Require the RIC without any triangle or chasing arrow symbols.

PROPOSAL #2: Recommendations to the PRO:

- PROs run statewide ad campaigns to teach Oregonians about label changes.
- Use eco modulation to support recycling labeling best practices.

PROPOSAL #3:

- Allow both Oregon's Recycling Modernization Act and California's SB 343 to be implemented.
- Suggest coordination with OR DEQ and CalRecycle around accepted materials lists.
- Suggest coordination with OR DEQ and future OR PRO around needed investments for materials "close" to making statewide accepted materials lists.(eg PET thermoforms).

Task Force members discussed the three proposals and the survey results.

The Chair and Vice Chair will take the feedback from this meeting and refine the proposals. They may request input in the form of a survey or writing before the next meeting.

Action by the Task Force

Several Task Force members asked for more information. The Chair asked for a vote on an additional meeting to review more background information. A vote took place via chat - 10 members voted. 9 members voted in favor, 1 member opposed, 2 members abstained. Another meeting will be set up to provide more background information. The meeting will be recorded for members who are unable to attend.

Another vote decided the Trask Force should not focus on plastic packing first but instead focus on all packing types. The final vote count was 7 (all packaging) to 5 (plastic first).

2. Packaging not on the Oregon Uniformed Statewide Collection List for commingled collection, cannot have the chasing arrows anywhere on it or make any other claims about the packaging being recyclable.






3. Allow CA SB 343 to take effect and take no action to regulate recyclability claims and the use of the chasing arrows symbol at the state level.






4. Require the resin identification code without any other triangle or chasing arrows shape.






5. Require products and packaging NOT on the Oregon Uniformed Statewide Collection List (and recyclability labeling prohibited in CA under SB 343) to have a "do not recycle" label.





Add a threshold for the "DO NOT" recycle label, e.g., items that are recyclable in less than X% of areas in Oregon but above Y%. For items that are close to the threshold and accepted in CA, do not add an on-product label either way.






7. Prohibit recyclability labeling on covered packaging unless it is required by another state/agency/federal law.






8. Prohibit recyclability labeling on covered packaging unless it is part of widely adopted & standardized third-party labeling system such as How2Recycle.






 Allow recyclability labeling on covered packaging if it uses chasing arrows symbol in combination with a clearly visible line placed at 45 degree angle over chasing arrows symbol to convey that item is not recyclable. Example shown.







10. Require DEQ to review state criteria against enforceable federal statutory or regulatory recyclability labeling within 180 days of implementation at the federal level and permit DEQ to adopt federal criteria in lieu of state recyclability labeling requirements.






11. Require clear, standardized recycling labels (chasing arrows, instructions for separating products as needed) for items that are on Oregon's Uniform Statewide Collection List.






12. Create Oregon's Uniform Statewide Collection List after dialogue with California.





13. Mandate embedded recyclability labeling via QR code or other smart-labeling technology.


14. Provide time for packaging producers to prepare for any changes adopted.





15. Require the packaging industry, through Producer Responsibility Organizations, to propose and advocate for federal legislation to remove chasing arrows laws in all 36 remaining states.






16. Producer Responsibility Organizations run statewide ad campaigns to teach Oregonians about label changes.





17. Use the Producer Responsibility Organizations as a tool for removing a non-compliant product from sale in Oregon.






18. Incentivize removal of resin identification code with chasing arrows via eco-modulation.
