Dear Mr. Radcliffe:

I am returning your tracing of the upper levels of the Black Bear tunnels, and thank you very much for the loan of this material. In answer to your questions about amalgam, I've checked with Mr. Lewis and the literature.

Soft amalgam that goes thru chamois is characteristic of very fine gold. About the easiest and most satisfactory way to clean such amalgam, and recover the gold, is to retort it. The tendency of the amalgam to be soft at higher temperatures and fairly stiff at lower temperatures is a characteristic of the material.

The green stain on your plates results from the copper in the plate. That is the reason why some people prefer to use silver plated plates. The stain arises from a number of conditions; one may be the chemical nature of the mill water. As nearly as I can determine, about the only thing you can do with your plate is to use acid to clean it, as you have been.

This letter will be held until Mr. Lewis has the assays on the material you brought in for me are ready. I'll be back your way later in the spring to check with you on the operation. With best wishes, I am
