Dear Mr. French:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 7 and the information contained.

It is likely that we may have an engineer in your area in the future. However, it would give us a better basis for judging the extent of our interest if you could get the State Geologist in Grants Pass to make an examination and a preliminary report on your property. They do this free of charge, and we would respect their opinion as to size, etc.

In the meantime, I would like to know what type of deal you are asking on the property. Normally, iron ore of marketable grade (plus 60% iron) is handled on a royalty basis of 25¢ to 40¢ per long ton as it is sold and shipped.

I would need to know roughly what you want for the property under a lease or purchase, before we would examine it. Also, let me know if you are successful in getting the State Geologist to examine your property.
