st, 2015

Online Renewal System will open in November

It is almost time to renew your license for the 2016-17 license cycle. The online renewal system will open at the beginning of November. The deadline to renew is December 31st, 2015.

PLEASE make sure your contact information is current so that you receive our renewal notices. Last renewal period, more than 10% of renewal notices were returned as undeliverable. Failure to update your contact information is a violation of the Board's professional and ethical standards ([OAR 335-005](#)) and the Board has the authority to charge a \$100 fee for failure to submit changes within 30 days.

As part of the Board's performance measure required by the Oregon Legislature, the Board will select 5% of licensees for a professional development (PD) audit. If you are selected for a PD audit, you must submit valid documentation of your professional development activities. These must be in the form of signed certificates of attendance. We will also accept ASHA CEU registry print outs and un-official transcripts for graduate level coursework.

Start Getting Your PD Ready!

Below are some tips to make sure your professional development is acceptable for renewing your license. All licensees must renew their licenses on or before December 31, 2015 to avoid a late fee. SLPs and audiologists must submit 30 hours of acceptable PD: SLPAs must document 15 hours, completed in calendar 2014 and 2015. Initial licenses issued after August 1, 2014 must have at least half of the required amount.

By rule, PD documentation must be maintained for four years. If you are selected for PD audit, you must submit acceptable documentation prior to the renewal deadline or you could face an additional delinquent fees and/or disciplinary action from the Board. Licensees with insufficient or unacceptable PD will not be renewed until they have submitted the required amount, and if that requires going into the 2016-2017 period they will be subject to an additional delinquent fee. Licensees who fail to submit the required amount of acceptable PD in multiple renewals will be subject to disciplinary action.

- University Courses—For a graduate level course to count as professional development it must be taken for credit (pass/no pass is not acceptable) and the individual must earn a “C” or better. Documentation can be in the form of an official or unofficial transcript.
- In-service Activities—In-service activities are only applicable when put on by public school districts, ESDs, hospitals, or universities, **for their own employees**. If you are employed by a school and attend a program sponsored by another district or the ESD, this requires special approval. Ideally the sponsor will apply for such approval when they decide to open it up to other professionals who are not their employees. Any PD activities must directly related to speech-language pathology and/or audiology. An in-service on basic office tasks or software may improve your service delivery but they are only indirectly related and will not be counted as PD. All PD documentation must have the title, date & length of the activity and must be signed as verified by a third party administrator.
- CPR and basic life support courses put on by the American Red Cross, American Heart Association or equivalent providers. You may use the card earned after the course as documentation of completion.
- All other activities should be ASHA, AAA, ABA, OSHA or Board approved activities. Documentation can be an unofficial CEU registry and/or certificates of attendance. Go to the [ASHA website](#) to verify ASHA approved courses or providers.
- Remember that 1.0 ASHA CEU is equal to 10 PD hours. You must report your professional development in hours, not ASHA CEUs.

PD Activities That Are Not Accepted

Per OAR 335-070-0020 -

Activities not accepted as professional development include but are not limited to:

- Supervision of practicum students or clinical fellows, making presentations, or teaching classes.
- Serving on professional boards or committees
- Attending professional association business or committee meetings (whether paid or not)
- Attending staff meetings. (See article above for acceptable in-service activities)
- Performing volunteer work
- Reading or studying professional journals or articles, unless part of a self-study program that is sponsored and verified by an independent third party.

Hearing Aid Dispensers and Tinnitus

The Oregon Health Licensing Agency's (OHLA) Advisory Council on Hearing Aids recently put out a policy paper regarding the diagnosis and treatment of tinnitus. There have been concerns about some Hearing Aid Dispensers acting outside the scope of their licensure regarding tinnitus.

(Below are excerpts from OHLA's Tinnitus FAQ put out in July 2015)

Are the diagnosis and treatment of tinnitus within the scope of practice of a hearing aid specialist?

Answer: No. ORS 694.015(2)'s definition of "dealing in hearing aids" does not include the diagnosis and treatment of an underlying disease or defect that interferes with human hearing such as tinnitus. Instead, "dealing in hearing aids" means the measuring of a person's hearing capability when evaluating and measuring their hearing range so that they can be fitted with a hearing aid or to have their hearing aid adapted for a different range or power of hearing.

May hearing aid specialists advertise that they can treat tinnitus?

Answer: No. Since the diagnosis and treatment of tinnitus are not within a hearing aid specialist's scope of practice, it is not permissible to advertise that they can treat the condition.

What happens if the Health Licensing Office receives a complaint that a hearing aid specialist is unlawfully or negligently practicing audiology or medicine?

Answer: HLO and the Advisory Council on Hearing Aids do not regulate the practice of audiology or medicine. HLO will refer the complaint to the Oregon Medical Board, Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, or other appropriate health professional regulatory board. A hearing aid specialist may be subject to investigation and possible sanctions if found to be providing services that are not within their scope of practice.

SLPA Supervision Audit Results

Every year the Board audits a number of school districts, ESDs, and individual SLPAs to ensure they are receiving the minimum required supervision. The Board is required by the Oregon Legislature to conduct these audits as part of the Board's "Key Performance Measures". It is also to ensure that patients are receiving adequate care and that SLPAs are not working outside of their scope of practice.

Audits were conducted on:

- 8 ESDs totaling 52 SLPAs
- 15 individual school districts with 48 SLPAs
- 13 individual SLPAs

The audit consisted of a review of the SLPAs' January and February 2015 clinical interaction logs.

The audit was conducted on a total of 107 SLPAs (34.7% of total active) who submitted a total of 396 clinical interaction logs.

- 87 out of the 107 SLPAs who submitted materials had documentation that was 100% correct. Twenty SLPAs showed some deficiency for an 80% correct rate for the total number of SLPAs audited. This is up from 73% last year.
- Out of 396 submitted logs there were 45 logs with some sort of deficiency for an 88.6% correct rate. This is up from 80% last year.
- Twelve of the ESDs/SDs had perfect scores, for 52%. This is the number traditionally reported for the Key Performance Measure. This is up from 40% last year but down from 54% in 2013.
- The average score for the twenty-three ESDs/SDs was 85%. This is up from 70% last year.
- The average for all evaluated (ESDs, SDs, individuals) was 82% correct. This is up from 66% last year.
- Of the non-school district SLPAs audited only seven non-school district SLPAs reported clinical interaction. Four of the seven had logs that were 100% correct. The total average score was 71% with all errors related to supervision change notices.
- Nineteen SLPAs did not submit supervision change notices in a timely manner.
- Two SLPAs submitted logs with multiple months listed on one log. This caused documentation errors on four logs. For one SLPA this revealed inadequate supervision.
- Four SLPAs submitted logs showing inadequate supervision.



RECENT BOARD ACTIONS

7/19/15

Perkins, Kristin K. Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: Licensed issued with conditions

Violation: A Consent Order was issued July 19, 2015 issuing Perkins a Speech-Language Pathology (SLP) license with conditions. Perkins previously applied for licensure as an SLP on May 21, 2013, did not complete her application, and it was considered abandoned as of November 21, 2013 per OAR 335-060-0020(3). Following an investigation, Perkins entered into a consent order on July 1, 2014, imposing a civil penalty on Perkins for purporting to be an SLP while not holding an Oregon license in violation of ORS 681.250(2). Perkins' business website, Nature's Communication Center, continued to contain references to her Lake Oswego SLP practice from July 15, 2014 through October 23, 2014 during which time Perkins was not licensed in Oregon. On or about November 5, 2014, Perkins sent the Board an email indicating she was not practicing in Oregon and not aware that the Board was concerned about her website and offered to work on it with her information technology IT person. The Board received Perkins' application for licensure on December 1, 2014. On that date, the Board accessed Nature's Communication Center website. On the home page was the proclamation, "we just expanded to Lake Oswego, Oregon!" No staff SLPs including Perkins on that date were licensed in Oregon. Perkins purported to be a speech-language pathologist in Oregon through her listing of Lake Oswego offices on her company's website for more than twelve months, and in her professional correspondence with the Board in December 2014, without a valid Oregon license in violation of ORS 681.250(2) and OAR 335-005-0025(6) and (8). Perkins, along with her attorney, appeared before the Board on May 8, 2015, and described her efforts in correcting problems with the website and her difficulty with her original IT person which made it difficult to timely comply with the Board's concerns. She has since removed all references to a Lake Oswego office on all of her electronic devices and website. She stated that she has not been practicing in Oregon and has not been seeing Oregon clients under her Washington license. Perkins entered a Consent Order on July 19, 2015, and was issued a license that will expire December 31, 2015. Perkins will be placed on mandatory professional development audit for the next two license renewal periods.

6/8/15

Flipsen, Peter J. Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order \$200 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 6/8/15 imposing a \$200 civil penalty. Flipsen was employed by Pacific University and failed to apply for a license in a timely manner in violation of ORS 681.250(2).

5/11/15

Painton, Stephanie G. - Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Final Order by Default: Denial of Application

Violation: A Final Order by Default was issued May 11, 2015, denying an Oregon SLP license to Painton. Painton withdrew her request for a hearing. Painton violated ORS 681.350(1)(a), ORS 681.350(1)(c) and OAR 335-005-0010(2)(c) by attempting to obtain a license from the Board by means of fraud, misrepresentation, or concealment of material facts and by violating a lawful order of the Board.

5/11/15

McCallister, Alyssa N. - Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Final Order by Default: License Suspension

Violation: A Final Order was issued May 11, 2015, revoking McCallister's license for the remainder of her license period (January 30, 2016) or until she demonstrates to the Board her competence, fitness and ability to practice in accordance with licensing law and professional and ethical standards. Licensee is in default for failing to timely request a hearing. Licensee practiced as a speech-language pathology assistant for more than five months without a valid license in violation of ORS 681.250(2) and ORS 681.360. Licensee accepted a job as a speech-language pathology assistant without having completed the necessary practicum hours, in violation of OAR 335-005-0020(1). Licensee practiced as a speech-language pathologist on a Conditional SLP license for 13 months after she met the requirements for and should have obtained a regular SLP license, and without being supervised appropriately as a Conditional SLP, in violation of ORS 681.325 and OAR 335-080-0025(4). Licensee engaged in misrepresentation and unprofessional conduct, in violation of the Board's definitions as defined in OAR 335-005-0010(1) and OAR 335-005-0010(2)(a), OAR 335-005-0010(2)(e) and OAR 335-005-0010(2)(k). Licensee engaged in dishonesty, fraud, and misrepresentation in documenting SLP services not provided, IEP meetings not held, and professional communication not performed, in violation of OAR 335-005-0025(4) and OAR 335-005-0025(8). Licensee failed to provide required services to students in her professional care in violation of OAR 335-005-0015(1), OAR 335-005-0015(2) and OAR 335-005-0015(11). Licensee violated OAR 335-010-0070(1). Licensee failed to maintain complete documentation of the clinical services she provided for students and patients in violation of OAR 335-005-0015(16), OAR 335-010-0060 and OAR 335-010-0070. Licensee failed to provide all services competently in the treatment of her assigned patients with dysphagia in violation of OAR 335-005-0015(2).

4/19/15

Kapantzoglou, Maria—Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order \$900 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 4/19/15 imposing a \$900 civil penalty. Kapantzoglou was initially licensed by the Board on December 13, 2012. The license expired on January 30, 2014 and Kapantzoglou did not submit a renewal application until August 11, 2014. Kapantzoglou practiced or purported to be an SLP without a valid license for approximately seven months in violation of ORS 681.250(2), OAR 335-005-0025, ORS 681.320(1), and OAR 335-060-0030.

3/31/15

Pastoor, Lori A.—Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order \$1,000 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 03/31/15 imposing a \$1,000 civil penalty. Pastoor practiced and purported to be an SLP for approximately three months at Camp Yakety Yak in 2013. Pastoor was employed by The Hello Foundation as an SLP for approximately two months in 2013 prior to her regular Oregon SLP license being reissued, and for another approximately two months after failing to timely renew her license in early 2014, in violation of ORS 681.250 (2), ORS 681.320, and OAR 335-060-0030.

3/19/15

Maxon, Robin M.—Audiologist

Outcome: Consent Order \$350 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 03/19/2015 imposing a \$350 civil penalty. Maxon was employed as an SLP at Eastern Oregon Audiology from approximately January 31, 2014 to February 27, 2014 without a valid license, in violation of ORS

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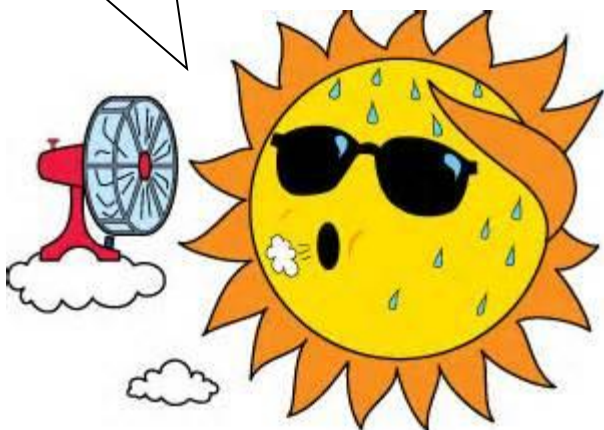
A Reminder About Reporting Requirements

A reminder about events to report to the Board office:

- Any name used professionally. If you legally change your name you must submit a copy of whatever legal documentation used to change the name, within 30 days. We will update our records and mail you a new license.
- Changes in work or home address, email, and phone number must be reported within 30 days.
- Changes in supervision, whether you are an SLPA or a CF holding a Conditional SLP license, must be reported within 30 days.
- Any licensee's conviction for a misdemeanor or felony and any arrest for a felony crime must be reported within 10 days after the conviction or arrest.
- Prohibited or unprofessional conduct on the part of yourself or another licensee must be reported within 10 working days (see the Fall 2011 issue of *The Voice* for details).

3/18/15

Putnam, Georgiana C. - Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: \$500 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 03/18/2015, imposing a \$500 civil penalty. Putnam was employed as an SLP at Reynolds School District and worked for more than twelve weeks from approximately January 31 to April 23rd, 2014 without a valid license, in violation of ORS 681.250(2).

3/9/15

Ecker, Sara—Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: \$400 Civil Penalty

Violation: A Consent Order was issued 03/09/2015, imposing a \$400 civil penalty. Ecker was initially licensed as a Speech-Language Pathologist (SLP) by the Board on September 4, 2007. In 2013, Ecker failed to apply for renewal of her license on a timely basis, in violation of ORS 681.320(1) and OAR 335-060-0030, and her license expired on January 30, 2014. On or about April 8, 2014, the Board received a license renewal application from Ecker and her license was renewed on that date. Ecker was employed as an SLP at The Hello Foundation and worked for more than two months without a valid license, in violation of ORS 681.250(2) and OAR 335-005-0025(1).

1/9/15

Jablonski, Debra B. - SLP Applicant

Outcome: Consent Order: Denial of Initial Application; Applicant May Re-Apply After November 8, 2015

Violation: A Consent Order was signed effective 01/09/15, denying Jablonski's initial application for SLP licensure in Oregon. The Board received Jablonski's application on or about October 8, 2014, in which she reported criminal history. During the course of its investigation, the Board found evidence that Jablonski had violated ORS 681.350(1)(a), which allows the Board to refuse to issue a license if the applicant has obtained or attempted to obtain a license or conditional license by means of fraud, misrepresentation, or concealment of material facts. The Board found that Jablonski was in violation of OAR 335-005-0010(1) which defines misrepresentation as including any untrue statements or statements that are likely to mislead; OAR 335-005-0010(2)(b), which defines unprofessional conduct as including making a false statement to the Board; and OAR 335-005-0010(2)(c), which defines unprofessional conduct as including attempting to obtain a license from the Board by means of fraud, misrepresentation, or concealment of material facts. Jablonski may reapply for SLP licensure after November 8, 2015.

1/8/15

Nugent, Carol—Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: Voluntary Surrender of License and Revocation

Violation: A Consent Order was signed effective 01/08/15, accepting the surrender of Nugent's license and revoking this license. In response to a complaint filed on May 1, 2013, the Board reviewed records for eight dysphagia clients seen by Licensee. The findings in the records of a patient who Licensee

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SLPA Supervision Reminders

SLPA Supervision Requirements can be found in [OAR 335-095](#)

SLPAs cannot practice without adequate supervision from a licensed and qualified Speech-Language Pathologist. There have been rumors of SLPAs being used independently of a supervising SLP and performing the duties of SLPs that are outside the scope of an SLPA's responsibility.

It is important to remember that all clients are considered to be part of the supervising SLP's caseload. SLPAs cannot have a caseload and adequate supervision must be given for all clients on the caseload that the SLPA is assisting with. Minimum supervision requirements cannot be "made-up" at another site or in subsequent months. The Board realizes sometimes things such as illnesses are out of a licensee's control and would look at a wider range of the person's clinical logs to verify general compliance.

Other SLPA Supervision Reminders:

- The supervising speech-language pathologist must be able to be reached throughout the work day. A temporary supervisor may be designated as necessary.
- The supervising speech-language pathologist must co-sign each page of records.
- Supervision of speech-language pathology assistants must be documented.
- An SLP may only supervise two SLPAs.
- Documentation must include the following elements: date, activity, clinical interaction hours, and direct or indirect supervision hours. Clinical logs documenting supervision must be completed and supervision hours calculated **for each calendar month for each caseload**. Each entry should be initialed by the supervising speech-language pathologist. Each page of documentation should include the supervising speech-language pathologist's signature and license numbers issued by this Board and the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission if applicable. Supervision documentation must be retained by the speech-language pathology assistant for four (4) years.
- Documentation must be available for audit requests from the Board at any time.



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treated beginning on or about May 31, 2013 were of concern to the Board. Licensee does not admit to these factual allegations; however she consents to voluntarily surrendering her license on February 28, 2015, and to the Board then revoking her license, based on the factual allegations and the Board's conclusions of law.

12/26/14

Zamora, Jenell - Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: Civil Penalty \$250

Violation: A Consent Order was signed effective 12/26/14, imposing a civil penalty of \$250. Zamora supervised Courtney McMullen during the period in which McMullen practiced speech-language pathology at Harney ESD without a valid conditional speech-language pathology license, from approximately 2010 to 2012. Zamora continued to supervise McMullen after she completed her clinical fellowship and practiced without a regular speech-language pathology license until it was issued to McMullen by the Board on January 3, 2013. Zamora violated ORS 681.250(8)(f) by assisting or permitting McMullen to practice speech-language pathology without a license.

12/22/14

Standard, Eleanor - Speech-Language Pathologist

Outcome: Consent Order: Voluntary Surrender of License and Revocation

Violation: A Consent Order was signed effective 12/22/14, accepting the surrender of Standard's license and revoking this license. The Board opened an investigation related to Standard's work with the Central Point School District during the 2012-2013 school year, while employed by Southern Oregon Education Service District. In the exercise of its duties, the Board found that it has grounds under ORS 681.350 and ORS 681.490 to accept Standard's surrender of her license.
