Requirements and Contents of Fiscal Impact Statement

- ORS 183.335: Agency must provide notice of fiscal impact for proposed rules
- Analysis of any significant fiscal impacts on the following:
 - State, federal and local government agencies
 - DEQ
 - The public
 - Large businesses
 - Small businesses
- Discussion of impacts to small businesses and possible mitigation measures
- Housing cost

Fiscal Advisory Committee Process

Fiscal Advisory committee:

- Reviews fiscal impact statement
- Provides observations and recommendations on:
 - Draft rule's fiscal impact
 - Extent of that impact
 - Significant adverse fiscal impacts on small businesses and potential mitigation

DEQ:

- Documents and considers committee input
- Revises fiscal impact statement if necessary

Updates to Division 246 and 247



Safety Net Program

Original Proposal:

 Delete the Safety Net Program entirely

[-0190 -0230] Safety net program

Revised Proposal:

- Move purpose of Safety Net Program to the Purpose statement of Division 246
- Retaining rule numbers relating to the Safety Net Program

[246-0010(1)]

concern. It also addresses cases of elevated health risks from <u>air toxic air contaminants</u> emissions at stationary sources and source categories of <u>air toxic air contaminants</u> emissions. In the future, it is also intended to address human exposures to toxic air contaminant emissions from stationary sources that are not addressed by other regulatory programs or the Geographic Program through a Safety Net Program. It is expected that the Safety Net Program will apply only rarely.





(ca) The ATSAC members will provide DEQ with findings and recommendations that DEQ will report to the Environmental Quality Commission, including consensus, majority, and minority opinions. Final decisions must be made by a quorum of members, based on consensus when possible. If consensus is not possible, decisions will be made by majority vote with a quorum present.

Original Proposal:

Include relocation criteria


Revised Proposal:

Add clarification that existing portable sources are excluded from relocation criteria



Portable asphalt plant – example of an existing portable source subject to CAO rules.


Final Risk Assessment Submittal Timelines



Original Proposal: Shorten L3 & L4 Risk Assessment timelines to 30 days → 60 days

Revised Proposal: Revert original timelines

Final Risk Assessment Submittal Timelines



Original Proposal: Shorten Risk Assessment timelines to 30 days

Revised Proposal: Expedited risk assessment timeline of 30 days for sources with anticipated risk above Immediate Curtailment

Emissions Inventory Requirements

New: Clarification to confirm flexibility for setting Source Risk Limits

Adds rule language from -0110(2) "Establishing Source Risk Limits" to -0040(4) "Emissions Inventory Requirements"


- (2) Establishing Source Risk Limits. For new, reconstructed, and existing sources whose risk is greater than the Source Permit Level, DEQ may set Source Risk Limits based on either:
- (a) The level modeled in the risk assessment required under OAR 340-245-0050 using the emissions inventory submitted under OAR 340-245-0040(1); or
- (b) For existing sources, a level other than the modeled level that reflects a reasonable estimate of risk from the source taking into account projected operations and other factors, including but not limited to:



Modified language: Require only emissions inventories for all NSR types

*DEQ retains discretion to call in any existing source.

[OAR 340-245-0050(1)]



(E) Ambient Monitoring Plan Requirements

Modified Proposal: Remove previously proposed language, and remove "only" to allow regulation of TEUs not being monitored

(iii) If the Level 3 or Level 4 Risk Assessment calculates risk from the source that does not cause any exceedances of the criteria in subparagraph (ii), then DEQ shall issue a Toxics Air Contaminant Permit Addendum addressing only toxic air contaminant monitoring requirements, including a reporting and compliance schedule for implementing the Toxic Air Contaminant Monitoring Plan required under OAR 340-245-0230;


Revised Proposal: Restored some exempt TEUs

Fiscal Impacts of the Proposed Rules





Three Fiscal Impact Statement Questions

Organization of Draft Impact Statement

The potential fiscal impacts of proposed rule updates to:

- Strengthen health-risk based standards (division 247)
- Align divisions 245 & 246 (Creating division 247)
- Division 245 for clarifications and to address inefficiencies

Fiscal Impacts Strengthening health-risk Based Standards

Rule changes proposed to strengthen health-risk based standards include:

- Updating authoritative sources
- Revising the petition process
- Rescoping ATSAC

DEQ expects no fiscal impact from these procedural changes to businesses, DEQ, or other agencies.

Fiscal Impacts Aligning Division 245 and 246

Rule changes proposed in order to align Divisions 245 & 246 include:

- Creating Division 247 to house list of toxic air contaminants and their health-risk based standards
- Removing the rule-language related to the Safety Net Program, while retaining the purpose and the rule numbers

DEQ expects no fiscal impact from these proposed changes to businesses, DEQ, or other agencies.

Fiscal Impacts Division 245 Clarifications and Inefficiencies

Scenarios estimated to have a fiscal impact:

- Sources exceeding RALs or installing controls
- Modeling requiring a higher level risk assessment
- NSR Modifications: Emissions Inventory requirement
- Post-TACPA modifications: cost and public notice requirements


Fiscal Impacts Division 245 Clarifications and Inefficiencies

Fiscal impacts difficult to quantify:

- Expediting timelines
- Delays in construction
- Public health benefits

Initial Findings

- The proposed rules are not expected to generate significant statewide fiscal and economic impacts
- There are no anticipated fiscal impacts related to the creation of division 247 and alignment of division 245 and 246
- There could be significant fiscal impacts for a limited number of sources based upon proposed updates to division 245, but there may be options to offset increase in costs
- Proposed rules may result in health benefits to the public





Fiscal Impacts by Sector



State, Federal and Local Agencies

- State, federal, or local agency-owned sources will experience the same fiscal impacts as other permitted sources
- There are no significant fiscal impacts that affect all state, federal, and local agency-owned sources
- State, federal and local agency-owned sources may see a significant fiscal impact if they exceed a Risk Action Level under the proposed rule changes

- In the short term, DEQ may see increased costs due to additional review requirements and deliverables
- In the longer term, anticipate increased efficiency due to the alignment of Divisions 245 & 246 and addressing clarifications and inefficiencies in Division 245.
 - However, it is difficult to quantify the full extent of impacts at this time



- DEQ anticipates some benefit to public health from the proposed rule changes
- Improved public health may translate into lower costs related to health care

It is not possible at this time to estimate public health benefits from local reductions in exposure to toxic air contaminants

Large Businesses

- Large sources will experience the same fiscal impacts as other permitted sources
- There are no significant fiscal impacts that affect all large businesses
- A limited number of large businesses may see a significant fiscal impact if they exceed a Risk Action Level under the proposed rule changes

DEQ does not have adequate information to estimate the potential costs to specific large businesses that may be affected by the proposed rules

Small Businesses

- Small sources will experience the same fiscal impacts as other permitted sources
- There are no significant fiscal impacts that affect all small businesses
- A limited number of small sources may see a significant fiscal impact if they exceed a Risk Action Level under the proposed rule changes

DEQ does not have adequate information to estimate the potential costs to specific small businesses that may be affected by the proposed rules



Mitigation of Impacts to Small Businesses

- Technical Assistance available to small businesses completing risk assessment process under CAO
- Tiered implementation of the CAO program could delay/defer regulatory costs for most existing smaller businesses
- Additional time for compliance with risk levels through extensions and postponement proposal
- Cost impacts may be reduced through other methods (pollution prevention, product substitution)




