7. Department Update

Linsay Hale Presented

- Thanking John Rinier for his time and commitment to the Fire Policy Committee as he is retiring in July and congratulating Darren Bucich on his appointment to the chairmanship of the Board.
- The work group formed to review the Revocation and Denial process will meet following this FPC meeting to make sure that the practices are applicable to the Fire Service in 2020.

Kayla Ballrot Presented

• Maintenance Re-certification packets went out on June 1st 2020, they are due on 12/31/2020, we recognize that COVID-19 may effect this but encourage training, drills, and TPE's while maintaining social distancing practices. Extensions will be granted upon request.

- The Marine-Based Fire Fighter standard is up for renewal, a task force has been formed to meet and get this standard updated. This should be brought to the FPC in the November meeting.
- The Fire Officer task force has been announced and will most likely be convened at the end of the summer.
- DPSST and the Fire Program have a new website that will be rolled out Monday June 15th.

Julie Olsen Presented

- Training has not been occurring on campus but regional trainers are being sent out to department in their regions. Additional measures are being taken to keep both DPSST Training Staff and fire service personnel safe due to COVID-19.
- The Fallen Fire Fighter Memorial will be taking place September 17th at 1:00pm at DPSST, we are planning a virtual memorial and are working with the Honor Guard to determine what that will look like. Eric Aarseth will be added to the memorial wall this year as well.
- Grant opportunities were announced several months ago. We highly encourage more training associations to take advantage of them and to get grant requests submitted by October of 2020. The funding must be used by June 21st, 2021.
- The DPSST Fire Program has been asked to train the Oregon National Guard for wild fire season. We are in the process of planning the training and logistics of this event and will debrief the FPC in our August meeting.
- We have received a \$20,000 grant from the National Fire Academy to be used for fire training and we will work with an FPC sub-committee to determine what classes will be offered around the state.
- The Fire Program is still not in a position to hire more Training Staff but current staff are working to make sure that open areas throughout the state are having their training needs met.

Eriks Gabliks Presented

• DPSST is actively tracking the tragic death of George Floyd due to the actions of a Minneapolis police officer. There is no excuse for the actions of the Minneapolis police officer or the inactions of his three co-workers. As the state's standards and training agency for many public safety disciplines, including law enforcement, there is much interest in the work of DPSST. DPSST embraces transparency and has responded to inquiries from local, state and federal elected officials. For almost 20 years, DPSST has participated in a national decertification database that is operated by the International Association of Directors of Law Enforcement Standards and Training (IADLEST). This system, the National Decertification Index (NDI), is used by dozens of state criminal justice certification agencies but the challenge is that not all states certify, decertify, or use the same language for their actions. NDI is a "pointer system" that sends agencies to the state that entered the information for more details. DPSST has pledged to provide whatever

information is needed and to assist any legislative committees that are formed that will improve law enforcement professionalism through standards and training.

- On March 17, 2020, DPSST suspended all training classes due to the COVID-19 pandemic and updated CDC and Governor's guidelines. The suspension was necessary so that DPSST staff could create a health and safety protocol that managed risk and enabled training classes to return. The Academy has resumed operations but under new guidelines around the campus including Aramark food service. Staff have done a great job working with students to address risk and implement proactive cleaning measures and use of PPE. While the Academy was closed, more than three dozen DPSST staff answered the call for assistance issued by Oregon Emergency Management. DPSST staff assisted in the emergency coordination center, joint information center, incident management team, and the Wilsonville PPE distribution center. All DPSST staff have completed their assignments and have returned to normal duties.
- DPSST hosted the State's Fallen Law Enforcement Officer Memorial On May 5, 2020. While the
 campus was closed to the public, it was necessary to honor and remember Oregon's fallen police,
 corrections and parole and probation officers. A limited number of honor guard members
 participated in the modified ceremony and the names of all of the fallen were read. DPSST
 livestreamed the event on Facebook and also created a video afterwards that has generated more
 than 25,000 views to date.
- DPSST continues to work on its 2021-2023 Agency Request Budget as are other state agencies. DPSST is waiting to hear if reductions will be taken in the current 2019-2021 biennium. Until additional guidance is given, vacant positions at the agency are being held vacant to avoiding hiring an individual only to lay them off in a few months.
- Eriks asked committee members to keep Johnny Mack of Chemeketa Community College, and a former member of the Fire Policy Committee, in their thoughts and prayers as he works through some medical challenges.
