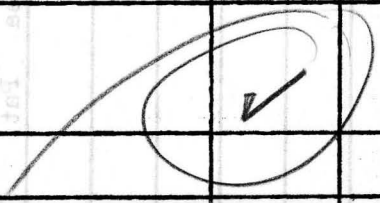

## BAISLEY-ELKHORN MINE

### BAISLEY DISTRICT:

Is 13 miles from Baker on the Union Pacific and Old Oregon Trail. Mine was located in 1880, and was sold to the Baisley-Elkhorn Company. Consists of 14 lode claims, 9 patented, 5 unpatented, recorded in Baker county. Located in high mountain area; country rock is granite with argillite hanging walls, and argillite foot; vein strata bearing northeast and southwest; width 7 feet, length 900 feet. Minerals are gold, silver and other precious minerals, assays at from a trace to \$500 per ton. Water is ample from tunnel; power available from the Eastern Oregon Light and Power Company; timber on claims. Mine is now being developed from a lower tunnel; equipped with water wheel, compressor, power drills, cars, track and mining tools. There are several thousand feet of tunnels and a raise of 400 feet. Operated for years from what is known as the upper workings. Has large past production, figure not available. Owners are John Schmidt and the Pollman Estate, Baker, Oregon (Prescott--6/1/37).

## BAISLEY-ELKHORN MINE

*BALD MT.-  
ELKHORN R  
ROCK CR DIST.*

*The Baisley-Elkhorn mine, the property of Wm. Pollman, of Baker, Oregon, has produced approximately \$1,000,000. It was closed in 1907 and is now inaccessible.*

The country rock is granodiorite. The vein strikes northeast and is nearly vertical. The vein filling is composed of altered fragments of granodiorite, quartz and some calcite. The ore minerals named in the order of importance are pyrite, sphalerite, galena, chalcopyrite and occasionally ruby silver. About 25 per cent of the gold is free. The two pay shoots were from 2 to 10 feet wide, one 150 feet long and the other 850 feet long.
