Tree Nut, Sesame, Soy, and Milk Allergy Notice

AICs with tree nut and sesame allergies, who experience anaphylactic reactions, need to report their allergy to Health Services. Health Services already tracks AICs with milk and soy allergies. Food Services just purchased Toasted Oats (Toasted O's), a cereal we have purchased in the past. This cereal is processed in the same facility as tree nuts (almonds), sesame, soy, and milk derivatives (ingredients made from milk). To avoid exposure, you must ask Foodservice staff what dry cereal is being served then self-select by asking for no dry cereal when Toasted Oats are served. During the Fall-Winter 2025-26 dry cereal is on the menu twice weekly. However, institutions may make changes anytime, without notice.

Want Insurance on Property or Artwork You're Sending Out?

Good news — we can help with that!

If you'd like to add USPS insurance to your outgoing package, just let the Mail Room know **how much** you want it insured for. Please note that insurance is an **additional cost**.

What USPS doesn't always make clear is that **you**, as the sender, **must be** able to provide proof of the item's value **and** its condition at the time it was mailed in order to collect any insurance payment for loss or damage.

Please keep this in mind when requesting insurance.

The Mail Room **cannot** assist with insurance claims — that responsibility belongs solely to the sender/owner of the property being mailed out.

To all my Fellow club members and honored guests of Toastmasters!!

Hello and greetings from this side of the fence! My name is Hector Guerra and I've been a member of Toastmasters High Desert Club for a few months now. I would like to start off this article by thanking the Toastmasters club for all that you do! Especially for "us" the members of the prison club. This is my second time being incarcerated and like always as soon as I lost my freedom and was locked up, I set myself some goals on how I could spend my time wisely and invest in myself: mentally, physically and spiritually. Last time I was locked up I did the A&D treatment program at Powder River. To know more about myself and my addictions. It was the best thing that ever happened to me. In the A&D treatment program you got to get up in front of 50 adults-in-custody (AIC) plus staff and talk about yourself, just like an Ice Breaker. I was so scared and nervous, which is weird because I love to talk and view myself as a gifted and prolific speaker.

Come to find out, I am not as gifted or prolific as I thought I was. The first time I had to go up in front of the whole room and talk, I froze! You would have sworn I didn't know how to speak English and I started speaking in tongues, it was crazy. Long story short, while doing the A&D treatment program I met a fellow AIC and Toastmasters club member, and I loved the way he talked. How he was confident, was able to engage the crowd and make any topic fun! So, I asked him how do you do that and that is when he told me about Toastmasters and its many benefits. When it comes to public speaking and being a leader, this time when I got locked up, I was thankful to go to prison that had the Toastmasters club.

Thanks to Ed, Vikki and Josiah volunteering their time, so we AlC's have a place to learn how to communicate on a higher level and speak more effectively. Toastmaster has taught me so much that I didn't realize there was so much to learn when it comes to being a great public speaker. It is like an art form.

My Toastmasters Origins

It all started with professional development. My name is Josiah Barron, I had started working as the Executive Director for the Chamber of Commerce in Umatilla, Oregon, which as you might guess, included a large amount of public speaking.

Although I had acted in a few plays while in high school and college along with several public speaking and performing arts classes at college, let's just say my presentation delivery as the host of my first community awards banquet was a little choppy. I wouldn't consider myself a shy person, yet I'm also not a super extrovert. I would place myself more towards the middle on the extrovert-introvert scale. Whether at ribbon cuttings for new business or other public occasions there would be times when I stumbled over my words with my thoughts going faster than my mouth, or other times that I would repeat the same exact thing unnecessarily. It was not that I was a bad speaker, it was that my communication needed more honing and development to portray more professionalism and confidence. The Chamber board of directors directed me to find a continuing education source to further develop my communication skills.

Enter Toastmasters. One option for further professional development of speaking skills was attending a public speaking course at the local community college. Second, I also remember that a colleague had mentioned she was a member of a Toastmasters Club, which she had said participation had helped her with both her communication and leadership development. With that thought in mind, I look up Toastmasters International and used their Find the Club feature. There were several clubs in surrounding towns about 30-40 minutes away and one club in Umatilla where I lived. I decided I would go visit the local club, High Desert Toastmasters (HDTM) at Two Rivers Correctional Institution in Umatilla.

HDTM has helped me gain more confidence in communication and become a more concise and smoother communicator over the past two years I have been a part of the club. Table Topics especially has helped me with becoming a better extemporaneous speaker which has been a great benefit for introductions to new business owners and making on the spot speeches at ribbon cuttings. I still have areas for improvement, but that is why it is called continuing education. It is also inspiring to see other club members achieving their personal and professional leadership and communication goals. I am grateful that I joined the HDTM club not only because of my personal and professional growth, but also for all the friendly and dedicated people I have met through this journey.

PRISON RAPE ELIMINATION ACT (PREA INFORMATION)

The Oregon Department of Corrections (ODOC) has a zero-tolerance policy for sexual abuse, sexual harassment and for retaliation for reporting an incident. You may report in person to any staff, through an inmate communication, through the grievance system, by calling the PREA hotline by dialing 9 from any inmate phone.

Filing an Anonymous PREA Report

If you are uneasy about filing a PREA allegation, you may file an anonymous report with an outside agency.

You may write to:

Please indicate in the beginning of your letter you are filing a PREA allegation and you are requesting to remain anonymous. The Governor's Office will refer all anonymous allegations to the DOC PREA Coordinator to assure an investigation is completed based off the information that is provided.

Community-Based PREA Advocacy (Support) Program

ODOC has partnered with community based, confidential advocates of sexual abuse victims to provide services to inmates. Inmates at ODOC who have experienced sexual abuse may reach a community-based advocate by dialing 711 inmate telephone systems, or may request a private call through the PREA Compliance Manager at the facility. Advocates provide victims of sexual abuse information about their options, resources, information and emotional support. There is no charge for calls to advocates.

Role of an Advocate:

- Provide confidential support and crisis intervention
- Inform you about the investigation and medical examination process
- Educate you about healing from sexual abuse
- Offer resources and referrals

Advocates will:

- Not tell you what to do
- Not communicate with the institution unless you request them to do so and sign a release
- Not provide legal advice

Community-based advocacy centers provide sexual abuse support to people of all genders. Community-based advocates will not report unless you request them to do so and if you sign a release of information.

DOC is committed to providing inmates with avenues to seek assistance. Below are additional resources:

The community-based advocacy crisis line is for individuals needing assistance coping with sexual abuse related issues and should not be used for other purposes.

Telephone calls and mail with community-based advocacy centers is considered privileged communication and will be handled similar to legal calls/official mail.
