High-Grade Ore Hit

Striking high-grade in their old Bunker Hill mine at Galice, Ore., this spring, Virgil Hill and William Robertson brought two bars of gold aggregating 600 oz. to Grants Pass early in April. They said that the gold was the result of five-and-a-half day's mining.

The mine is an old one, on which they worked for a time last fall. Resuming early this spring, they shortly struck spectacular ore.

A ledge of rich gold ore is stated to have been opened in the **Bunker Hill** or Robertson mine 12 miles from Galice, Oregon. William Robertson of Galice and Virgil E. Hull are the owners of the property. The

cyanide mill on the ground is being operated by Vivian E. Hughes and J. B. Fanchini.

An order for \$65,000 of mining equipment has been made by the Penn Mining Syndicate to be installed at the Robertson Mine before the winter season. The equipment will increase the present 75-ton mill to a 500-ton mill capacity in 24 hours. "

Cyanide Plant Location Moved

A cyanide plant located on Galls creek, and operated by V. E. Hughes and J. B. Fanchini, is being moved to Bunker Hill mine, owned by Bill Robertson, Mr. Hughes reported in Grants Pass on Friday.

The two partners will operate the cyanide plant at the Bunker Hill mine about 12 miles from Galice and then later install another plant in California.

Rich gold strikes are reported at the Robertson mine. K. Dean Butler, manager, in town to exhibit specimens of high grade ore from the mine, is called back to the mine by news of another strike, richer than any previously reported.

On February 3

Sixty-five pounds of gold ore from the latest strike at the

Robertson mine, containing gold valued at approximately \$7,000, creates a near-sensation when exhibited in Grants Pass by K. Dean Butler, manager for the Robertson Gold Mining Co.
