### **EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 23-26**

## ESTABLISHING A STATE GOVERNMENT ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE ADVISORY COUNCIL

WHEREAS, artificial intelligence is a term coined in 1956; and

WHEREAS, generative artificial intelligence has the potential to bring significant benefits and also raise questions and concerns regarding ethics, privacy, notification, security, employment, education, and social change; and

WHEREAS, ensuring the safe and beneficial use of artificial intelligence has never been more crucial; and

WHEREAS, the potential for artificial intelligence to replicate, codify, and systematize discrimination and related impacts is extensive enough to have created a partner industry of activists, advocacy groups, and organizations devoted to shaping artificial intelligence policies to prevent further harm; and

**WHEREAS,** Oregon's State Data Strategy explicitly centers equity and ethics at the forefront of Oregon's use of data and artificial intelligence systems; and

**WHEREAS**, the federal government released a Blueprint for Artificial Intelligence Bill of Rights further centering the need for ethical and equitable principles, practices, and guidelines for government artificial intelligence adoption in order to protect individuals from harm; and

WHEREAS, the exponential growth of artificial intelligence technologies should be documented, and the potential risks of their use should be acknowledged, planned for, and mitigated; and

**WHEREAS,** maximizing potential benefits of ethical and effective artificial intelligence implementation and adoption requires thoughtful governance and standards to mitigate risk and address privacy, ethics, and equity; and

WHEREAS, a stable and thoughtful regulatory approach to the use of artificial intelligence technologies in Oregon will continue to foster an environment for innovation while protecting individual and civil rights;



### EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 23-26 PAGE TWO

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, TINA KOTEK,** Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Oregon, do hereby issue this order to become effectively immediately:

### **IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:**

- 1. The Governor's Oregon State Government Artificial Intelligence Advisory Council (the "Council") is established. The Council shall recommend an action plan to guide awareness, education, and usage of artificial intelligence in state government that aligns with the State's policies, goals, and values and supports public servants to deliver customer service more efficiently and effectively. The recommended action plan shall include concrete executive actions, policies, and investments needed to leverage artificial intelligence while honoring transparency, privacy, and diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- 2. The Council shall consist of no more than fifteen (15) members. All members of the Council must have a commitment to data ethics and data equity. The members shall be selected as follows:
  - a. The President of the Senate shall appoint one member of the Oregon State Senate;
  - b. The Speaker of the House shall appoint one member of the Oregon House of Representatives;
  - c. Oregon State Chief Information Officer;
  - d. Oregon State Chief Data Officer;
  - e. Representative from the Governor's Racial Justice Council, appointed by the Governor;
  - f. Department of Administrative Services Cultural Change Officer;
  - g. Executive Branch agency representative, appointed by the Governor;
  - h. The Governor shall appoint up to eight additional members. These members, at the discretion of the Governor, may include community organizations with demonstrated expertise in data justice; artificial intelligence experts from Oregon universities; and representatives from local governments.



### EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 23-26 PAGE THREE

- 3. The Governor shall designate the Oregon State Chief Information Officer as Chair of the Council.
- 4. A quorum for the Council meetings shall consist of a majority of the appointed members. The Council shall strive to operate by consensus; however, the Council may approve measures and recommendations based on an affirmative vote of a majority of the quorum.
- 5. The Council shall provide a recommended plan framework to the Governor's Office no later than six months from date of convening, and a final recommended action plan no later than 12 months from convening. The report shall include the findings and recommendations of the Council.
- 6. The Council shall be staffed by Enterprise Information Services. In addition, all state offices and agencies shall provide necessary support to the Council.
- 7. The Council shall make specific recommendations for policy changes and investments for consideration by the Governor, in order that:
  - a. Awareness of artificial intelligence (AI) is promoted to support state employees with information needed for their decision making; and
  - b. The State has clear usage policies that outline the acceptable use of AI tools, providing transparency, uplifting diversity, equity, and inclusion, and protecting personally identifiable information and other sensitive information.

A quorum for the Council meetings shall consist of a majority (8) of the appointed members (14).

The Council shall strive to operate by consensus; however, the Council may approve measures and recommendations based on an affirmative vote of a majority of the quorum.



A board [council] may only do what the law authorizes. Thus, a board has no inherent authority to act. A board may take an action only if the law provides authority for the intended action. A single board member acting alone has no authority unless specifically granted, as in the case of a chair, and an individual cannot take action to bind the state.

Advisory boards may be created by the Governor... They serve as advisors on policy matters to their appointing authority who is responsible for the management and administration of the policy. These boards study existing policy and make recommendations for change or implementation. Although they do not have final authority to make or enforce rules, their research and advice to decision makers contribute to effective changes in state government.



Oregon enacted the public records and public meetings laws in 1973. These laws reflect the legislature's policy choice that the public is entitled to know how the government's business is conducted.

ORS 192.410(4) states public records include any writing containing information relating to the conduct of the public's business...

The term "writing" is broadly defined in ORS 192.410(6) as including every type of documentation. For instance, hand-written documents, photographs, computer discs, emails, instant messages, text messages, etc.

Emails are public records even if sent or received on a personal email account.

If you don't receive a state email account, it is highly encouraged you create a separate email account to use for conducting your board communications.



Oregon's public meetings law serves two purposes:

- To provide a means by which the public can be informed about the deliberations and decisions of state government; and
- To ensure governing bodies in Oregon have an open decision-making process.

Except for executive sessions, any member of the public may attend any public meeting.

The public meetings law applies to state and local government "governing bodies" of "public bodies."

"Governing body" means the members of any public body consisting of two or more members (for instance, a board, commission, committee, subcommittee or council) with authority: To make decisions for a public body on policy or administration, or

To make recommendations to a public body on policy or administration.

In a recent opinion, the Court of Appeals held that serial communications among a quorum of a governing body, even if conducted through an intermediary, can constitute a "meeting" for purposes of the public meetings law.



There are four basic requirements for conducting a public meeting:

- 1. Advance notice must be provided to interested parties of meetings, location, and the main subjects.
- 2. Meetings must be open to public attendance, unless it's an executive session.
- 3. The meeting must be recorded or written minutes must be made.
- 4. Votes must be cast publicly and recorded.

Advance noticed must be given for all public meetings. The notice should include the time, place, and main subjects.



- Notify Board Administrator of planned absence
- Quorum and roll call
- Hand raise Teams function to request the floor and promote one person speaking at a time
- State your name each time you speak for transparency in the case of audio listening
- Parliamentary procedures for decision making

Purpose	The purpose of the Council is to recommend an action plan to guide awareness education, and usage of artificial intelligence in state government that aligns with the State's policies, goals, and values and supports public servants to deliver customer service more efficiently and effectively. The recommended action plan shall include concrete executive actions, policies, and investments needed to leverage artificial intelligence while honoring transparency, privacy, and diversity, equity, and inclusion.
