EQUIPMENT ON PROPERTY

Developing Cinnabar— W. C. Fellows of Sumpter and Donald Kempfer, of Unity, are developing a cinnabar showing on Greenhorn mountain. The vein has been opened on the surface and they are now driving a lower tunnel to develop the ore. Brick and material for a 10-ton retort has been hauled to the property and will be assembled ready for operating by spring. Fellows and Kempfer, along with Milton Reichert, have organized the Paramount Quicksilver Mine, Inc., under which title the work is being carried. The company offices are in Baker with the law firm of Hallock, Donald and Banta.

The Paramount Quicksilver, Inc., is carrying on development work in the Greenhorn Mountains, Grant County, Oregon, and equipment for a 10-ton retort is on the ground awaiting installation in the spring. A tunnel is being driven to open a vein on which only surface work has been done. W. C. Fellows of Sumpter and Donald Kempfer of Whitney organized the company recently with Milton Reichert.

Quicksilver Plant Goes In at Paramount Mine

Paramount Cinnabar Corporation, a new company formed to develop a cinnabar deposit discovered by Milton S. Reichert on the old Golden Fleece property in the Greenhorn District of the Blue Mountains of Oregon, early in January was installing the first retort unit of its reduction plant.

This equipment will be able to handle about 5 tons of ore daily, and can be expanded as required. Mr. Reichert, who visited his old home in Seattle over the holidays, reported that the cinnabar occurs in a serpentine formation and that the vein is opened by a shallow shaft which cuts the dipping vein some 150' below the outcrop. An adit 150' lower vertically is being driven 100' to cut the downward extension of the vein.

Some exceptionally high values have been found in the upper portion of the vein.

The property is at 6,500' elevation in a region of heavy snowfall and is very difficult of access in winter. It is only a short distance from the old Morning, Red Boy and several other gold properties which formerly gave very rich yields.
