IDC students will be exposed to current methods of adult learning theory, international best practices in the areas of outcome driven techniques and diagnosing the root causes behind problem shooters. There will be a live teaching component to the class, where instructor candidates will have the opportunity to run a live fire training block. There will also be a TCCC presentation designed by current tactical team medical staff.

Overview: The Precision Carbine course is designed for Patrol Officers who carry and deploy the AR-15/M4/M16 weapon system in their routine patrol operations. This course will provide Patrol Officers with the skills necessary to make precision shots on low percentage targets under stress and less than ideal conditions at distances of 50 to 75 yards and shots on high percentage targets out to 100 yards or beyond. The Precision Carbine course curriculum is akin to a Patrol Marksman School designed around the capabilities and limitations of the standard patrol rifle/carbine and operator. This course is 10 hours in length and includes classroom and range instruction.

Overview: Public Safety Leadership in the Era of Accountability: Creating and Maintaining a "Well-Disciplined" Organization

The Oregon Association Chiefs of Police and DPSST are pleased to host this two-day class presented by Randy Means of the Thomas & Means Law Firm. Being labeled a "Well-Disciplined Organization" is a high compliment and does not mean "well-punished." In fact, the need to use a lot of punitive discipline is indicative of a poorly disciplined organization. A well-disciplined organization is a place where people follow the rules, do what they are supposed to do, and refrain from doing otherwise. This program, then, is about motivating employees to do just that, utilizing a broad array of very focused organizational leadership initiatives. This is not "Leadership 101." It is an applied macro-leadership seminar about the shaping of organizational culture through the proper use of policy, training, supervision and systems. It deals with leadership responsibilities that are non-negotiable. Styles can and will vary from leader to leader but adherence to certain key principles cannot. Leaders must put employees on clear notice of organizational standards. Those standards must be consistently enforced. Sanctions must be consistent and proportionate. The supervision function must be led and managed. In certain key respects, it cannot vary from supervisor to supervisor; overarching consistency must be maintained from workgroup to workgroup. This requires a systemic approach to handling what historically was left to individual supervisory and managerial discretions. The program demonstrates the need for organizational solutions to organizational problems and emphasizes roles and responsibilities of the various members of the leadership team-from first line supervisor to CEO. It includes discussion of the more global aspects of leadership-leading an organization rather than just a smaller component of one. It helps first-line supervisors and mid-managers see a bigger picture. And it reminds senior management personnel of the vital need to keep close watch on smaller things. If you take care of problems while they're small, you don't get a lot of big problems. Theme: accountability at all organizational levels.

Overview: Public Safety Leadership in the Era of Accountability: Creating and Maintaining a "Well-Disciplined" Organization

The Oregon Association Chiefs of Police and DPSST are pleased to host this two-day class presented by Randy Means of the Thomas & Means Law Firm. Being labeled a "Well-Disciplined Organization" is a high compliment and does not mean "well-punished." In fact, the need to use a lot of punitive discipline is indicative of a poorly disciplined organization. A well-disciplined organization is a place where people follow the rules, do what they are supposed to do, and refrain from doing otherwise. This program, then, is about motivating employees to do just that, utilizing a broad array of very focused organizational leadership initiatives. This is not "Leadership 101." It is an applied macro-leadership seminar about the shaping of organizational culture through the proper use of policy, training, supervision and systems. It deals with leadership responsibilities that are non-negotiable. Styles can and will vary from leader to leader but adherence to certain key principles cannot. Leaders must put employees on clear notice of organizational standards. Those standards must be consistently enforced. Sanctions must be consistent and proportionate. The supervision function must be led and managed. In certain key respects, it cannot vary from supervisor to supervisor; overarching consistency must be maintained from workgroup to workgroup. This requires a systemic approach to handling what historically was left to individual supervisory and managerial discretions. The program demonstrates the need for organizational solutions to organizational problems and emphasizes roles and responsibilities of the various members of the leadership team-from first line supervisor to CEO. It includes discussion of the more global aspects of leadership-leading an organization rather than just a smaller component of one. It helps first-line supervisors and mid-managers see a bigger picture. And it reminds senior management personnel of the vital need to keep close watch on smaller things. If you take care of problems while they're small, you don't get a lot of big problems. Theme: accountability at all organizational levels.

Overview: The Oregon Drug Evaluation & Classification Program has received national acclaim for its success in identifying the drug-impaired driver. Officers trained as Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) are frequently called upon to differentiate between drug influence and medical and/or mental disorders. The certified DRE is a critical tool in combating the adverse impact of drug and alcohol impaired driving in our communities.

DRE School is demanding. To receive certification as a DRE, three phases of training must be completed. The following summarizes each phase:

ACADEMIC TRAINING (Phase I & II): This phase is conducted over nine days (72 hours). It includes courses in physiology, vital signs, standardized field sobriety testing (SFST), and extensive material on each of the seven categories of the drugs of abuse. The training includes three written examinations, an SFST proficiency examination and five written quizzes. Students must achieve a minimum of 80% on each examination, and must demonstrate proficiency in administering SFSTs.

CERTIFICATION PHASE (Phase III): After successfully completing the academic portion, the students must complete the certification phase. Certification Training is tentatively scheduled for June, 2019 in Portland, OR. Students will attend one of the training weeks in Portland. Depending on the size of the class, one week option will be canceled and the groups will combine. This is an additional five days of required training after phase 1 & 2. At this time, the above certification dates are the only dates available in Oregon for 2018. With the recommendation of the DRE State Coordinator, out of state certification training is an option, but will be at the expense of the student's agency.

It is the student's responsibility to attend and complete the certification requirements within six months following DRE School. The requirements include: conducting a minimum of 12 drug influence evaluations while under the supervision of a DRE instructor; identifying subjects under the influence, and attaining a 80% toxicological confirmation rate. Written reports will be submitted to the DRE instructor observing the evaluation for review and approval. In addition, the student must maintain an accurate progress certification log, DRE rolling log and submit a curriculum vitae. Lastly, the student must pass a comprehensive final knowledge examination, and obtain the written endorsement from two certified DRE instructors and the DRE State Coordinator before obtaining certification and IACP credentials.

- Must be SFST, D.I.D. (Drugs That Impair Driving) and Intoxilyzer 8000 certified.
- A reasonable background and experience conducting DUI investigations.
- A written recommendation from your local prosecutor.
- Written recommendations from two local DREs.
- Submit a minimum of two actual DUI arrest reports for review.

Overview: The Reno Police Training Officer (PTO) model is based on the teaching principles of Problem-Based Learning (PBL) and emphasizes the need for the PTO to function primarily as a trainer rather than as an evaluator. PBL is firmly established in the fields of medicine and education, where it is used to facilitate the transfer of knowledge. Similarly, in policing, recruits need to learn much more than just laws and police procedures. They must also understand how to transfer their academy knowledge effectively when dealing with individuals and issues within a community. As demands on police continue to increase, agencies must provide officers with the resources and the training necessary to fulfill their expanded role. This approach will help police recruits think about their roles and responsibilities as they approach specific problems in their daily work. Problem solving is an integral part of police work and requires a creative and flexible method of thinking.

The PBL model encourages flexibility and creativity and this training model is designed to emphasize community-oriented policing principles and leadership development and train new recruits to be problem-solvers as they enter the field. This model is adaptable to any discipline within the criminal justice system (Corrections, P & P, etc.).

Care Under Fire:

Care rendered at the scene of the injury while both the medic and the casualty are under hostile fire. Available medical equipment is limited to that carried by each operator and the medic.

Tactical Field Care:

Care rendered once the casualty is no longer under effective hostile fire. Medical equipment is still limited to that carried into the field by mission personnel. Time prior to evacuation may range from a few minutes to many hours.

Agitated individuals can often be directed away from violence by specific communication skills. Verbal de-escalation techniques are geared to "set up" those being contained so that physical control techniques are enhanced, if they become necessary. When the public is witness to successful verbal de-escalation, they better understand and respect the challenges facing an officer, which contributes to future officer safety.
