ACCESS	ACCESS in Jackson County will replace a refrigerated truck used in collecting edible but perishable foods from grocery stores and other food-generating locations and redistributing them to food pantries and other organizations which serve the needy.	\$87,171.88
AntFarm Inc.	AntFarm will purchase a trailer to collect cans and bottles for recycling at Northeast Clackamas County area events and festivals, and conduct community education and outreach about recycling. AntFarm is a non-profit organization in Sandy that teaches youth jobs and life skills through civic and environmental stewardship.	\$16,000.00
BRING Recycling	BRING Recycling will conduct focus group research and update its website to rebrand the organization and its services to more effectively communicate its identity and work, and to include information for residents and businesses on the impact of consumption and waste on climate change. BRING Recycling is a non-profit with 45 years of service to Lane County.	\$40,490.00
Cascades Academy	Cascades Academy, a school in Deschutes County, will purchase and install eight hand dryers in bathrooms to replace paper dispensers with the goal of reducing solid waste disposal and the purchase of paper towels.	\$10,082.00
City of Eugene	The City of Eugene will assess the capacity of repair cafés to shift consumer attitudes and practices and drive expansion of repair activities for household goods and equipment.	\$35,000.00
City of Eugene	The City of Eugene will include a Consumption and Waste chapter in its updated community Climate and Energy Action Plan. The City will evaluate and discuss with community stakeholders options including food waste prevention and recovery, repair and reuse, construction and demolition material reuse and recycling, and sustainable procurement.	\$25,410.00

City of Gresham	The City of Gresham will purchase and install 35 recycling containers at city parks and in the historic downtown area, with the goal of increasing the amount of recycling in the city.	\$22,267.00
City of Lake Oswego	The City of Lake Oswego will develop and implement a food waste compost education campaign designed to inform residents about the City's new compost program; the goal of the project is to boost participation rates.	\$9,501.39
City of Sandy	The City of Sandy will purchase a mobile wood chipper for use by residents. The chipped debris will be used as a source of mulch and trail surfacing. The City's mobile wood chipping service also results in reduced outdoor burning of yard debris.	\$30,000.00
City of Tillamook	The City of Tillamook and City Sanitary Service will pilot a residential curbside recycling program using carts in order to evaluate the feasibility and potential benefits of offering commingled (mixed material) curbside collection to all residents in the urban growth boundary.	\$6,625.00
Columbia Gorge Habitat for Humanity ReStore	The Columbia Gorge Habitat for Humanity will hire staff who will help solicit and collect reusable construction materials at its ReStore in The Dalles. Funds will also go toward marketing materials to promote its program.	\$37,005.00
Columbia Slough Watershed Council	The ResourceFULL Use Program will expand and promote materials exchanges for industrial and manufacturing sectors in the Portland metro area by allowing for additional exchange-related workshops and increased personnel staff time to be used for exchange support and promotion.	\$18,982.82
Douglas County	Douglas County will conduct a feasibility study of expanded recycling services to County residents with the intent of increasing recycling and delaying closure of the Roseburg Landfill.	\$37,000.00

Green Lents	The Green Lents Community Tool Library will fund staff, provide for translation and interpretation services where needed, purchase equipment and supplies, and host and coordinate community events in order to increase membership in its free tool-lending service and expand tool selection for residents of outer southeast Portland.	\$44,500.00
Habitat for Humanity of Oregon	Habitat for Humanity Oregon will fund start-up expenses for a new ReStore in Warrenton which will expand markets for salvaged and gently used construction materials and home improvement items while generating revenue to pay for Habitat for Humanity's affordable homeownership programs.	\$47,730.00
Habitat for Humanity/Rogue Valley	Habitat for Humanity/Rogue Valley will purchase a box truck and storage containers. The box truck will be used to collect reusable building materials from the northern area of the county, a currently underserved area. The storage containers will be retrofitted to allow for covered storage of reusable building materials at the Medford area ReStore.	\$29,400.00
Junction City/Harrisburg/Monroe Habitat for Humanity	Junction City/Harrisburg/Monroe Habitat for Humanity will purchase a vehicle, equipment, and tools, and fund a portion of staff expenses associated with opening a new ReStore for used building materials.	\$45,000.00
Marion-Polk Food Share Inc	Marion-Polk Food Share will fund a portion of operating expenses (fuel, vehicle repairs) and totes to expand its retail edible food rescue program to additional groceries in Marion and Polk Counties.	\$25,000.00
Meals on Wheels People	Meals on Wheels People will purchase reusable meal trays and lids to replace disposable trays for use in transporting meals to homebound seniors in the counties of Multnomah and Washington.	\$25,000.00

Metropolitan Contractor Improvement Partnership	City of Roses Disposal in collaboration with the Metropolitan Contractor Improvement Partnership (MCIP) will purchase equipment, supplies and fund start-up expenses for a reclaimed lumber processing and distribution outlet that will expand the market by serving large-scale end users seeking quality reused and reclaimed lumber, including those in the construction, manufacturing and design industries.	\$117,293.00
NeighborImpact	NeighborImpact will fund a portion of operating expenses (labor, fuel, vehicle repairs) associated with its edible food recovery program in Deschutes, Crook, and Jefferson Counties.	\$50,000.00
Oregon Food Bank, Inc.	Oregon Food Bank will fund personnel services, supplies, and equipment for a food rescue program which collects discarded edible food from grocery stores and distributes it to 21 regional food banks and partner agencies throughout the state.	\$50,000.00
Oregon Green Schools Association	The Oregon Green Schools Association will support waste prevention and recycling programs at 30 rural and lower-income Oregon schools. The goal of this project is for each participating school to achieve Oregon Green School Certification.	\$39,500.00
Our United Villages d/b/a ReBuilding Center	The ReBuilding Center in Portland will replace a 24-foot stake truck and purchase and retrofit additional equipment in order to increase its collection and salvage of used building materials.	\$60,099.00
Portland Community ToolBank	Portland Community ToolBank will fund construction of a room where tools and gloves can be cleaned, purchase event equipment to add to the rental collection, and fund a portion of staff expenses. The ToolBank lends high-quality tools and equipment to organizations that maintain schools, support injured veterans and the disabled, repair senior housing, landscape public spaces, clean beaches and rivers, preserve historic landmarks and more. Rock Creek Pantry	Rock Creek Pantry in Washington County will purchase a large walk-in freezer and increase staffing levels to expand its collection of edible, perishable food from grocery stores.	\$35,866.00
SCRAP PDX	SCRAP PDX will increase staff and marketing efforts to expand work with businesses in order to identify and coordinate collection of additional salvage and manufacturing discards for creative reuse.	\$23,824.00
St. Vincent de Paul Society of Lane County	St. Vincent de Paul Society of Lane County (SVDP) will replace a densifier for expanded polystyrene (EPS) with a more efficient machine in order to increase the amount of foam plastics recycled from Lane, Linn, and Benton counties.	\$38,000.00
Star of Hope Activity Center	Star of Hope will purchase bin-style recycling receptacles for placement in parks, boardwalks, and campgrounds in Coos County. Star of Hope is a non-profit organization that provides community support services to adults with developmental disabilities and operates a community recycling program that employs developmentally disabled clients and generates revenue used to support other vocational, training and community inclusion programs.	\$10,000.00
Tillamook County Habitat for Humanity	Tillamook County Habitat for Humanity will fund staffing and equipment to help expand Habitat's ReProgram which collects and sorts reusable construction and demolition materials for resale at the ReStore's Bay City retail site.	\$52,095.72
Tualatin School House Pantry	Tualatin School House Pantry will purchase a commercial freezer, allowing it to accept and redistribute more nutritious frozen foods recovered from grocers and food manufacturers.	\$6,000.00
