Meeting Summary
<p>Brian Harvey discussed why he wants to be on the OHCC:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • He will bring new perspectives to the PCA program; he feels like the PCA program is not as well integrated into the OHCC as compared to other programs. It is hard to find out about the PCA program; he would like to bring more attention to that program. He thinks that more utilization of the program could have kept people in their homes for a longer period.

- He has extensive experience on boards: he is on the Portland Advocacy Board; he is on Oregon Recovers. He has applied to be on the OCAA. He helps inform policies on behavioral health.
- He went to OSU and finished in 2010.
- He was assistant to the president to the Portland NAACP. He worked with civil and elected offices at the highest level. He is committed to public service. He wants to fulfill that passion on addiction and mental health.
- He has passion, unique perspective, formal education and public policy experience. He would not be doing it if he did not think the was a good fit.

CPR Report:

Kelly Rosenau, OHCC Workers' Compensation & CPR Program Coordinator, shared some information:

- October thru December claims: number of claims: 12; average age: 42.
- Two highest causes of injury: lifting and helping employer with ambulation.
- Most injured part of body: back and ankle.
- In the past 12 months, only 50 claims have been filed. We hope that injuries have been reported to us.
- We believe that because many PSW provide family support, they may not be filing claims. Or when seeking treatment and asked if the injury happened at work, they say 'no' because they do not think of their supports as 'work'.
- There is one COVID claim. She is back to work.

Training Update and Report

- OHCC Training trained over 1,000 workers through webinar and OnDemand (iLearn) in the month of February. This is our highest attendance record since physical distancing and offering webinars in place of in-person; this is not unique workers but attendees.
- OHCC Training will be offering PDC cohort training. Based on this plan, workers could take all the PDC courses in one month and have enough credits to meet the requirements for the PDC. We are offering the cohorts in different languages. They have good attendance in some non-English-speaking classes.
- The Training and Registry Customer Service team is hitting over 1,000 incoming calls a month. The calls are from both workers and consumers and often involve making referrals to the ERC coordinators.

- General training information: iLearn will not be an option for our three core courses after this Spring. We will be moving these classes to a learning management system that is user friendly and will have features including a certification dashboard. Our training courses will not be moving to WorkDay Oregon.
- OSU PACE Professional and Continuing Education (PACE) learning management system will be hosting our courses and they are working on the programming now. Workers will be able to go to PACE and sign up for classes, cohorts, view the certification dashboard, see assessments and evaluations.
- The classes will be added throughout this pilot process and include on-demand and registration for webinars.

The benefits of a new system include:

- Certification dashboards so workers can follow their progress
- This system will be more user friendly
- The Registry will still be used
- PACE is a pilot
- Changes can be made more quickly
- Tutorials on how to use the system will be provided
- OSU/PACE will handle most of the IT issues
- The timeline is for mid-May
- OHCC will be able to offer more on-demand classes
- It would be all-in-one spot for online training

Miscellaneous

Workers may feel alone in this work environment; a need was identified for a PSW support group. Roberta reported that the COMPASS program provides some peer support networks.

Mentor program. Could something be sent out to PSWs? They are a smaller community. They have family support groups. One of the moms has a support group for autism.

What else can we do to help set up peer-support networks?

Patrick Van Orden will reach out for more resources.
