In the late 1930's the Jefferson movement again became a popular cause.

On December 4, 1941, the Yreka courthouse was bursting with advocates of the "Jefferson" movement. Judge Childe, one of the movement's most vigorous leaders, was formally inaugurated as Governor. Handbills, windshield stickers, & a massive advertising campaign brought notoriety to the well laid plans of the movement. The inauguration, parade, & other events were filmed for release to movie theaters. The "State of Jefferson" campaign was well on its way & gaining momentum when the fateful attack on Pearl Harbor changed forever the course of history.

The area of the state of Jefferson provides a wider variety of outdoor splendor than any other state—the Pacific Ocean, the magnificent redwoods, fabulous fishing, hunting & trips into the scenic wilderness areas. In the winter, fantastic skiing and snowmobiling are available. Rafting & other river sports & activities, the par mutual race track, many senior citizen programs, excellent library facilities, and many other activities provide whatever kind of entertainment you're seeking. The towns of Ashland & Jacksonville, among many others are sites of fascinating historical information—the excellent Shakespearean plays have become world famous. And don't forget Mount Shasta, the land of the friendly Big Foot.

We cannot help but ponder whether the movement to create "Jefferson" as the 49th state might have succeeded had it not been for the interruption of World War II.
