Plan for a Resilient Oregon Statewide Resilience Forum Overview & Agreements October 2025

The **Oregon Statewide Resilience Forum** is a group of resilience practitioners, researchers, and leaders that will support and advise on development of the **Plan for a Resilient Oregon (PRO)**. The PRO is a people-centered, multi-hazard resilience strategy commissioned by Governor Tina Kotek. The PRO is scheduled for release by **Labor Day 2026**. It aims to inform the **2027–2029 state budget**, legislative agenda, and executive agency directives.

Purpose and Role: The Statewide Resilience Forum (SRF) brings together diverse, engaged leaders from the state and local levels to

- Guide development of a flexible, actionable resilience framework.
- Ensure the plan reflects lived experience, regional diversity, and community-specific challenges.
- Vet and advise on preliminary strategies, key findings, and recommendations.
- Support the incorporation of community feedback, scientific research, and agency expertise into the PRO.

Forum participants will collaborate to suggest potential ways to align statewide policy with local realities and urgent resilience needs by offering their perspectives, providing substantive input, and reviewing drafts. The Forum is intentionally designed to bring both statewide strategy and local wisdom to the planning process. Participants will represent their organizations, agencies, or regions rather than expressing their individual opinions; however, their personal experience and knowledge

Deliverables & Impact: The Statewide Resilience Forum's work will:

- Contribute directly to the drafting and refinement of the Plan for a Resilient Oregon.
- Inform a Story Map that visually captures resilience challenges and solutions.
- Spotlight effective existing practices and shape new, strategic recommendations to enhance Oregon's resilience.

Engagement and Research Backbone: The work of the Forum is supported by a joint research team from the **University of Oregon's Oregon Partnership for Disaster Resilience** and **Oregon State University's Oregon Climate Change Research Institute**. This team's scope of work includes the following:

- Inventory and analyze existing resilience plans.
- Design qualitative engagement tools for use by the Regional Resilience Forums.
- Conduct interviews and focus groups with state agencies, infrastructure experts, and other relevant individuals and entities.
- Serve as a resource to the Statewide Resilience Forum, and

 Synthesize findings and draft the Plan for a Resilient Oregon in collaboration with the PRO team in the governor's office.

Composition: The Forum is composed primarily of representatives directly working in the resilience field from state agencies, statewide associations, and community-based organizations. The public is also welcome. The group will adhere to a published agenda and shared expectations and agreements, outlined below, to allow all participants to engage productively and equitably.

Meetings and Discussion: The Statewide Resilience Forum will hold meetings on a set day and time each month until June of 2026. While not subject to Oregon public meeting rules, the SRF will hold virtual meetings open to the public, and any written materials provided will be maintained in a public access file that is available for examination.

These meetings will generally follow a common agenda, adhere to an approved schedule of subject matter discussions, and yet encourage dialogue and inquiry. In all cases, efforts will be made to solicit input from individuals who have been directly involved in, or who have special knowledge of, resilience in Oregon.

Forum Decision-Making and Facilitation: The SRF will provide context and experience which will be valuable to Plan for a Resilient Oregon. As an advisory body without official decision-making ability, The Forum will advise the Plan for a Resilient Oregon, with final decision-making reserved for the Governor. The Forum will generally operate by consensus or consent with voting utilized as a last resort. To guide the discussion, each meeting will have a facilitator who will be identified before each meeting. To clarify the group's advice to the governor, facilitators may take straw polls, ask participants to rank options, and so forth.

The governor's office staff and the research team will share facilitation responsibilities. A lead facilitator will be designated for each meeting. In accordance with the standards of conduct, the facilitator will be responsible for managing the discussion, ensuring broad participation, and following the agenda. Specific decisions about the conduct and flow of the meeting will be made by the meeting facilitator.

Meeting Location and Agendas: Meetings will be held monthly and will be virtual, unless otherwise noted. A meeting schedule will be posted on the project website. All efforts will be made to make any meeting schedule or venue change at least a week in advance of the meeting. Agendas for the Forum meetings will be set by the Governor's Office staff in consultation with research partners. Meeting agendas and supporting materials will be distributed to participants at least one week ahead of the meetings.

Minutes from the previous meeting will be posted with the agenda for the next meeting. Minutes will reflect the general topics of conversation, key points of consensus or disagreement, and expected follow-up actions.

Meeting Participation Expectations: Participants in the Statewide Resilience Forum are expected to:

- Serve the public interest
 - Serve the mission of the PRO and the public good above personal, political, or organizational interests.
 - Abide by all relevant statutes, regulations, policies, and procedural rules.

- Act with integrity and honesty
 - o Provide accurate, truthful input based on their expertise and experience.
 - Disclose any potential or actual conflicts of interest promptly.
- Encourage inclusivity and equity
 - Make space for all participants to speak or engage.
 - Welcome and consider diverse perspectives.
- Engage respectfully and professionally
 - o Treat all colleagues, staff, and the public with courtesy, even in disagreement.
 - Listen attentively and avoid interrupting others.
 - o Communicate thoughtfully:
- Participate constructively
 - Attend meetings regularly and prepare for the meetings.
 - o Engage in discussions in good faith, focusing on solutions.

Should additional expectations be proposed, the whole group will be consulted for agreement.

Subject-Matter Experts: Experts and those with lived experience may be invited to present at meetings to provide their expertise, knowledge, and wisdom. With the input of the SRF, a schedule of topics will be developed for the series of meetings.

Connection to Regional Forums: The Statewide Resilience Forum is directly informed by five Regional Resilience Forums, made up of fifty-three community-based organizations (CBOs) from across Oregon. Each Regional Forum will engage regionally and with their own community constituencies to raise issues, gaps, and recommendations. In each region, the State of Oregon has contracted with a core group of CBOs who are compensated for local outreach events as well as their participation in their region's forum. These CBOs are responsible for:

- Attending monthly regional meetings (Oct 2025–July 2026).
- Hosting community engagement events.
- Providing culturally relevant input.
- Collecting stories and sharing local resilience priorities.

Regional Facilitators will organize monthly meetings, compile input, and participate in the Statewide Resilience Forum on behalf of their region. The five contracted regional facilitator organizations are:

Understanding the Landscape of Resilience Planning Pathways

Plan for a Resilient Oregon

The Plan for a Resilient Oregon (PRO) is a statewide initiative launched by the Governor's Office to help Oregon communities prepare for and adapt to increasingly severe disasters. A people-centered plan, it centers equity, local knowledge, and community-driven solutions, with a focus on building long-term resilience across diverse geographies and populations. The planning process began in early 2025 and will unfold over two years, culminating in a published Resilience Plan and StoryMap. Monthly Statewide Resilience Forums—starting October 2025—will serve as key venues for public input, knowledge sharing, and collaborative visioning as we build this plan together.

The following sections outline options PRO can pursue throughout this planning process based on the American Planning Association's *Planning for State Resilience: A 50-State Breakdown*.

Creating Oregon's Resilience Plan

Common Themes Across Plans

Across the country, resilience plans share overlapping priorities. APA's analysis shows that successful plans often include:

- Equity & Environmental Justice: Prioritizing frontline and tribal communities and embedding equity in funding, engagement, and metrics.
- **Nature-Based Solutions:** Wetland restoration, green infrastructure, and forest health are common strategies.
- **Infrastructure Modernization:** Upgrades to energy, transportation, water, and broadband systems are central to resilience.
- **Climate Hazards:** Plans address wildfire, flooding, extreme heat, drought, and sea-level rise using scenario modeling and risk assessments.
- **Community Engagement:** Inclusive outreach—such as multilingual materials, youth engagement, and advisory panels—is essential to legitimacy and impact.
- Governance & Coordination: Interagency collaboration, regional partnerships, specific roles, and clear implementation pathways are key to success.

Purpose & Implementation Mechanisms

APA's review shows that states use a mix of mechanisms to implement resilience plans. APA notes that states with strong legislative or executive mandates tend to have more durable and well-funded resilience strategies. Oregon can draw from these models to design a plan that is both visionary and actionable:

By learning from national models, integrating community voices, and aligning with proven planning frameworks, Oregon can craft a plan that is both visionary and grounded—one that reflects the lived realities of its people and the diverse landscapes they call home. The Resilience Plan will not be a static document, but a dynamic roadmap for collaboration, investment, and action.






