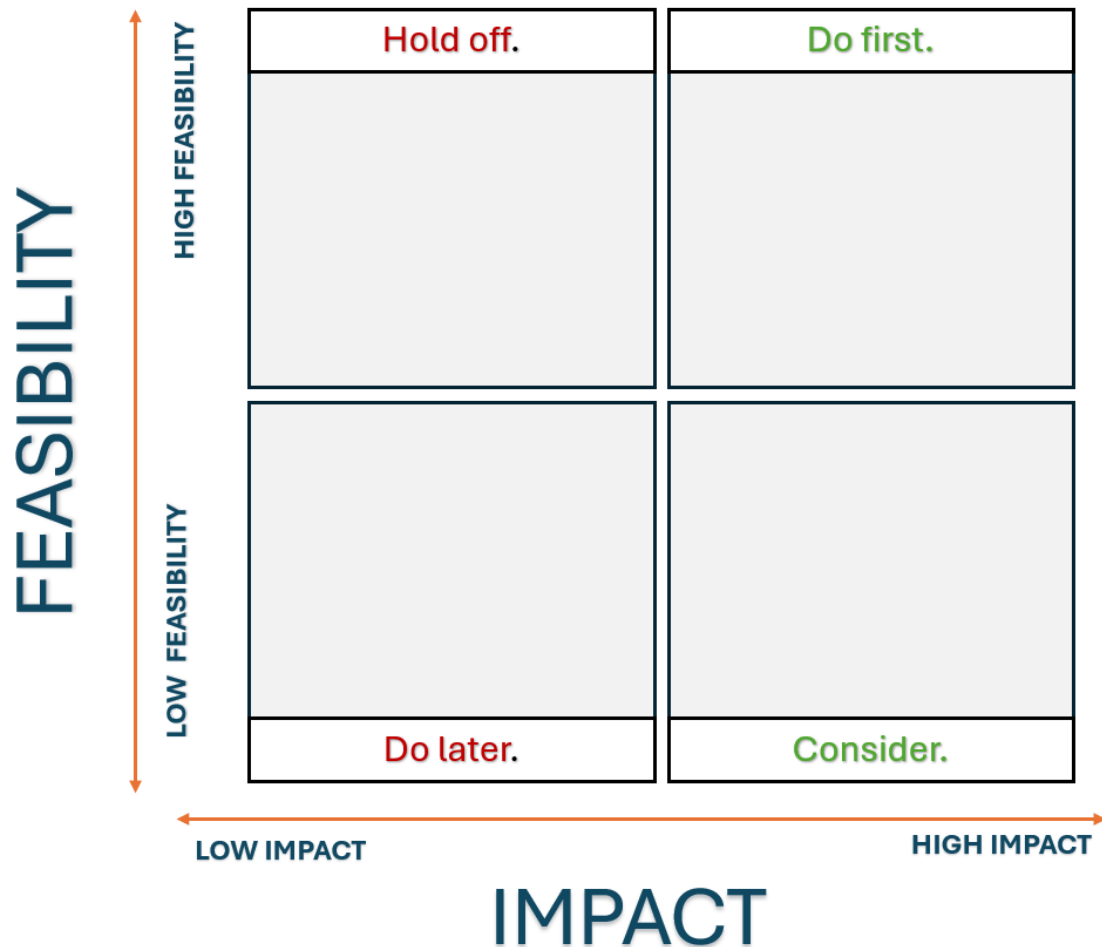


## Prioritization Framework: Feasibility and Impact

When prioritizing options, it will be helpful to focus on what is:

- *Most Feasible* – This includes what recommendations have lowest barriers for implementation, are affordable, and can be implemented within a specific timeframe
- *Most Impactful* – What recommendations have the greatest impact and for whom?

<b>Key Definitions</b>	
<b>Feasibility</b>	<p>The degree to which a recommendation is implementable.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Having necessary resources or pathway to resources</li> <li>- Expanding an existing effort or launching something new</li> <li>- Political feasibility</li> <li>- The degree to which an idea has broad community support</li> <li>- Having a solution ready within a specific timeframe that aligns with the Council's timeline</li> <li>- Low barrier</li> </ul>
<b>Impact</b>	<p>The degree to which a recommendation will have the desired impact.</p> <p><i>For all subcommittees</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Data Driven / Prior demonstrated success in achieving the desired outcome</li> <li>- The likelihood that the solution will provide the workforce to serve the Medicaid population</li> </ul> <p><i>Subcommittee specific criteria:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Each subcommittee will develop specific criteria for their work</li> </ul>

### **Other Criteria to Consider**

- *Timeline for Implementation* – Can the recommendation be advanced in the short-term, mid-term, or long-term; and how long will it take to see the impact?
- *Resources Required* – What resources (staffing, legislative, funding, etc.) will be required to advance the recommendation?
