Dear Mr. Ramp:

I wish to thank you somewhat tardily for your kind letter of November 29, 1966. I had inquired about the possibility of our going together to the Brushy Butte area.

I have delayed writing you because I have been desirous of doing more work at the claim sites so that there will be more to observe and check when we go up together. I have also been spending a good deal of time doing paper research work in the Clerk's office at the Court House.

I have been encouraged by the results so far in the actual mining area.

When we do get together it would be wiser to meet at or near the Dixonville Store because the best approach to the Brushy Butte area at this time of year is at the northwest. The owner of the land to the southeast will not let people up his road at this time of year, and I have never been over the southern approach which is much longer over roads of doubtful passability.

Dear Dr. Lenci:

My work in the Wilderness area has delayed getting this information to you.

The sample taken across the mineralized zone exposed by the open cut above the Panama tunnel assayed 7.9% copper, and the sample I took from your discovery cut on the ridge above assayed 1.45% copper. A copy of the assay report is enclosed for your records.

Also enclosed is a Zerox copy of a portion of Diller's geologic map of the Roseburg quadrangle on which you can spot a few of the prospects in the Brushy Butte area. I have colored in the serpentine areas as I think they are in some way related to the copper occurrences.

I haven't tried to write up a report on the area as we have too little information. Perhaps some time in the future if you continue to explore in the area and find some promising occurrences another visit would be advisable.
