<p>A description of the steps the program has taken to decrease the use of restraint and involuntary seclusion.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> * The program has provided refresher training and ongoing full CPI training courses focused on the verbal de-escalation techniques, use of a least restrictive intervention and how to identify escalation patterns. * Utilize team meetings, clinical supervision, and program quality improvement forums to discuss individual clients and their patterns to formulate Plan B conversations. * Utilizing a variety of techniques tailored to the individual needs including special programs based upon client needs. * Involved family members in discussions to aide in reducing escalation and increase support to the client. * Discussed each individual case of restraint and seclusion room placement to aide in the reduction. Quarterly decrease was 72% with isolation and seclusion room placements and 45% for interventions year over year. * Reviewed CPS and education on trauma based interventions during each team in-service meetings.
