
Prioritization Framework: Feasibility and Impact

When prioritizing options, it will be helpful to focus on what is:

- Most Feasible This includes what recommendations have lowest barriers for implementation, are affordable, and can be implemented within a specific timeframe
- Most Impactful What recommendations have the greatest impact and for whom?

Key Definitions	
Feasibility	The degree to which a recommendation is implementable. - Having necessary resources or pathway to resources - Expanding an existing effort or launching something new - Political feasibility - The degree to which an idea has broad community support - Having a solution ready within a specific timeframe that aligns with the Council's timeline - Low barrier
Impact	The degree to which a recommendation will have the desired impact. For all subcommittees - Data Driven / Prior demonstrated success in achieving the desired outcome - The likelihood that the solution will provide the workforce to serve the Medicaid population Subcommittee specific criteria: - Each subcommittee will develop specific criteria for their work

Other Criteria to Consider

- *Timeline for Implementation* Can the recommendation be advanced in the short-term, mid-term, or long-term; and how long will it take to see the impact?
- Resources Required What resources (staffing, legislative, funding, etc.) will be required to advance the recommendation?
