Purpose

The Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) requires each facility to collect and review data “...in order to assess and improve the effectiveness of its sexual abuse prevention, detection, and response policies, practices, and training (Standard 115.88 a).”

This overview is intended to:

- Identify problem areas and corrective action taken on an ongoing basis for each facility and the agency as a whole;
- Compare the current year’s data and corrective actions with data from prior years; and
- Assess the agency’s progress in addressing sexual abuse.

This report provides current information for 2024, along with historical information for calendar years 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023.

Background

PREA was signed into federal law in September 2003, following unanimous bipartisan congressional support. The Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) was an early adopter of the standards developed under PREA. Since its passage, DOC has been aggressive in implementing PREA strategies.

The purpose of the act was to “provide for the analysis of the incidence and effects of prison rape in federal, state, and local institutions and to provide information, resources, recommendations, and funding to protect individuals from prison rape (Prison Rape Elimination Act, 2003).” PREA seeks to establish a zero-tolerance policy regarding rape and sexual abuse in federal, state, county, and city correctional systems including prisons, jails, police lockups, and other confinement facilities for adults and juveniles. PREA mandated the publication of standards to ensure compliance and to improve prevention, detection, and response strategies in addressing sexual abuse and assault.

The final rule/standards were published in the federal register on June 20, 2012, and became effective on August 20, 2012. The standards require annual audits of one-third of the facilities under the agency’s jurisdiction, along with Governor’s certification of statewide compliance in all facilities under the operational control of the state’s executive branch, including private facilities operated on behalf of the executive branch to house offenders. Failure to comply with the standards will result in a loss of five percent of identified federal grant funding.

Agency Achievement/Corrective Actions in 2024

The Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) has zero-tolerance for sexual harassment, sexual abuse, and retaliation for reporting an incident or cooperating with an investigation. Because the PREA standards require a third of DOC's facilities to be audited every audit cycle year, every facility is audited once every three years. Furthermore, the Governor must certify the level of compliance with every agency under their direct control. The following agency progress was made in 2024 to reduce sexual abuse, increase sexual safety, and meet federal PREA standards:

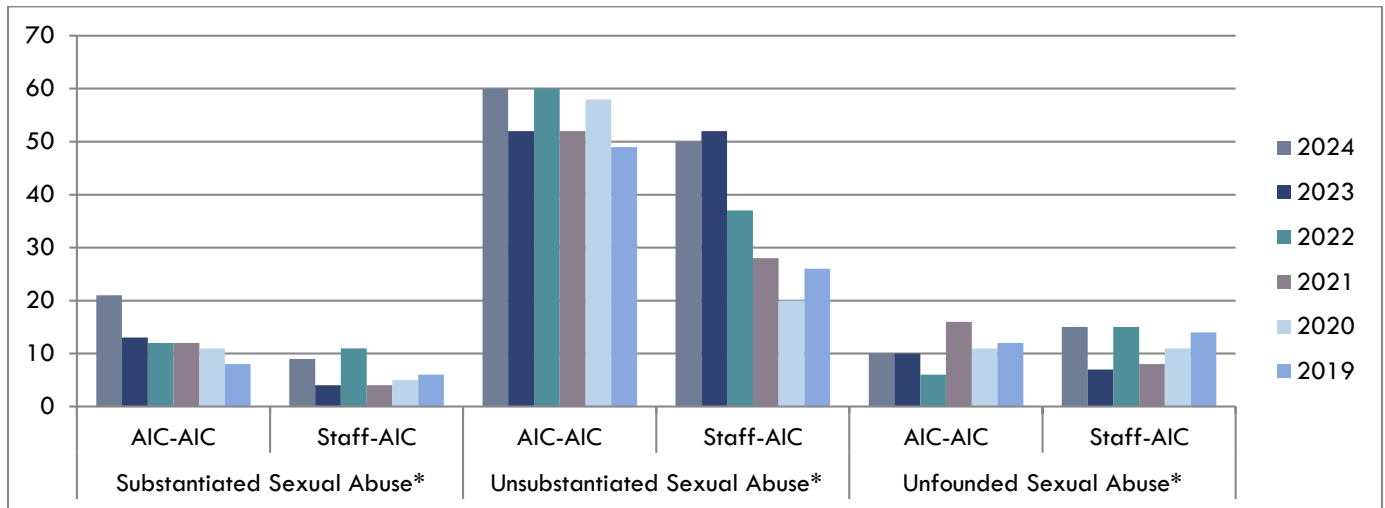
- Received five national PREA audits (CCCF, DRCI, OSCI, CRCI and SCI) and prepared each facility prior to the onsite audit
- Provided four PREA audits in other states as part of the circular auditing agreement with the Western States Consortium
- Provided PREA online annual training to all employees
- Provided training to new PREA Compliance Managers (PCMs) and Sexual Abuse Liaisons (SALs)
- Provided in-person training to new Sexual Abuse Response Team (SART) members
- Updated Adult in Custody (AIC) PREA handbook information in Russian, Spanish, Chuukese, and English
- Updated the PREA investigative report template to include clarity regarding volunteer/contractor notifications, notifications when an AIC is a vulnerable adult under state law, and clarification around case closures
- Implemented a final approval process for all SART investigative reports to include a PREA Headquarters (HQ) review/approval
- Implemented a PREA reporting mechanism on all AIC tablets, which reports directly to the Office of the Inspector General
- Implemented an online PREA Compliance Manager training
- Implemented an online Sexual Abuse Response Team training
- Hosted a two-day face-to-face PREA Compliance Manager and Sexual Abuse Liaison meeting, which included several opportunities for training, including TORT claims, Advocacy, Transgender Cultural Fluency, and PREA investigations

- Participated on the National PREA Coordinators Working Group, and in the National PREA Coordinators Conference with planning, preparation, and facilitated lectures
- Participated on the Gender Informed Practices Assessment (GIPA) PREA Workgroup
- Updated the Grievance Rule regarding PREA allegations
- Applied for and received one federal PREA-related grant, accomplishing an update to the PREA automation system to include improvements to the following modules:
 - PREA Incident Tracking
 - PREA Retaliation Monitoring
 - PREA Incident Reviews
 - PREA Risk Screening
 - Various new PREA reports
 - Transgender/Intersex, and gender-diverse tracking
- Applied for and received one state level grant which allowed DOC to send staff to be trained on trauma-informed practices
- Created and distributed SART Pins for SART members to wear and be recognized by staff and AICs

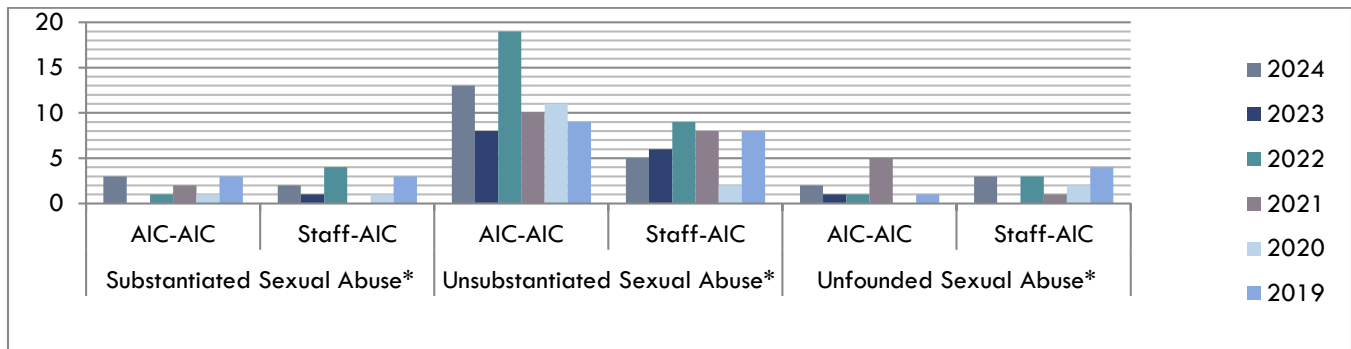

Coffee Creek Correctional Facility (CCCF)

CCCF is a multi-custody prison located in Wilsonville. The facility has the capacity for up to 1,795 AICs. The prison has cell and dormitory housing, AIC work programs, skills training, treatment programs, health services, religious services, physical plant, a central records unit, and administrative areas. In addition, CCCF houses the state's intake center, which provides intake and evaluation of all AICs committed to state custody by the courts. The intake center houses approximately 400 AICs. CCCF is located on 108 acres. CCCF's co-located minimum facility opened in 2001, and the medium facility opened in 2002.

- Received the onsite portion of a national PREA audit

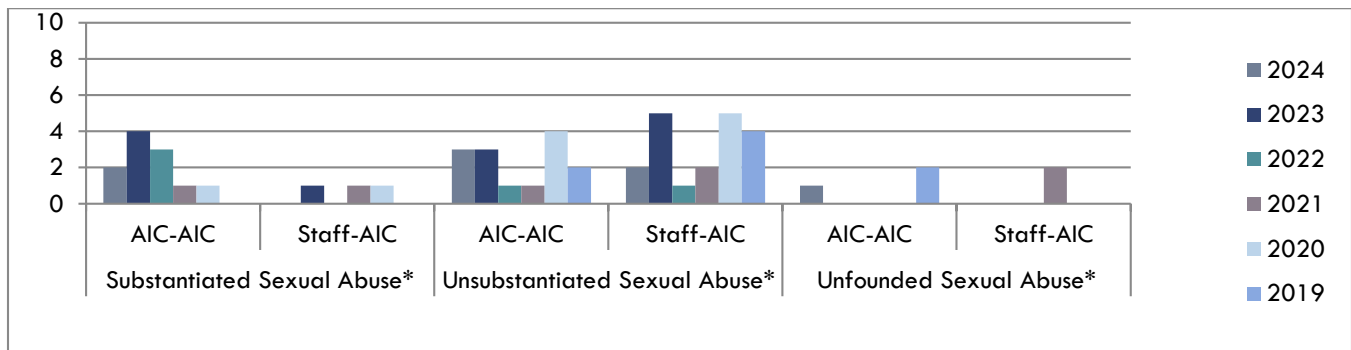

Columbia River Correctional Institution (CRCI)

CRCI is a minimum-custody facility located in Portland. The facility has the capacity for up to 558 AICs who are within four years of release. Located in the largest metropolitan area of the state, this facility is focused on cognitive programming, work programs, and preparing AICs for return to the community. CRCI is home to a 61-bed alcohol and drug Alternative Incarceration Program (AIP). Individuals who successfully complete this 180-day, in-prison program are released to the community for a 90-day transitional leave period. Individuals who successfully complete the transitional leave period are granted a reduction in their sentence and move to post-prison supervision. CRCI is located on a 26-acre site in northeast Portland and officially opened in September 1990.

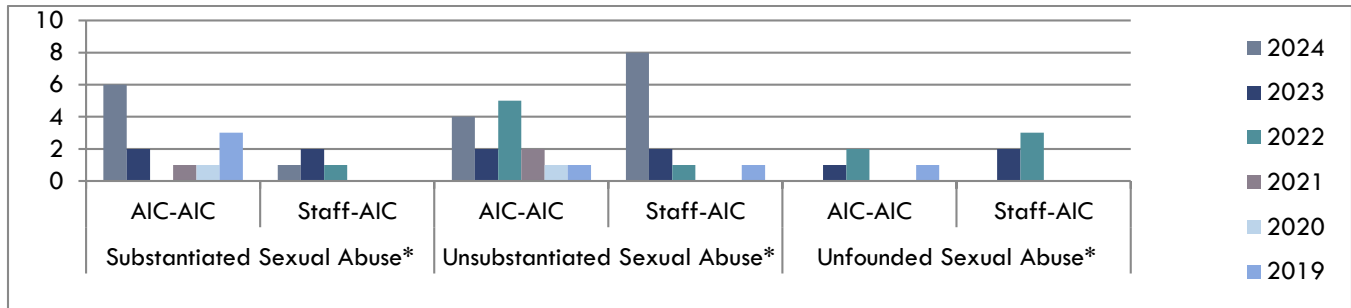

Deer Ridge Correctional Institution (DRCI)

Deer Ridge Correctional Institution (DRCI) is located four miles east of Madras in central Oregon. The facility has the capacity for up to 899 AICs. DRCI provides a range of correctional programs and services including education and trades programs, mental health treatment, cognitive and parenting programs, and institution work crews. Construction began in October 2005 with the first minimum-security adults in custody (AICs) arriving in September 2007. DRCI is the largest minimum-custody facility.

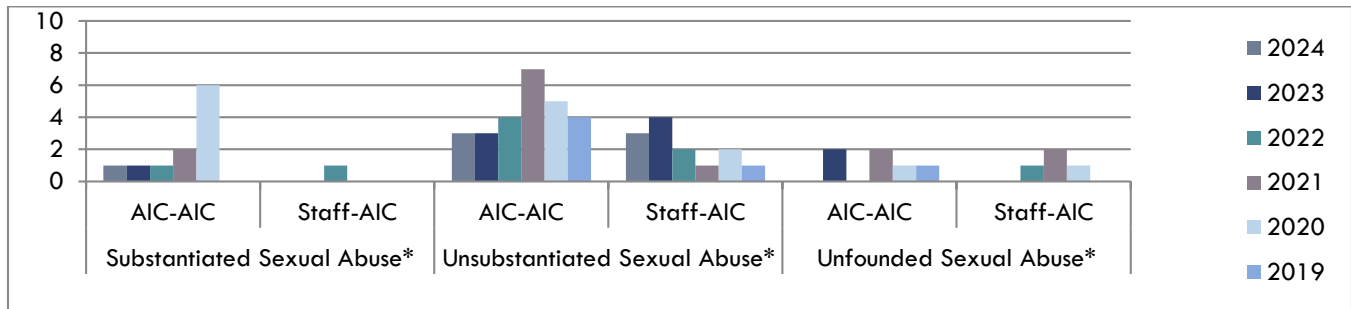

Eastern Oregon Correctional Institution (EOCI)

EOCI is a medium-custody prison in Pendleton. The facility has the capacity for up to 1,257 AICs. The institution is known for its Oregon Corrections Enterprises industries, including a garment factory which produces Prison Blues®, whose products are sold in and outside the United States. Other industries include embroidery, a call center, and commercial laundry facilities. EOCI provides a range of correctional programs and services including education, drug and alcohol treatment, mental health treatment, religious services, and AIC work opportunities. The buildings that comprise EOCI were constructed on 53 acres in 1912 and 1913 and originally used as a state mental hospital. After two years of renovation, EOCI received its first AICs in June 1985.

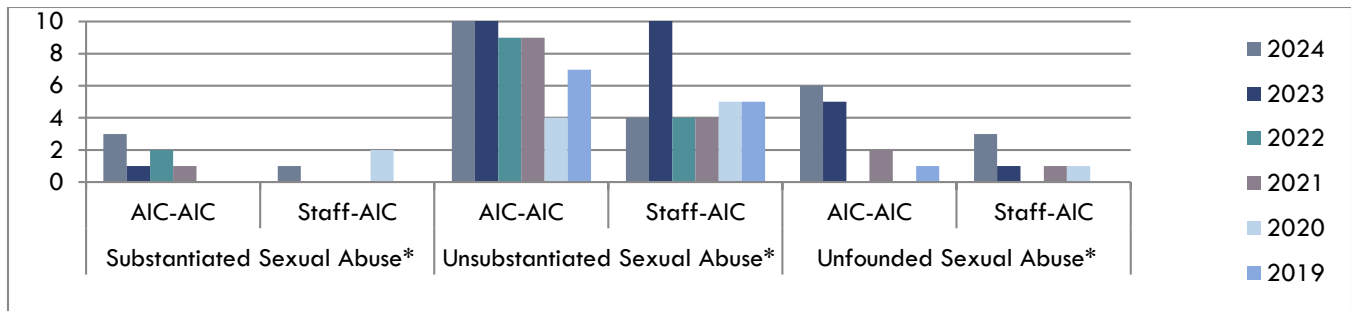

Oregon State Correctional Institution (OSCI)

OSCI is a multi-custody prison located in Salem. The facility has the capacity for up to 888 AICs. It provides a range of correctional services and programs including education, drug and alcohol treatment, mental health treatment, religious services, work opportunities, and transition planning. OSCI participates in prison industries with Oregon Corrections Enterprises, including a print shop and a contact center. OSCI was established by action of the 1955 Legislature and became fully operational on June 1, 1959.

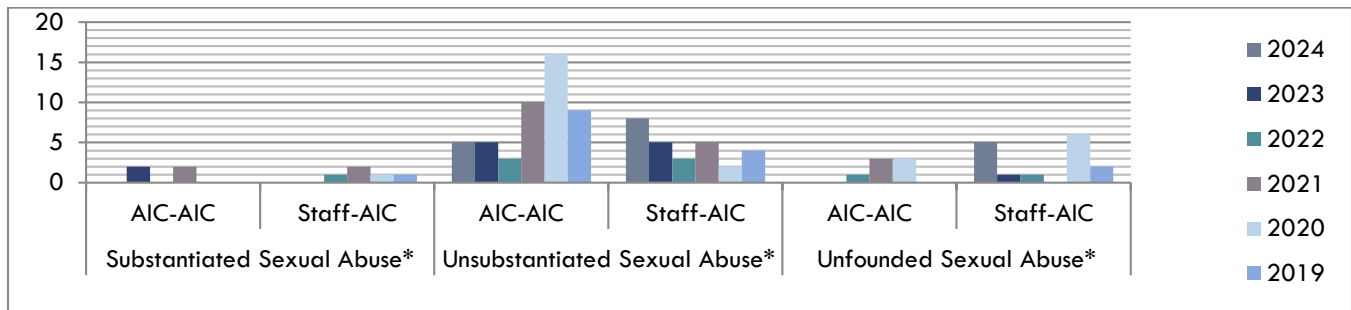

Oregon State Penitentiary (OSP)

OSP is a multi-custody facility housing Oregon's only maximum-security individuals. Located in Salem, the facility has the capacity for up to 2,000 AICs. OSP is surrounded by a 25-foot-high wall with ten towers. The facility has multiple special housing units including disciplinary segregation, behavioral health, and an infirmary with hospice services and 24-hour nursing care. OSP provides work opportunities for AICs with Oregon Corrections Enterprises including a furniture factory, laundry, metal shop, and contact center. It provides a range of correctional programs and services including education, work-based education, and pre-release services. OSP is located on 194 acres and was established in 1866. Until 1959, it was Oregon's only prison.

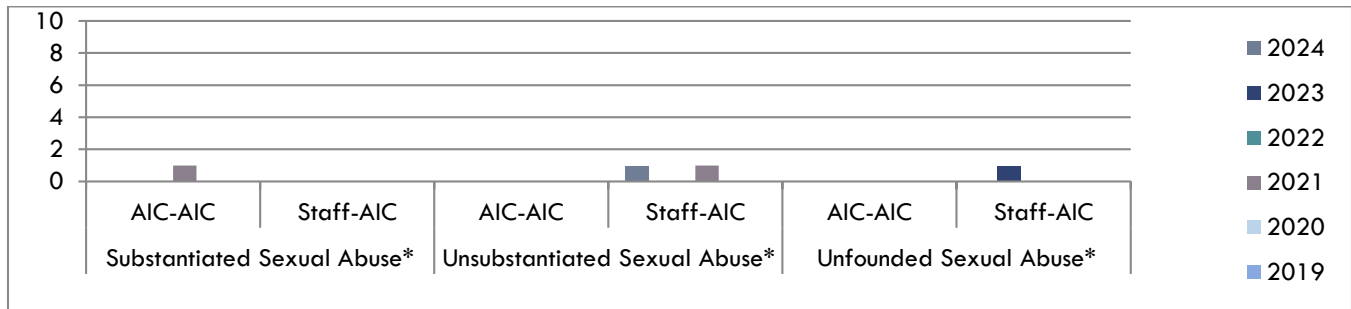

Powder River Correctional Facility (PRCF)

PRCF is a minimum-custody prison in Baker City. The facility has the capacity for up to 316 AICs who are within four years of release. PRCF serves as a transition and re-entry facility and is focused on cognitive programming, work programs, and preparing AICs for return to the community. PRCF is home to the 128-bed [New Directions Inc.](#) (drug and alcohol treatment) Alternative Incarceration Program. Individuals who successfully complete this 180-day, in-prison program are released to the community for a 90-day transitional leave period. Individuals who successfully complete the transitional leave period are granted a reduction in their sentence and move to post-prison supervision. PRCF is located on nine acres and opened in November 1989.

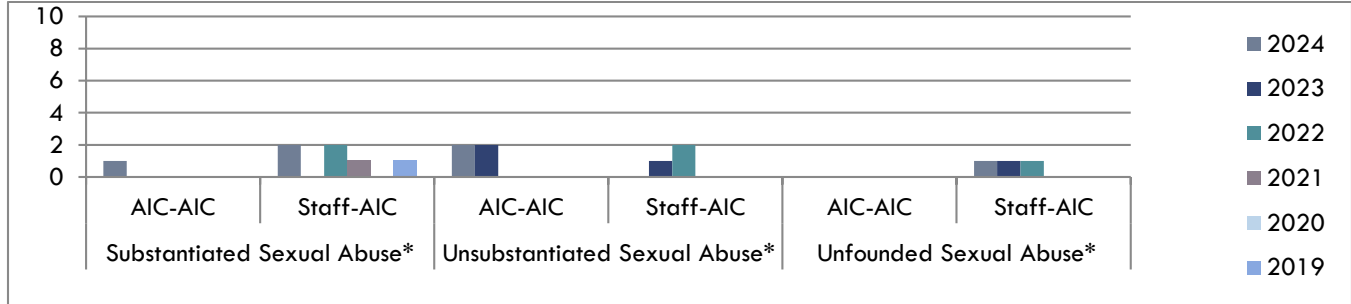

Santiam Correctional Institution (SCI)

SCI is a minimum-custody prison in Salem. The facility has the capacity for up to 440 AICs who are within four years of release. The facility concentrates on work opportunities, most of which are in the form of work crews contracting with state agencies, local organizations, and private industries within a 60-mile radius of Salem. SCI provides a range of other correctional programs and services including education, transition programs, and religious services. SCI is located on 12 acres and was built in 1946. The building was originally used as an annex to the Oregon State Hospital for mental health patients. It was used for a variety of correctional purposes until 1990, when it opened as SCI.

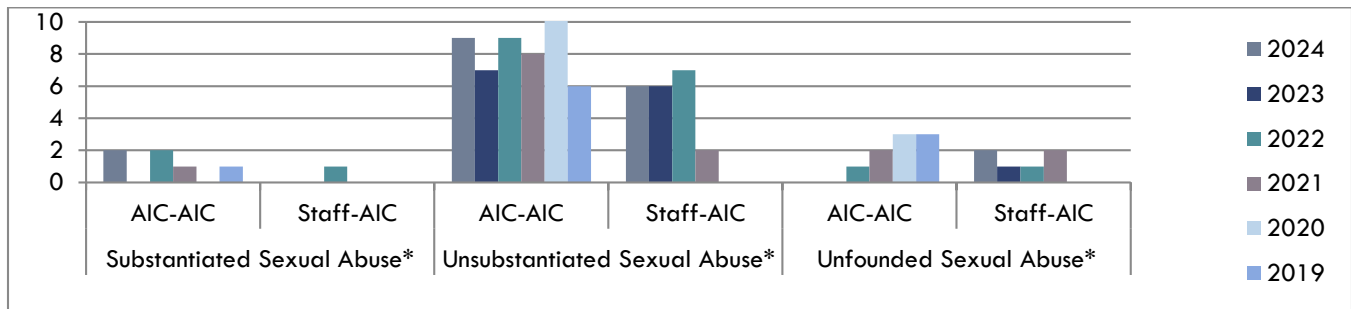

Snake River Correctional Institution (SRCI)

SRCI is a multi-custody prison in Ontario. The facility has the capacity for up to 3,059 AICs and is the largest correctional institution in the state. SRCI has multiple special housing units including disciplinary segregation, intensive management, infirmary/hospice with 24-hour nursing care, and an administrative segregation unit. SRCI provides work opportunities for AICs with Oregon Corrections Enterprises including a contact center, laundry, and sign shop. SRCI specializes in incentive housing, specialized housing, AICs with mental health/medical vulnerabilities, education and trades programs, cognitive, and parenting programs. SRCI is located on 538 acres and opened in 1991.

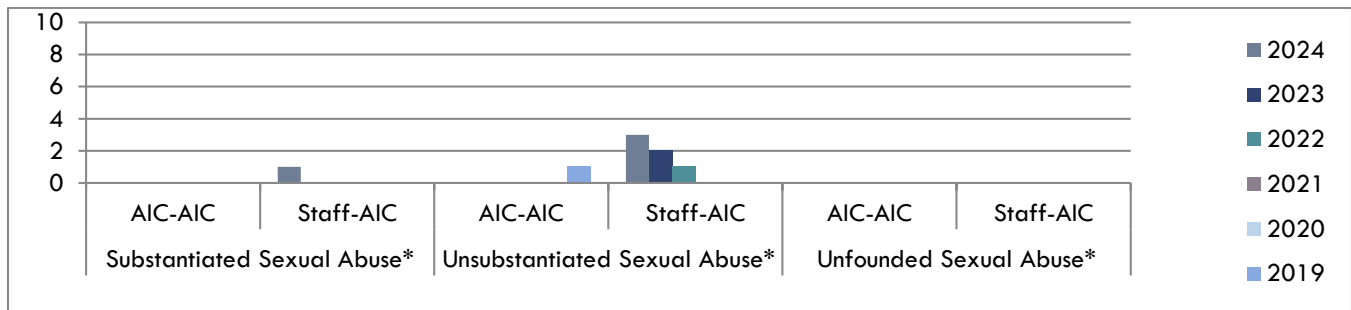

South Fork Forest Camp (SFFC)

SFFC is a minimum-security work camp with the capacity to house 204 AICs who are within four years of release. Part of SFFC's mission is to supply a ready work force to combat forest or wildfires throughout the state. Crews provide critical support for statewide fire operations, recreation, and reforestation as well as for special projects such as sign making, metal fabrication, and tool/equipment repair. SFFC was established in 1951, is a satellite facility to CRCI, and is managed jointly with the Oregon Department of Forestry. It is located approximately 28 miles east of Tillamook off Highway 6 along the Wilson River in the Tillamook Forest and is located on 28 acres.

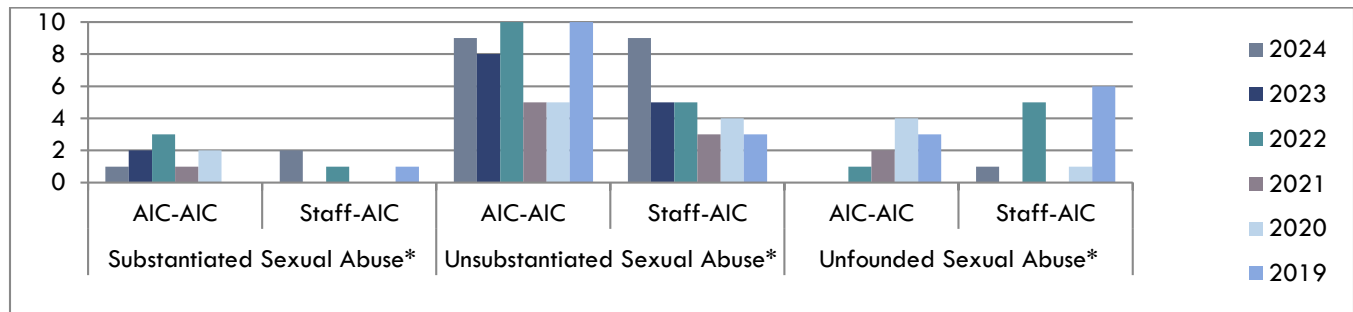

Two Rivers Correctional Institution (TRCI)

TRCI is a multi-custody prison in Umatilla with the capacity to house 1768 AICs. TRCI participates in prison industries with Oregon Corrections Enterprises including institution and industrial laundry, mattress manufacturing, and sewing. The facility provides a range of correctional programs and services including education, religious services, and behavioral health services. TRCI's AIC work crews repair and clean irrigation ditches, maintain local baseball fields, and work with local cities and the Hermiston School District. TRCI is located on 280 acres and opened in March 2000.

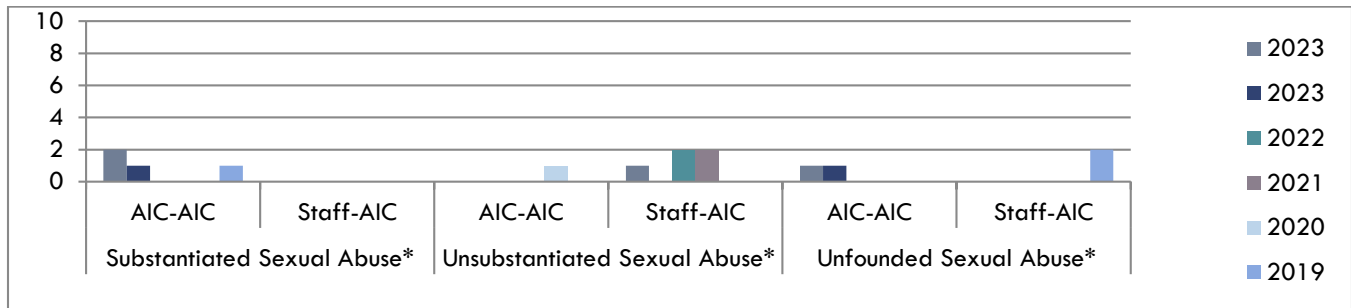

Warner Creek Correctional Facility (WCCF)

WCCF is a minimum-custody prison in Lakeview. The facility has the capacity for up to 406 AICs who are within four years of release. WCCF provides a range of correctional programs and services including education, transitional programs, religious services, and work crews. WCCF has a contact center onsite through Oregon Corrections Enterprises. WCCF opened in September 2005. It received the State Energy Efficiency Design (SEED) award in May 2008 for its progress in design efficiency. The most energy-efficient element at WCCF is the use of geothermal energy, providing 100 percent of the hot water to the facility.

Definitions

AIC-AIC Sexual Abuse:

Sexual abuse of an adult in custody (AIC), detainee, or resident by another AIC, detainee, or resident includes any of the following acts if the victim does not consent, is coerced into such act by overt or implied threats of violence, or is unable to consent or refuse:

- (1) Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight;
- (2) Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva, or anus;
- (3) Penetration of the anal or genital opening of another person, however slight, by a hand, finger, object, or other instrument; and
- (4) Any other intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or the buttocks of another person, excluding contact incidental to a physical altercation.

Staff-AIC Sexual Abuse:

Sexual abuse of an AIC, detainee, or resident by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer includes any of the following acts with or without consent of the AIC, detainee, or resident:

- (1) Contact between the penis and the vulva or the penis and the anus, including penetration, however slight;
- (2) Contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva, or anus;
- (3) Contact between the mouth and any body part where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire;
- (4) Penetration of the anal or genital opening, however slight, by a hand, finger, object, or other instrument, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire;
- (5) Any other intentional contact, either directly or through the clothing, of or with the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or the buttocks, that is unrelated to official duties or where the staff member, contractor, or volunteer has the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire;
- (6) Any attempt, threat, or request by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer to engage in the activities described in paragraphs (1)-(5) of this section;
- (7) Any display by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer of his or her uncovered genitalia, buttocks, or breast in the presence of an AIC, detainee, or resident; and
- (8) Voyeurism by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer.
 - Voyeurism by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer means an invasion of privacy of an AIC, detainee, or resident by staff for reasons unrelated to official duties, such as peering at an AIC who is using a toilet in their cell to perform bodily functions; requiring an AIC to expose their buttocks, genitals, or breasts; or taking images of all or part of an AIC's naked body or of an AIC performing bodily functions.

AIC-AIC Sexual Harassment:

Repeated and unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or verbal comments, gestures, or actions of a derogatory or offensive sexual nature by one AIC, detainee, or resident directed toward another

Staff-AIC Harassment:

Repeated verbal comments or gestures of a sexual nature to an AIC, detainee, or resident by a staff member, contractor, or volunteer, including demeaning references to gender, sexually suggestive or derogatory comments about body or clothing, or obscene language or gestures.

Substantiated: An allegation that was investigated and determined to have occurred.

Unsubstantiated: An allegation that was investigated and produced insufficient evidence to make a final determination as to whether or not the event occurred.

Unfounded: An allegation that was investigated and determined to not have occurred.

Adult in Custody (AIC): Per the passage of House Bill (HB) 3146, all statutory references to the word “inmate” were changed to “adult in custody (AIC).”
