<p>A description of the steps the program has taken to decrease the use of restraint and involuntary seclusion.</p>	<p>Monthly meetings are held with clinical staff and leadership staff to review restraints during the month, the circumstances contributing to the restraint/seclusion, and how staff can proceed differently. Results of this discussion are shared in staff meeting. Minutes from this meeting are available to all staff in program and are required reading. Crisis intervention trainers meet with staff monthly during shift planning/shift debrief to discuss crisis intervention and alternatives to restraint, as well as provide feedback around implementation of crisis intervention techniques.</p>
