The LWCF is managed by various federal agencies including US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Parks Service and Fish and Wildlife Service. There are a number of grant programs under the LWCF including Federal Land Acquisition Programs by USFS, BLM, NPS, and FWS to support individual land and water acquisition projects from willing sellers. Each bureau has a defined project selection process and criteria. Tribes can collaborate with agencies to support Federal land acquisition projects funded by LWCF.
