

Clean Water State Revolving Fund

What To Know Before Applying

The Clean Water State Revolving Fund helps Oregon communities protect water quality by offering low-interest loans for a variety of clean water projects like wastewater treatment, stormwater management, habitat restoration, and more! As loans are repaid, the funds are reused to support new projects across the state.

Topic	Specific Items to Consider				
Project Eligibility	Activities must enhance, protect, or restore water quality. (OAR 340-054-0005)				
Borrower Eligibility	Only public agencies are eligible borrowers. Public agencies include federally recognized tribal governments, cities, counties, sanitary districts, soil and water conservation districts, irrigation districts, various special districts and certain intergovernmental entities. (OAR 340-054-0010, ORS 468.423)				
Form of Funding	Only loans are available (no grants) with a debt financing structure, which must be repaid with interest by the borrower.				
Debt Reduction Opportunities					
	 Principal Forgiveness. Partial forgiveness of the principal amount borrowed may be available for projects and or borrowers that qualify. See DEQ's Principal Forgiveness webpage for more information. Sponsorship Option. When a point source and nonpoint source application are paired at submission, the "blended" debt service and resulting interest rate for each loan is lower than if submitted separately. 				
Type of Funding	Both state and federal dollars are awarded. A single audit may be required.				
Application/ Loan Types	There are five different application/ loan types. The three most common are: Planning, Point Source, Nonpoint Source. The two additional are: Local Community Loan and Community Development Financial Institution.				
Eligible Expense Types	Eligible expense types for Planning and Design activities generally include engineering, permitting, developing technical drawings, environmental reports, or required additional loan documents. These may also include costs related to Request for Proposals, bidding, up to the preconstruction meeting and prior to initiating construction activities. Note: planning does not include the preparation of detailed bid documents for construction.

Additional	After applying, additional documents are required. All of these must be

Exhibits)	Items can take borrowers from a few months to two years to compile and submit				
	and be deemed complete.				
Receiving	Timing : Funds may only be requested after the loan agreement is signed.				
Funds	It may take several months to compile or develop documents needed for				
	DEQ to draft the loan agreement.				
	Reimbursement Basis: Loan funds are paid to borrower on a reimbursement				
	basis, meaning the borrower must pay project costs or costs must be incurred				
	before requesting payment from the loan.				
	Borrower may need to provide documents such as an IRS W-9, letter (on				
	letterhead) with LGIP account information, banking institution (ACH) details, SAMs				
	registration email or screenshot, and other documents DEQ requires.
