PUEBLO MINING CO. INC. Pueblo District

Harney County

OWNERS: Pueblo Mining Co. Inc., an Oregon stock company with headquarters at Condon, Oregon. President, Judge James D. Burns, Condon, Oregon; vice president: ~~Silver~~ Cooney; secretary-treasurer: M. Mackay, attorney, Condon, Oregon. There are fifty-three active members. The heaviest stockholders are Gerald Burns, Father T. J. P. Brady, Jack Eaton, Emmett Smith, and William Cooney.

LOCATION: About ten miles south of Fields, Oregon on Pueblo Mountain. It is located in sections 8, 9, 16, and 7. T. 40 S.; R. 35 E. W. M. There is a good dirt road to the property, which leaves the main road at Catlow's Ranch.

AREA: Thirteen patented claims and two unpatented claims. The patented claims are the Old Crow, Ravin, Surprise, Mountain Pass, Prince of Peace, Badger, Gold Basin, Sage Hen, Gold Horn, Sun Shine, Beagle, Lady Bates and Big Blue. The unpatented claims are the Shamrock and Robert Emmett.

HISTORY: Located by a Mr. Brown, now deceased, in 1916. There is an old arrastre on the Mountain Pass claim. Several thousands dollars of free gold ore is said to have been milled.
In 1925 the Pueblo Mining Co. Inc. bought the mine from Mr. Brown for \$8000 cash. Permission to sell \$25,000 worth of stock was granted by the state. *All of the stock has not been issued, as there have been no buyers. At the present time no work is being done on the claims.

DEVELOPMENT: There are two cross cuts which are each said to be several hundred feet in length. These, however, were inaccessible due to caves at the portals. Two 20 foot shafts and numerous cuts constitute the only accessible workings.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION: The property is located at an elevation of 7000 feet on the rugged Pueblo Mountain. No timber is available, but there is enough water for domestic purposes and prospecting. Snow fall in winter is moderate.
There are three cabins and a mill building on the property. All other equipment has been removed.

GEOLOGY: The country rock is a schist, similar to that found in the Connor Creek Area. There are two parallel quartz stringers averaging three inches in width. These are about fifty feet apart, strike north and south and dip west. Minor amounts of pyrite, chalcopyrite and malachite is associated with the quartz. Due to snow and the fact that the portals of the two cross cuts were caved, very little sampling could be done. However four samples were taken, two from cuts and one from each dump at the cross-cuts. These ran from a trace to fifteen dollars.

REMARKS: No appraisal could be made of the property due to the inaccessibility of the workings. However, the veins are narrow and the mine is ninety miles from supplies.
