SPOKANE MEN ACQUIRE CAMP CARSON MINES

Old Mining Camp Will Be Re-oponed for Large Scale Work

HARRY HOWELL TO MANAGE OPERATION

Reservoirs for Storing the Flood Waters Planned to Increase Hydraulic Operation.

New life is promised for Camp Carson, a famous old mining camp near the headwaters of the Grande Ronde river in Union county, northwest of Baker.

It became known the first of the week that the Camp Carson properties have been bonded to a group of Spokane people who will carry on operations there this year.

The work will be continued in the large pit opened last year in making a test of the placer gravels. The work will be in charge of Harry Howell, who has operated the mines the past two years. Mr. Howell is an experienced hydraulic miner, who has operated many years in Alaska.

While the work this year will be with the present set-up of ditches and equipment the parties taking over the property have plans for impounding the waters in reservoirs to increase the water for piping and washing the gravel. Surveys have been made which show possibility of storing sufficient water for making Camp Carson the largest hydraulic mining operation in Eastern Oregon.

Little Clear Creek, which is included in the Camp Carson properties, is also included in the contract with the Spokane parties, and they plan to work this with a dragline shovel. Tests that have been made of the ground indicate the ground can be successfully handled in this manner.

When it comes to getting into some of the mining camps in the high altifides where there are deep snow banks a difficult time may be expected. This was the case with Harry Howell last week in taking in supplies to the Camp Carson placer mines near the head of the Grande Ronde river.

He started from La Grande with a caterpillar tractor going via Starkey. At one time the machine was stuck in mud and snow for 19 hours, and with snow and rain storms during the rip he found plenty of trouble. However, he tanded at the mine with his equipment and is now getting ready to take up the operation where it was stopped when snow came last fall.

It is planned to enlarge the operation at Camp Carson by increasing the capacity of the ditches and reservoiring water in lakes near the property. When this is done Camp Carson will be one of the largest hydraulic operations in the state.

Camp Carson Old Channel Explored

Harry Howell of La Grande was in Baker Monday making preliminary arrangements for surveys in the vicinity of old Camp Carson placer ground looking toward development of water resources sufficient to mine by hydraulics.

Howell, who is interested with Spokane men in the project has had four men on the ground since early in the year. Last year in a 30-days run with natural water supplies he tested various places to the extent of 1800 yards and says he recovered \$1000: This season, the test run is proving the same results he indicated

season, the test run is proving the same results, he indicated.

The operator believes gravel volume at Camp Carson in the old Blue channel is sufficient to run many years on gravel about 20 cents and that it can be done profitably with a sufficient head of water to run six inch giants.

Natural water provides about a five-month season and it is con-

Natural water provides about a five-month season and it is contempletated to increase this with reservoirs to at least a seven-month season. By starting operations in late winter each year even better advantage can be taken of the natural water, Mr. Howell predicts.

He said the concern expects to have about 15 men on the ground, which is directly west of North Powder, by July 15th, and that if possible the development would proceed so that full operations could be expected next season.
