(The F5 was amended after staff confirmed with the Department of Corrections (DOC) that the conviction was a violation, but the charge is punishable as a misdemeanor.) On 1/9/20 West pled guilty and was convicted of *Taking*, *Angling*, *Hunting*, *or Trapping in Violation of Wildlife Law or Rule*.

DPSST was notified by Justen Roberts that he was arrested on 5/26/19 for *Driving Under the Influence (DUI)* and *DUI with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC)* .08% or *Greater* in Chico, California. On 2/25/20, Roberts pled no contest and was convicted of the added charge of *Reckless Driving-Alcohol Related*, the *DUI* and *DUI with a BAC* .08% or *Greater* were dismissed due to the low BAC

6. Branford, Angela (49801) Certification Review: Corrections

On June 18, 2018, Angela Branford was terminated from the Washington County Sheriff's Office (WCSO). An internal investigation revealed that Branford inappropriately used law enforcement database systems for personal reasons and when questioned, attempted to omit information and mislead investigators in an effort to minimize her behavior.

7. Conklin, Robert (53852) Certification Review: Corrections

Presented by Linsay Hale

Reason for Discretionary Review

On December 19, 2018, Robert Conklin resigned from the Harney County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) during an investigation into his treatment of an inmate he believed had flooded his cell. Staff determined, Conklin's hostile behavior towards the inmate, specifically pushing the inmate into a security gate, yelling obscenities at the inmate, then pushing him against the wall violates the Board's moral fitness standards.

The committee discussed the moral fitness violation and identified the following aggravating and mitigating factors specific to this case:

• Aggravating:

- o Conklin did not provide any verbal command prior to using force during intake of the inmate.
- o The lieutenant did not request assistance from Conklin.
- o Conklin's lack of restraint by punching a cabinet once the inmate was in the cell
- Conklin's behavior, including the 2016 bar incident, shows an ongoing pattern of reckless behavior and the inability to conduct himself in a professional manner.
- O During the 2016 incident, Conklin attempted to have a fellow patrol deputy use their position to take action against the individual in a bar you ended up having the altercation with.
- o Both issues took place while Conklin was employed at the HCSO.

• Mitigating:

O Conklin received discipline for the prior event in 2016 and admitted to substance abuse.

8. Daley, Benjamin (56374) Certification Review: Corrections

On December 6, 2017, Benjamin Daley was discharged from the Department of Corrections/Oregon State Correctional Institution (DOC/OSCI) for failing to report for scheduled shifts and failing to respond after numerous attempts to contact him. Staff has confirmed with OSCI that Daley was also the subject of a criminal investigation which resulted from allegations that he was providing contraband that included tobacco, marijuana and porn to inmates housed at the OSCI.

• Aggravating:

- The Oregon State Police conducted a criminal investigation and found probable cause to charge Daley with Criminal Misconduct and Supplying Contraband.
- Daley was dishonest about his conduct when questioned by the Oregon State Police.
- o There were multiple accounts that Daley's behavior was ongoing and occurred on multiple occasions.
- o Daley's conduct jeopardized the safety and security of staff and inmates.
- o Daley failed to appear for multiple shifts
- o Daley abandoned state property when he left his assigned work equipment in his room when he moved out.

9. Verduzco, Sergio (42247) Certification Review: Corrections

Reason for Discretionary Review

On October 3, 2018, Sergio Verduzco resigned from the Department of Corrections/Deer Ridge Correctional Institution (DOC/DRCI) while under investigation for insubordination, inappropriate use of DOC resources and engaging in inappropriate, personal relationships with several individuals in custody and on active supervision.

This review is limited to Verduzco's unprofessional and unauthorized relationship with individuals in custody or on supervision as it relates to the Board's moral fitness standards.

- Aggravating:
 - Verduzco held the position of lieutenant at the time of your separation.
 - o Verduzco showed a lack of professionalism when he was overfamiliar with the personal lives of the inmates and their families.
 - o Verduzco's actions took you away from a shift that is regularly short staffed.
 - Verduzco failed to take any responsibility for his actions and attempted to justify and minimize his actions when interviewed.
 - o When Verduzco was on paid administrative leave, he did not stay home in accordance with the agreement with his command staff.
 - Verduzco was untruthful during the investigation, indicating he had been offered jobs teaching at the community college and could circumvent the hiring process.
 - Verduzco continued to participate in an unauthorized inmate program even after you had received discipline and were given direction not to continue.
- Mitigating:
 - o The committee did not identify any mitigating factors.

10. Yeaney, Joseph (25561) Certification Review: Corrections

Reason for Discretionary Review

On December 31, 2018, Joseph Yeaney resigned from the Department of Corrections/Columbia River Correctional Institution (DOC/CRCI) following an investigation into his failure to properly process a visitor into the facility and his subsequent dishonesty when questioned about his actions by fellow staff members.

Staff determined that Yeaney's untruthfulness violates the Board's moral fitness standards.

Joseph Yeaney provided verbal mitigation for committee consideration.

The committee discussed the moral fitness violation and identified the following aggravating and mitigating factors specific to this case:

Aggravating:

- o The record reflects that after the review of video footage from the intake area that the visitor did not walk through the metal detector and instead went through in their scooter which received a red light that indicated metal. This contradicts Yeaney's account of the incident.
- O Yeaney did not take ownership in the incident.
- Though Yeaney had 31 years of service with DOC, he failed to ask for assistance from other staff regarding the procedures in the area which he was assigned to and unfamiliar with.

Mitigating:

- o The verbal mitigation provided by Yeaney.
- o Yeaney had 31 years of service with DOC.
- o There was a possible language barrier and the conversation took place through glass which may have resulted in miscommunication.
- o Yeaney retired prior to being interviewed by his employer.

11. <u>Proposed Rule Changes for OAR 259-008-0100 – Oregon Fallen Law Enforcement Memorial Eligibility Criteria</u>

Presented by Jennifer Howald

On January 23, 2020, the Board discussed the eligibility criteria for recognition on the Oregon Fallen Law Enforcement Memorial. The prompt for the discussion was a proposed legislative concept developed to address the eligibility disparity between DPSST instructors who have law enforcement officer certifications and those who do not. The proposed legislative concept was tabled for additional discussion. The general consensus at the time indicated that instructors were not meant for inclusion on the Oregon Fallen Law Enforcement Memorial, regardless of their status as a certified law enforcement officer, because they are not acting as a law enforcement officer.

The Board's discussions highlighted a need to review the existing eligibility criteria to determine if the rules appropriately represent the types of line of duty deaths that should be honored on the Memorial.

Additional Department review identified a need to update the rule language to address redundancies, semantics and unnecessary content. For organizational purposes, the Department recommends removing the Oregon Fallen Law Enforcement Memorial rule content from OAR 259-008-0100 and adopting a separate rule to maintain the Memorial criteria.

The committee discussed this proposed rule changes and provided additional comments with the draft language. Staff will compile the comments provided by the Corrections Policy Committee and the Police Policy Committee to draft updated language to be presented at a later meeting before being presented to the Board.

12. Department Update

Eriks Gabliks Reported:

• Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, DPSST suspended all Criminal Justice Basic and Leadership training courses on March 17, 2020. The suspension affected all

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classes at the agency's 235-acre campus and also regional training opportunities. On May 4, 2020, we restarted training delivery with updated CDC guidelines that meet Governor Brown's Executive Orders regarding social distancing by implementing a plan of action for the safety of staff, students and guests. Our protocols can be found on-line at

https://www.oregon.gov/dpsst/CJ/Documents/DPSSTHealthandSafetyProtocols.pdf. To date, the protocols have been well received by staff and students. The Academy remains open for business but closed to visitors. In accordance with guidelines issued by the state's Department of Administrative Services (DAS), only students, staff and deliveries are allowed on campus at least until December, 31, 2020.

- DPSST continues to work with state budget officers on our need for additional basic training classes. DPSST is budgeted to deliver 16, 16-week, Basic Police Classes in the current biennium. The 16th budgeted class is scheduled to begin in December. If additional funds are not received for more classes this would mean no new Basic Police classes would be offered until July 1, 2021 which would create a significant impact for stakeholders. DPSST has also identified a need for at least one additional 6-week Basic Correction class to meet the needs of city and county corrections officers being hired. DPSST is working with stakeholder organizations to make them aware of this need.
- DPSST has been proactive and shared our work with state legislators, local elected officials, community partners, and media by holding a number of Webex sessions that covered three different areas: basic police training (one hour), police use of force training (one hour), and DPSST criminal justice professional standards (one hour). This doesn't mean that our other programs aren't important, these are the three areas that many Oregonians want to know more about due to the tragic death of George Floyd due to the actions of a Minneapolis police officer. All of the sessions have been posted on our webpage for all to see https://www.oregon.gov/dpsst/CJ/Pages/InformationalFiles.aspx
- Governor Kate Brown has appointed a Public Safety Training and Standards Task Force to recommend improvements to the training and certification of Oregon law enforcement officers. This will include recommendations on: how to apply best practices, research, and data to officer training and certification; how to best incorporate racial equity into law enforcement training and certification; use of force training, including best practices on incorporating concepts of de-escalation; and the composition of the Board of Public Safety Standards and Training and how to include additional public participation. While the focus is on DPSST police training, many of the items being discussed will also be of interest to corrections and parole and probation professionals. DPSST welcomes the review and will provide any assistance needed. We will keep you posted on the work of this task force.
- The Oregon Secretary of State Audits Division has commenced a performance audit of DPSST. The audit will be generally focused on law enforcement use of force practices, police accountability, and community policing objectives.
 DPSST welcomes the review and looks forward to working with the auditors.
 Again, while the focus is on DPSST police training, many of the items being

- discussed will also be of interest to corrections and parole and probation professionals. DPSST welcomes the review and will provide any assistance needed. We will keep you posted on the audit as it progresses.
- Governor Kate Brown recently called a special session of the Oregon Legislative Assembly to address urgent police accountability and COVID-19 legislative matters. DPSST is actively working with legislators and stakeholders during the session. Discussions included militarization of police, use of tear gas by police, limitations or elimination of neck restraints by police, arbitrator rulings of police misconduct, creating a statewide database on police officer discipline matters, oversight of police use of force investigations by the state attorney general's office, and a duty for police officers to report misconduct of fellow officers. DPSST has not trained the carotid neck restraint technique for more than a dozen years. DPSST has already implemented the decertification database on its webpage as directed by legislation passed during the special session. The work of the agency in the professional standards arena, along with database, has been recognized by both local, statewide and national media outlets.
- To stay engaged with stakeholders around the state, DPSST is sending electronic updates providing information on agency activities, enrollment information, and other pertinent information.
- There continues to be much interest in the work that DPSST does on both the
 professional standards and training fronts. We have received a number of calls
 and emails from elected officials and community members asking for information
 as to what we do. DPSST welcomes the interest and has responded to each
 inquiry.

Linsay Hale Reported:

Linsay reiterated the formation of the Applicant Review Committee (ARC) whose
purpose will be to review criminal conduct which occurred prior to an
individual's employment in public safety. The ARC will consist of two members
from each of the criminal justice Policy Committees as well as the public member
of the Board. The nominations for the ARC will take place at the November CPC.
