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Executive Summary

ORS 459A.174(1)(a)

In 2022, Oregon became the fourth U.S. state to enact a law establishing a statewide mattress recycling program. Senate Bill 1576 requires mattress manufacturers to establish an extended producer responsibility (EPR) program that makes it easy for consumers to recycle their unwanted mattresses and foundations. The law aims to increase mattress recycling, establish new convenient locations in every county for residents to drop off their mattresses, reduce illegal dumping, and create jobs in the recycling sector.

Over 10 years ago, the mattress industry created our organization - the Mattress Recycling Council - as its EPR solution. We have now recycled more than 17 million mattresses from across our state programs. As we expanded to Oregon we drew on this expertise. This annual report describes the financial position and operational performance of the Mattress Recycling Council Oregon LLC (MRC)'s first year rollout. The report also includes appendices detailing collection sites, participating manufacturers, registered retailers, and examples of MRC's education and outreach efforts.

MRC's operating plan was approved by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) in July 2024, and operations began on Jan. 1, 2025. In its first year of operations, 134,121 mattresses and foundations (equivalent to 8 million pounds) were collected from consumers and businesses throughout the state. Stretched end to end, the number of collected units would reach from Portland to Bend.

In addition to the mattresses and foundations collected, MRC's 2025 achievements include:

- 5.9 million pounds of materials reused, recycled or used as biomass fuel
- 75.6% of program materials diverted from Oregon landfills
- Facilitated the reuse of 2,081 mattresses
- Generated 390 local media placements publicizing the launch of the program and availability of new sites and events for consumers and businesses
- Began work on a three-phase approach to mitigate the illegal dumping of mattresses

Looking ahead, MRC is well-positioned to build on this strong groundwork and will continue to rapidly grow the program in its early years as convenience expands and public awareness increases. We remain committed to continuous improvement, ensuring the program's long-term financial health, and delivering environmental and economic benefits to communities across Oregon.

Definitions

This report incorporates definitions from the Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) and Oregon Administrative Rules and refers to the approved Program Plan.

From the section related to the mattress stewardship program (ORS 459A.153):

- (3) “**Discarded mattress**” means a mattress that has been used, and abandoned or discarded, in this state.
- (4) “**Environmentally sound management**” includes, but is not limited to, the following management practices, implemented in a manner that is designed to protect public health and safety and the environment:
 - (a) Adequate record keeping;
 - (b) Keeping detailed documentation of the methods used to:
 - (A) Manage discarded mattresses; and
 - (B) Track and document the fate of discarded mattresses from collection through final disposition within this state and outside this state;
 - (c) Performance audits and inspections of recyclers, haulers and other parties as determined by a stewardship organization;
 - (d) Compliance with worker health and safety requirements; and
 - (e) Maintenance of adequate liability insurance for a stewardship organization and contractors working for the stewardship organization.
- (6) “**Foundation**” means a ticking-covered structure that is used to support a mattress or sleep surface and that may be constructed of frames, foam, box springs or other materials, used alone or in combination.
- (7)
 - (a) “**Mattress**” means:
 - (A) A resilient material or combination of materials that is enclosed by a ticking, is used alone or in combination with other products and is intended for or promoted for sleeping upon; or
 - (B) A foundation.
 - (b) “Mattress” does not mean:
 - (A) An unattached mattress pad or unattached mattress topper, with or without resilient filling or ticking, that is intended to be used with or on top of a mattress;
 - (B) A sleeping bag;
 - (C) A pillow;
 - (D) A car bed, crib mattress or bassinet mattress;
 - (E) A carriage, basket, dressing table, stroller, playpen, infant carrier, lounge pad, crib bumper or other product manufactured for young children or the pad for a product described in this subparagraph;
 - (F) A waterbed, an air mattress or another that contains liquid- or gas-filled ticking and that does not contain upholstery material between the ticking and the mattress core, or
 - (G) A foldout sofa bed, futon, futon mattress or upholstered furniture.

- (15) **“Producer”** means any person, irrespective of the selling technique used, including that of remote sale, that:
- (a) Manufactures a mattress that is sold, offered for sale or distributed in this state;
 - (b) Is the owner of a trademark or brand under which a mattress is sold, offered for sale or distributed in this state, whether or not such trademark or brand is registered in this state; or
 - (c) Imports a mattress into the United States that is sold or offered for sale in the state.

- (16)
- (a) **“Program mattress”** means a discarded mattress that a stewardship organization will provide environmentally sound management for under a mattress stewardship program.
 - (b) “Program mattress” does not mean a mattress transported from outside this state to be discarded in this state.

- (17)
- (a) **“Renovate”** means to alter a discarded mattress for resale through replacing the ticking or filling, adding additional filling or replacing components of the discarded mattress with new or recycled materials.
 - (b) “Renovate” does not mean:
 - (A) Stripping a discarded mattress of the ticking or filling without adding new material; or
 - (B) The sanitization or sterilization of a discarded mattress without other alteration to the discarded mattress.

(18) **“Renovator”** means a person that renovates discarded mattresses.

(19) **“Retailer”** means a person that offers new, used or renovated mattresses for retail sale.

(20) **“Retail sale”** means sale to a consumer in this state by any means and for any purpose other than resale, including but not limited to sale by remote offerings such as sales outlets, catalogs or the Internet.

(23) **“Stewardship organization”** means a nonprofit organization designated by a producer or group of producers to implement a mattress stewardship program.

Other terms defined elsewhere in the ORS are also applicable to this report:

ORS 174.116(1)(a):

“Local government” means all cities, counties and local service districts located in this state, and all administrative subdivisions of those cities, counties and local service districts.

ORS 459.005(3):

“Collection service” means a service that provides for collection of solid waste or recyclable material or both but does not include that part of a business operated

under a certificate issued under ORS 822.110 (Dismantler certificate).

ORS 459.005(21):

“Recycling” means any process by which solid waste materials are transformed into new products in a manner that the original products may lose their identity.

ORS 459.005(24):

“Reuse” means the return of a commodity into the economic stream for use in the same kind of application as before without change in its identity.

ORS 459A.085:

“Collection service franchise holder” as described under ORS 459A.085.

In addition, for purposes of this Annual Report:

“Collection location” means a type of site that would accept a dropped-off mattress. This includes permanent collection sites, recyclers and mattress collection events.

“Collection network” means the system of collection channels through which the program receives discarded mattresses, including permanent collection sites, collection events, retailer take-back programs, the Commercial Volume Program (CVP), and other approved collection pathways.

“Collector” means a party that collects one or more Mattresses discarded in Oregon and delivers them to a Collection Site or Recycler.

“DEQ” or **“The Department”** refers to the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality.

“MRC Inc.” refers to Mattress Recycling Council, Inc., a tax-exempt non-profit corporation incorporated in the state of Delaware.

“MRC” refers to Mattress Recycling Council Oregon, LLC, a limited liability company that MRC Inc. created to design and implement the Oregon mattress stewardship program.

“Plan” refers to the document approved by DEQ that describes how a stewardship organization will develop and implement a mattress stewardship program in Oregon and that contains the information specified in Section 4(1) of the law.

“Rural areas” refers to counties that have a population of less than 10,000 people, as described in Section 5(1) of the law.

“Unit” is synonymous with the term “mattress,” and collectively refers to mattresses and foundations.

“Urban areas” refers to counties that have a population of 10,000 people or more, as described in Section 5(1) of the law.

Chapter 2: Collection, Transportation and Processing

ORS 459A.174(2)(b), (c), (d), (e), (f) and (g)

In 2025, MRC worked to create a robust collection network throughout Oregon, enabling residents to dispose of used mattresses for recycling. The program's success hinges largely on working within the existing statewide infrastructure of facilities that receive or handle discarded mattresses as part of their ongoing operations.

Collection Channels

In 2025, MRC continued to recruit mattress collection locations, making it more convenient for Oregon consumers and businesses to have their mattresses recycled at no charge by MRC, either by dropping off their units at a collection site or by accessing the network.

MRC collects used mattresses through the following channels in Oregon:

1. Permanent collection sites
2. Mattress collection events
3. Commercial Volume Program (CVP)
4. Retailer take back

In 2025, MRC:

- Contracted with 24 permanent collection sites that collected units from consumers.
- Participated in 54 collection events.
- Provided 13 CVP sites with permanent on-site trailers.
- Picked up 6 live loads from 6 commercial entities.

Table 1 summarizes MRC's collection network in 2025. [Appendix B](#) lists all locations by type.

In 2026, MRC continues to expand the collection network in areas that increase access for Oregon consumers and commercial entities. We publish drop-off options and recycling information on [ByeByeMattress.com](https://www.byebyemattress.com).

Collection Site Types

Permanent Collection Sites

Permanent collection sites are open to the public. All of them must allow residents to drop off mattresses at no cost. Some locations allow drop-offs from commercial entities. Except for mattress recyclers, MRC pays these sites a handling fee if they accept mattresses from the public at no cost (MRC compensates recyclers for serving as collection sites as part of the services they provide under contract to MRC). MRC bears the cost of transporting the units to a recycler and recycling them.

In 2025, the Oregon program had 24 permanent collection sites.

The types of permanent collection sites that the program offers Oregon residents and commercial entities include:

Solid Waste Facilities

Solid waste facilities (SWF) comprise the majority of MRC's permanent collection sites. In 2025, MRC contracted with 13 SWFs. All of them accepted mattresses dropped off by residents at no cost. Some also allowed no-cost drop-off for commercial entities with small loads.

Mattress Recyclers

Recyclers accept mattresses directly from residents and commercial entities at no cost. In 2025, MRC's recycling network consisted of 3 locations throughout Oregon. Recyclers in Oregon track the number of units they receive from each of the following sources:

- **Retailer drop-off:** This includes units that mattress retailers drop off at recyclers using their own transportation or use MRC's CVP services, but excludes units that retailers drop off at SWFs.
- **Institutional drop-off:** This includes units from hotels, educational facilities and other large-volume mattress purchasers that deliver units to recyclers using their own transportation or use MRC's CVP services. It also includes units from commercial entities with small loads such as junk haulers, landlords or independent retailers. MRC's Portland-based recycler accepts units from small commercial sources that agree in writing to maintain a compliance log indicating the source of the units they receive. These compliance logs help identify out-of-state mattresses entering Oregon for disposal, which are not program mattresses. It excludes units that are dropped off at SWFs or other site types that accept small commercial loads.
- **Consumer drop-off:** This includes units that Oregon residents drop off directly at recyclers.

Nonprofits

MRC contracts with nonprofit organizations to serve as permanent collection sites to either provide more access within a county or if a solid waste facility has declined participation.

Depending on the site, residents and/or commercial entities may drop off units at these nonprofit sites at no cost. In 2025, 5 nonprofits accepted mattresses from the public through MRC's program.

Mattress Retailers

To increase mattress retailers' and residential access to the program, MRC contracts directly with some mattress retailers to serve as permanent collection sites. In 2025, MRC had 1 permanent collection site at a retailer. Both Oregon residents and commercial entities may drop off mattresses at this collection site.

Other

In order to establish convenience, the Plan allows MRC to contract with "other suitable sites for the collection of discarded mattresses." This allows us to create a solution when all other types of sites in the area are unavailable or decline to be part of the network. In 2025, MRC contracted with 1 local business to be a mattress collector.

Reuse Organizations

MRC seeks to contract with reuse organizations and furniture banks to operate permanent collection sites. Furniture banks are nonprofit organizations that collect gently used furniture and household goods and redistribute these items to individuals and families in need. In 2025, MRC partnered with one furniture bank to serve as a permanent collection site. The organization accepts mattresses dropped off in reusable condition. Those in good condition are reused by people in need. Mattresses deemed unsuitable for reuse are placed in MRC's container for transport to a mattress recycler for dismantling.

In 2026, MRC will continue to engage furniture banks and reuse organizations across Oregon to expand the network of permanent collection sites and support collection events.

Mattress Collection Events

MRC hosts mattress collection events in areas that may benefit from enhanced residential access. MRC partners with local government, waste services providers, nonprofits, local businesses, community organizations, retailers, and other interested parties to hold collection events. When hosting events, MRC provides the necessary labor, transportation, recycling and publicity. In 2025, MRC hosted 54 collection events across the state.

MRC may partner with other collection programs to increase awareness and participation at these events. In 2025, MRC participated in 3 PaintCare collection events.

Retailer Take Back

Retailers commonly offer to remove a consumer's used mattress when delivering a new one, providing a convenient collection option. Retailers may then recycle the collected mattresses through the program at no cost. MRC covers all recycling costs

and, for retailers that qualify under CVP, the program also pays for transportation.

Commercial Volume Program (CVP)

MRC provides no-cost transportation and recycling of discarded mattresses from retailers, lodging establishments, educational institutions, healthcare facilities and military bases if they have at least 100 discarded units to be picked up at a single site. MRC provides transportation in three ways:

- **Permanent On-Site Trailers:** If a business generates at least 100 mattresses per month at a particular location, MRC provides a permanent on-site trailer. This arrangement works well when a retail chain uses a central distribution center to deliver mattresses purchased at its multiple retail storefronts and then consolidates the discarded mattresses returned by its delivery teams to the distribution center. In this manner, MRC can provide efficient collection service for all of a retailer's storefronts within its local distribution network. In 2025, the number of on-site trailers at retail locations was 13.
- **Temporary CVP Site (Live Loads):** For businesses that generate at least 100 units at a time at a particular location, but not monthly, MRC does not provide a permanent on-site trailer. Instead, MRC dispatches a truck and trailer to the collector when requested and the units are loaded into the trailer while the driver waits. This is referred to as a "live load" pickup. In 2025, MRC handled 6 live load pickups for 6 CVP entities.
- **Consolidation Locations:** To provide no-cost drop-off for smaller retailers and businesses, MRC offers trailers where these entities can consolidate the mattresses that they collect. In 2025, MRC had 2 strategic commercial consolidation locations.

Small Volume Commercial Loads

To provide no-cost drop-off for commercial sources generating smaller volumes (that is, fewer than 100 units at a time), MRC encourages our permanent collection sites to accept small commercial loads. Small commercial loads are delivered by junk haulers, small businesses and third-party premium service curbside collectors. Small commercial sources may also drop off units for no-cost directly at a mattress recycler.

Collection Site Mattress Management

MRC compensates permanent collection sites for all program mattresses dropped off by individuals, businesses (including mattress retailers) or other entities for which the site has not collected a fee and that the site loads in a collection container.

MRC negotiates agreements to provide compensation that covers the reasonable actual costs of collecting and managing units at the collection sites. The amount of compensation varies from site to site since it is based on variable factors, including the hourly wage rates for general labor handling mattresses, forklift operators, and type of forklift. After conducting extensive time studies at various collection locations in other program states, MRC learned that it should take no longer than 3 minutes per unit to load a mattress onto a trailer. The compensation MRC pays also includes an

embedded allowance for mattress disposal costs incurred when collection sites receive non-recyclable units. If a site believes they are receiving an excessive number of non-recyclable units from the public, they may provide documentation to support additional compensation.

When adding new collection sites, MRC provides on-site training and the Oregon Collection Site Requirements to educate site staff regarding proper handling, efficient stacking techniques and best practices to increase the recyclability of mattresses received. MRC's Oregon Collection Site Requirements are available on our website and are included in all collection site and event contracts.

The Oregon Collection Site Requirements define program products and non-program products that are ineligible for recycling. Program mattresses are any mattress or foundation that is discarded in Oregon, provided they were not transported from outside Oregon for purposes of disposal. The requirements also describe non-recyclable mattresses (e.g., those that are insect-infested, excessively soiled, crushed, etc.) and how to identify bedbug-infested units.

To further assist collection sites in identifying and managing instances of bedbug contamination, MRC offers an online training video about bedbugs that collection site staff can access on demand.

The Resources Library also contains a series of videos MRC created prior to Oregon's launch that addresses broad topics that are of interest to all our state programs; efficient mattress stacking and loading, effective collection site operations, program and non-program products identification and collection event promotion. The series is available in English and Spanish. In 2026, MRC will create videos addressing the questions and comments we've received from Oregon sites and events regarding their interpretation of the Collection Site Requirements, or what our staff has commonly discussed or addressed at site visits.

To support onboarding and operations, MRC visits new and existing collection sites at least every other year and as needed. In 2025, MRC staff conducted routine site visits and provided supplemental training and resources. During these visits, staff answered questions, confirmed compliance with program requirements and environmentally sound management practices, reviewed mattress stacking and loading techniques to improve efficiency, offered recommendations to maintain mattress quality, and provided support with signage and invoicing.

In 2025, MRC offered site improvement funding to eligible, no-cost permanent collection sites. These funds can be used to purchase equipment and make infrastructure improvements that will increase the number of mattresses diverted from landfills, improve the recyclability of discarded units, improve worker safety, reduce mattress handling time and fire risk, and lower transportation costs by increasing the number of units shipped per container. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to, weather coverings, cement pads, fencing and mobile loading ramps. Beginning in March 2025, these sites were eligible for up to \$15,000 per site per year. Funding recipients must agree to serve as an MRC-contracted public drop-off site for at least one year following the distribution of funds for the project.

In 2025, MRC awarded 3 projects totaling \$31,670, which are expected to add an additional 17,000 units annually. The projects included structural improvements to mattress collection areas to increase the recyclability of units, as well as new equipment to enable safer, more efficient loading.

Mattress Transportation

For each MRC permanent collection site in Oregon, MRC provides storage containers that are appropriate for the size and location of each facility. MRC uses 53-, 48- and 28-foot trailers, as well as sea containers and roll-off bins for sites with limited space or other logistical constraints. The 53-foot trailer is preferred because it can hold the most mattress units, resulting in a lower per-unit transport cost. All container types are covered to reduce water contamination, which increases the potential for reuse or recycling of collected units.

MRC also provides no-cost transportation of discarded mattresses from retailers, lodging establishments, educational institutions, healthcare facilities and military bases if they have at least 100 discarded units available for pickup at a single location.

To provide statewide coverage, MRC contracts with mattress recyclers, third-party logistics companies and independent transporters. MRC provides monthly updates to DEQ on the contract status with transporters. In 2025, MRC contracted with the following transporters listed in Table 3.

Oregon collection sites, transporters and recyclers each use MyMRC, an electronic logistics and reporting platform, to request and manage pickups (accepting, rejecting, or diverting) and make docking appointments with recyclers. All users can provide feedback and access real-time data and reporting. MRC is also available to assist with any issues that may arise regarding transportation and logistics.

Collection sites use MyMRC to request or cancel pickups from an MRC-contracted transporter. For sites located in urban areas, MRC transporters have 48 hours to swap a trailer after receiving a request, and up to five days for sites in rural areas. Mattresses are bulky and light cargo, and as a result, efficient transportation helps control costs. MRC assigns mattress loads to individual recyclers to achieve efficiency throughout the collection network.

Recycler Procedures

In 2025, MRC contracted with the following recyclers to dismantle and recycle units collected by the program:

After program mattresses arrive at a recycling facility, the recycler unloads the container, and the total count of mattresses and foundations is documented. Recyclers dismantle mattresses by separating and evaluating components for reuse, recycling or landfill. The top outer layer, typically called the quilt panel or ticking, is removed first. This exposes comfort foam and spring layers. While the dismantling process varies by recycler and mattress type, most use a combination of manual and mechanical methods. Recycling foundations are dismantled in a similar manner and typically consist of three

main components: an outer ticking fabric, structural steel, and a wood frame. The ticking is typically landfilled and the steel is separated from the wood frame using a shearing machine.

The most common commodities recovered at a facility are steel, foam, quilt panels and wood. Recyclable materials are sorted and prepared for end markets, which may require them to be compressed into bales or shredded. The Program Disposition section explains what happens to each material after it is consolidated by recyclers.

It is uncommon for units heavily contaminated with bedbugs or putrescible solid waste to arrive at recycling facilities. In the rare instances they do, they are separated to minimize facility contamination and worker exposure. The recycler may choose to recover the steel, which is the most valuable component, or send the unit to a landfill.

Materials Management

MRC and its recyclers implement the program consistently with Oregon's solid waste management hierarchy: source reduction, reuse (including renovation), recycling, composting, energy recovery, and disposal. The following describes activities MRC undertakes that are consistent with each waste management tier in the hierarchy. Associated data is provided in the [Disposition Data](#) section.

Source Reduction

Mattresses are long-term durable goods that consumers use over a multi-year period. MRC's source reduction efforts focus on reducing the environmental footprint of the mattress manufacturing process, encouraging the mattress supply chain to consider end-of-life design issues when designing new products and encouraging consumers to maintain their mattresses properly to extend their useful life. In addition, MRC has formed workgroups that facilitate information sharing across the mattress industry value chain, including mattress manufacturers, component suppliers and recyclers, to improve the recyclability of mattress materials. In 2025, MRC continued to build consumer awareness of mattress care best practices with a rotating series of monthly social media posts, participation in ISPA's Sustainability Conference and workgroups to engage the supply chain in challenges faced by the program

Reuse (including Renovation)

Reuse follows source reduction in Oregon's waste management hierarchy. Mattresses in reasonably good condition have a positive residual value and are commonly resold on social marketplaces or reused when given to friends or family. Old mattresses are also resold in used furniture stores, given away by donation centers and furniture banks. Used mattress retailers and mattress renovators were active in Oregon before MRC launched the program and remain active today.

MRC Recyclers: Reuse and Renovation

As discussed in the [Recycler Procedures](#) section, some recyclers sell or donate whole mattresses and component materials to reuse or renovators. In 2025, one recycler sold 823 of the units it received through its network of thrift stores.

Reuse Organizations as MRC Permanent Collection Sites

MRC lists Oregon-based reuse organizations that contract to serve as permanent collection sites on its Bye Bye Mattress recycling locator. In 2025, one mattress reuse organization served as a permanent collection site for residential drop-offs. The organization is recognized by the community for its efforts to redistribute usable furniture and mattresses to people in need. MRC transports unusable units collected at reuse organizations to recyclers for dismantling. In 2025, the reuse organization donated 1,258 used mattresses. MRC also reached out to other reuse organizations in the state to discuss the program and how to become a permanent collection site. MRC will continue efforts to identify reuse organizations that could serve as drop-off points.

Reuse and Program Development

MRC considers the views of reuse organizations and other interested stakeholders when setting program policies. For example, MRC has offered to work with a reuse organization to divert good-quality units from local mattress collection events back into the community. MRC also facilitated an introduction between the reuse organization and the nearest mattress recycler to support the recovery of reusable mattresses from the facility. Although the organization has not yet attended an event or received mattresses from the recycler, MRC will continue to notify it of opportunities to collect reusable mattresses.

Recycling

Recycling is the third priority in Oregon's waste management hierarchy. The program is designed to increase both the number of discarded mattresses diverted from Oregon's landfills and the recycling of post-consumer mattress materials.

To achieve this result, MRC is building a robust, diverse and geographically accessible mattress collection network that is continually improving. Among other things, MRC provides enclosed containers to protect discarded mattresses from weather damage during storage and transport and funds site improvements to increase the quantity and quality of collected mattresses. Once a recycler receives a discarded mattress, it dismantles the unit and separates its components for sale or use in secondary markets. Materials for which no market exists or that cannot be recycled (because they are contaminated or mixed with other materials) are usually landfilled.

MRC uses the following strategies to promote mattress recycling:

1. **SWF Compensation:** The program compensates for participating in solid waste facilities and other collection locations at negotiated rates for handling mattresses that they accept free of charge from consumers and businesses. Additionally, MRC provides no-cost storage, transport and recycling of these units. This reduces the quantity of discarded mattresses that these facilities would otherwise landfill.

2. **No-Cost Retailer Recycling:** Retailers can recycle mattresses they pick up through retailer take-back at no cost through MRC's program. Retailers generating more than 100 discarded units may request no-cost pick-up through MRC's Commercial Volume Program. Additionally, many public collection locations in MRC's network also accept discarded units from retailers. Discarded mattresses that retailers provide for recycling reduce the number they send to landfills.
3. **No-Cost Business Recycling (Commercial Entities):** Business or large-volume mattress consumers (such as hotels, dormitories, nursing homes, etc.) generating discarded mattresses may provide these units to an MRC-contracted recycling facility at no cost. Businesses generating more than 100 discarded units may request no-cost pick-up through MRC's Commercial Volume Program. Additionally, many public collection locations in MRC's network also accept discarded units from businesses.
4. **Mattress Retailers (Retailer Take-Back):** Mattress retailers commonly offer consumers the option to have a used mattress picked up for recovery at no cost when they deliver a new mattress. This is an important way for Oregon consumers to access the MRC program in a convenient manner. Since the program encourages retailers to make discarded mattresses they collect available for recycling through the program free of charge, this provision diverts additional quantities of discarded units.
5. **No-Cost Consumer Drop Offs at SWFs:** Oregon residents may drop off mattresses at participating solid waste facilities and other public drop-off sites throughout Oregon at no-cost.
6. **MRC Recyclers' Target:** MRC's recyclers are responsible for dismantling discarded mattresses and foundations, selling or otherwise identifying a new use for reclaimed materials in secondary markets, and disposing of the waste or otherwise unrecyclable material. Recyclers are financially incentivized to reuse or recycle as much of a mattress as possible because it keeps the revenue it earns from the sale of those materials as opposed to incurring costs when sending materials to landfill. To further incentivize the amount of mattress materials recycled through the program, MRC's recyclers are expected to recycle 70% by weight of the units they process. The [Disposition Data](#) section contains more detail.
7. **Prevent Bedbug and Other Contamination:** A mattress may not be recyclable if it is wet, heavily soiled or contaminated by bedbugs. Although contamination affects relatively few units, MRC educates recyclers and collection sites on how to prevent and properly manage bedbug and other contamination and thereby increase the amount of mattress materials that can be recycled annually.
8. **Mattress Collection Facility Improvement Funding:** To increase the number of mattresses diverted from the waste stream, improve the recyclability of discarded units, improve worker safety and decrease transportation costs and fuel consumption by increasing the number of units shipped per container, MRC funds improvements to mattress collection sites. Beginning in 2025, public collection sites in Oregon are eligible for up to \$15,000 per site. Award recipients must agree to serve as permanent collection sites for at least one year following completion of the project. The [Collection Site Mattress Management](#) section contains more detail.

Composting

Composting is a form of recycling and falls at the same level in the waste management hierarchy. In 2025, recyclers did not send any post-consumer mattress materials to a compost facility. While foundation wood is compostable, it must be shredded to a small particle size to increase surface area and ensure it degrades at the same rate as other organic matter. The energy requirements, abundance of scrap lumber and lack of composting infrastructure in the state make composting foundation wood impractical for MRC's recyclers.

Energy Recovery

Biomass Fuel

Oregon's solid waste management hierarchy considers biomass fuel to be recycling and is preferred over the transformation of solid waste through waste-to-energy facilities or landfill. In 2025, recyclers sent 872,733 pounds of wood to biomass fuel because it was more financially attractive than mulch markets with strict metal-contamination requirements.

Transformation (WTE)

In 2025, recyclers did not send any post-consumer mattress material to WTE facilities.

Disposal

Under their contracts with MRC, recyclers are expected to recycle 70% by weight of the units they process, although that may not always be feasible. Recyclers dispose of non-recyclable materials and residue in landfills. This material may include mattress materials that are:

- Severely damaged or twisted
- Wet, frozen or heavily soiled
- Infested with bedbugs, other living organisms or other biological contaminants that render the unit either unsafe to process or make its constituent materials unmarketable
- Have no financially viable market

Recyclers do not track landfill disposal data by material type, making it impossible for MRC to provide data regarding the exact quantity of specific materials that they landfilled in 2025. However, given that recyclers landfilled material, MRC assumes that they landfilled at least some quantity of every mattress material type (e.g., steel, foam, fiber and wood). In 2025, MRC performed another waste characterization study of the residual material generated by California mattress recyclers to quantify what mattress components are landfilled and why. The September 2025 report found the top three most prevalent waste categories as a percentage of total waste were polyurethane foam (19.5%), shoddy felt pad (15.6%) and mixed non-woven fibers (14.7%). This study updates a 2020 report, which was posted in 2021. Recyclers are disposing of these materials primarily because of a lack of end markets, contamination, or manufacturing methods that impair recycling. MRC Oregon recyclers landfilled 1,890,419 pounds of material in 2025.

Research

MRC conducted research in 2025 to improve mattress collection, dismantling, and recycling operations, while advancing source reduction, with funding by its California program. These efforts benefit all MRC state programs and focus on improving operational efficiency, expanding end markets and strengthening industry collaboration to advance circularity.

Our priority is developing higher-value, scalable end markets for recovered mattress materials, especially polyurethane foam, which remains one of the largest residual waste streams. Key 2025 projects included:

- **Foam Powder Technology (RoCo):** MRC supported development of a non-cryogenic grinding process to convert post-consumer flexible polyurethane foam into engineered powders with tunable surface properties. These powders demonstrated potential as additives or fillers in cement, rigid foam, coatings, adhesives, and engineered plastics. Testing showed benefits such as reduced material density, modified thermal properties, and sound absorption performance. Ongoing work is focused on scaling production and evaluating reincorporation into new flexible foams to improve circularity.
- **Footwear Applications:** Research at George Mason University demonstrated that mechanically recycled mattress foam can be successfully incorporated into footwear components. Up to 50% recycled content was achieved in midsole materials while maintaining key performance attributes such as cushioning, durability, and energy absorption. Recycled-content composites were also validated for outsole applications, confirming comparable traction and abrasion resistance to conventional materials. These results expand viable markets for foam beyond traditional downcycled uses.
- **Vitrimer and Advanced Recycling Research:** A new collaborative research project with BASF, a global chemical company, and Northwestern University is exploring chemical pathways to reprocess thermoset polyurethane foam using vitrimer chemistry. This work aims to enable foam-to-foam recycling and production of new polyurethane products, representing a potential pathway toward true material circularity.
- **Construction and Building Materials:** Building on prior feasibility work, MRC is supporting development of cementitious composites incorporating modified foam and textile materials. These materials demonstrate enhanced acoustic and structural properties and are being evaluated for architectural applications such as acoustic panels and sound barriers.
- **Waste Characterization Findings:** A 2025 study confirmed that polyurethane foam was the largest component of residual waste (19.5%), reinforcing the importance of continued investment in foam market development and recovery technologies. The findings are published in the [Research section of our website](#).

Collectively, these projects reflect a strategic approach: near-term expansion of mechanical recycling markets alongside longer-term investment in advanced recycling technologies.

Bridging Innovation to Commercial Scale

MRC is addressing barriers to commercialization by focusing on pilot-scale development, industry partnerships, and co-investment strategies to advance innovations from laboratory validation to market adoption. In 2025, progress was made in scaling vitrimer technologies, while additional opportunities in composites and building materials are advancing through the research pipeline.

Industry Workgroups - Engagement in Circularity

MRC plays a leading role in convening stakeholders and advancing industry-wide collaboration on circular economy initiatives. In 2025, MRC expanded its technical workgroup model to include dedicated groups on polyurethane foam and textiles. These groups bring together stakeholders across the value chain to:

- Generate new research concepts
- Address disassembly and material separation challenges
- Support commercialization of recycled materials
- Improve product design for end-of-life recovery

MRC also continued to lead its Circular Design Workgroup, which focuses on design for disassembly, waste reduction, use of recycled materials, and lifecycle emissions reduction. This workgroup meets each fall during ISPA's Sustainability Conference.

Global Collaboration and Circularity

Through participation in international forums and the Global Recycling Summit, MRC collaborates with organizations across North America, Europe, and other regions to share best practices, align on research priorities, and support the development of global recycling infrastructure.

MRC's strategy emphasizes expanding markets for mechanically recycled materials (near-term, lower environmental impact), while also improving collection, transportation, and processing efficiency and supporting development of advanced recycling technologies (long-term circularity).

Globally, industry stakeholders are increasingly aligned around key priorities, including design for recyclability, increased recycled content, improved material identification, and coordinated investment in infrastructure.

MRC's 2025 research portfolio reflects a balanced strategy of improving current recycling operations while investing in transformative technologies and market development. Significant progress was made in expanding viable end markets for polyurethane foam, particularly in engineered materials, footwear, and construction applications. At the same time, MRC strengthened its leadership role in convening industry stakeholders to advance circularity through collaboration, innovation, and shared best practices.

These combined efforts position the program to improve material recovery, reduce landfill dependence, and support the long-term transition to a more circular mattress industry.

Coordination with Existing Infrastructure

Existing Recycling Programs, Including Nonprofit Mattress Recyclers

In April 2023, MRC requested proposals to provide transportation and recycling services at locations throughout the state. As part of this process, MRC promoted the solicitation by contacting all known mattress recyclers in Oregon and existing mattress recyclers in other states by publicizing it on MRC's website, social media channels and direct email. MRC also visited all active for-profit and nonprofit mattress recyclers in Oregon to assess their capabilities, interest in participating in the program and future plans. A total of 7 businesses submitted proposals (2 existing nonprofits and 5 for-profit recyclers)

After evaluating the proposals based on the price offered to provide the requested recycling services, recycling experience, location, quality of proposal and facility capabilities, MRC awarded contracts to 3 recyclers (including 1 for-profit and 2 nonprofits).

MRC's Coordination with Existing Mattress Collectors and Stakeholders to Further the Environmentally Sound Management of Mattresses

As MRC establishes and expands its collection and recycling network, it seeks to deliver services efficiently and minimize duplication of effort by applying the following principles:

- To bring large quantities of discarded units into the program efficiently, MRC recruits Oregon's existing solid waste collection infrastructure to become convenient, no-cost mattress collection sites.
- MRC strategically selects collectors and recyclers to build a network that provides Oregon residents and businesses with statewide access to recycling services and minimizes transportation costs.
- MRC consults with Oregon stakeholders to educate them about the law and program requirements to increase participation among eligible collectors and retailers in the state. MRC conducted outreach to county solid waste advisory committees, the Association of Oregon Recyclers, the Oregon Refuse and Recycling Association, and county commissioners.
- MRC recruits and contracts with reuse organizations to increase the number of units that are reused.
- MRC recruits tribal entities to join the program as collection sites to provide access to its members and surrounding communities.
- MRC leverages existing retailer take-back practices and provides no-cost transportation and recycling to eligible retailers and other large quantity generators of discarded mattresses.

Chapter 3: Program Objectives

ORS 459A.174(2)(k)

Environmentally Sound Management

MRC implements comprehensive environmentally sound management practices across program operations to ensure compliance with SB 1576 and program standards.

MRC maintains internal policies and procedures to comply with the law and the Plan, including a regular review of compliance to identify areas of weakness, non-compliance or improvement. To support the safe and compliant operation of the program, MRC maintains comprehensive commercial insurance in accordance with industry standards and regulatory requirements.

Compliance is achieved through clearly defined third-party contract requirements, ongoing oversight and verification, robust data tracking and reporting systems.

Contractor Compliance

MRC contracts with third parties to collect, transport, and recycle discarded units and requires them to follow environmentally sound management practices as defined in ORS 459A.153(4). Contractors must comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including environmental, workplace health and safety, and fair labor standards requirements. Contractors are also required to maintain appropriate liability insurance, follow recordkeeping procedures and document the final disposition of collected mattresses.

A variety of inspection and accounting procedures are used to verify that permanent collection sites, transporters and recyclers comply with their contractual obligations, including environmentally sound management practices. Contractor obligations vary based on the services they provide to the program. All contracts include dispute-resolution and termination clauses in the event a vendor fails to comply with its contractual obligations.

Oversight and Verification

MRC performs monthly desk audits to monitor the compliance of permanent collection sites, transporters and recyclers by tracking and documenting the fate of collected mattresses from collection to final disposition, reporting requirements, inventory verification, and recycling rates. Additionally, MRC conducts site inspections of permanent collection sites and recyclers to verify compliance with environmentally sound management practices.

Each year, MRC engages a third-party consultant to observe and document each recycler's compliance with environmentally sound management practices, including environmental health and safety, fire safety protocols, MRC's recycling standards, and contractual obligations.

Recyclers

Contracted recyclers must agree to operate in compliance with environmentally sound management practices and meet MRC's recycling standards, recordkeeping requirements and legal obligations. Recyclers must document the fate of discarded mattresses from receipt of mattresses through final disposition. Recyclers must also meet contractual performance metrics, including a recycling rate of 70% when market conditions allow. MRC's contract permits a lower rate if extenuating circumstances, such as floods, fires, or other unforeseen events, prevent optimum operations.

The recycling rate is calculated using data reported by mattress recyclers and is determined by dividing the weight of whole mattresses and materials that are renovated, reused, and recycled by the weight of whole mattresses and materials recycled, renovated, reused, and disposed. MRC conducts quarterly virtual or in-person site visits with each recycler to assess compliance with operational, environmental and contractual requirements. MRC worked with each recycler on improvements to data tracking and documentation, acceptance criteria and end-market development and verification. During the initial years of the program, MRC anticipates identifying areas for improvement and collaboration with recyclers to ensure they operate in an environmentally sound manner.

Annual Recycler Compliance Assessment

MRC contracted with PAK Global Environmental Consulting, LLC, an environmental consulting firm, to perform environmentally sound management assessments of three contracted mattress recyclers during the fourth quarter of 2025. Each recycler was evaluated for compliance with local, state, and federal rules and regulations; contractual requirements; and environmentally sound management practices as defined in ORS 459A.153(4), as well as downstream vendor due diligence through document reviews, regulatory analysis, compilation and completion of conformance checklists, facility walkthroughs with interviews, and photographic documentation. The consultant shared the findings with each recycler.

These assessments identified common strengths and best practices, including knowledgeable management teams, excellent mattress and separated materials tracking, and good housekeeping. They also identified common findings and compliance improvement opportunities related to maintaining written procedures and plans for specific facility operations, formalizing training programs and protocols and maintaining training records. The findings also showed that recyclers lacked formal systems for downstream vendor due diligence, as required annually under MRC's contract; however, they were still within the allowable annual compliance period at the time of the assessment. Because end markets for deconstructed mattress materials are limited by the nature of the product and are primarily domestic, MRC supplements this requirement by reviewing recycler outbound material records and vendors' monthly reports as reported in its electronic logistics and reporting platform, MyMRC.

While the audit identified areas for improvement, recyclers can effectively address these findings by improving documentation, implementing written procedures and plans, and training employees. These assessments will be conducted annually to ensure compliance with recycling regulations and support continuous improvement.

Transporters

MRC contracts with transporters that deliver mattresses from permanent collection sites and events to designated recyclers. All transporters are contractually obligated to meet environmentally sound management requirements as required in ORS 459A.153(4).

Transporters document each mattress delivery to recyclers using bills of lading (electronic or paper) that identify the source, estimated quantity and destination. These bills of lading validate monthly transportation invoices and reconcile volumes reported by collection sites and recyclers.

MRC staff regularly communicate with contracted transporters and track performance in MyMRC, an electronic logistics and reporting platform, to assess compliance with operational, environmental and contractual requirements. MRC works closely with each transporter to improve data tracking and documentation, ensure timely pickup of requested hauls, and provide adequate containers and trained labor for collection events. MyMRC provides nearly real-time data, so MRC staff can identify and react promptly to address issues with performance, contractual obligations and customer service. It's a powerful tool that helps MRC hold its contractors accountable to operate in an environmentally sound manner.

Permanent Collection Sites and Collection Events

Permanent collection site and collection event contracts require compliance with environmentally sound management standards as defined in SB 1576 and with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations. All permanent collection sites and collection event hosts agree to follow the Oregon Collection Site Requirements, which are included in their contracts. The requirements state that the collector must accept all program mattresses at no cost, regardless of condition. The requirements also define which program mattresses are eligible for recycling and which are not, and explain how the collector can efficiently receive, separate and manage recyclable and non-recyclable program mattresses.

MRC communicates regularly with permanent collection sites and, at a minimum, conducts site visits every two years or as needed. During these site visits, MRC answers questions, provides supplemental training and resources, and confirms whether the site follows environmentally sound management practices and program requirements. These site visits and the real-time data from MyMRC are used to continually identify areas for improvement and opportunities to collaborate with collection sites to ensure they meet program requirements and operate in an environmentally sound manner.

We anticipate that the vast majority, if not all, of the contractual compliance issues that MRC and its contractors will encounter under the program can and will be resolved

through the contractual process. In the event, however, that a material violation of the contract cannot be cured and contract termination becomes necessary, MRC will notify DEQ as part of its monthly reports identifying collection sites, transporters and recyclers that are participating in the program. In 2025, MRC contractors had no material contract violations.

Documentation and Data Tracking

MRC uses MyMRC to track mattresses from collection through final disposition. The reporting system aggregates data from the collection network, transporters, and recyclers and uses bills of lading to document shipments.

Upon receipt at a recycling facility, recyclers enter each bill of lading data into MyMRC. This information calculates program metrics, including the number and weight of units received, the source of those units, and material recovery by commodity type. Recyclers are also contractually bound to comply with MRC's Recycling Standards, which establish requirements for material receipt, processing, tracking, and downstream vendor due diligence for materials used in recycling, reuse, or renovation.

MyMRC generates data and reports that support annual reporting and internal performance monitoring, including units collected, transportation activity, recycler throughput, material sold to the scrap markets, and recycling rates.

Summary

MRC and its contracted service providers use environmentally sound management practices at every step in the mattress collection, transport and recycling process. The purpose of these provisions is to promote consistent and constructive communication between the contracting parties regarding the fulfillment of their legal obligations. They are designed to ensure that potential compliance issues are identified early and addressed through a structured, progressive dialogue. This approach facilitates cooperative problem resolution, with the goal of preserving the contractual relationship and avoiding escalation to termination.

Convenience Data

In accordance with the law and Plan, MRC implemented alternative convenience standards in 2025 to provide statewide access to mattress collection services in Oregon.

MRC met the alternative convenience requirements through a combination of permanent collection sites and collection events. Per the Plan, we used Portland State University's Certified Population Estimates to determine a county's population. Of Oregon's 36 counties, 29 had a population greater than 10,000 and 7 had a population less than 10,000.

- **Counties with Populations Greater Than 10,000:** Where a permanent collection site was not established, MRC held at least 1 collection event within the program year.

- **Counties with Populations Less Than 10,000:** In counties without a permanent collection site, MRC held at least 1 collection event during the program year.
- **Additional 25 Collection Sites:** MRC established permanent collection sites or supplemented them with collection events throughout Oregon to ensure that the combined total of permanent collection sites and events equaled or exceeded 25 during the program year.

Prior to launching the program in 2025, MRC contacted all known Oregon solid waste facilities (SWFs) and other potential collectors to assess their interest in becoming permanent collection sites. Upon Plan approval, MRC promptly provided program details and expedited the contracting process. These good-faith efforts supported the continued build-out of the statewide collection network. A summary of the convenience standards and program performance is provided in Table 5. Refer to [Appendix B](#) for a summary of the number of permanent collection sites and events by county.

Collection Site Development

MRC worked with local SWFs, mattress retailers, solid waste officials, local community organizations and businesses to establish permanent collection sites. Where permanent sites were not feasible, MRC hosted collection events. Although many factors outside MRC's control influence when entities choose to voluntarily participate and host events, MRC prefers locations that are willing and available on a weekend day in a recognizable area of the community with adequate space for safe traffic flow. We also seek to partner with other recycling programs to increase event participation and benefit from cross-marketing.

ORS 459A.162(1)(b) allows MRC to provide information that the alternative methods resulted in providing service to residents throughout the state at an equivalent level of convenient service. In implementing the program, we've found that there are places in the state where the existing solid waste infrastructure isn't operating enough days per week to allow MRC the opportunity to meet the preferred definition of convenient service (ORS 459A.162(1)(a)(C) requires a collection site in a county with a population of 10,000 or more to be staffed and operated at least six days a week).

Based on resident experience, disposing of a mattress, which is a durable good that is typically discarded about every 14 years, usually requires advance planning due to its size and handling, and fewer than six days of weekly access can still meet community needs. MRC contracts with 24 existing solid waste facilities and businesses that voluntarily participate in the program. Of these, 10 are located in a county with a population greater than 10,000 and would therefore be required to be open at least six days per week. Five of the 10 collection sites are located in counties that have multiple permanent collection sites, and one of these other sites is already meeting the six days per week requirement. MRC surveyed the remaining 5 because the site is the only permanent collection site available in the county and we wanted to confirm whether this level of service (operating less than six days per week) is adequate for their communities. Table 6 summarizes these responses.

The alternative convenience definition also requires MRC to establish 25 additional permanent collection sites statewide to extend convenient service to residents or continue holding collection events until all 25 sites are in place. In 2025, MRC met this requirement by establishing 11 permanent collection sites and holding 14 collection events across the state. MRC also held 17 additional events to further expand convenient access for Oregon residents. All collection sites and events were open to county residents, except for three events. Two events in Marion County and one event in Yamhill County were open to local residents only; however, these events still supported convenience because other permanent collection sites or collection events in those counties remained open to all county residents. These three events also expanded access for rural and semi-rural communities. In 2026, MRC will prioritize establishing permanent collection sites or holding events in counties with the highest population density to maximize mattress diversion from landfills in an environmentally responsible manner.

Public Access and Outreach Support

MRC maintains a publicly accessible and regularly updated list of all permanent collection sites and collection events on [ByeByeMattress.com](https://www.byebyemattress.com), enabling residents to easily identify available collection opportunities. MRC also provides outreach assistance to collection site operators and event hosts to increase awareness and participation within the collector's community. Additional details are provided in the [Education and Outreach](#) section.

Collection Network Convenience Analysis

MRC will perform a statewide GIS analysis of the permanent collection site and collection event network in 2026 to determine if any service gaps exist in this alternative convenience approach. That analysis will determine the percentage of the population within 15 miles of MRC's collection network. MRC will summarize the analysis and include it in the 2026 Annual Report.

Collection Data

Program Collection

The program's success hinges largely on working with the existing statewide infrastructure of facilities that receive or handle discarded mattresses as part of their ongoing operations.

In 2025, recyclers and permanent collection sites reported collecting a total of 134,121 program units from the sources shown in Table 7.

Collection occurred through multiple channels, with the largest volumes received from permanent collection sites, retailers and direct drop off at recyclers. Smaller volumes were collected through institutional sources and collection events. MRC anticipates that as more institutional entities perform periodic change-outs and become aware of the program, units from this collection source will increase.

Recyclers report to MRC the number of program and non-program units they receive and process. Non-program units include those obtained from franchise haulers and SWFs that do not participate in the program, as well as units not collected from Oregon sources. MRC compensates its recyclers only for processing program units. In 2025, recyclers accepted a total of 11,628 non-program units for recycling.

Solid Waste Facility Survey

To understand mattress collection and management, MRC surveyed 139 SWFs to determine the number, or weight, of program and non-program mattresses collected and sent to reuse, recycling or disposal in 2025.

MRC distributed the survey to 139 facilities, receiving 17 responses:

- 4 facilities reported that they do not collect mattresses at their facility.
- 6 facilities reported collecting mattresses, but do not participate in the program.
 - Of these, 4 provided disposal data and 2 did not complete the survey.
- 7 facilities reported collecting mattresses and participating in the program.
 - 3 are permanent collection sites, of which 1 provided disposal data.
 - 4 were event hosts, of which 1 provided disposal data.

Below is a summary of MRC's efforts to ensure accurate and complete 2025 SWF survey data:

- Issued advance notice of the survey in 2 of its 2025 newsletters and distributed a third reminder notice in 2026.
- Distributed initial survey request and 6 follow-up reminders to facilities that did not respond.
- Analyzed all submitted data for completeness and reasonableness and

conducted follow-up outreach by phone and email to resolve data gaps and inconsistencies.

Collection by Regions

Program Mattresses

To show how the program is performing across different regions of the state, MRC disaggregated program mattress collection data by number and weight of program units directed to mattress management pathways. Differences between initial collection pathways and final dispositions may occur. For example, a recycler may determine whether a unit directed to them for recycling can be reused or should be disposed. Refer to the [Disposition Data](#) section for more details.

Table 8 provides a regional breakdown of program mattresses. The regions correspond to DEQ's solid waste permit regions.

- **Eastern region:** Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla (including Milton-Freewater), Union, Wallowa, Wasco, and Wheeler counties.
- **Northwest region:** Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Multnomah, Tillamook, and Washington counties.
- **Western region:** Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties.

In 2025, 2 program participants (1 permanent collection site and 1 collection event) disposed of a total of 259 units. The participants disposed of the units because they were either deemed non-recyclable or collected outside the event's collection period. Units are considered non-recyclable if they are heavily soiled, crushed, or contaminated with bed bugs.

MRC provided targeted training to the permanent collection site on proper screening procedures for non-recyclable units and determined that the site applied overly conservative criteria. MRC will continue to monitor performance and provide technical assistance to improve screening practices and minimize the number of units disposed.

MRC also recruited the collection event host to become a permanent site in 2026. This ensures that the units collected at the location are managed through the program and directed to recycling or reuse.

Also in 2025, 1 mattress reuse organization served as a permanent collection site for residential drop-offs. The organization redistributes usable furniture and mattresses to people in need. In 2025, the reuse organization donated 1,258 used mattresses and sent 2,062 mattresses to an MRC recycler (those units are included in the “Number of Units Delivered to Recyclers” in Table 8).

Non-program Mattresses

Through its SWF survey, MRC collected data on non-program mattresses managed outside the program. Table 9 provides a regional breakdown of the non-program mattresses directed to disposal in 2025.

- 10 SWFs that did not participate in the program provided collection and final disposition data.
- 4 SWFs reported that they do not collect mattresses.
- 4 reported that they directed 5,335 units to disposal, and 2 provided incomplete data.

In 2026, MRC will continue to recruit locations that dispose of mattresses to increase program participation and diversion.

Illegally Dumped Mattresses

In accordance with the Plan, MRC employs a three-phase approach to managing illegally dumped mattresses, which includes gathering data on the number of units discarded. Refer to the [Mitigation of Illegal Mattress Dumping](#) chapter for additional details.

Challenges to Expanding the Collection Network

MRC prioritizes increasing the number of collection opportunities to divert mattresses from landfills and provide convenient access to mattress recycling for Oregon residents and businesses.

Before the program launch and throughout 2025, MRC actively recruited entities that collect discarded mattresses to participate. Specifically, MRC contacted:

- All Oregon landfills and permitted SWFs to promote the program and encourage their participation.
- Organizations capable of accepting mattresses, including retailers, thrift stores, nonprofit organizations, furniture banks, tribal governments and local businesses.

MRC's Oregon Program Coordinator led these efforts through phone calls, emails, newsletters, presentations, and in-person site visits.

Despite these efforts, MRC continues to face challenges in recruiting certain solid waste facilities. Some SWFs decline to serve as permanent collection sites because they charge residents a fee for mattress disposal. While MRC offers compensation to cover reasonable, actual costs of collecting and managing mattresses, it does not pay the same amount as the fees charged to consumers. For this reason, some SWFs choose not to participate in the program. Additional barriers to participation include:

- Limited internal resources to complete the contracting process.
- Operational constraints (e.g., lack of space for a 53-foot trailer, limited labor, or inadequate loading equipment).
- Low volumes of discarded units.
- Participation by SWFs is not mandatory per SB 1576.

In 2026, MRC will continue expanding its recruitment efforts through established program strategies. MRC will:

- Conduct targeted outreach to non-participating SWFs, reuse organizations, retailers, and other eligible entities, with an emphasis on underserved areas.
- Prioritize recruitment using program data and site location analysis.
- Leverage partnerships with state agencies, local governments and tribal governments to identify and recruit potential collection sites.
- Provide technical assistance and site improvement funding to prospective participants to overcome operational barriers.
- Conduct ongoing stakeholder engagement through presentations, communications and site visits.

Through these actions, MRC will increase the number of permanent collection sites, improve statewide access to no-cost mattress recycling and support continued diversion of mattresses from disposal.

Collection Targets and Goals

Per the Plan, MRC will propose program performance goals no later than two years after the program implementation date. We anticipate submitting these to DEQ in January 2027. Once established, MRC will report on the goals and the methods to achieve them in future annual reports.

Disposition Data

As discussed in the [Materials Management](#) section, recyclers are expected to reuse, recycle or send to biomass as much material as is economically practical and feasible. MRC tracks the disposition of mattresses and mattress materials collected and processed in Oregon to evaluate program performance and ensure compliance with reporting requirements.

Data Collection and Reporting

Recyclers

Each of the 3 recyclers processes discarded units from both program and non-program sources. However, they track and report recovered materials differently.

- Recycler A commingles materials recovered from program and non-program units generated in Oregon and reports these combined outbound materials.
- Recycler B maintains separate tracking for outbound materials derived from non-program units and does not report those non-program materials to MRC.
- Recycler C processes units from both Oregon and California. For this recycler, MRC estimates Oregon-specific outbound weights by applying the proportion of inbound and processed units attributable to Oregon.

Permanent Collection Sites and Solid Waste Facilities

MRC surveyed all known SWFs and permanent mattress collection sites in Oregon to determine the final disposition of program and non-program mattresses managed at their facilities. Two permanent collection sites reported that 259 units (14,245 pounds) were disposed and 4 non-program solid waste facilities reported the disposal of 5,335 units (293,425 pounds).

Reuse and Renovation

The mattresses received at one charitable furniture bank that is part of the collection network reused 1,258 mattresses (which equals 69,190 pounds) for their clients in need of home furnishings. Refer to the [Collection Data](#) section for more details. MRC recyclers directed 823 whole units (totaling 45,271 pounds) and an additional 101,530 pounds of other mattress materials (foam, steel and wood) to reuse and renovation.

Recyclers and permanent collection sites reported to MRC that they reused, recycled or sent to biomass 75.6% by weight of the units processed in 2025. Table 10 shows the 2025 disposition totals and percentages.

Mattress Materials Recovered and Diverted

Recyclers and permanent collection sites report to MRC the weights of recycled, reused, biomass, and residual materials generated, and the materials recovered from discarded program and non-program mattresses from Oregon sources in 2025. A summary of the data is provided in Table 11.

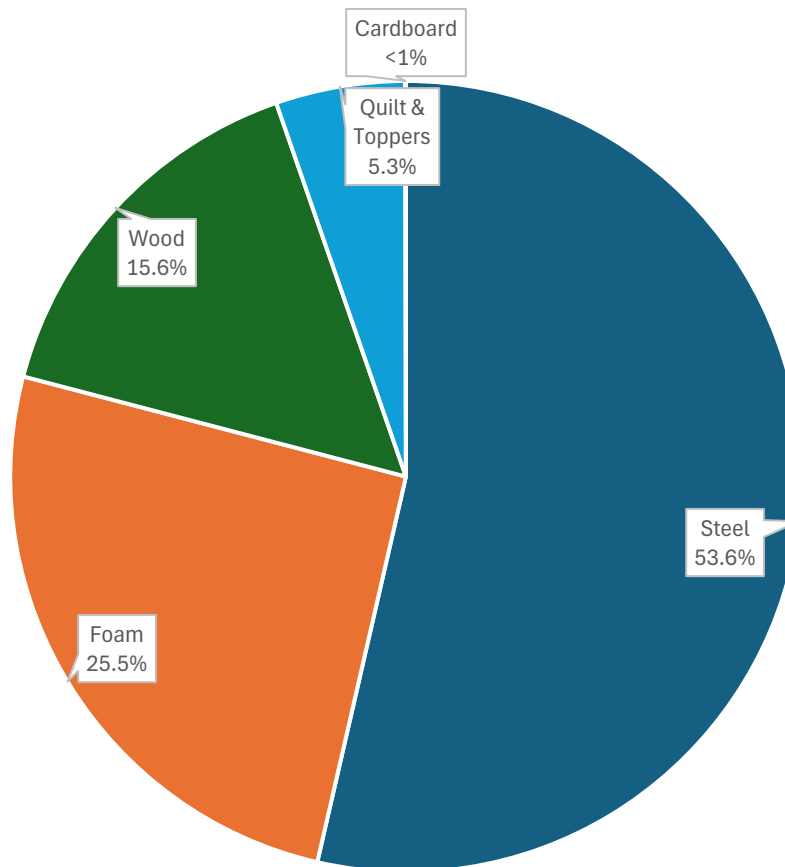

Uses for Recycled Materials

The disassembly process varies from one recycler to the next, but most use a combination of manual and mechanical processes. Recyclers sell or pay to have materials from discarded mattresses and foundations manufactured into new products or used for alternative purposes. MRC continues to research new end markets to increase the program's recycling rate, improve the financial sustainability of its recyclers and expand secondary markets for mattress components. The [Materials Management](#) section contains more detail on MRC's research.

Steel Wire: Most discarded mattresses contain steel springs, either in the form of open coil innersprings or as pocketed coils encased in polypropylene fabric, and most used foundations include a steel wire interior support structure. Recyclers separate the steel manually or mechanically from other mattress materials. The steel recovered from these products can be shredded or baled and sold into steel scrap markets, where mills remelt the material for use in new steel products such as appliances, automobiles, and building components.

Foam: The interiors of most mattresses contain one or more layers of polyurethane and/or latex foam. After removing the outer quilt panel, recyclers separate the inner foam layers for baling and sale to scrap purchasers. Nearly all post-consumer foam is sold to carpet underlayment manufacturers for use in

carpet padding. In this process, scrap foam is chopped into small pieces, mixed with rebonding adhesive and exposed to steam to cure the mixture. The result is a large rebond foam cylinder that is cut into thin sheets to make a carpet pad.

The feedstock for carpet padding is mostly post-industrial polyurethane foam but may also contain a small percentage of used carpet pad, post-consumer mattress foam and quilt panels. As consumer preferences continue to shift from carpet to hard surface flooring alternatives, the value and demand for post-consumer foam and quilt is expected to decline. See the [Materials Management](#) section for MRC's efforts to expand foam end markets.

Quilt Panel: The mattress sleep surface (that is, the top layer of a one-sided “no-flip” mattress and the top and bottom layers of a two-sided mattress) typically consists of a decorative outer fabric (ticking), one or more layers of fiber batting, non-woven fabric or foam (polyurethane and/or latex) and a thin backing (usually a non-woven fabric). Manufacturers stitch or “quilt” these layers together. After removing the quilt panel, recyclers bale it for sale separately from other recovered materials.

Demand for recycled quilt panels is limited for several reasons. First, quilt panels lack consistent construction and material composition. Second, quilt panels are more likely to become contaminated with dirt, water, bodily fluids or other environmental impurities because they are the outermost layer of a mattress. As a result, nearly all quilt panels are sold to carpet underlayment manufacturers, which chop the quilt into small pieces for use in carpet padding. In this application, the post-consumer quilt panel represents a small percentage of the finished carpet pad.

Foundation Wood: Most consumers use a foundation or box spring underneath their mattress. The foundation raises the mattress's sleep surface to a comfortable height and helps prolong its life by acting as a shock absorber. A typical foundation is composed of a wood frame assembled using nails or staples. A steel wire structure attached to the wood frame by staples or nails provides the spring support for the foundation. Some foundations use an all-wood interior structure rather than a steel wire structure. The sides of the foundation are typically covered with decorative ticking, while the top and bottom are typically covered with non-woven fabric. To dismantle a foundation, recyclers remove the ticking and non-woven fabric, then shear or shred the unit to separate the metal from the wood. Recyclers send wood to biomass facilities, where it is burned to generate energy. If the wood is free of significant metal or fabric contamination, it can be finely shredded for use as mulch or, in some limited cases, as compost. In 2025, recyclers sent wood to biomass facilities and reuse applications.

Cardboard: Mattress foundations may contain a layer of cardboard that separates the wood base structure from the bottom non-woven fabric. Recyclers bale this cardboard and sell it to manufacturers that produce chipboard for cereal boxes, corrugated cardboard and other packaging materials. Cardboard accounts for a very small share of the material that can be captured for recycling.

Market Challenges and Continuous Improvement

The program recycling rate is highly dependent on the availability and requirements of end-market buyers, who often have strict standards for material quality and volume. For example, many scrap metal recyclers may reject pocketed coils if they consider the polypropylene fiber encasing the coils to be an unacceptable contaminant. Material recovery rates depend on both the condition of collected units and the availability of markets for post-consumer mattress components. To improve the material quality and increase recovery rates, MRC:

- Provides covered containers and training to reduce contamination and maintain quality.
- Offers site improvement funding to collection sites.
- Supports research and market development to increase the quantity and diversity of end markets.
- Works with manufacturers and suppliers on product design and material circularity.

For materials that cannot be sold in scrap markets for use in making new products, MRC encourages its contracted recyclers to also explore alternative uses to minimize the amount sent to landfill. Refer to the [**Materials Management**](#) section for more details on these efforts.

Chapter 4: Mitigation of Illegal Mattress Dumping

ORS 459A.174(2)(h)

To mitigate the costs associated with illegally dumped mattresses found in any condition, collectors may discard these mattresses at no cost at collection events and permanent collection sites that participate in the program. Additionally, MRC's outreach efforts reinforce that mattresses in any condition are eligible for no-cost drop-off at participating locations. See [Education and Outreach](#) chapter for more information.

Based on data from other state programs and its own research, MRC expects to find that Oregon communities that lack access to solid waste disposal and mattress recycling will experience more illegal dumping. MRC will confirm this hypothesis using a combination of data collection through what is reported to DEQ, existing data collected by state agencies and data that will be collected by MRC. As MRC continues to build its no-cost collection network of permanent collection sites and events across the state, no cost recycling opportunities should address this problem.

MRC's first priority in Oregon is to understand the scope of this state's problem, where the illegal mattress dumping is occurring, tactics that Oregon communities have or are using to address the problem, the effectiveness of those tactics and where additional work is needed. MRC is using the following strategy to address illegal mattress dumping:

1. Engage Metro, the regional government agency in greater Portland, staff and select urban and rural communities to understand how and what illegal mattress dumping data is collected and analyzed, including limitations and resource gaps. This work will establish a baseline understanding of the issue across Portland and its applicability to other regions of Oregon. These discussions will also help identify approaches suitable for replication in other urban and rural communities and support the evaluation of future mitigation efforts.
2. MRC is required to report the number of discarded mattresses that were illegally dumped as reported to DEQ. At this time, Oregon DEQ does not collect mattress specific illegal dumping data; this information is not available. As an alternative to this requirement, MRC will survey additional communities to identify what illegal dumping data they currently collect and encourage jurisdictions that do not track this information to begin doing so. Using these surveys, MRC will compile available county and municipal data consistently and conduct an annual statewide census of illegal mattress dumping. MRC will submit the initial census to DEQ by December 2026.
3. Develop and publicize criteria for communities and other eligible entities to propose pilot projects aimed at reducing illegal mattress dumping and associated costs. In 2027, MRC will fund selected pilot projects and share results to support broader adoption of effective strategies for other communities considering similar efforts.

By following this multistep process, MRC can make fact-based decisions designed to

further the statutory objective of mitigating the fiscal, health and social costs of illegal dumping.

Stakeholder Engagement Findings

In 2025, MRC engaged Merina+Co, a Portland-based consulting firm, to better understand the scope of illegal mattress dumping in Oregon and to inform the design of a consistent statewide data-collection approach. As the first phase of this work, Merina conducted a targeted stakeholder engagement process focused on public sector entities with direct responsibility for waste management, nuisance abatement, or illegal dumping response.

Stakeholder Selection and Interview Process

Merina selected stakeholders to ensure representation across geographic regions and community types, including urban, suburban and rural areas. The selection also considered population size, governance structure (city, county, or regional authority), and known involvement in mitigating illegal dumping. This approach was intended to capture a wide range of operational perspectives, data practices, and challenges.

Merina contacted 9 organizations and 16 individual staff members. From these outreach efforts, Merina completed 5 interviews with representatives from:

- Metro Regional Government (Portland metropolitan area)
- City of Salem
- Deschutes County
- Malheur County
- Lane County

Four of the 9 organizations contacted did not respond or were unable to participate within the study timeframe.

Merina conducted virtual interviews with the representatives of the 5 responsive organizations to better understand how they identify, collect, and analyze data on illegal dumping. Interviewees included solid waste directors, environmental health leaders, franchise administrators, and nuisance abatement specialists. Merina, with input from MRC, developed standardized interview questions to guide interviews and ensure consistent, relevant discussions. The interviews gathered information on the scope of illegal dumping, data quality and limitations, existing prevention and response strategies, and gaps where additional resources or tactics may be needed.

Key Findings and Takeaways

Stakeholders consistently reported that instances of illegal dumping in general vary considerably across Oregon and that the causes and conditions differ by location.

Nature and Drivers of Illegal Dumping

Interviewees identified public lands, roadsides, and areas near encampments for unhoused people as common dumping locations, particularly in rural and remote areas. Convenience emerged as a major factor, including limited access to disposal

or recycling sites, transportation barriers, and the physical difficulty of moving mattresses. Some urban areas also reported “inadvertent” dumping, such as residents leaving mattresses and other durable goods in public spaces with the intent that others reuse them.

Data Limitations

Stakeholders reported limited and inconsistent data on illegal dumping, especially for mattresses. Only a few jurisdictions collect mattress specific data, and even robust systems rely on resident reports or internal coordination that may be incomplete. Multiple departments within a jurisdiction often respond to dumping incidents independently, further fragmenting available data and likely resulting in underreporting statewide.

Current Mitigation Approaches

Jurisdictions employ a mix of education, convenience based strategies, enforcement, and environmental interventions. Stakeholders expressed strong interest in renewed education efforts, particularly targeted outreach to multifamily housing and high turnover populations. Many also emphasized the importance of convenient and affordable disposal options, such as expanded recycling access or special collection events. Enforcement strategies and physical site controls (e.g., gates or increased monitoring) showed mixed effectiveness but remain part of local responses.

Next Steps and Planned Actions

The findings from this stakeholder engagement phase will directly inform the next stage of the project: development of a broader illegal dumping census and data collection effort. Based on the stakeholder feedback, MRC will:

1. Design a census to collect both baseline data and gather the level of awareness and understanding jurisdictions have about illegal dumping conditions, recognizing that comprehensive quantitative data may be limited.
2. Prioritize focused outreach to county governments, large urban areas and tribal lands to complete the survey.
3. Develop and publicize criteria for communities or private entities to request MRC funding for pilot projects that implement ideas that have the potential to mitigate illegal dumping and associated costs.
4. In addition to the census, MRC will launch an Illegally Dumped Mattress Collection Initiative (IDMCI) in 2026 to understand the extent of illegal mattress dumping by collecting community-specific data. MRC will use the data to track dumping activities and develop programmatic solutions and will report on the outcomes in the 2026 annual report. Participating entities must collect illegally dumped mattresses and box springs from the public right-of-way and report collection data monthly through MRC’s reporting software. Required data elements include the collection date, the zip code of origin, final disposition (recycled, landfill, etc.), and photographic documentation of each illegally dumped unit. MRC will compensate participants for participating.

These actions will support more consistent data collection, strengthen collaboration

among jurisdictions, and help MRC evaluate trends in illegal mattress dumping in the state and refine future education and mitigation strategies over time.

Chapter 5: Financing

ORS 459A.174(2)(a) and (i)

In 2025, MRC collected revenue on a grand total of 368,524 units sold to consumers by registered producers, renovators and retailers, which generated fee revenue of \$8,291,790. Including \$5,119 in late fee revenue, total revenue collected was \$8,296,909.

MRC incurred \$4,172,742 in expenses for the year. After factoring in a small net investment return of \$4,972, the program's net assets for 2025 were \$4,129,139.

Chapter 6: Education and Outreach

ORS 459A.174(2)(j)

MRC's education and outreach efforts target consumers, the mattress industry, the collection network, state regulators and other stakeholders. Separate industry- and consumer-facing brands are used to reach these audiences.

The primary brand, Mattress Recycling Council, is used to:

- Educate the mattress industry about program mechanics, Oregon's mattress recycling law and their legal obligations under that law.
- Inform regulators about the program's performance.
- Encourage mattress collectors and collection sites throughout Oregon to work with MRC to divert mattresses from landfills and combat illegal mattress dumping.
- Inform the collection network and recyclers about requirements for proper screening, stacking, loading and environmentally sound management of mattresses.
- Share expertise, resources, the results of research projects and outcomes.

MRC uses a consumer-facing sub-brand, Bye Bye Mattress, to inform those looking to discard a mattress about their options. Specifically:

- Residents learn about their nearest drop-off location as well as mattress retailers that recycle discarded units through the program.
- Businesses learn how to work with the program to have old mattresses transported and recycled at no-cost.
- The public learns about the program, the assessment, eligible and ineligible items, how a mattress is recycled and why recycling is beneficial.

Mattress Industry Compliance Outreach

MRC's efforts to encourage timely registration, reporting and remittance of the assessment are as follows:

Pre-Program Launch (2022-2024)

MRC first informed the mattress industry about Oregon's program in March 2022. Upon the bill being signed into law, MRC published information on its website - [MattressRecyclingCouncil.org](https://mattressrecyclingcouncil.org) - and issued a press release to mattress and furniture trade media. Simultaneously, the International Sleep Products Association (ISPA) notified its members.

Once the Plan was approved in July 2024, communication escalated with notification mailings and media coverage to highlight important implementation details. We also created a digital ad campaign to encourage early registrations. MRC also began publishing information on [MRCreporting.org](https://mrcreporting.org) and periodically emailing registered companies keeping them informed of the program's developments. MRC's and ISPA's

newsletters and social media provided additional repetition of this information. To reach even wider audiences, we leveraged industry events and relationships with other industry associations to continue to raise awareness of Oregon's program. By the end of 2024, 231 companies were registered.

[Appendix D](#) contains examples of pre-program launch ads and outreach.

Post-Launch (2025)

As the first reporting and payment deadline approached, written instructions and videos were provided demonstrating how to use MRCreporting.org to complete these monthly tasks. Emails were sent to registered companies and the information was also cross-posted on MattressRecyclingCouncil.org and MRCreporting.org. These resources were further shared through a quarterly retailer newsletter.

The protocols established in the Plan were implemented to identify businesses required to register for the program and to notify those that missed reporting or payment deadlines. These efforts led to the identification and registration of 80 new businesses.

Each month, MRC emails DEQ a list of registered companies for publication on its website. [Appendix A](#) is a cumulative list of the retailers, producers and renovators registered during the calendar year (Jan. 1 - Dec. 31, 2025).

Collection Network Outreach

The Plan outlined the approach for recruiting locations to serve as collection sites and host events, as well as how communication would occur with those choosing to participate in the collection network.

Throughout 2025, MRC's Oregon Program Coordinator aggressively recruited collection locations across the state. Outreach efforts included site visits, phone calls, email campaigns and participating in meetings and conferences hosted by organizations within the solid waste and recycling community, as well as those focused on local and county government. Information sheets about becoming a collection site or hosting an event were common items used in these interactions, along with directing contacts to [MattressRecyclingCouncil.org's Oregon page](https://MattressRecyclingCouncil.org's%20Oregon%20page).

Notably, MRC joined the League of Oregon Cities as a Business Partner member, allowing us to provide city leadership and local elected officials with program information through the League's newsletter, social media and events. Other groups that amplified our outreach include Association of Oregon Recyclers, Oregon Refuse and Recycling Association, Northwest Product Stewardship Council, various county solid waste advisory committees and the Oregon City/County Management Association.

Once a location began participating in the network, internal protocols were followed to onboard the host and provide outreach assistance (as described in the [Publicity Toolkit](#)). Contacts at these locations began receiving MRC's Highlights and a quarterly Oregon newsletter.

Growing Awareness of the New Program (Years 1-3)

The approved Plan outlined how target audiences would be educated about recycling opportunities. In the initial years (years 1-3 or Jan. 1, 2025 – Dec. 31, 2027), the following tactics were identified to grow program awareness:

- Provide retailers with point-of-sale materials in the five most common spoken languages.
- Offer local media a public service announcement.
- Seek media coverage opportunities.
- Distribute a publicity toolkit to participating collection sites, recyclers and local officials.
- Engage and collaborate with community-based groups.
- Participate in community events focused on environmental and recycling education.
- Working with other industry associations and industry media to encourage mattress recycling.

In addition to using these tactics in 2025, we piloted digital advertisements on Nextdoor and Reddit. Cumulatively, our approach demonstrated a commitment to using a multichannel, multilingual strategy.

Point-of-Sale Materials

Prior to program launch, retailers were provided with in-store and online materials described in the Plan - information card, poster, digital badge (an image for use on a website or other digital material) and a question-and-answer sheet to help retailers explain the assessment to customers and how to find recycling opportunities.

[Appendix D](#) contains examples of these materials.

According to the Oregon [Secretary of State](#)'s office (which is required to publish the five most common languages spoken in the state other than English), Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese, Korean and Russian were the most spoken additional languages in 2025. MRC provided the information card and poster in each of these languages.

In compliance with the Plan timeline, materials were published on [MattressRecyclingCouncil.org](https://mattressrecyclingcouncil.org) in December 2024, and registered participants on MRCreporting.org were notified of their availability. The materials were also distributed by mail, with an initial shipment sent to registered participants on Dec. 15, 2024. Throughout 2025, mailings continued as retailers completed their registrations. In total, these shipments included 6,400 information cards and 96 posters.

During 2025, 21 retailer visits were conducted in the Portland metro area. Some retailers were observed displaying MRC-issued materials, while others chose to incorporate the information into their own branded materials.

In 2026, MRC is exploring working with a third-party to create and conduct a statewide inspection to proactively determine how retailers are communicating about the stewardship assessment and recycling opportunities.

Public Service Announcement

A public service announcement (PSA) titled “Influencer,” is offered across all state programs. The campaign includes 15-second and 30-second video and radio spots. Spanish versions are also available. Oregon TV and radio stations were contacted in April and November to encourage airing the PSA in advance of Earth Day (April 22) and America Recycles Day (Nov. 15). By year-end, the PSA was airing at one TV station in the Eugene area. “Influencer” will continue to be offered in 2026. TV and radio scripts are included in [Appendix D](#).

Consumer Media Coverage

To encourage local coverage about the program, available collection sites and collection events, two strategic press conferences were organized, along with individual coordination with each site and event host to announce their participation.

Overall, these proactive efforts generated 390 stories across print, online and broadcast media in Oregon, equating to approximately \$75,000 in advertising value and over 34 million impressions.

National media publishing consumer advice, including guidelines for decluttering and mattress care tips, also mentioned Bye Bye Mattress or attributed MRC as their source for recycling information. This earned an additional 150 stories, resulting in 615.2 million impressions and equating to \$257,000 in advertising value.

Publicity Toolkits

Prior to program launch, a publicity toolkit was created to assist recyclers, collection sites, and collection event hosts in promoting their participation in the program. As contracts were finalized, the toolkit was provided and meetings were requested to discuss next steps.

Once the program launched, a protocol was maintained to provide each new site or event host with a toolkit within five days of finalizing their collection details. The first step includes an email containing the toolkit document, a personalized social media graphic and a flyer. The site or event host must also respond to confirm whether they would like assistance with contacting local officials and whether MRC is permitted to inform local media. Based on their response, a determination is made on whether to engage a communications consultant to inform local officials and/or media.

Throughout 2025, MRC interacted with the hosts of 23 sites and 37 collection events. Many opted to have our assistance with informing local officials and engage media. In addition to the local media coverage mentioned above, there were 64 social media mentions by local officials, municipal government pages and community groups generating more than 440,000 potential impressions.

Industry Outreach

SB 1576 requires MRC to provide Oregon large volume generators with mattress recycling. This is similar to what is provided in other state programs and is advertised as the Commercial Volume Program (CVP). For over a decade CVP has been promoted to mattress retailers, lodging establishments, educational facilities,

healthcare facilities and military installations via advertisements and editorial opportunities or direct outreach by staff. Before Oregon’s program launched, the CVP webpage information, marketing materials and advertisements were updated to include Oregon.

In 2025, MRC advertised to mattress retailers, educational facilities, and lodging establishments, while also informing property managers and the rental housing industry about the program’s availability. Property managers and landlords were encouraged to share recycling information with tenants and were provided guidance on how to work with MRC to recycle large quantities of units collected from their properties. [Appendix D](#) contains examples of CVP ads and materials.

Community Events and Community-Based Groups

In 2025, MRC researched community events to support. 2026 Earth Day events in Eugene and Bend were ultimately selected and additional details will be provided in the next annual report.

In 2026, MRC will select community-based groups and pursue membership and sponsorship opportunities in return for promoting the program to their members. Per the Plan, we are seeking groups that, “assist minority, low-income or other historically underrepresented people. MRC will ask these groups to help promote the program to these audiences (e.g, publishing our information in their printed materials, on their websites, mentioning us or allowing us to speak during their meetings or events, etc.). MRC will offer community-based groups a set of materials similar to those provided to local officials, and will translate those materials if necessary. MRC is also open to collaborating with a group to create and conduct outreach in a culturally appropriate manner for their audience.”

Consumer Advertising

To prepare for building a broader digital advertising plan, MRC piloted ads on Reddit and Nextdoor. Ads were targeted at a demographic likely to discard a mattress, which is typically a mattress shopper. Ads were timed with the Black Friday and holiday shopping timeframe. We selected Eugene and Bend as the test markets, since they had established collection opportunities. Examples of these ads are in [Appendix D](#).

Measuring Impact of Outreach

Per the Plan, MRC agreed to issue industry and consumer surveys to measure impact of outreach. The Plan's Implementation Timeline indicated that the first industry survey would be issued within the first year of operations, while the initial consumer survey would be issued after 12 months of operations.

Industry Awareness and Satisfaction

In 2025, all 1,672 registered participants in North America (retailers, institutional sellers, manufacturers, distributors and renovators) were invited to complete an annual survey. 247 participants responded for a 15% response rate. 64 of those respondents were registered participants in Oregon.

Of the Oregon respondents, 53 identified as retailers/institutional sellers, 19 as manufacturers/distributors and 2 as renovators. The total number of surveys doesn't equate to the 64 total respondents because some respondents represented multiple registration types (i.e., a retailer and manufacturer).

Questions varied based on the respondents' role(s) in the industry. Generally, the survey assessed knowledge of obligations, satisfaction with the program, customer service and resources. Retailers were also asked a series of questions to gauge their satisfaction with launch communications. Major takeaways are categorized below. Note that sample sizes are low; therefore, results should be interpreted anecdotally. [Appendix D](#) contains the survey questionnaire and responses.

Retailers

Of Oregon retailers, 46% said that some portion of their sales were made online. Most (85%) sold from physical locations that are typically department, furniture, and mattress stores.

The majority of all retailers (97%) said they proactively provided information explaining the recycling assessment to their customers. The remainder (3%) said they only provided information about the assessment upon request. Most (68%) provided program assessment information using MRC's posters and/or cards.

Half of all retailers (50%) said they regularly take back customers' mattresses. Another third (34%) said they did so "sometimes" and 16% do not take back mattresses.

The ByeByeMattress.com website was used by 44% of respondents to locate a drop-off facility to recycle discarded mattresses taken back from customers. None use third party transporters to take back customer mattresses.

No retailers were contacted by a regulatory agency(ies) to schedule an inspection. Nor had any completed an inspection.

About half of respondents (52%) were extremely/somewhat satisfied with program resources they receive from MRC; 7%, dissatisfied; the remaining 41%, neutral.

The majority (80%) of retailers had utilized MRC's Customer Service department in the past. Slightly more than half of them (54%) were satisfied with their experiences, 38% were neutral and 8% dissatisfied. MRC continues to fine-tune its live support and educational resources through coaching and material enhancements.

Overall, about a third of respondents (34%) were extremely/somewhat satisfied with the program; 31%, dissatisfied; the remaining 35%, neutral.

To better understand opportunities for improvement, we isolated and asked Oregon retailers a few additional questions. First, we assessed the level of communication they received prior to the launch. About one third (34%) reported being extremely or somewhat satisfied with pre-launch communications, while 43% felt neutral and 23% were dissatisfied.

Next, we asked about customer education materials. About half (51%) said they were extremely/somewhat satisfied with customer education materials; a third (35%), neutral; 14%, dissatisfied. More than half (54%) said customers were already aware of the program/assessment prior to making a purchase.

Lastly, we asked Oregon retailers if they were satisfied with the drop-off location in their county. About a quarter (25%) said they were satisfied; another quarter (26%) neutral; another quarter (26%), dissatisfied. The remaining 23% of retailers were not aware of their drop-off location.

Manufacturers

Among the 10 manufacturers who responded, 8 said they offer green/sustainable products and practices. The top communications vehicles for conveying this information included manufacturer websites, sales materials and/or product documentation.

Four manufacturers expressed interest in participating in the Commercial Volume Program or receiving more detailed program information. Follow-up information was provided to those interested.

Half of respondents indicated they were familiar with the regulatory agencies overseeing the recycling program(s) in their state(s), while the remaining were either not familiar or unsure.

No manufacturers reported being contacted by DEQ to schedule an inspection, however one manufacturer noted that they had completed an inspection.

The majority of respondents (all but one) were extremely/somewhat satisfied with the resources they receive from MRC.

Five manufacturers reported having used MRC's customer service department in the past. All but one were extremely satisfied with their experiences.

Half of respondents indicated they were extremely or somewhat satisfied with the program, while the remainder reported being neutral or dissatisfied.

Renovators

Only one Oregon renovator submitted a response. This respondent was not interested in recycling old mattresses with MRC or becoming a public collection site at this time.

This renovator reported being somewhat satisfied with program resources.

They had used MRC's customer service department in the past and felt neutral about the experience.

The renovator expressed a neutral overall view about the program.

Consumer Awareness and Behavior

Per the Plan's specified timeline and requirements, MRC conducted its first statewide consumer awareness and behavior survey in April 2026. An analysis of the results, along with the full questionnaire, will be included in the 2026 Annual Report.

Other Performance Metrics

MRC's Plan also states that we regularly monitor outreach tactics to assess how each contributes to the overall performance of our marketing strategy. The metrics selected include website visitors and pageviews for ByeByeMattress.com and MattressRecyclingCouncil.org, the number of PSA impressions and airings, and the combined reach of media outreach and coverage generated through publicity toolkits. For newsletters, we tracked subscriber counts and open rates. To measure social media performance, we monitored total followers and reach/impressions to evaluate audience growth and engagement. Table 14 summarizes the data collected from 2025 efforts not already described in this chapter.

Chapter 7: Recommendations

ORS 459A.174(2)(n)

As 2025 marked the first year of program implementation, we do not recommend any substantive changes to the program at this time. The initial year has been focused on establishing foundational operations, and we believe it is important to allow sufficient time for the program to mature before considering adjustments.

Our current efforts remain centered on building and strengthening the statewide collection network to provide convenience service, while simultaneously increasing awareness and participation through targeted outreach and marketing to both consumers and businesses.

Until forthcoming reports and studies are completed and we have additional years of program data, we do not yet have sufficient information to support meaningful, data-driven recommendations for program modifications, including the potential utility of a ban on disposal of mattresses. As additional data is collected and trends become clearer over time, we will be better positioned to evaluate program performance and identify opportunities for improvement in future reporting periods.

Future Reporting Requirements

MRC will provide additional reports and studies to DEQ in subsequent years of program implementation.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the **Mattress Recycling Council – Oregon, LLC** (“MRC – OR”) is presented to assist in understanding MRC – OR’s financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of MRC – OR’s management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to generally accepted accounting principles and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements.

Purpose of the Oregon Recycling Operations:

Oregon’s (OR) Mattress Stewardship Act (SB 1576 of 2022) requires mattress manufacturers in OR to develop, finance, and implement a convenient and cost-effective statewide recycling program for mattresses and box springs discarded in the state. MRC – OR developed and manages the program in the state. MRC – OR funds its operations through a \$22.50 per unit recycling fee that went effect on January 1, 2025. The recycling fee is collected from consumers when they purchase a mattress or box spring unit at retail. MRC – OR is required to perform a financial statement audit under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America to satisfy the state of Oregon’s Mattress Stewardship Act.

MRC – OR is one of four wholly owned subsidiaries of Mattress Recycling Council, Inc. (MRC). MRC also operates recycling programs in the states of California, Connecticut and Rhode Island. MRC formed MRC – OR during 2022, which began operations on January 1, 2025. MRC is a not-for-profit corporation incorporated on November 14, 2013 under the laws of the State of Delaware and organized and operated for purposes consistent with recognition of exempt status under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), including, without limitation, to work to establish an environmentally sound and cost-effective program for recycling of sleep products. MRC is a subsidiary (under current accounting standards) of the International Sleep Products Association (ISPA) due to common control.

MRC – OR’s significant accounting policies are as follows:

Basis of Accounting and Separately Stated Financial Statements of MRC – OR:

The financial statements of MRC – OR have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, prepaid expenses, advances, payables, accruals and other liabilities.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Basis of Accounting and Separately Stated Financial Statements of MRC – OR (continued):

On an annual basis, MRC – OR’s financial statements are included in the consolidated group financial statements of MRC. These financial statements of MRC – OR have been issued as a subsidiary of MRC as of December 31, 2025. MRC – OR’s December 31, 2025 separately stated financial statements will be prepared due to the request of the Board of Directors of MRC and the State of Oregon. See **NOTE J** for related party transaction disclosures.

Basis of Presentation:

As a wholly owned subsidiary of MRC, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, the financial statements of MRC – OR have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. MRC – OR reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

Net Assets Without Restrictions – Net assets that are not subject to or are no longer subject to third-party imposed stipulations. The board designated reserves are also included in net assets without restrictions.

Net Assets With Restrictions – Net assets whose use is limited by third party-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions. MRC – OR has no net assets with restrictions as of December 31, 2025.

Revenues are reported as increases in net assets without restrictions unless use of the related assets is limited by third party-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in net assets without restrictions. Gains and losses on investments and other assets or liabilities are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit third-party stipulations or by law. Expirations of restrictions on the net assets (i.e., the third party-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets. MRC – OR has adopted a policy to classify restricted revenues as without restrictions to the extent that restrictions were met in the year the revenue was received.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Basis of Presentation (continued):

MRC – OR established a financial reserve policy to provide for short-term and long-term financial needs. It is the policy of MRC – OR to include in its unrestricted net assets, approximately three months (25%) of its annual operating expenses. Once MRC – OR has met the unrestricted net asset objective, MRC – OR seeks to maintain long-term reserves that fall within a reserve target range of a minimum of six months (50%) and a maximum of nine months (75%) of annual operating expenses. MRC – OR designates its net assets, which can include cash, investments and other current assets, toward the board designated reserve.

Income Tax Status:

MRC is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to MRC’s tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. MRC – OR is considered a disregarded entity for federal income tax purposes. MRC – OR’s activity and mission are consistent with those of its Parent company, MRC. The subsidiary’s financial operations are reported on a consolidated basis with MRC’s tax-exempt Federal Form 990 filing.

MRC has adopted the authoritative guidance relating to uncertainty in income taxes included in ASC Topic Income Taxes. These provisions provide consistent guidance for the accounting for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in an entity’s financial statements and prescribe a threshold of “more likely than not” for recognition and de-recognition of tax positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. MRC performed an evaluation of uncertain tax positions for the year ending December 31, 2025, and determined that there were no material matters that would require recognition in the financial statements or that may have an effect on its tax-exempt status. As of December 31, 2025, the statute of limitations for MRC’s income tax return for the year ending December 31, 2022, 2023, and 2024 remain open with the Federal, state, and local authorities. It is MRC’s policy to recognize interest and/or penalties related to uncertain tax positions, if any, in income tax expense.

Cash and Cash Equivalents:

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, MRC – OR considers all unrestricted highly liquid cash balances with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Accounts Receivable:

Accounts receivable is stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a charge to earnings and a credit to valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances which are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable. As of December 31, 2025, the balance of the allowance for doubtful accounts was \$29,155.

Revenue Recognition:

The state of Oregon mandates that all retailers, producers, and importers that sell mattresses and box springs must register with MRC – OR, report monthly mattress sales, and collect and remit the recycling fee to MRC – OR each month. Each month, a retailer reports the number of mattress and foundation units sold, and then remits to MRC – OR the per unit recycling fees that were collected on those units. The per unit recycling fee was \$22.50 per unit for the year ending December 31, 2025. MRC – OR recognizes mattress recycling fee revenue in the period a mattress is sold at retail.

Investments:

MRC – OR has adopted Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958 Not-for-Profit Entities. Under ASC 958-320, investments in marketable equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in marketable debt securities are valued at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Property, Equipment, Depreciation and Amortization:

MRC – OR capitalizes all expenditures for property and equipment in excess of \$1,000. Purchased property and equipment are carried at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

Functional Allocation of Expenses:

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities and in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain shared costs have been allocated among the four operating state programs (CA, CT, OR and RI) based on supporting services benefiting each program. Shared general and administrative expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but that provide for the overall support of MRC, including expenses related to contracts with third-party vendors. Total shared costs are allocated to the respective operating states on a monthly basis.

For the year ending December 31, 2025, approximately 8.8% of the shared expenses not directly identifiable with any other specific function but that provide overall support of MRC were allocated to MRC – OR, which is based on relative state population of OR as it relates to CA, CT, and RI in 2025.

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Operations:

In the financial statements, revenues earned and expenses incurred in conducting the programs and services of MRC – OR are presented as operating activities. Non-operating activities include investment return, gains or losses on the sale or disposal of property and equipment, if applicable, and other non-operating items.

NOTE C – INVESTMENTS

Due to the level of risk associated with investments and level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of investments, there is always a possibility that changes in risks in the near term could materially affect investment balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements. MRC – OR has an investment policy statement that is reviewed by the MRC Board annually which addresses these risks. The portfolios are reviewed on a quarterly basis and changes are made as needed, within the scope of the policy.

NOTE G – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Concentration of Service Providers:

For the year ending December 31, 2025, three recyclers accounted for 100% of MRC – OR’s total recycling costs and 100% of the units recycled.

For the year ending December 31, 2025, four vendors accounted for approximately 71% of MRC – OR’s total expenses.

Note Payable – Line of Credit:

In May 2022, MRC entered into a line of credit agreement with M&T Bank. The principal amount on the line was \$1,000,000 and called for a variable rate of 2.42% above the 1-Month CME SOFR Term Reference Rate. The minimum rate was 2.42%. The line of credit was secured by collateral of the assets of MRC. There were no draws on the line of credit in 2025, therefore there is no interest expense related to the line of credit in 2025. The line of credit was closed in January 2025.

NOTE G – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES (continued)

Note Payable – MRC:

On December 22, 2022, MRC – OR entered into an agreement to fund the formation and start-up costs for MRC – OR. MRC – OR borrowed \$1,078,885 in total from MRC. Principal and interest was due 48 months from the date of the note, which called for an interest rate of 4% plus the base lending rate designated by RBC (ISPA's investment broker) plus a sliding scale of 1.00 – 2.75%. The note was paid in full during 2025 and there was no balance at December 31, 2025. Interest expense was \$46,239 for the year ending December 31, 2025.

Product Care Association Consulting Fees:

MRC has outsourced its billing and collection functions to Product Care Association (PCA), a third-party vendor which operates out of Canada. PCA collects and reviews the monthly sales reports from various mattress retailer sellers, invoices these sellers, and collects the fee income on behalf of MRC. During the year ending December 31, 2025, the total expenses incurred related to PCA consulting fees was \$386,792 and MRC – OR's proportionate allocation of those expenses was \$31,760, which is included in the administration expenses (management, staffing, and general expenses) on the statement of activities.

NOTE H – CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

A small number of participants accounted for a significant portion of MRC – OR's accounts receivable at December 31, 2025, exposing MRC – OR to a concentration of credit risk. Economic characteristics of participants with accounts receivable balances are similar, as they are all in the retail industry. As participation and remittance is required by Oregon law, management does not believe this concentration poses a significant risk of financial impact.

MRC – OR maintains its cash and cash equivalents and investment balances in two U.S. financial institutions. The balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC). The FDIC insures up to \$250,000 and the SIPC insures up to \$500,000 (including \$250,000 for cash). MRC – OR's investment firm also maintains additional insurance coverage through an outside insurer which provides excess protection of up to \$400 million. At December 31, 2025, MRC – OR's uninsured cash balance was \$1,009,768 and MRC – OR had no uninsured investments.

NOTE I – FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Generally accepted accounting principles define fair value, establish a framework for measuring fair value, and establish a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability occurs in the principal market for the asset or liability or, in the absence of a principal market, the most advantageous market. Valuation techniques that are consistent with the market, income or cost approach are used to measure fair value.

The fair value hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels:

Level 1 – These inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that MRC – OR has the ability to access.

Level 2 – These are inputs (other than quoted prices included within level 1) that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These inputs may include quoted prices for the identical instrument on an inactive market, prices for similar instruments, interest rates, default rates and other similar data.

Level 3 – These are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and rely on management’s own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. The unobservable inputs should be developed based on the best information available in the circumstances and may include the MRC – OR’s own data.

MRC – OR estimates that the fair value of all financial instruments at December 31, 2025 do not differ materially from the aggregate carrying values of its financial instruments recorded in the accompanying statement of financial position.

MRC – OR is one of four operating wholly owned subsidiaries of the MRC. MRC also operates recycling programs in the states of California, Connecticut and Rhode Island. MRC is a not-for-profit organization incorporated on November 14, 2013 under the laws of the State of Delaware and organized and operated for purposes consistent with recognition of exempt status under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), including, without limitation, to work to establish an environmentally sound and cost-effective program for recycling of sleep products. MRC is a subsidiary (under current accounting standards) of ISPA due to common control.

These financial statements include the intra-entity accounts and transactions between MRC – OR and MRC. Due from MRC includes participant funds for the recycling program collected by MRC on behalf of MRC – OR.

Operating Agreement with MRC:

MRC – OR is required to pay a monthly service fee in the amount of \$38,225, which represents the anticipated costs incurred by MRC for administrative and financial staff support services to the LLC. At the end of each quarter a reconciliation is prepared for a “true up” of actual costs MRC – OR incurred versus the monthly fee charged, and any surplus or deficits are reimbursed by the respective party.

For the year ending December 31, 2025, MRC – OR incurred management fee expenses of \$521,639 which is recorded in the management, staffing, and general expenses on the statement of functional expenses. MRC recorded the associated management fee revenue in the same amount. The administrative fee expense charged by MRC has not been eliminated in these financial statements as of December 31, 2025.

NOTE K – LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

MRC – OR has financial assets as of December 31, 2025, consisting of cash and cash equivalents of \$1,231,296, accounts receivable of \$833,630, investments of \$742,010 and due from MRC of \$731,125, which total \$3,538,061 of financial assets available to meet cash need for general expenditures within one year. Included in these financial assets is the Board designated reserve in the amount of \$2,055,307, set aside for the financial reserve in order to comply with state regulations in OR. These board designated financial assets are not available for general use.

MRC – OR considers all expenditures related to its ongoing recycling programs, as well as the services undertaken to support these programs, to be general expenditures. As part of MRC – OR’s liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities and other obligations come due. In addition, MRC – OR invests cash in excess of daily requirements in investments, which include conservative fixed income ETFs. In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next 12 months, MRC – OR has a financial reserve to assist with operational liquidity if needed.

For the year ending December 31, 2026, MRC – OR projects it will collect sufficient additional revenue to cover its general expenditures for the year and is budgeting a positive change in net assets.

NOTE L – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

In preparing the financial statements, MRC – OR has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through June 25, 2026, the date the audit report was available to be issued.

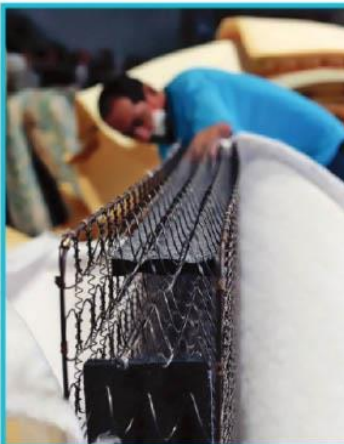

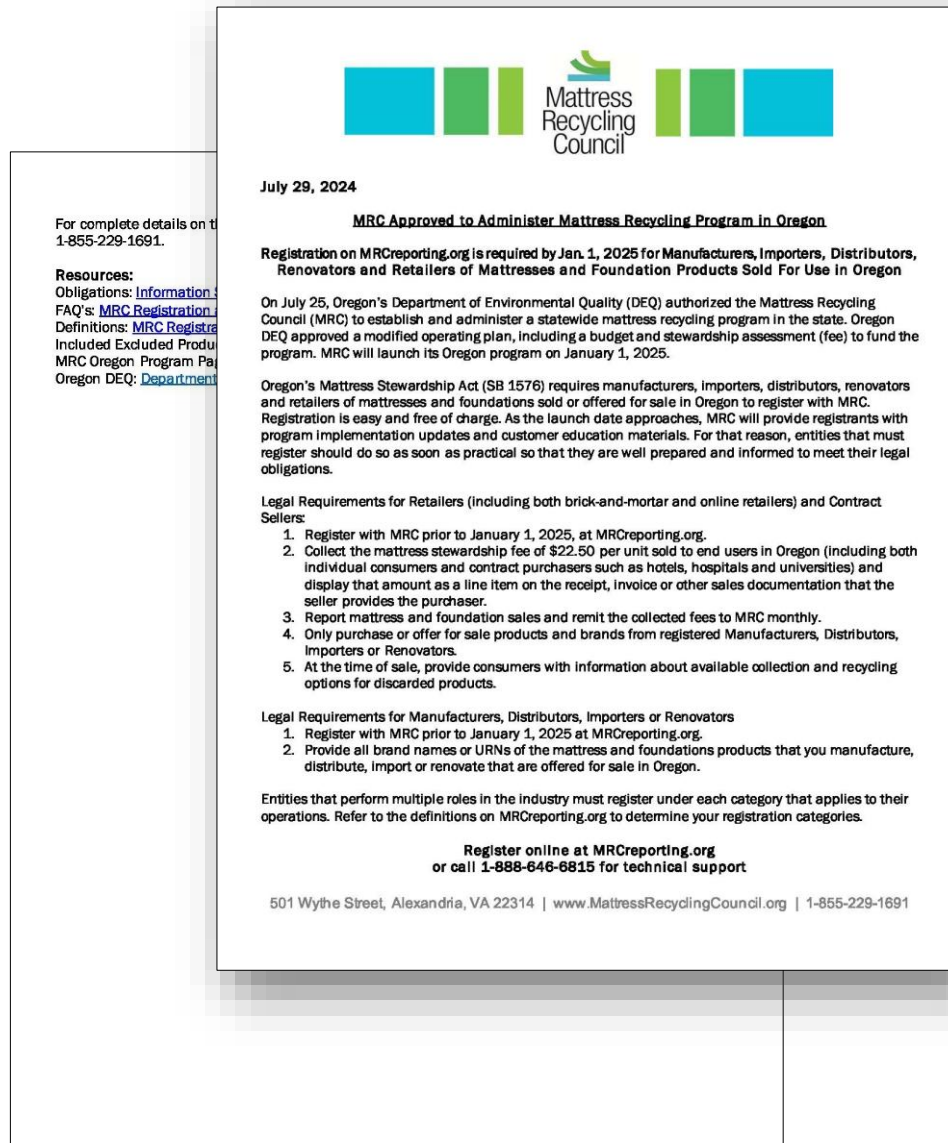
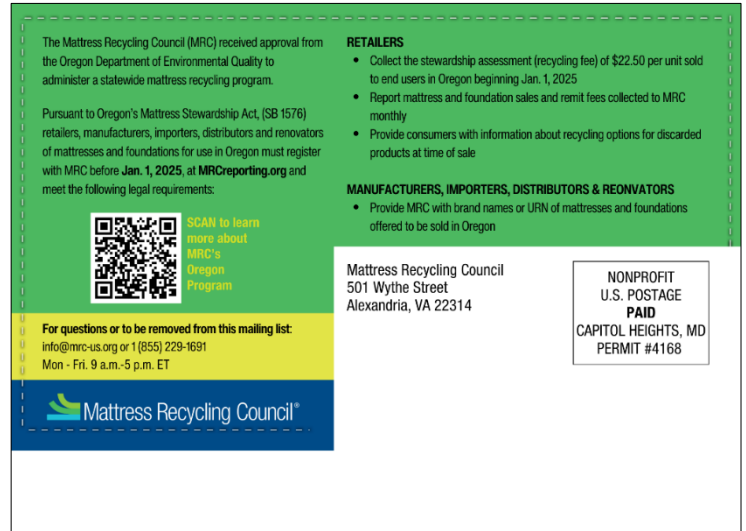

Open for Business in Oregon

MRC's Oregon program, which launched on Jan. 1, is up and running, making it our fourth state program!

Oregon's Commercial Volume Program (CVP) is active and working with mattress retailers to aggregate truckloads of discarded mattresses from large-volume sources like mattress retailers, hotels, junk haulers, and universities. Obtaining units from upstream CVP sources is important for keeping units clean and dry.

MRC's Oregon Coordinator Darcy Perez continues to work with solid waste facilities across the state to build the collection network. Interested in becoming a collection site? Contact us!

All mattress retailers selling into Oregon were required to register by Dec. 31 and must add a \$22.50 stewardship assessment (fee) to each unit sold in the state. The registration and remittance portal is open and includes links to free education materials that must be provided to all customers

Preparing for Oregon

Are you registered with MRC?

With plan approval, MRC is now actively registering mattress manufacturers, distributors, importers, renovators, and retailers of mattresses and foundations for use in Oregon. Those in the mattress industry, including online retailers who sell in Oregon, should become familiar with all their company's obligations and must register their business with MRC before Jan. 1, 2025.

Visit MRCreporting.org to learn of your legal obligations, to register your company or update your existing profile to add Oregon.

How to prepare for sales on Jan.1

- Register with MRC at MRCreporting.org
- Verify the brands you carry are registered with MRC. Check here. If those brands are not listed, please notify your distributor or manufacturer to register at MRCReporting.org.
- Update your Point-of-Sale system to apply the Stewardship Assessment (fee) to the included products.
- Include a line item on your invoice or receipt to show the Stewardship Assessment.
- Notify your staff about the program obligations.

Customer Education Materials

In December, you will receive a package of customer education materials tailored for your customers and Frequently Asked Questions about the program. This will include posters for your store and receipt attachment cards for customers. These cards will meet the requirement for retailers to provide consumers with the collection opportunities available through the program. Additional materials will be available to order online at no cost or to download for printing.

This legislation is aligned with other successful recycling programs administered by MRC in California, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Since 2015, MRC has recycled more than 10 million mattresses and diverted more than 360 million pounds of steel, foam, fiber and wood from landfill. "By giving Oregonians a convenient way to recycle mattresses, we are reducing both waste sent destined for the landfill and the likelihood of these items being illegally dumped," said Senator James Manning (D-Eugene), Co-Chief Sponsor of Senate Bill 1576, who carried the bill on the Senate floor. "The public-private partnership authorized by this legislation will be good for state residents and the environment, and will create good green jobs." MRC will propose funding its activities through a stewardship fee added to the cost of all mattresses and box springs purchased in Oregon, including online sales. MRC would then use the fee to establish collection sites and events where residents can drop off mattresses for free. In current program states, MRC accomplishes this by working with mattress retailers, the existing solid waste infrastructure, waste haulers, small businesses and nonprofit organizations. MRC would also recycle mattresses from commercial sources, including hotels and universities. "MRC has developed a successful approach to mattress recycling. We continuously seek to improve the service we provide residents, increase the amount of each mattress that can be recycled and reduce the environmental impact of our operations," said Ryan Trainer, President of MRC and the International Sleep Products Association. Oregon's Mattress Stewardship Act – Senate Bill 1576

In March 2022, Oregon enacted the Mattress Stewardship Act (SB 1576) requiring the mattress industry to create and manage a statewide mattress recycling program. The [Mattress Recycling Council \(MRC\)](#) is the nonprofit organization created by the mattress industry to administer this and other statewide mattress recycling programs. MRC uses a consumer-facing brand known as [bye bye mattress](#).

On July 25, 2024, Oregon's Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) approved a modified operating plan including a stewardship assessment (fee) to fund the program. Pursuant to the plan, the program will begin Jan. 1, 2025, and a \$22.50 per unit stewardship assessment collected on the sale of each mattress and foundation sold for use in Oregon.

Requirements

Retailers and Contract Sellers

Brick-and-mortar and online retailers who sell or offer for sale products to end users in Oregon that meet the law's definition of mattress or foundation must:

- Register at [MRCreporting.org](#).
- Beginning Jan. 1, 2025:
 - Collect the stewardship assessment on each mattress and foundation sold to end users in Oregon (including both individual consumers and contract purchasers, such as hotels, hospitals and universities).
 - Report and remit the collected assessments to MRC monthly.
 - Only purchase or offer for sale products and brands from registered manufacturers, distributors, importers or renovators.
 - At the point of sale, provide consumers with information about available collection and recycling options for discarded products. MRC will provide point-of-sale materials to retailers free of charge.

Manufacturers, Distributors and Importers

Manufacturers, distributors and importers of products that are sold or offered for sale in Oregon that meet the law's definition of mattress or foundation must:

- Register at [MRCreporting.org](#) and provide the brand names or URNs of the mattresses and foundations that are manufactured, distributed or imported that are offered for sale in Oregon.
- Those that also sell or offer for sale these products to end users in Oregon must also register as "Retailer" and are subject to those requirements.

The assessment does not apply to wholesale sales to retailers. Retailers will collect the assessment when they sell to the end user. The assessment must only be collected from the end user.

Renovators

Renovators who do products in Oregon definition of mattress must:

- Register at [MRCreporting.org](#) and provide the brand names of the mattresses and foundations or offered for sale.
- Those that also sell or offer for sale these products to end users in Oregon must register as "Retailer" and are subject to those requirements.

The assessment does not apply to wholesale sales to retailers. Retailers will collect the assessment when they sell to the end user. The assessment must only be collected from the end user.

Fee Collection

The \$22.50 stewardship assessment (fee) is collected on each mattress and foundation sold directly to Oregon end users, including individual consumers and contract purchasers (hotels, hospitals, universities, etc.). This fee is:

- A flat rate regardless of mattress or foundation size or type.
- Charged per unit. Each mattress and each foundation unit are considered separate units.
- Described on the receipt or other sales documentation provided to the customer as a "stewardship assessment." Abbreviations of these words or phrase are permitted. Pursuant to Oregon's law, it may not be referred to as "Oregon Recycling Fee."

Fee Reporting and Remittance Policy

No later than 30 days following the end of each reporting period, a company that has a legal obligation to collect the recycling fees from mattress and foundation purchasers must submit a [Fee Report](#) to MRC and remit to MRC all fees collected during that reporting period. For example, a Fee Report for the month of March and all recycling fees collected on March must be sent to MRC by April 30 (that is, 30 days after the end of March reporting period).

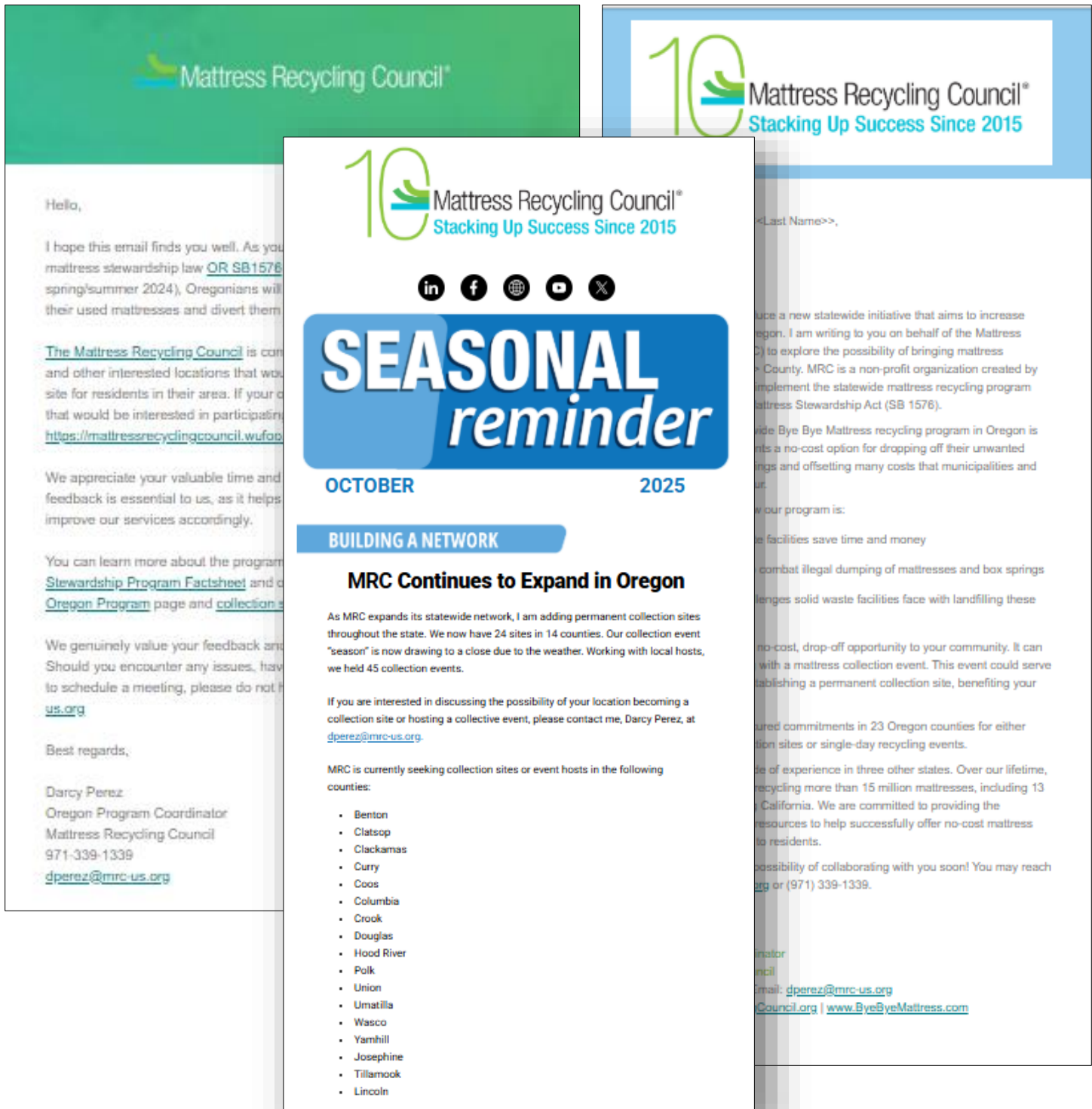

BECOMING A NO-COST MATTRESS COLLECTION SITE

In March 2022, Oregon passed the Mattress Stewardship Act (SB 1576), establishing a statewide mattress recycling program administered by the bedding industry.

The industry created the Mattress Recycling Council (MRC), a nonprofit organization, to administer this program. Bye Bye Mattress is the consumer-facing brand MRC created to promote the program.

By joining MRC's Bye Bye Mattress program, you'll provide your community a no-cost option for diverting valuable material from the waste stream, support local green jobs and help reduce illegal dumping.

Overview

MRC's Bye Bye Mattress program has recycled more than 13 million mattresses from California, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

This is made possible by a stewardship assessment that is collected when mattresses and box springs are sold to consumers in these states.

MRC is submitting a plan to Oregon's Department of Environmental Quality proposing to start a program in 2025 that operates like those MRC currently administers.

Program and Non-Program Products

Program Products:

Participants must agree to accept at no-cost all program mattresses and foundations (also commonly called box springs) in any condition. The product must have been used in Oregon.

Non-Program Products:

- Adjustable bases not covered in ticking or fabric
- Air mattresses that contain no upholstery material
- Car beds
- Collapsible roll-away beds
- Fold-out sofa beds
- Futons and furniture
- Infant carriers, lounge pads or crib bumpers
- Juvenile products such as carriages, baskets, cribs, bassinets, dressing tables, strollers and playpens or their pads
- Loose bedding, blankets or sheets
- Mattress pads or toppers
- Mattresses stripped of padding components (partial units)
- Metal bed frames
- Pillows and cushions
- Sleeping bags
- Water beds

What We Provide

- Collection containers at your site
- Compensation for all program products collected (including those too damaged for program containers and requiring disposal)
- Transportation from your site to the contracted recycler
- Mattress recycling services
- Assistance with residential education

Participant Benefits

Participating facilities no longer incur mattress disposal or stewardship assessment and recycling costs.

Program materials are waste-to-materials reused.

GIVE RESIDENTS ACCESS TO NO-COST RECYCLING

Overview

The Mattress Recycling Council (MRC) must offer collection events in counties with a population of less than 10,000 and in counties that do not yet have a permanent collection site. Whether you dedicate your event to mattress and box spring collection, or want to add these items to a pre-established event for other waste, MRC can provide a turn key solution at no cost to you.

Eligible Event Hosts

- Municipalities** such as cities and counties.
- Waste Collectors** such as landfills, transfer stations and municipal yards.
- Community Influencers** such as civic groups, nonprofit organizations, or public institutions/facilities that have access to large paved parking lots or open areas.

What MRC Provides

- Assistance with event promotion
- A 53-foot trailer for holding collected mattresses
- Labor to load mattresses (where available)
- Transportation
- Mattress recycling

Giving residents a no-cost option to dispose of their mattresses helps mitigate illegal dumping.

An assessment collected on the sale of mattresses and box springs allows MRC to cover all the costs an event host would normally incur.

Participation Requirements

- Make request for event at least 60 days prior to the event date
- Complete the online form and agree to MRC's Terms & Conditions
- Provide a collection location accessible to a 53-foot trailer (special accommodations can be made for remote locations)

Which items are accepted and not accepted for drop off or recycling by MRC's program?

A mattress or box spring in any condition, no matter when it was purchased must be accepted at the event. Mattresses must have been used and discarded in Oregon. Those transported from out of state for disposal at the event are ineligible.

These items may not be put in the recycling container:

- Severely damaged, wet, twisted, frozen or soiled mattresses or box springs
- Items infested with bed bugs

These items are not accepted for recycling:

- Adjustable bases not covered in ticking or fabric
- Air mattresses that contain no upholstery material
- Car beds
- Collapsible roll-away beds
- Fold-out sofa beds
- Futons and furniture
- Infant carriers, lounge pads or crib bumpers
- Juvenile products such as carriages, baskets, cribs, bassinets, dressing tables, strollers and playpens or their pads
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- Sleeping bags
- Water beds

KEY DETAILS

- [Oregon's Mattress Stewardship Act](#) enacted in 2022 required the mattress industry to create a program to make it easy for consumers to recycle mattresses and box springs. This is similar to legislation passed for other products like paint and packaging.
- The program is funded by the \$22.50 per unit stewardship assessment. The assessment amount was approved by Oregon's Department of Environmental Quality. It is not set by individual retailers.
- The program is operated by the Mattress Recycling Council (MRC), a nonprofit organization created by the bedding industry.
- MRC operates similar programs in California, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Collectively these states have already recycled 15 million mattresses. Recyclers have diverted more than 500 million pounds of material from landfill.

Why do I have to pay the stewardship assessment (fee)?

Oregon law requires retailers to collect this assessment on each mattress and box spring that is sold. It is passed on to the Mattress Recycling Council to operate a statewide mattress recycling program known as Bye Bye Mattress.

If your company DOES recycle with MRC's Bye Bye Mattress you can say:

We are using this program to recycle the mattresses our customers no longer want.

If your company DOES NOT recycle with MRC's Bye Bye Mattress:

On ByeByeMattress.com you can find participating drop-off locations, upcoming collection events and other information about responsible ways to get rid of an unwanted mattress.

What is the assessment used for?

The Mattress Recycling Council uses this assessment to operate a statewide mattress recycling program known as Bye Bye Mattress. It is providing collection locations with containers, transportation of those containers to recyclers and the disassembly of the mattresses and box springs. Residents are now able to drop off any mattress or box spring - no matter its condition or when it was purchased - at no extra cost.

Who is the Mattress Recycling Council?

The Mattress Recycling Council (MRC) is a nonprofit organization founded by the bedding industry to administer the statewide mattress recycling program created by Oregon's law. For more information about MRC, go to www.MattressRecyclingCouncil.org. To learn how to recycle your mattress or to find a collection location or event near you, visit www.ByeByeMattress.com.

If I don't plan to discard a mattress now, why do I have to pay this assessment (fee)?

Even if you aren't discarding a mattress right now, mattresses don't last forever and will eventually be discarded. State law requires retailers to collect this assessment on any mattress or box spring sale to fund this mattress recycling program. This program provides a network of participating cities, towns, retailers, recyclers and other organizations where old mattresses are collected for recycling at no additional cost to you. The assessment also supports efforts to combat illegal dumping of mattresses and help keep our community clean.

If I decide to take my old mattress to a recycler myself, do I still pay the assessment (fee)?

Yes. State law requires retailers to collect this assessment on any mattress and box spring sale to fund the mattress recycling program. Visit www.ByeByeMattress.com to find the location nearest you.

I didn't pay this fee when I bought my old mattress, so can I still drop it off for free at one of the participating locations?

Locations participating in MRC's Bye Bye Mattress program must accept all mattresses and box springs at no additional cost no matter when they were originally purchased, and no matter the condition.

Are the mattresses really recycled?

The Mattress Recycling Council is using three local recyclers that disassemble the units and prepare the steel, foam, fibers and wood for use in new products like carpet padding, insulation and mulch. MRC has found up to 75% of mattress and box spring materials can be recycled.

What are the benefits of mattress recycling?

Mattress recycling programs offer many benefits for the community, state and environment, including:

- Less reliance on incinerators and landfills by diverting mattresses from the waste stream
- Reduces the number of illegally dumped mattresses
- Conserves resources by making used steel, foam and other materials available for use in new products
- Creates recycling jobs

What happens to my old mattress or box spring when it gets recycled?

Recycled mattresses are cut open and the layers are separated and organized by type. Wood is recycled and used as a fuel source or shredded to produce landscaping mulch. Foam, fiber and other soft commodities are compressed and turned into carpet underlayment or animal bed padding. Metal and box springs are extracted, sent to recyclers and used to make building materials.

Will the Mattress Recycling Council or Bye Bye Mattress program pick up my old mattress from my home?

If your store takes back old mattresses:

No, but our store/company offers this service at time of delivery of your new mattress. (If your store recycles with the program, please let the customer know. Otherwise direct them to drop off their mattress at one of our free collection locations listed on www.ByeByeMattress.com.)

If your store does not take back old mattresses, your response should be:

Mattresses are collected from a vast network of free collection sites throughout the state. These are typically public works yards or transfer stations. Visit www.ByeByeMattress.com to see what options are available. The Mattress Recycling Council or the Bye Bye Mattress program does not pick up mattresses from customer's homes.

NEW OPTIONS FOR LANE COUNTY RESIDENTS TO RECYCLE MATTRESSES FOR FREE *Mattress Recycling Council, with St. Vincent de Paul and county leaders, bring new network of recycling collection sites to the region from coast to valley*

EUGENE, ORE. – Just in time for spring cleaning, residents in Lane County, including its coastal communities, now have access to a growing network of mattress recycling options that include free drop off for residents. It's all thanks to a new Oregon state law, the bedding industry and the efforts of local solid waste facilities, businesses and nonprofits. Including Eugene-based St. Vincent de Paul (SVdP), a longtime global leader in mattress recycling.

A state law that took effect this year called for an industry-led program to replicate its successful mattress recycling programs already operating in other states. State Sen. James Manning, Jr. of Eugene was among [the bill's chief sponsor](#). Now, as the Mattress Recycling Council's [Bye Bye Mattress program](#) grows to serve all Oregonians, Lane County is the first region where multiple local collection sites have confirmed their participation.

In the past, residents have been able to drop off old or unwanted mattresses and box springs at SVdP's recycling facility and Lane County Waste Management's Glenwood Transfer Station in Eugene – for a fee. As a result of the new law and MRC's Bye Bye Mattress program, it's now free for residents to drop off these items at the SVdP facility and Glenwood, as well as three other Bye Bye Mattress collection sites in the southern Willamette Valley.

In addition, some mattress retailers will accept old ones for recycling through MRC's Bye Bye Mattress program. Residents who are having a new mattress delivered should ask their retailer about taking back their old one.

In Lane County, the [four Bye Bye Mattress collection sites](#) include SVdP's recycling facility, Glenwood Transfer Station, and SVdP's thrift stores in Florence and Cottage Grove. In Linn County, SVdP's thrift store in Albany also accepts mattresses and box springs from the public for free. (See below for addresses and hours of operation.)

In addition, SVdP is currently accepting mattresses at 13 of their 14 stores across Oregon. SVdP is in the process of adding these drop-off locations to the Bye Bye Mattress program and [ByeByeMattress.com](#).

NEW, NO-COST OPTIONS TO RECYCLE UNWANTED MATTRESSES AND BOX SPRINGS **ARRIVE IN OREGON**

The Mattress Recycling Council's Bye Bye Mattress program network now serves people throughout the greater Portland area

PORTLAND, ORE. – Today in Northwest Portland, local officials announced the addition of Metro Central transfer station to the Mattress Recycling Council's (MRC) [Bye Bye Mattress program](#) in Oregon. People in the Portland-area now have access to mattress recycling, including free drop off at the Metro Central transfer station and other sites in the region.

These new options for recycling mattresses and box springs for free and keeping them out of landfills are the result of a new Oregon state law and efforts by the bedding industry and local governments, solid waste facilities, nonprofits and businesses, including Metro, Community Warehouse, Pride Recycling and Environmentally Conscious Recycling (ECR) in the Portland area. ECR is both a collection site and the recycling facility for the region.

The state law that took effect this year called for the bedding industry to create and administer the program. It's similar to product stewardship programs for paint (PaintCare), electronics (E-Cycles) and beverage containers (Bottle Bill) that have reduced waste and encouraged reuse in Oregon for years; and replicates the success of MRC's programs operating in other states.

More locations throughout the state are joining the network each month. This growing network brings big benefits to people and the environment:

- Recycling is free at participating locations.
- Less illegal dumping in local streets, parks and riverbeds.
- Fewer mattresses taking up space in landfills.

Metro Councilor Ashton Simpson and leaders from Community Warehouse and ECR attended today's announcement.

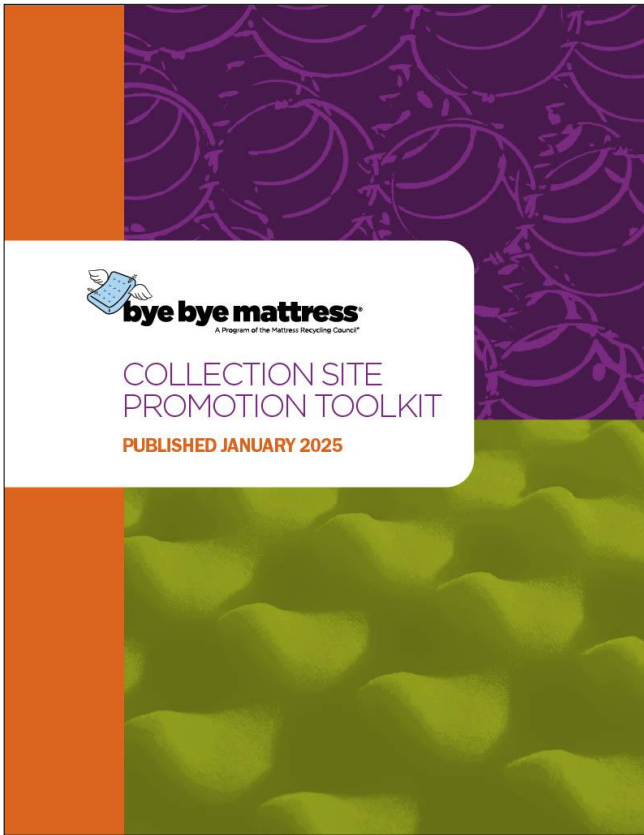

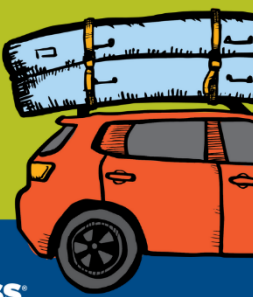

NO-COST MATTRESS RECYCLING FOR BUSINESSES AND ORGANIZATIONS

Overview

By participating in the Mattress Recycling Council's Bye Bye Mattress program, your business or organization will divert valuable material from the waste stream, support local green jobs and help reduce illegal dumping.

The Commercial Volume Program makes it easy for mattress retailers, universities, hotels, hospitals, the military and others with large volumes of discarded mattresses to use MRC's Bye Bye Mattress.

MRC is a nonprofit organization established by the bedding industry and authorized by Oregon's Department of Environmental Quality to operate the statewide program enacted by SB 1576. Learn more at [MattressRecyclingCouncil.org](https://www.MattressRecyclingCouncil.org).

What We Provide

- No-cost recycling services.
- No-cost drop-off at a participating recycler (no minimum required).
- No-cost transportation of collected mattresses to a participating recycler (100 unit minimum required).
- No-cost storage for eligible mattress retailers (100 units per month minimum required).

Eligibility Requirements

RETAILERS

- Mattress retailers must be registered with MRC, remitting the recycling fees (stewardship assessments) and compliant with all provisions of the law to participate.
- To receive no-cost drop-off at a participating recycler, the retailer must make arrangements with MRC.
- To receive no-cost transportation, the retailer must have accumulated a minimum of 100 units. Partnering with other local businesses and organizations, or allowing public drop-off to reach the minimum is permitted.
- To receive a permanent trailer, the retailer must accumulate at least 100 mattresses monthly. Partnering with other local businesses and organizations, or allowing public drop-off to reach the minimum is permitted.
- Units must have been used and discarded in Oregon.

HEALTHCARE FACILITIES • MILITARY BASES HOTELS & LODGING UNIVERSITIES & ETC.

- To receive no-cost drop-off at a participating recycler, the organization must make arrangements with MRC.
- To receive no-cost transportation, the organization must have accumulated a minimum of 100 units. Partnering with other local businesses and organizations, or allowing public drop-off to reach the minimum is permitted.
- Units must have been used and discarded in Oregon.
- When purchasing new units, remitting the recycling fee (stewardship assessments) and compliant with all provisions of the law to participate.

Participation Requirements

If receiving transportation or a permanent trailer the following is required:

- Complete provided registration form and return it no later than 14 days prior to desired pickup date or trailer delivery date.
- Provide a minimum of two staff to load units into the provided trailer.
- Keep units dry and segregated.
- Provide a secure collection area that can accommodate a 53-foot trailer.
- Pack items efficiently to maximize container capacity.
- Use MRC's electronic reporting platform to request and track outgoing shipments.

Non-Recyclable & Unacceptable Items

Items in these conditions are not recyclable:

- Units infested with bed bugs or other living organisms
- Severely damaged, twisted, wet, frozen or soiled units
- Adjustable bases not covered in ticking or fabric
- Air mattresses that contain no upholstery material (such as camping beds)
- Car beds
- Collapsible roll-away beds
- Fold-out sofa beds
- Futon mattresses, frames or bases
- The unit's packaging or shipping boxes
- Juvenile products, including: cribs, carriages, baskets, dressing tables, strollers, playpens, infant carriers, lounge pad, crib mattresses and bumpers
- Loose bedding, blankets or sheets
- Mattress pads and toppers
- Metal bed frames
- Pillows and cushions
- Sleeping bags
- Water beds

Frequently Asked Questions

What if I do not have 100 units to discard?
MRC requires a minimum of 100 units to receive transportation or retailer container. A participant may partner with other businesses or facilities, or allow the public to drop off units at the site in order to reach the minimum.
A participant may also make arrangements with MRC to drop off any number of units at a participating recycler.

Can I store mattresses until I have the 100 minimum unit amount?
Yes. Mattresses must be stored in a location where they remain clean and dry. Contact MRC for transportation options.

Will MRC assist in loading trailers?
No, it is the responsibility of the participant to load the trailer. Participants are required to provide a minimum of two staff to load units into the provided trailer.

How long do I have to load the trailer?
Three hours are allocated to load the trailer. If the participant needs more time, contact MRC to discuss alternate solutions.

Where will the mattresses be taken?
The mattresses will be taken to an MRC-contracted recycler. Find the list of recyclers at www.ByeByeMattress.com.

Will I receive documentation for recycling mattresses?
Yes. Shipment documentation will be available in MRC's online reporting portal or at the time of drop-off for loads delivered directly to a recycler.

Can I recycle mattress related items?
No. Only eligible mattresses and box springs are accepted. See Non-Recyclable and Unacceptable Items section above.

Can I recycle mattresses that are infected with bed bugs, damaged, wet, twisted, frozen, or heavily soiled?
No. Mattresses in these conditions should be disposed of as solid waste at the participant's expense.

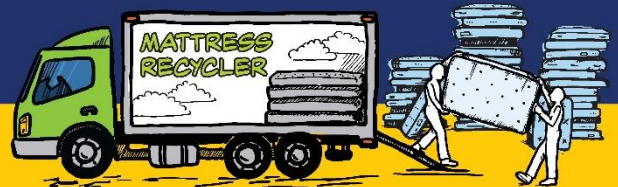

Mattresses pile up fast — but now there's an easier way. The Mattress Recycling Council's Bye Bye Mattress program now operates in Oregon, allowing property managers and tenants to recycle mattresses and box springs at no cost.

Property managers confronted with piles of discarded mattresses can drop them off at designated recycling facilities, or may qualify for no-cost pickup. Registration is required and free outreach materials are available.

Tenants can drop off mattresses at collection sites or events. When buying new, they should ask their retailer about take back when arranging delivery or setup.
