^{**}House Bill 3069 (2025) requires Phase 1 (25% of funds after funds for Tribal Governments have been set aside) funding of the Oregon Behavioral Health Deflection Program to be distributed to counties based on the county formula share used for the program during the biennium ending June 30, 2025: This percentage formula is derived from the county formula share employed by the Oversight and Accountability Council established under ORS 430.388 for 2023-25 as mandated in statute, Section 76(6)(a) of HB 4002 (2024). Per HB 4002 (2024), county applicants may not receive less than \$150,000, which will affect the actual percentage of funds distributed to counties. Not all counties applied for Phase 1 funding, which also affects these percentages.

^{***}House Bill 3069 (2025) requires Phase 2 (70% of funds after funds for Tribal Governments have been set aside) funding of the Oregon Behavioral Health Deflection Program to be distributed to counties based on Section 8(6)(a)(B)(ii)(b). This was approved by the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission on October 21, 2025. Per HB 3069 (2025), county applicants may not receive less than \$300,000 total, which will affect the actual percentage of funds distributed to counties.
